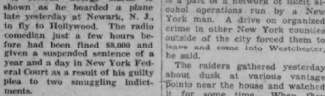

CAPTAIN DROWNS HERE IN ATTEMPT TO BOARD BARGE

John King Loses Hold On Rope While Descending To Vessel

RESCUE EFFORT FUTILE Three Friends See Master Of Boat Plunge Into Icy Harbor Waters

Capt. John King, 52, master of a barge tied up in Mamaroneck Harbors East Basin, was drowned last night when he lost his hold on a rope and fell into the water as he was attempting to board the vessel.

The accident happened at 2:30 A. M. at the public docks on Harbor Island. Efforts to revive the man with artificial respiration were futile and he was pronounced dead at 2:50 A. M. by Dr. F. P. Hunter.

According to village police, Captain King was returning to the barge with three friends from the Manhattan Hotel, 270 East 17th Street, New York City, when they reached the point on Harbor Island where the barge was tied up.

Examinations later indicated he had suffered a laceration of the forehead and of the back of the scalp, probably having struck his head against the side of the barge as he went down.

Rescue obtained a ladder from the barge dock and extended down into the water. He clambered down it and caught hold of Captain King pulling him up to one of the wooden piles supporting the dock. He held the man while Dr. Hunter went for assistance.

Dr. Amos O. Squire, county medical examiner, later ordered the body removed to the Silcock and Keck Funeral Home. He gave an autopsy as the cause of death.

Representatives of the Bowker Construction Company, New York City, owners of the barge, also were scheduled to investigate the village today to investigate.

The barge, it was understood, had been loaded with material bound for the New York World's Fair grounds. It had been tied up at the dock for more than a week, fully loaded, awaiting a crew of men on the barge so that it could be moved out.

NAZIS ASSAIL PRESIDENT German Press Refers To His 'Shameless War Agitation' In Bitter Attack

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2 (AP)—After President Roosevelt and members of a House appropriations subcommittee had conferred on "world affairs" and "technical developments" in connection with the army defense program, Chairman Snyder (D-N.Y.) announced today that the army bill would carry a provision to make \$50,000,000 available for the production of planes under way.

The War Department announced that the program would include additional planes needed in expanding the air corps.

General Young, former commander of the air corps training center in Trenton, became chief yesterday of a new training and operations division here.

Today's Presidential conference, Snyder said, included no mention of plane sales to France, reported to have been discussed Tuesday by the executive.

Chancellor Hitler's own newspaper, 'Völkischer Beobachter', also joined the Nazi press attack against what was interpreted here as a plea by President Roosevelt to bank European democracies in a defense against fascist states.

The German press attack on Roosevelt was inspired by accounts reaching Europe of his conference Tuesday with the Senate Military Affairs Committee. Members of the committee said the President told them the United States intended to help Europe's democracies arm against threats of totalitarian aggression by selling them planes and supplies.

The resolution was suggested by Chairman Snyder and was approved by a vote of 22 to 11. It provided for the production of 2,000 planes and 100 bombers in 1939.

TEACHERS FACING PAYLESS PAYDAYS UNDER NEW RULING

Constitutional Amendment Halts Town School Loans On Uncollected Taxes

RYE NECK ALSO AFFECTED Education Boards May Be Forced To Take Action To Meet Situation

School teachers and other employees in the school systems of Mamaroneck, Rye Neck and other Westchester communities face payless paydays as the result of a ruling on a new amendment to the State Constitution, it was learned today.

The school district has approximately \$100,000 in uncollected taxes which ordinarily would be paid by the Town Board by borrowing on the Town of Rye, which is similarly affected, the Rye Neck School District has \$150,000 in uncollected taxes. Both school districts, it was understood, have come to depend on borrowings from their townships to meet obligations which are coming due.

Under the construction given the amendment, the Town will not be able to borrow on tax anticipation notes customarily made available to the school district on Feb. 15. What action will be taken by the Board of Education and the Town Board remains a matter of speculation.

A resolution favoring the publication of names and amounts being received by individuals was adopted at a meeting of the American Bar Association in New York City recently, the consensus was that under Article 8, municipalities were prohibited from lending their credit to assist districts or other political subdivisions.

PRESIDENT TERMS 'RHINE FRONTIER' STATEMENT A LIFE

U. S. Foreign Policy Has Not And Will Not Be Changed, He Declares

ITALY ASKED TO EXPLAIN American Embassy Asks Reason For Hostile Press Campaign

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3 (AP)—President Roosevelt termed a "deliberate lie" today a statement that he had said the American frontier is on the Rhine.

The President, at a press conference at which he reported America's foreign policy recently, also described as a lie the report that he had said the American frontier was in France.

The chief executive declared some reports of his conference with the Senate Military Committee last Tuesday had given a correct impression of this nation's policy. He added most of them had been manufactured by some radio and newspaper owners and editors and they were a deliberate attempt at distortion of existing facts.

This nation's foreign policy, the President said, has not changed and would not be changed. He reiterated to be:

1. Opposition to any entangling alliances.
2. Maintenance of world trade for all nations including ourselves.
3. We are in sympathy with each and every effort to reduce or limit armaments.
4. As a nation we are sympathetic with the peaceful maintenance of political, economic and social independence of all nations in the world.

That, the President emphasized, was very simple and there was nothing new in it.

Mr. Roosevelt said the people were beginning to realize that all things they read from agitators or the legitimate and newspaper owner variety in connection with the defense and foreign policy programs were pure lies.

These agitators, he said, were appealing to the emotions and fears of the people and were not in the American way.

The President's statement of foreign policy followed a question which suggested that some people were confused about what actually took place at his conference with the Senate Military Committee and also his meeting yesterday with a House subcommittee on the army bill.

Mr. Roosevelt said he always had believed foreign policy should not be involved in politics, and he did not think the 1940 campaign should enter into the question of foreign policy and American defense in the year 1940.

All the people had to do, he declared, was to read the headlines to realize the pure garbage in connection with his conference. He added these guesses were developed up the next day to assume a false position.

He said the question of secrecy was 100 per cent blank. To illustrate Mr. Roosevelt said reports reached the government which were believed to be probably true but which probably could not be proved in a court.

The President said he had 14 or 15 newspapers before him which gave erroneous reports of what took place at the conference with the Senate committee.

The public, Mr. Roosevelt said, knows pretty well that when they read such reports that they are not news but merely rumors.

Asked about the "American frontier is on the Rhine" statement, the President with a smile declared some look got that off.

Italy Asked to Explain

ROME, Feb. 3 (AP)—The United States Embassy today asked the Italian Government for an explanation of bitter personal attacks on President Roosevelt published in the Fascist press.

The attacks were part of an intense hostile press campaign provoked by versions of the President's meeting Tuesday with a Senate committee, which quoted him as saying that the frontiers of the United States were in France.

Meanwhile the Italian press today again turned in editorial gags on President Roosevelt, claiming him almost unanimously of trying to provoke war.

A typical headline was the Rome newspaper, Il Piccolo, "The Fascist Secretary in the Service of the Chamber."

Premier Mussolini's own newspaper, Il Popolo d'Italia in Milan, called the President's reported remarks an "extremely serious and grave mistake."

Members of Legation, Foreign Minister Count Ciano's newspaper, called Roosevelt "Public Enemy No. 1 of Europe."

"Roosevelt in America" (Washington Post) in England, and "Lemon Head in France," it is reported said "assassins of Mussolini," Jewish bankers and social-communists, are heading the movement for war.

The trustees were to provide funds for the delinquent real estate taxes last year day the town's bonding authority authorized the council that the sale would be illegal under a recently enacted amendment to the State Finance Law.

County Attorney William A. Devlin, who attended the meeting, said he disagreed with the board's action, but agreed that the council was within its right to pay the taxes.

The financial aspect of every school district in the township is affected by the sale. The trustees are to be paid by the school districts by either school authorities of Mamaroneck or by members of the Township Board at what steps might be taken here. Sufficient funds are on hand, it was understood, to meet payroll until a settlement of the matter is reached. The school district said that as planned in Rye is contemplated here.

THE MAMARONECK VILLAGES DEMOCRATS STAND BEHIND O'CONNOR AND HIS POLICIES

Party Not Satisfied He Should Withdraw From Political Endeavor

RESIGNATION ACCEPTED

Committee Calls Another Meeting For Next Friday Evening

Despite the withdrawal of William F. O'Connor as chairman of the Mamaroneck Village Democratic Committee, the committee at a meeting yesterday endorsed the "principles" he advocated during his chairmanship, and declared it was not "satisfied" that he should withdraw completely from political endeavor.

The committee's action was taken to mean that it would stand behind Mr. O'Connor should he decide to seek office in the party election as either an independent candidate or as a candidate on an insurgent Republican ticket, should there be one.

The committee's resolution accepted "with regret" Mr. O'Connor's resignation, and put the party leaders on record as "pledging their support to his principles during his term of office."

The resolution further stated that the committee "would not go on record as being completely satisfied with his political retirement as indicated by his statement Saturday."

HINES DEFENSE DENIED MISTRIAL

Stryker's Motion Enlivens Start Of Third Week

NEW YORK, Feb. 6 (AP)—A defense demand for a mistrial—promptly denied by the court—enlivened the start today of the third week of Tammany district leader James J. Hines' retrial on policy racket conspiracy charges.

Lloyd Paul Stryker, Hines' lawyer, made his motion during District Attorney Thomas E. Dewey's opening in the case Wednesday evening in the State Building on Nassau Avenue near West 42nd street.

Committees he appointed yesterday are expected to make reports there. A committee to interview candidates is headed by Miss Anna O'Connor, secretary to the committee. A committee to be headed by Harold O. Thomsen, and committee on registration by Harry Kellie.

Among the major principles advocated by Mr. O'Connor during his term in office—principles which the committee yesterday pledged itself to give continued support—was his contention that the present form of government had given way to "partial politics."

Mr. O'Connor summarized his views in that portion of his statement Saturday which read:

"Without inquiring too deeply into the motives of those involved in the various districts and subsequent re-ignition of the Village Manager, nor of the failure of the independence of that individual under his present status, the announced candidacy of the chairman of the Republican Village Committee, Edward J. Kahn, for trustee forces me to realize that organization politics are again to take over, bag and baggage, the government of this Village."

SENATE REJECTS NOMINATION OF ROBERTS, 72-9

Roosevelt's Choice For Virginia Federal Judgeships Defeat

GLASS, BYRD LEAD FIGHT Democratic Senators Term Nomination 'Personally Offensive' To Them

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6 (AP)—The Senate rejected today President Roosevelt's nomination of Floyd H. Roberts to a Virginia federal judge. Senators Glass and Byrd, Virginia Democrats, had objected to the appointment.

The vote resulting confirmation was 72 to 9.

President Roosevelt told a press conference Friday that if the nomination was rejected, he would write a letter to Roberts which would be of great interest.

The senate judiciary committee had disapproved the nomination by a vote of 15 to 3.

Glass and Byrd testified before the committee that the nomination was "personally offensive" to them.

No debate preceded the vote on the nomination of Roberts.

MEDIATION CONFERENCE CALLED AS LOYALISTS CROSS FRONTIER; BRITISH PLEDGE AID TO FRANCE

London To Defend France Against Any Threat BOTH IN ACCORD

LONDON, Feb. 6 (AP)—Prime Minister Chamberlain told the House of Commons today "any threat to the vital interests of France, from whatever quarter it came, must evoke the immediate cooperation of this country."

His declaration followed a statement yesterday by Virginio Gayda, Italian Fascism's newspaper spokesman, in Rome's La Voce d'Italia, that Italian troops would stay in Spain until Generalissimo Francisco Franco's political, as well as military victory, was assured.

The Prime Minister said the British Government was "in complete accord" with the statement of the American Foreign Minister George Bonnet that "all forces of Great Britain would be at the disposal of France just as all forces of Great Britain in case of a war in which the two countries were involved."

His statement was made in reply to questions by Laborite Arthur Henderson on Anglo-French relations and was greeted with applause from all sections of the house.

It was considered particularly significant in view of Franco's agitation for concessions in the Mediterranean and Africa.

Chamberlain qualified his statement by saying "it is impossible to conceive in detail all the hypothetical cases which might arise."

He added, however: "I feel bound to make it plain that the solidarity of interest which France and this country are united in such that any threat to the vital interests of France, from whatever quarter it came, just evokes the immediate cooperation of this country."

Negrin's Defeated Troops Pour Into France

ARMY DISARMED

LONDON, Feb. 6 (AP)—Spanish insurgent authorities were reliably reported today to have informed the British Government their peace terms were "unconditional surrender" of the Spanish Government.

This disclosure came on the heels of a report in authoritative quarters that Britain and France were making a fresh attempt to mediate the two and one-half-year-old war in Spain.

Informed sources told G. B. Jerran, assistant to the British agent in Burgos, insurgent capital, had called the attention of Generalissimo Franco's regime to a three-point peace offer by Dr. Juan Negrin, premier of the Spanish Government.

The insurgents were said to have told Jerran flatly that these terms were "unconditionally unacceptable." One of Negrin's points called for an insurgent guarantee against foreign influence in Spain.

The Spanish Government apparently has left Spain, one informed source said, "and we do not know whether they are actually holding together."

NEGRIN CALLS CONFERENCE

BERLIN, Feb. 6 (AP)—Premier Negrin of the Spanish Government called a conference today with the British and French envoys in Spain, presumably to take up mediation of the Spanish civil war.

Negrin's foreign minister, Julio Alvarez Del Vayo, joined in arranging for the late afternoon meeting while Negrin's defeated Catalonian Army poured into France.

With Catalonia abandoned to the army of insurgent Generalissimo Franco, the Spanish Government leaders were believed by diplomats to be discussing the possibility of ending the civil war by surrender of their remaining one-fourth of Spain.

It was presumed Negrin and Alvarez Del Vayo would draw up terms of unconditional surrender of the central and southeastern "island" of Spain.

Premier Negrin followed his defeated northern army into France this morning.

The broken government forces Sunday afternoon when French soldiers, to disarm them and put them in concentration camps until their future could be arranged.

Twenty thousand had crossed into France this morning along with the continuing flood of civilian refugees. Sixty thousand more were expected. The rest of the northern (Continued on Page Six)

BRITAIN UNCOVERS PLOT IN BOMBINGS

Outlawed Irish Republican Army Blamed For Outrages

LONDON, Feb. 6 (AP)—Allegations that the outlawed Irish Republican Army had formed a plan to attack the British out of Ireland were made in the Bow Street Police Court today as Scotland Yard guarded the British royal family, high officials and public buildings against bomb outrages.

At the trial of 12 men accused of conspiring to cause explosions, the prosecuting attorney spoke of a mysterious "aluminum powder," a new agent of "considerable importance" and a plan, designed as "a new agent of most comprehensive and covering every field of public activity."

The attorney said the plans were discovered in a search of the home of Michael O'Shea and read:

"In order to exercise a maximum world effect, the diversion (presumably bombings) must be carried out at a time when no major world crisis is on, but if it is carried out when trouble is anticipated, with the jumpiness and nervous expectation of the government as well as the nervous potentialities of the people, it can be expected to the full."

The alleged plan gave details of a four-day ultimatum sent Foreign Secretary Viscount Halifax on Jan. 13, four days before three explosions occurred in various parts of the country.

The ultimatum, which referred to the "government of the Irish Republic," threatened active interference in British "territorial or commercial life" unless British forces were withdrawn from Eire (Ireland).

VICTIM OF ATTACK OFF CRITICAL LIST

Beaten By Fellow Roomer, De Muira Improves At Hospital

Luciano DeMuira, 66, who was attacked by a fellow roomer at 477 Center Street, Mamaroneck Village, early Saturday morning, was taken into custody after being charged with police in Palmer Avenue office of Dr. Emil Verill.

Verill, who was a compensation claimant, had repeatedly refused to go to a hospital or to accept medical service. Dr. Verill said today, adding that his mental condition was due to "extreme nervousness brought on by constant drinking."

Police had reported that Verill had been suffering from a mental ailment since he was arrested on the head last fall by a bucket of molasses from an upper window on a local construction job.

Big Federal Relief Reduction Proposed

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6 (AP)—Rep. Woodrum (D-Va.), a leading economy advocate, proposed today that Congress cut future relief appropriations in half and turn relief administration over to the states as far as possible.

He introduced a bill calling for a federal relief expenditure of \$1,120,000,000 for the next fiscal year, and creating definite standards of eligibility for relief.

The proposal would substitute an unemployment relief administration (UIRA) for the WPA, and would cut the federal administrative cost of the program from an estimated \$7,000,000 to \$2,000,000.

Government Agencies Fund Recommended

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6 (AP)—The House appropriations committee recommended \$1,808,926,799 today to operate more than a score of independent government agencies for the year starting July 1, an increase of more than \$28,000,000 over the current year.

Despite the increase, the committee topped \$1,500,000 from some of the budget bureau's estimates.

It withheld the \$2,088,376 appropriation recommended for the Federal Communications Commission, pending action by Congress on the President's request for reorganization of the commission from reorganization by internal department.

ROOSEVELT ASKS \$150,000,000 FOR WPA 'EMERGENCY'

President Says Additional Sum Is Needed For Next Five Months

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7 (AP)—President Roosevelt told Congress today an "emergency" exists in relief and asked "immediate consideration" of an additional appropriation of \$150,000,000 for WPA for the next five months.

This figure represents the cut Congress made in his request for \$275,000,000 to carry WPA from February through June. The White House announced earlier today the President had signed the \$275,000,000 last Saturday.

In asking immediate consideration on what he termed the "simple and absorbing factor" in the relief program, Mr. Roosevelt said in a message to Congress that the \$150,000,000 available, WPA must be shut abruptly on April 1 by 1,000,000 persons or less on that date a week-to-week reduction of 200,000 persons still further to a figure well below 1,000,000 persons.

"In other words," the President said, "the program of present employment would be slashed considerably more than one-half within a period of three months."

"If, however, proper reserves were maintained at the end of the fiscal year, employment at the end of June would drop still further—to a figure of only slightly more than 1,000,000 persons."

"Therefore, on a program of gradual reduction from 1,500,000 to 1,000,000 persons would be thrown out of work \$300,000,000 of the work program—Administration—added employment—of, with the addition of those dependent on them, from 6,000,000 to 8,000,000 Americans would no longer receive Federal Government aid."

Discussing the prohibition which he declared, "to be and which you can remove immediately, face to face with the danger signals of pneumonia."

"There are some, although no fewer, indications that we are facing an influenza epidemic in the County Health District," Dr. Ramsey stated.

"Thousands of people are ill with acute respiratory disease. Most of them may be very seriously ill, but since two-thirds or more of all persons who contract pneumonia have a cold or similar illness first, every such illness is potentially a pneumonia."

Dr. Ramsey advised those who are able to stay away from other people to avoid spreading infection. "If you have a cold with signs of fever, chills, chest pain, or a cough with blood-tinged expectoration," he declared, "go to bed and call your doctor immediately. Face to face with the danger signals of pneumonia."

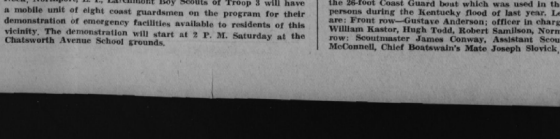

Police Associations Censured At Meeting Of County's Village Leaders

It revealed that the "Governor and State Legislature make every effort possible to reduce the budget submitted, and if necessary defer such capital expenditures as can be deferred, and curtail such state functions as can with safety be curtailed to the end that the tax burden of our people be lessened, and to the further end that the people may be encouraged to purchase and improve real estate rather than be discouraged from doing so by the imposition of the contemplated \$1 per \$1,000 tax on real estate."

Diagnoses was also expressed in a bill, which if passed, would cut the necessary number of agents of ten per cent for a village referendum from the present 20 percent to ten per cent.

Among the bills favored by the group was one which would allow a village board to use a local bank in which a village officer is a member as a repository of village funds.

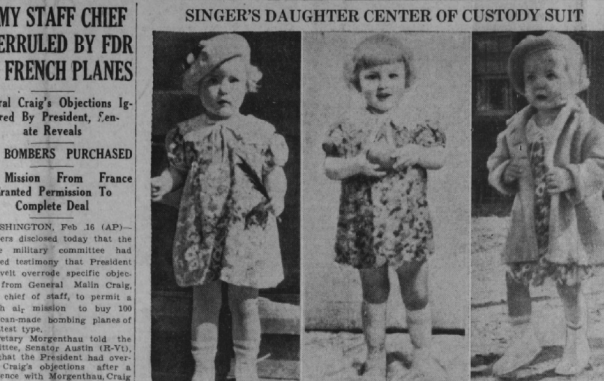

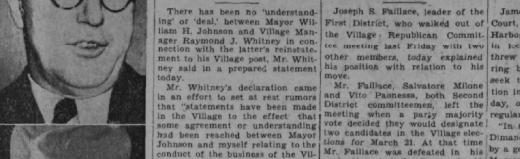

TRUSTEES AUTHORIZE LOAN FOR OF CITY

\$57,000 Approved In Tax Anticipation Notes PLANS GO AHEAD

Funds for the purchasing by Mamaroneck Village of St. Michael's Home property for a "Village Hall" were made available last night when the Village Board of Trustees authorized Village Treasurer - Clerk Frederick Bull, Jr., to borrow \$57,000 in tax anticipation notes.

The trustee action was an expected sequel in the negotiations which included the authorization, after a permissive referendum, of a bond issue for the \$75,000 needed to purchase and renovate the St. Michael's Home property at Mount Pleasant and Prospect Avenues.

Search of title is being made at the present time and Corporation Counsel Anthony Scaione is expected to communicate with the village and charitable organizations which own the property.

By authorizing Mr. Bull to proceed with the steps necessary to make the money available, the board, it was pointed out, is paving the way for the completion of the transaction.

The board last night took no action on the proposed issuance of an additional \$100,000 bond issue for the construction of a garage for houses all of the Village motor vehicles.

Approximately \$60,000 of the sum authorized last night is to be used to purchase the land and buildings, to balance the property and ready it for occupancy of the Village office.

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REVISED BUILDING CODE APPROVED FOR LARCHMONT

Special Committee Sanctions Proposals With Several Minor Changes

General approval with recommendations for several minor changes in the present code, the Larchmont Village Board last night by the special committee studying revision of the building code. The committee, headed by Leonard J. Payne, submitted its completed report on revision.

"We find," the report concluded, "that the present code is generally excellent and that certain amendments are not necessary. However, there are certain changes recommended by the committee which should be studied by your building inspector and appropriate recommendations should be made by him."

NEGRIN CALLS CABINET

The letter was sent to Paris by special messenger yesterday, the day on which Franco and British ceased to regard the Republican regime as Spain's real government.

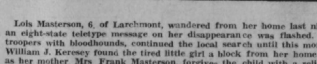

New York Port Authority Urged To Acquire W. & B. And Operate It Tax Free

Officials of Communities Along Line Suggest New Proposal

WHITE PLAINS, Feb. 28.—The Port of New York Authority, operator of the Holland Tunnel and various bridges in the metropolitan area, will be asked to buy the abandoned Boston and Westchester Railroad and operate it tax free if such is legally possible.
