21 MISSING AS FIRE HITS HALIFAX HOTEL; RYE GIRL IS VICTIM

Jean Sherwood Hurt; Many Feared Dead

21 IN HOSPITALS

HALIFAX, NOVA SCOTIA, March 2 (Canadian Press)—Twenty-one persons were missing, many of them feared dead, after an early morning fire swept through the half-century old Queen Hotel today and then spread to adjacent buildings.

Twenty others were in hospitals with spinal injuries, fractures and burns. Many victims were hurt when they jumped from hotel windows before flames could reach them as the flames went steadily through the old wood and stone structure.

Officials estimate the burning ran on high at 27 minutes. They said the hotel register had been in the fire and that it might be days before a complete list could be compiled.

It was believed, however, that there were 27 guests and about 30 employees in the hotel when the fire started.

NEW CITY OF RYE BILL INTRODUCED IN LEGISLATURE

Williamson Presents Measure For Village's Charter Movement

SCHMIDT TO SPEAK HERE
Platt Asks Supervisors To Hold Hearing Before Taking Any Action

A 178-page bill which would make the Village of Rye the fifth city in the county was introduced by Senator Piny Williamson, Westchester, Republican, before the State Legislature at Albany last night.

Under the Williamson bill, Rye Village would be divorced from the poor relief status of the neighboring Village of Port Chester. Taxpayers of Port Chester, the unincorporated town of Rye area and the Rye N.Y. section also were concerned with the possibility of an increased tax rate if the charter should be passed.

While the Shore Acres Taxpayers Association board of trustees is "still studying" the measure, and no decision has been reached, the bill has been recommended by R. L. A. Quinlan, president, said today.

All Rye Neck residents are invited to attend the meeting of the Young Men's Republican Club of Rye Neck at Armory Hall, Harry Avenue, at 8 P. M. tomorrow, at which the measure will be discussed. It was introduced today by Robert Montgomery, secretary.

Quick Cessation of Fighting Brings Complete Suppression of Revolt

ULTIMATUM EFFECTIVE Threat To Bomb Fact Into Submission Results In Speedy Peace

MADRID, March 8 (AP)—General Jose Miaja's National Defense Government announced today that today the surrender of Republican army chiefs involved in a Communist uprising and the quick cessation of fighting indicated complete suppression of the revolt.

The announcement came shortly after revolting Communist aerial attacks on the city were repelled by the fire of anti-aircraft guns and tanks and hand grenades attacks by Miaja's forces.

SLOVAK PARLIAMENTS TO RESIST AT PRAGUE; MAGLIONE NAMED STATE SECRETARY BY NEW PONTIFF

Prague Is Asked To Return Ousted Official
SITUATION TENSE

BRATISLAVA, March 11 (AP)—The Slovak Parliament today recommended that Dr. Joseph Tiso be reappointed premier of autonomous Slovakia, the post from which he was ousted by the Prague Government for backing Slovak independence agitation.

Bratislava remained quiet and there was serious talk of compromise being reached over the Slovak demands for complete independence—not merely autonomy from the Prague Government.

Karl Sidlo, vice premier of Czechoslovakia and representative of the Slovaks, seemed to be in control of the situation. In a conciliatory radio speech he asked the extremist Hlinka Guards (Slovak storm troopers) to maintain discipline.

Hlinka guards paraded through the Slovak capital carrying rifles and pistols.

Czech police controlling traffic returned the scenes of gunfire as they marched past slaying Slovaks and patriots alike.

Parliament recommending reinstatement of Tiso, as premier, also suggested that Sidlo should receive a cabinet post as well as Josef Sivak. The acting premier named by President Benes of Czechoslovakia refused to replace Tiso.

Heavy detachments of troops, gendarmes and police surrounded Liberty Square where German residents of Slovakia were protesting the anniversary of Germany's attack on Czechoslovakia.

Czechs and Slovaks seemed to have been at odds since the day they faced each other with stacked arms over the issue of complete independence—not merely autonomy—for Slovakia.

This Slovak capital was under martial law decreed by the central government in Prague. President Eini Hacha had removed three Slovak ministers, including President Joseph Tiso, yesterday to suppress a separatist movement.

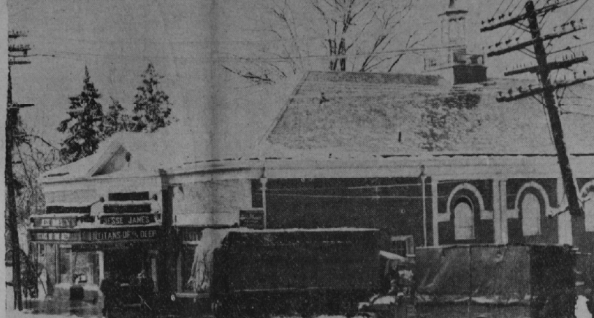

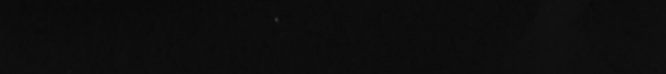

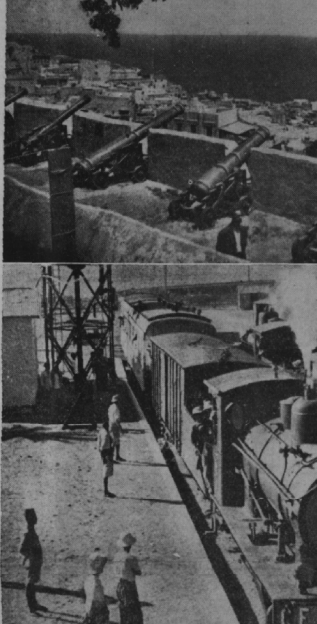
\$103,980 IN WPA FUNDS APPROVED FOR VILLAGE HALL
