THREE KNOWN DEAD, 46 ARE MISSING AFTER VESSEL AND FREIGHTER COLLIDE AT SEA

Three Women From County Among 53 Passengers

CRASH HAPPENED OFF NEW JERSEY
Inquiry Will Start This Afternoon
Say Officials

NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—The liner Mohawk, chartered by the Ward line out of two passenger ships—the Morro Castle and the Havana—had been wrecked in a 90-day period, may have cost the lives of 49 persons when she collided last night with the freighter Tallman in an Arctic Sea off Sea Girt, N. J.

When the Mohawk sailed from New York yesterday afternoon, an hour before the other Tallman, she had 53 passengers, including three well-known Westchester women, and 110 crew, including a deck officer from Rye.

The 164 persons aboard the liner when the collision occurred were accounted for today by:

Known dead 3
Missing 46
Survived 116

Earl R. Barry, of Westmont, N. J., a passenger, died on the Albatross after he had been taken from a boat on the Mohawk's lifeboat. A head injury caused his death.

There was one death on the business trip. He was married and was the father of two children.

Inquiry To Start At Once
The United States steamship inspection service moved swiftly, as it did in the Morro Castle disaster, in which 124 persons lost their lives for one to the worst of the ill-starred Jersey Coast.

It is assumed an inquiry would be begun as early as this afternoon. The government inspectors said they were especially eager to obtain a report from representative officers of the Mohawk as soon as possible. So far none of the 116 survivors of the liner has been questioned.

The most grave report came after 10 A. M. It was a witness of the freighter "Elyot" saying life boats number 3, 5 and 7 of the (Continued on Page Two)

Die in Electric Chair
For Killing His Daughter

BANK HEARING IS SET FOR FEB. 5TH IN FEDERAL COURT

Depositors Will Be Given Chance To Make Protest Against Proposed Lease

RENTAL FEE DETERMINED
New Financial Institution To Open Soon Unless Objections Are Made

Unless legal objections are raised at a hearing on the rental of the First National Bank building to the County Trust Company of White Plains, it is now scheduled for Tuesday, February 5, establishment of the County Trust's branch bank here is expected to follow soon after that date.

The hearing will be held in the U. S. District Court, Court of Federal Building in New York City, starting at 10:30 A. M., and pursuant to notice is for the purpose of enabling the judge sitting at that time to receive evidence, information, and if there are any, before the County Trust's branch bank here is expected to follow soon after that date.

Depositors and creditors of the closed bank are eligible to be heard by the court on a separate copy of which is now available for public inspection in the County Trust's office.

Receiver Special Attorney William E. Schramm presented the petition for the closing of the bank, which resulted in the court calling the hearing.

The main purpose of the proposed lease is to enable the County Trust to occupy the building for a 90-day period on the basis of a rental of \$3000 yearly, which is 100 per cent of the deposits which can run the rent up as high as \$100,000.

The school board, which was then headed by William F. Blacking, appealed the action of the township. This decision was reversed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court.

MACON SINKS AFTER MYSTERY EXPLOSION; ALL BUT 2 RESCUED

81 Survivors Are Being Brought To San Francisco—Lieutenant Commander Donald M. Mackey of Bedford Hills Among Those SAVED—Search For Bodies Of Victims

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 13.—The giant dirigible Macon, destroyed by a sudden mysterious disaster, lay at the bottom of the Pacific Ocean today, while 81 survivors were being brought into San Francisco Bay by cruisers of the United States fleet. Only two members of the crew were missing. Among the rescued was Lieutenant Commander Donald M. Mackey of Bedford Hills, N. Y.

The tragic fate of every American-made giant dirigible the navy has possessed, overtook the crew of the Macon as she sailed through the fog off San Francisco. The deliriously inflated craft was almost instantly and the immediate efforts of Lieutenant Commander Mackey, U. S. Navy, who was on the Macon and survivor of the Akron disaster, to which the ship proved fatal.

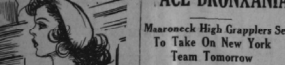

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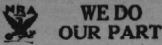

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POLITICAL FEES ARE READY FOR A BATTLE FIGHT THIS SPRING

Republicans Arranging For Annual Caucus To Be Held February 25—Democrats Will Designate Candidates Then Too—No Surprise Candidates Looked For

The Republicans and Democrats of this village will have a bitter battle during the next four weeks for the two places on the Board that are at stake in the annual village election to be held Tuesday, March 19. The contest is to fill vacancies caused by the expiration of the terms of Mayor Hornidge and Trustee O'Callaghan, both of whom have succeeded in resisting efforts to draft them for re-election.

With the opposing battle lines already well defined, the two parties striving for victory at the polls next month will get their campaign actively under way during the next two weeks. The Democratic caucus, scheduled for February 25, will be a preliminary, and the same date will be the opening salvo in the fight.

Answering fire from the camp of the Republicans will come out of the caucus of that party to be held on the same date.

Following the two caucuses the supporters of the candidates who are lined up on the opposite battlements will settle down to a combat that will last for almost a month, and that will not let up until the last ball is cast on the night of Election Day.

No opposition to the selection of Trustee Alfred E. Buechele as the Republican candidate seeking the office of mayor, is expected to arise, as the Republican caucus to be held in St. Thomas' Commanding House, 215 E. 11th St., on Feb. 25, has already been endorsed by the Republican Committee, with the exception of a single dissenting voice, it is expected to be chosen in unopposed and undivided fashion as a candidate for trustee.

NO PRIMARY LIKELY

Should this happen there will be no occasion for the primary that has been planned for the following day. In the case that contests should arise and require a vote by ballot of the enrolled Republicans, to decide their candidates, in the event of contests for commitment, which however is considered almost an unlikely occurrence, a fight for the two major nominations, the caucus may still have no following day primary in a central place. Party members will instead vote for their district headquarters in a polling place to be set up in each of the eight village districts.
