SIX DISTRICTS FACE GOP CONTESTS FOR COMMITTEE SEATS

Primary Fights Loom As Petitions Are Filed

There is no contest for seats on the Democratic Town Committee, the petitions filed by midnight deadline last night revealed.

Four of the six districts in which there are contests here involve the Village of Mamaroneck, the other two are in Larchmont Village.

Primary elections in September will be held in the six districts. The first is in the First District, Second, Fifth, Eighth and Ninth districts here.

In the Second District, E. Milton and Mrs. S. Panosian have filed a joint petition against the field of Thomas Stannegren, Grady Givans, and Joseph R. Civitini in a five-way battle.

Robert J. Payne, Charles Grossberg and Leo A. Coleston will be running in the Third District. Barney Epstein, district leader, has declined to run again.

James M. Smith, co-leader of the Fifth District, has filed his petition as an incumbent. Along with him are James P. Dimando and John J. Carroll, Jr., Mrs. Julia Shogren, co-leader of the district, did not file a petition.

Five are seeking the two committee seats in Larchmont Village District. There are two couples in this fight and one "independent." Edward H. Tatum, an incumbent is linked with Helen Benjamin, the other incumbent, did not file a petition.

INJUNCTION TO BAR COUNTY COLLECTION DENIED AT BAR

Issue To Be Taken Before Court Of Appeals

FEE HELD LEGAL

By HUGH W. ROBERTSON

Butressing his decision by a lengthy opinion, Supreme Court Justice Lee Parsons Davis today upheld the constitutional right of Westchester to establish tolls upon its parkways and denied flatly the application of the Automobile Club of New York for an injunction against the 10-cent toll station erected this week on Hutchinson River Parkway and scheduled to begin collections tomorrow morning.

The decision is expected to be appealed, as J. Francis Hayden, counsel for the Automobile Club, announced when the motion for the injunction was heard on Tuesday that the issue would be carried to the appellate Division and the Court of Appeals. Because the decision favors the County, however, there is no stay in the appeal and nothing is expected to prevent the County from proceeding with the toll collection although eventually the trial court may be asked to hold the issue over.

The papers submitted on this motion do not support the claim of unconstitutionality, Justice Davis wrote in his opinion this morning. "This local law is an exercise of the County's power, and is not unconstitutional because it is an arbitrary, discriminatory or unreasonable exercise of the County's power," he said.

Only one unit was put in use because of the slack in cartage materials. Today and tomorrow A. Baber and Son, Inc., contractors who erected the incinerator, will make repairs to the other unit not in use, by rectifying the butchery valves which have been termed faulty in operation.

The Hanna Pure Food Factory on Mamaroneck Avenue, which supplies a large number of cans and other products to the incinerator, is reviewing its delivery schedule to the incinerator, Village Manager Whitney said.

The Pure Food factory will deliver its cans and other waste products daily and earlier in the morning than heretofore, said Mr. Whitney.

Temperature recordings on the pyrometer, gauge of heat intensity in the incinerator furnaces, showed a variance from 1100 to 1200 degrees on Monday, and from 900 to 1100 degrees on Tuesday.

According to some authorities a good general average for proper combustion is between 1200 and 1800 degrees.

More complaints on smoke, if any, were noted from the incinerator, and officers with Village authorities early yesterday.

GEORGE W. BURTON, LONG SUPERVISOR OF TOWN, PASSES

Former Republican Leader Was Member Of County Board For 18 Years

Pioneered Town Growth

George W. Burton, supervisor for 18 years during the greatest growth of the town of Mamaroneck, died yesterday afternoon from a heart attack, at 219 Bruce River Road, Yonkers. He was 62 years of age.

A resident of 34 Greenwood Avenue, Town, Mr. Burton held the supervisor's post for 18 consecutive years. He was a member of the Democratic county board and the Republican town board.

He fostered the Mamaroneck Valley water supply project and was president of the Westchester Joint Waterworks No. 1 from the time of its incorporation in 1918 until his death.

He also fostered the Westchester County water supply project and was its first president. He was a member of the New York and Stamford Railroad Company's trolley line which operated an attempt to increase the service to the town.

The late supervisor was also responsible for the elimination of the dilapidated stum area extending along Post Road from Orienta Avenue to the railroad station.

The Post Road was widened at the old eliminations. Part of the land bought in the condemnation was turned over to the county at the Mamaroneck Avenue for erection of a school.

PLAYLAND READY TO GREET THROUGH

Thousands To Fill County's Park For Annual Newspaper Day Tomorrow

Thousands of children, and adults too, from the Mamaroneck Larchmont section will help swell the big crowd for tomorrow's Newspaper Day at Playland. The county's amusement park at Rye-Mott Station Park, which was last two months from the Daily Times, will have for many of its attractions at the park. Many a youngster will have his fists jammed with anything from 50 to 100 free tickets, clipped by himself and also given to him by his parents.

If the weather man is good, and last year's figures for Newspaper Day hold true, more than 10,000 youngsters and their parents will fill Playland tomorrow, from youths from White Plains, Tarrytown, Ossining, Mount Vernon and New Rochelle, join the Mamaroneck Larchmont contingent.

The gates at Playland will open at 11 A. M., but the probability is that the children in buses and private automobiles will be patiently waiting there at 8 A. M. for the park to open.

The same bus arrangements as to routes and frequency of travel will prevail this year as did last. There will be 13 special buses added, and on top of that there will be the regular Playland bus, and the one to Stamford to accommodate the crowds. They will run at 10-minute intervals during the early part of the day.

Buses may be boarded along Mamaroneck Avenue, Post Road and at the Depot as early as 8:30 A. M. tomorrow, although the park does not open until 11 A. M.

The special buses will run West on Post Road into Mamaroneck Avenue to the railroad station, then along Jefferson Avenue, Palmer, McKeon and Barry Avenues, back to Post Road to Playland.

The food counters at Playland expect to get plenty of business tomorrow. Last year the children consumed 2,500 Frankfurters, 4,000 hamburgers, 5,000 bottles of soda pop and 8,000 bottles of milk.
