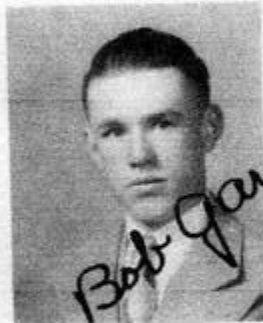

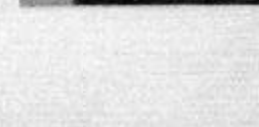

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THE SENIOR LOG

On the morning of September 10, 1934, the S.S. "Class of '38", with Miss McPhee at the helm, was ready for the Freshman leg of its voyage across the Sea of Knowledge. Most of the members of the crew immediately began to take part in activities around them. A considerable number of both boys and girls participated in sports. Many of the members also joined in the numerous social activities. On June 24, 1935, the Sophomore Port had been reached.

The ship set sail from the Sophomore Port on September 9, 1935 with practically the same crew on board. This time, however, the piloting was divided between Miss Austin and Miss Southall. Some of the athletic-minded members of both sexes were accepted in "B" Squads of all branches of sport. Social and club activities also received much cooperation from the zestful and ambitious crew of Sophomores.

With Miss Scutt and Mr. Davis as Co-captains, the ship resumed its adventurous voyage on September 14, 1936. Some of the crew had begun to feel the wear and tear of the voyage and had gone ashore, believing they would find life easier there. Their number, however, was quickly replenished by stalwart newcomers, ever-ready to battle and surmount all obstacles lying between them and their cherished destination.

The Junior Crew met on deck at the beginning of the year and elected the following officers: Rosemary Raichlen, President; Joe Humphreys, Vice-President; Caroline Schreyer, Secretary; John Lapolla, Treasurer.

The social highlight of the year's cruise was the Junior-Senior Prom which proved to be an unprecedented success.

Honors were plentiful and came from diversified fields. Not only were a great number of boys accepted on the "A" Squads of the different sports, but the girls, too, were showing their athletic skill in no mean fashion. The National Honor Society was increased by seven members, three of whom were Juniors; namely, Hazel Eggers, John Lapolla, and Helen Wetstein. The last two named were elected Vice-President and Secretary, respectively. The Juniors also made an enviable record in the Merit-Award Honors for notable service in many different fields, Dorothy Carr, Frank Langham, and Helen Wetstein upholding the honor of the Junior crew on this account.

With three-fourths of their voyage behind them, but with the tricky reefs and dangerous shoals of the Senior Year still before them, the doughty crew of forty-nine, under the command of Miss McPhee, set their eyes grimly on the ever-nearing port of graduation.

At this time, it was sad to learn that a hard-working and loyal member, Oliver Gilmore, had died during the vacation months.

The Senior crew was especially fortunate in having a thoroughly-tested sea-dog for captain and a sturdy, sea-going staff of mates. The officers chosen were: Ned Rozofsky, President; Harold Pitts, Vice-President; Caroline Schreyer, Secretary; John Lapolla, Treasurer.

All other activities on the ship were momentarily suspended as the crew turned its attention to dramatics. Three one-act plays were presented in the main cabin early in December. The spectators were treated not only to some modern themes but also to a refreshingly old fashioned melodrama.

An inspection of the ship's log for the Senior leg of the voyage reveals that the following are the highlights:

The Crew created this 1938 edition of the Year Book, the first one in the history of the school to be planographed and to have a durable cover.

This year saw the school's first experiment in student government, the G.O., all four officers of which were Seniors. They were: Harold Pitts, President; Caroline Schreyer, Vice-President; Lawrence Vitro, Secretary; John Lapolla, Treasurer.

Both boys and girls of the Senior Crew made up an overwhelming majority of all athletic teams.

Senior membership in the National Honor Society was raised by the addition of George Baer, Sadie Di Lorio, and Caroline Schreyer, John Lapolla and Helen Wetstein being veterans of the previous year.

Five Seniors were honored by winning the Merit-Award Sweaters, in addition to last year's three Juniors: Emily Ansbomb, Allen Butcher, John Lapolla, Cynthia Muir, and Caroline Schreyer.

Slowly, our weather-beaten, but still sea-worthy, craft pulled into the Graduation Harbor. With thoughtful countenances, the sturdy sailors, who had overcome many physical and mental obstacles, went ashore, hoping their life's voyage would be just as happy and entertaining as had been their High School Cruise.

FOOTBALL RESUME

Our football squad launched its 1937 gridiron season with high hopes, a few veterans and a new coach, William Axtell, formerly Physical Director of Cornwall-on-the-Hudson High School.

Overwhelmed by a more experienced Eastchester team, a fighting Bellows eleven went down to defeat in the season's opener 43-0.

Undismayed, however, the Blue and Black returned to the field the following week to hold a strong Mt. Kisco team in check 0-0.

On the next Saturday, Bellows fell before the onslaught of an all-conquering Bronxville varsity 30-0.

Though hard hit by injuries, Bellows took the field again and battled tenaciously before bowing 13-0 to Alexander Hamilton of Elmsford.

The high light of an otherwise mediocre season came with Bellows' surprising victory over a highly touted Rye High School eleven. This 7-6 victory over our arch rivals stamped the season as a partial success. Thus inspired, Bellows defeated Greenburgh 34-7. The performance displayed by the many sophomores used in this game gave hint of the potential power of next year's eleven.

In the season's finale with our traditional rival, Harrison, Bellows fought stubbornly before yielding to the power of the Maroon invaders. The final score was 14-0.

In Coach Axtell's own words, "The season was a success due mainly to three things: (1) team work, (2) good sportmanship on the part of the team and its school supporters, and (3) the team's "stick-to-it-iveness".

BASEBALL

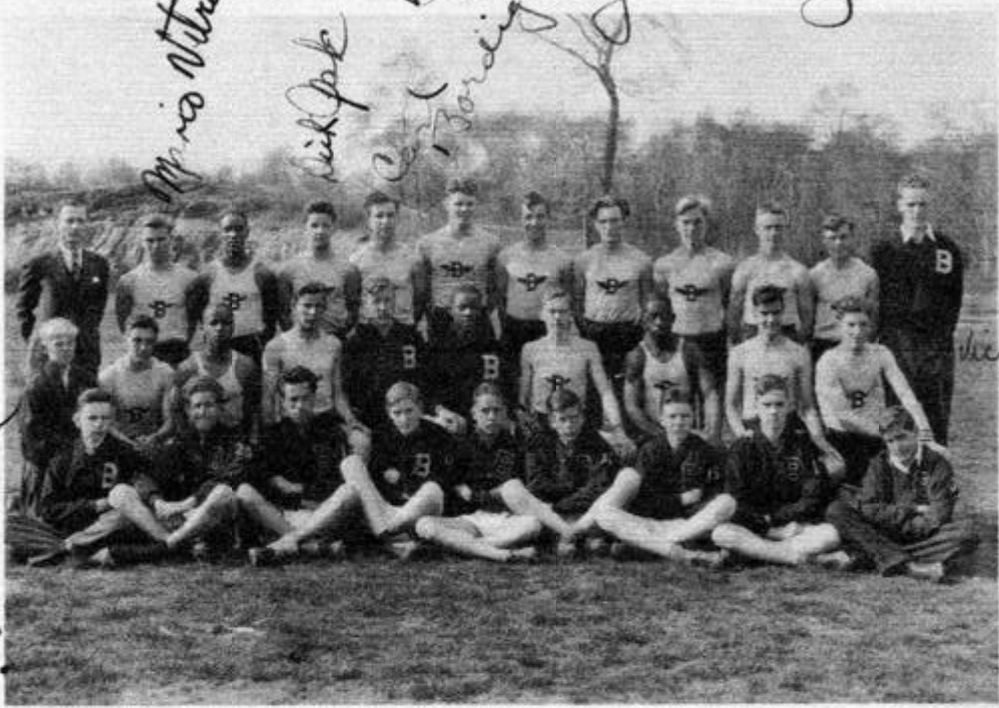

Volunteer Coach was E. Brooks, "an outsider," with Mr. R. Zimmerman as Faculty Adviser.

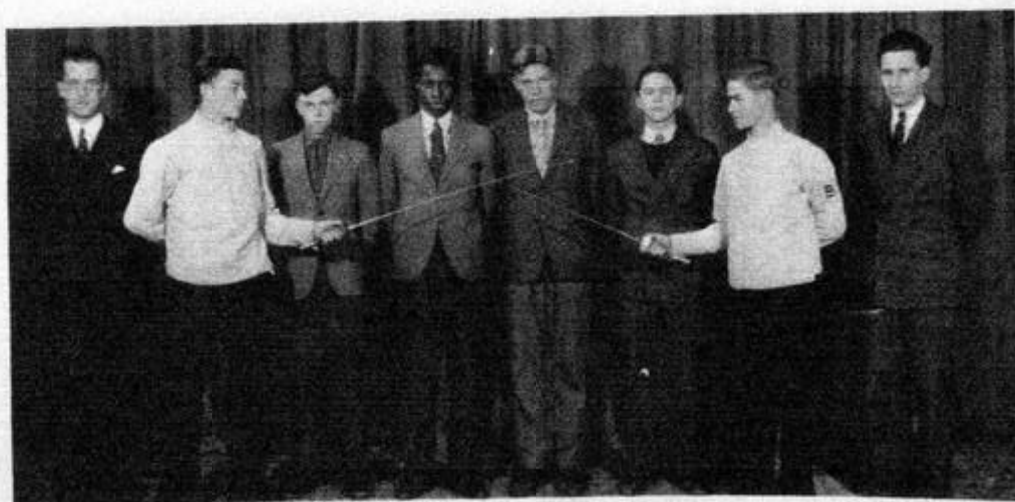

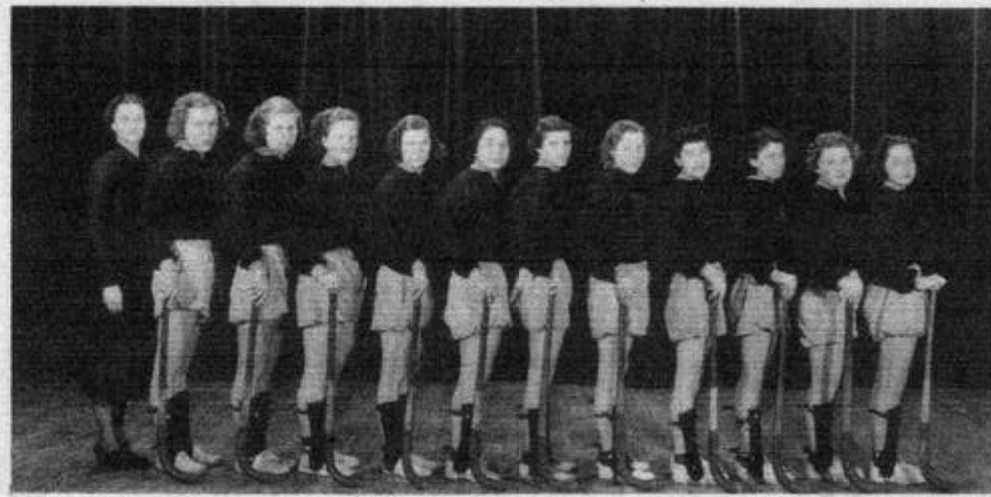
