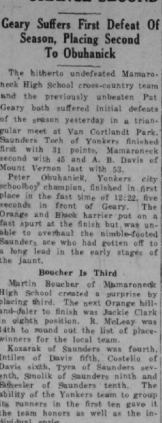

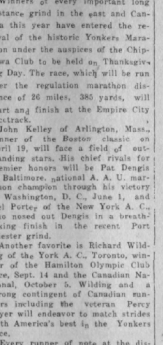

National Government Retains Majority Although MacDonald Is Defeated

LADY ASTOR RE-ELECTED Winston Churchill Is Returned To Commons—Maxton Also Triumphs

LONDON, Nov. 15 (AP)—Returns from yesterday's general elections showed the National Government retained its majority in the House of Commons today, although Ramsay MacDonald, lord president of the council and the first leader of the National Government, went down to defeat.

The voters had returned 356 National Government members to the Commons according to the vote count at 3 P. M., more than a majority in the total of 619 seats.

How great the majority might actually be was not shown by these returns, although some observers were that the government might have as much as 200 more seats than the opposition. The last majority by the National Government was 412 seats.

Defeated with his father as well as MacDonnell, colonial secretary, Anthony Eden, minister for League of Nations affairs, was re-elected by the huge majority of 24,816. Sir John Simon, home secretary, again went back into his seat by a majority of 64,242.

Lady Astor was re-elected, her son W. A. Astor, lord East of England was away from the Labour Party member, and Lord Willoughby de Brocas, Lady Astor's son-in-law, won in Hunting and Bedfordshire.

Winston Churchill, former chairman of the Executive and former First Lord of the Admiralty, was returned to the Commons.

The socialist J. McGovern and an Independent Labour Party member, Ernest Bevin, were also re-elected.

While one former Prime Minister and his son, Ramsay and Malcolm MacDonald, were being defeated, another former premier again was re-elected.

David Lloyd George was re-elected from Carmarthen and his daughter, Miss Megan Lloyd George, won in St. Malcom Campbell, the world's most famous woman, failed in her race for the Commons, but she was defeated by W. H. Green of the Labour Party in the Bedford Division of London.

Ramsay MacDonald's defeat came in the 1313 election campaign. He has heard the news at his home in London. He was former Prime Minister since 1918 when the "Red" Party District rejected Lord Asquith.

The cabinet ministers returned to office included Alfred Dreyfus, the Secretary of Mines.

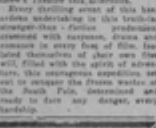

Associated Press Staff Writer Closing of the most important of the open hunting seasons during the past two weeks leave eager fans for the Orange State hunter.

Partridge, deer, pheasant, quail, snipe and duck have left the memory of pleasant days in field and woods. In most cases hunters have not had much to complain about. With the exception of snipe and quail season has been reported more about than that in several seasons past.

Partridge especially seem to be making an astounding comeback in the State. Game experts and old-time woodsmen in the Adirondacks, where the state's best grouse hunting is found, say they expect the king of game birds to register a good increase this winter, given a decent break with the weather.

Natural propagation was reported far ahead of expectations and with the recent success in artificial methods of hatching, the partridge may be well on the way back.

One of the best pheasant seasons in years is the agreement of the many hunters who make this the high point of their year's shooting.

Many after season surveys indicate that plenty of birds were about for hunting next summer and with the help of the Conservation Department and the many private clubs of the state, good hunting for this bird seems assured next year.

Except in the recollection of the oldest hunters, snipe never were so common and the net cover of the Finger Lakes region, in particular, gave fine hunting.

Whether the increase was due to natural causes and perhaps a result of the sport by many hunters or to the migration from other parts of the state, the number of game birds and ducks was larger than in many years.

Ducks and geese proved a bitter disappointment to the great majority of hunters. Unusually warm weather throughout the entire 20 days made duck shooting possibilities in nearly every part of the state rather than a mere stop.

Hunters fortunate in Canada brought back good bags. For most of the others, the ducks taken during the season could be numbered on the fingers of the two hands.

Deer hunters found the going better towards the latter part of the season and, lacking definite figures from the Conservation Department, reports indicate a slightly better than average year.
