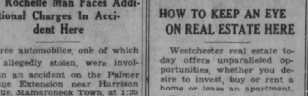

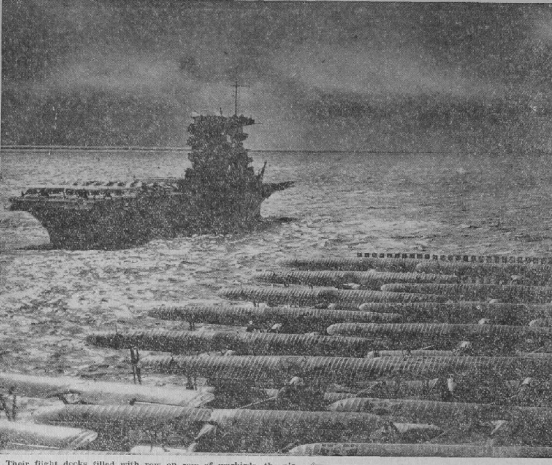

NATION'S GASOLINE TAP IS PROLOGED

Standard Oil Chemist Reports Pushing Back Of Resources 20 Per cent

By HOWARD W. BLANKENEL Associated Press Staff Editor

DALLAS, April 21—The end of the United States' gasoline resources was pushed back 20 per cent or more yesterday by a report to the American Chemical Society on the newest ways of extracting natural gas into liquid gasoline.

"Re-forming," is the technical name for this "conversion" process. In its present "infancy" stage, it enables us to add 20 per cent to the country's gasoline supply. American gasoline production last year was 20 billion gallons.

The 20 per cent estimate is conservative, Dr. Per K. Frolich said, who made the report, referred to estimate. But technicians in petroleum chemistry have claimed that an immediate 50 per cent addition to gasoline could be made from natural gas. Dr. Frolich is director of the chemical laboratories of the Standard Oil Development Company.

Under the latest discoveries about extracting gasoline, Dr. Frolich said, natural gas and petroleum are the same. One can be "re-formed" into liquid fuel by the same cracking processes which in the recent past have converted the amount of gasoline from oil.

How long the gas-reformed gasoline resources will last chemists refused to predict. The outside estimate, without assuming new gas, have ranged around 100 years. The present ability to change gas into liquid fuel is limited. One big obstacle is methane, or marsh gas, which exists in vast quantities in natural gas. It cannot now be changed into gasoline.

But, Dr. Frolich pointed out, the one sure way greater conversion is impossible. For 10 years ago we did not know any way to change into gasoline. The amount of natural gas that is now being converted.

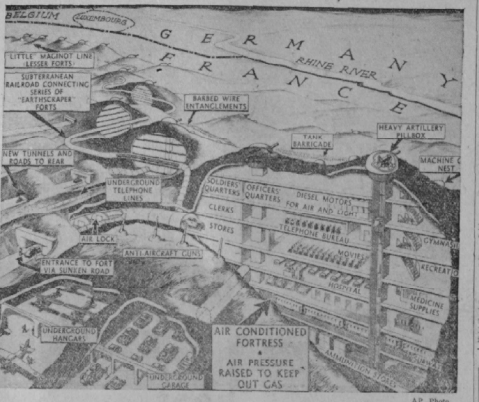
He said that some companies are changing natural gas into liquid fuel. But he added he was not talking about this scientific advance and it is not possible to say how much, if any, of this kind of gas is going into American motors.

AUTO OF FUTURE MAY RUN ON AIR

Electrical Energy From Ether Will Power Cars, Safety Council Told

NEW YORK, April 21 (UP)—Automobiles may be running on electrical energy drawn from the air in a few years, William A. Van Duzer, told the Greater New York Safety Council.

They will have three wheels, enabling them to make 90-degree turns; sharp blades that will be dropped instantly to the pavement to prevent skidding; photo electric cells that will keep them from running past red lights; and control their speed.

Van Duzer is traffic director for the District of Columbia. He addressed a session of the National Safety Council in session here.

The radio-controlled car, he said, will be as far advanced as the modern car is over the horse and buggy. It should come within 25 years, possibly five or 10, he said. Electric energy would be transmitted by etheral waves to operate motor in the cars. It will be a natural extension of the strides that have been made in the past 20 years in transmitting electricity without wires.

No less a political observer than the editor of the New York State Journal, an expertly well informed publication, has again confused the recreational side of Westchester with the more serious economic and political factors within the county. It is a mistake which is easily made by those who do not live within the county but merely pass through and are superficially affected by the display of outdoor opportunities.

Commenting upon the probable alignments at the state constitutional convention in Albany, the editor in question notes that originally the political setting was New York City versus up-state; then it became New York City and up-state cities versus the rural counties. Now, he predicts there may easily come a new setting in which residential counties suburban to New York City will unite to exert their power and to make independent demands.

"Westchester, Putnam and Dutchess reach hands across the Sound to Nassau and Suffolk and the five together can form a coalition not to be lightly considered," he estimates. "The all-important question is: where can this combination find the kindred faithful? Does the sentiment of the golf courses at Sleepy Hollow and Briarcliff, at Southoughton and Easthampton and Oyster Bay, rest more favorably in the hayfields of St. Lawrence or in the congested centers of Manhattan and Brooklyn?"

It is a pretty question as to political future. But with all due regard to the writer, this "country club consciousness" he mentions is not the dominant force in Westchester, and it is to be doubted if it has any greater appeal in the four other counties.

Westchester offers an unexcelled field for sports; its golf clubs are among the finest in the world; but they are for physical recreation and social diversion. Many of the county's leading citizens find relaxation at these beautiful spots; but not yet—and perhaps never—is the day when political domination of this county emanates from the locker-rooms of the country clubs.

The individual who does not believe in a Supreme Being is deprived of any worthwhile incentive to continue to exist. An individual who denies the existence of God must sink lower and lower. His desire cannot fail to prove a destroyer which will take out of his life all that might have made it happy and a success.

Athletes is to be viewed with growing alarm. It is a danger—and to be feared. Mr. Coleman de serves thanks for the manner in which he presented the matter before Mamaroneck Council. It is a message which needs to be carried to the far corners of the earth.
