

# County Fuel Experts Study Heating Plants

## Influence of Temperature Range and Relation to Efficiency, Problem

While it may seem a little early in the season, with summer just under way, to discuss winter heating problem, the Retail Coal Merchants Association of Westchester County, Inc., already is planning its activity.

Constructive articles on heating and its many angles are being prepared by C. A. Cole of Scarsdale, field manager of the Federal Heating Administration in Westchester.

Mr. Cole's discussion of "Why we heat our houses" is one of the simplest acts of every day life that is heating a house.

Customarily, few have any other idea why we do it. Fewer still have any notion of how we do it. Thus it remains for the expert to have any real knowledge of the kind of fuel which should be used for that purpose.

We are confronted by one of the most common acts of which we know little.

For instance, we do not "heat a house" at all, we "heat the air" in a house. And the main object is not merely to heat the air, but to have the heat in the air for the use of our bodies and for the things that go into it. Therefore, put in the simplest of terms, we burn fuel to warm our bodies and the furnace is the tool to generate the heat and our bodies are the tools to use it.

The human body has a narrow range of comfort in so far as heat and cold are concerned. With temperatures above 93 degrees, we feel too warm; if the temperature drops below 83 degrees, we feel too cold. Therefore, what might be called the "normal" range of the human body is only 10 degrees. Beyond that it is either too hot or too cold. And we are living in a climate which has a temperature range of 125 degrees or from 110 degrees in case of extreme snow down to 15 degrees below zero, in case of extreme cold.

When the temperature rises above 83 degrees, we need some mechanical assistance to keep cool—we call it air conditioning these days. When the temperature drops below 68 degrees, we need a mechanical assistant to keep warm—we call it heating a house.

This is a simple matter to what seems to be a puzzling question and yet it is the turning point of the whole fuel question. It is not so the household is concerned. It is the reason for the existence of the fuel industry—one of the colossal businesses of this country.

It is also the reason for the vast clothing industry, the building material industry, the food and drink industry.

The heart and center of it all is that the human body is naturally comfortable and at all times within a range of 15 degrees of temperature. It is in fact, a creature having a temperature range of 125 degrees. To overcome the seasons of heat and cold, various diseases incident to exposure, we must build up the various industries outlined. They are all service industries, and they all have their basis with the welfare of heat and cold.

# Private Building Awards Show Gain

The first six months of 1935 closed with private engineering construction registering a 48 per cent gain over the same period last year while Federal contracts lagged 30 per cent and municipal 12 per cent behind last year's rate, according to "Engineering News-Record."

The weighted average for public construction is 20 per cent behind the first half of last year.

In dollar value, total engineering construction for the first six months is \$697,271,000, 1935 as compared with \$112,974,000 in 1934; Federal awards, \$137,640,000 compared with \$219,690,000; total public, \$465,630,000 compared with \$858,576,000; and private, \$191,641,000 in 1935 compared with \$137,640,000 in 1934.

# Board Defends Word 'Realtor'

## Sole Use of Name by National Group Upheld

Reports to the National Association of Real Estate Boards of abuse of the term "realtor," which may be used only by members of this association, have resulted in a decision being made in every section of the country through membership boards.

At a meeting of the brokers' division of the association in Detroit today a resolution was passed calling for an investigation of the use of the term by real estate men who are not members of the association. As a result every section of the national board, through its local board, has been asked to report infractions that the association may take steps to prosecute if desired.

The association has gone to court 13 times since 1923 in defense of the trade name and in every instance has been upheld.

Decisions in favor of the national association have been handed down in circuit courts in the Michigan and Missouri; in district courts in Minnesota and Utah, and in the Supreme Court in the District of Columbia.

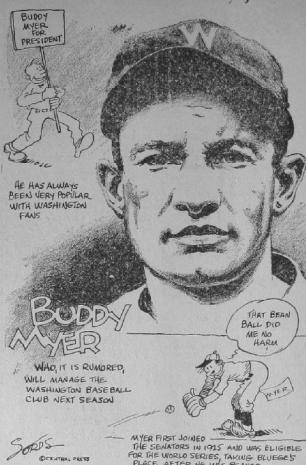

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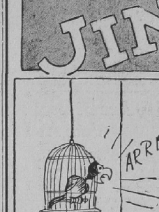

SEE WITHDRAWAL THREAT

Speech of British Diplomat Is Hailed By The Smaller Nations

GENEVA, Sept. 11 (AP)—Great Britain threw its whole weight behind the League of Nations "covenant" in its entirety in a declaration made today by Sir Samuel Hoare, British Foreign minister, before the League Assembly today.

At the same time, Sir Samuel warned the world that if the League fails to enforce a peaceful settlement of the Italian-German dispute, the "main bridge" binding England to the continent will have collapsed.

The League pledge was interpreted as an indication that Great Britain would not support the League unless it became necessary to quench the African blaze.

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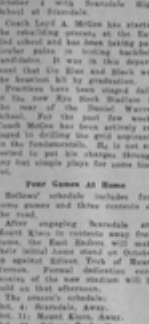
