WASHINGTON (AP)—Without naming countries, President Roosevelt said in a formal statement today the government hopes American manufacturers and exporters of airplanes, aeronautical equipment and materials would bear in mind the government's policy of condemning "unprovoked bombing" of civilians.

The brief statement was issued after the President had conferred with Secretary Hull in his White House study.

It followed, too, presidential appeals to Finland and Sweden to bomb civilian populations.

"These countries were not named in the statement, but there was little doubt it was intended to apply to their conflict."

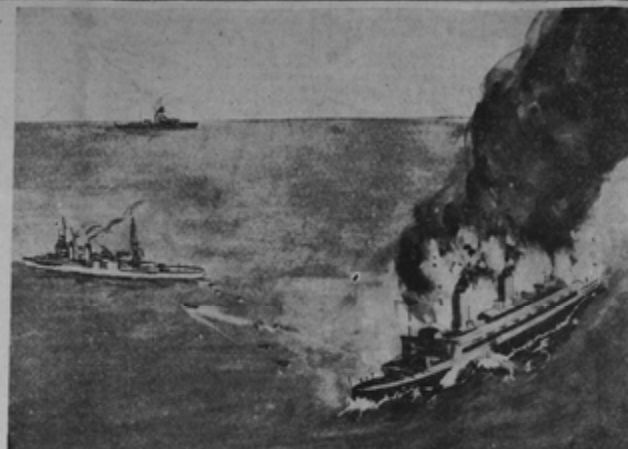

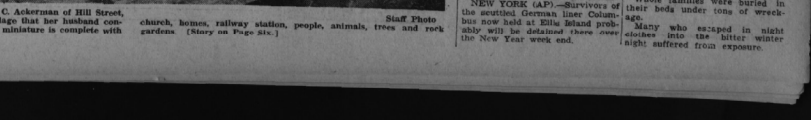
