REGISTRATION DROPS 500 IN THE VILLAGE; GAIN IN LARCHMONT

New Total for Mamaroneck Is 4,487 Compared to 4,933 Last Year—Decrease Noted in All of the Eight Election Districts—Strong Turnout Looked For In Larchmont

About 500 less voters than last year are eligible to cast ballots on Election Day here, results of Saturday's annual registration show. The new registration total is 4,487. Last year the figure was 4,933.

Every one of the eight local election districts shows a decrease, which political observers declare is because of lack of interest in the current campaign, as compared with last year's contest.

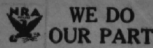

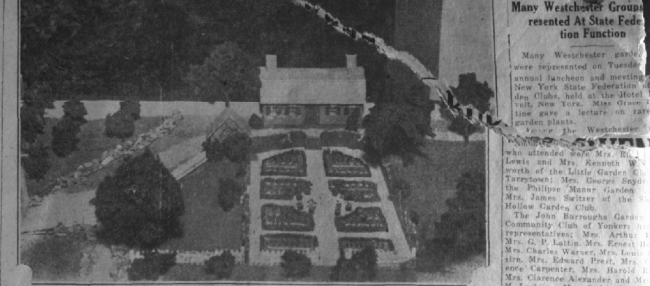

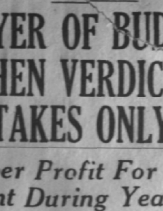
