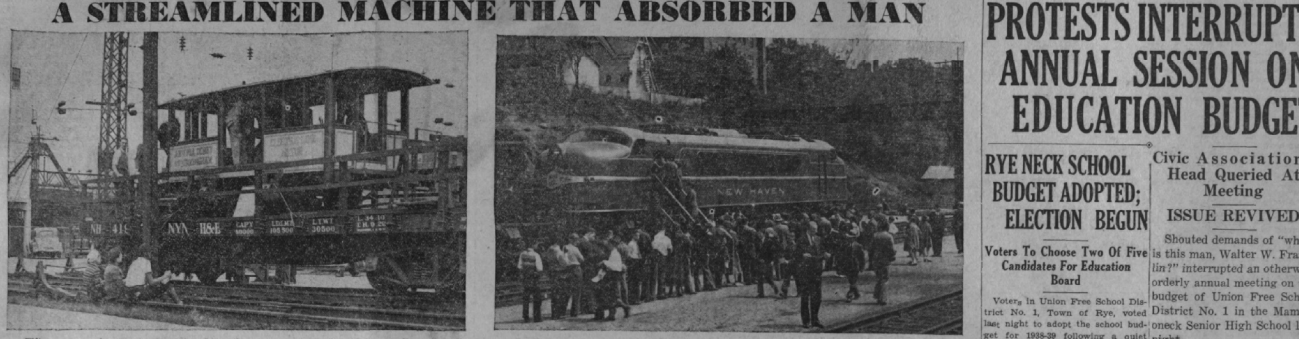

## Tax Collection Sets 77 PERCENT RECEIVED; \$200,000 INCREASE OVER 1937

**\$1,025,000 Paid In During Penalty-Free Period**

**OBLIGATIONS MET**

Collection of taxes during the penalty-free period of April amounted to 77 and 3-4 per cent of the total levy of \$1,348,716.28, or in round figures, approximately \$1,025,000, it was announced today by Henry R. Dillon, receiver of taxes for the Town of Mamaroneck.

The collection amounted to approximately \$200,000 more than was collected during the penalty-free period last year, when 64 per cent of a total levy of \$1,238,310.72 was collected. Mr. Dillon said he collected \$222,000 during April, 1937.

The percentage of collection was the best he has experienced since he has been in office, said Mr. Dillon, who became receiver in 1935. A good percentage of the more than \$200,000 paid to be collected will go into the Town's fund this month, even with the 2 per cent penalty which is imposed, Mr. Dillon said. Payment will be made to meet the increased penalty on June 1, when the penalty goes to 5 per cent.

The record-breaking payments made possible the clearance by the Town of its current obligations prior to or upon due date. A check for \$200,000 was handed by Mr. Dillon on Thursday to County Treasurer William R. Coffey as payment on the county's key account, the Town, amounting to \$680,038.

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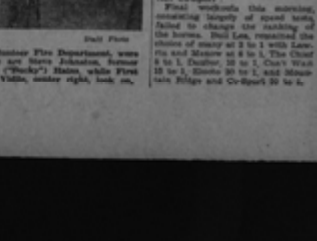

# MUSSOLINI TO GIVE GERMANY FREE HAND IN CZECHOSLOVAKIA

## Duce Hopes Reich Will Solve Crisis On Her Own

### FACT DISCUSSED

ROME, May 7 (AP)—Premier Mussolini, according to German sources, has agreed to give Germany a free hand in Czechoslovakia, so far as Italy is concerned.

Mussolini was said to have promised, during a conversation last night with Reichsleiter Hitler, to bring diplomatic pressure to bear upon the Czechoslovakian Government to be "reasonable" in meeting German demands.

The German sources said Mussolini agreed that Italy was a distinct force in Central Europe, and that the Republic German public was one which recognized only the Germany and Czechoslovakian.

Mussolini was reported to have expressed how Germany would like to see the problem "settled" on her own terms. He also was quoted as having expressed the conviction that a solution of the German problem in Czechoslovakia would contribute to the stabilization of European peace.

After the details had leaked in private to the press, the German foreign minister, Joachim von Ribbentrop, and his German press, were said to be in the process of continuing to assure the public.

Mussolini's private negotiations of a European pact were reported to have been the chief factor.

Hitler, according to German sources, indicated willingness to give to the Republic German, France, Great Britain, Italy and Germany, but to be decided in consideration of the fact that the British and German-British understandings preclude such an agreement.

Each would see the big air army which was planned today for the visiting German Reich. It is said that tonight's state dinner at the Reichstag was the highest point of the day's mood.

Both Premier Mussolini and Hitler were to speak briefly at the banquet, and their speeches were said to reveal the nature of their conversations on the future of the Reich.

**SMOKE CAUSES LOSS TO SHOPS**

Six volunteer firemen were overcome by smoke from a fire which swept through the basement and caused damage amounting to thousands of dollars in the five-story De Luxe Apartment building at Mamaroneck and Prospect Avenues, in the heart of the village's business district, at 5:45 P. M. yesterday.

One tenant, Mrs. Jennie McCall, wife of the building superintendent, Hugh McCall, was rescued from her ground-floor apartment when she found that the dense smoke made passage through the corridor impossible.

Mrs. McCall was assisted by the volunteer firemen through a rear window. She was uninjured except for an abrasion of the ankle.

Twenty-six families were sent to the street by the fire, the origin of which had not been determined today. Fire Chief Edward Secker could not place any estimate on the damage, nor could he explain how the fire started in the storeroom filled with boxes and some stock of the stores above.

Of the four stores located in the building, fronting Mamaroneck Avenue, the one most badly damaged was the Fashion Shoe Store, owned by William Jacobs, himself a volunteer fireman, who discovered the blaze and turned in the alarm. Mr. Jacobs estimated that the damage to his store and to the stock would be between \$8,000 and \$10,000.

Next to the repair shop was the Dean Store, Inc., a branch of the cleaning and pressing firm with main offices in Bridgport, Mass. Smoke also went into the branch office and into the Caprus Pharmacy, operated by R. J. Diforo, which is on the corner.

No estimate of the damage could be obtained from the operators of the latter establishments.

Mr. Jacobs was fitting a pair of shoes on a small child when the fire started. The child turned to her mother in the corner.

"Look, mommie, there's smoke coming from the man's shoulder!"

Mr. Jacobs looked behind him and saw the smoke emerging from the door and other windows. He called to his daughter to come to the front.

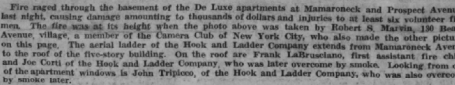

### TRUSTEES DEFER ACTION ON PLEA FOR APARTMENT

Hearing Held On Application For Reopening To Permit Building

**PETITION IS PRESENTED**  
Survey And Report Paid For By Village, Hooley Discloses

The Larchmont Board of Trustees, holding a special meeting in the courtroom of the Municipal Building last night, under advisement of the application of Moses J. Cherry for reopening of his property on Larchmont Avenue adjacent to the Municipal Building. The Board also took under advisement the application of Mrs. P. F. Laskov for the Building Code to permit erection of a two-story apartment building of non-fireproof construction on the property, Attorney Francis Hooley, appearing for Mr. Cherry, said the proposed building would be similar in construction to the recently erected structure on the east side of the Town of Mamaroneck and filed an amended plan calling for 84 apartments instead of 54.

During the meeting Mayor Henry D. Coughlin and attorney Francis Hooley presented the petition and Mr. Coughlin also presented the present zoning creates an unnecessary hardship and unusual difficulty in building construction of the proposed 84-unit apartment building. He called attention to non-conforming use of property on three sides of the Cherry property and declared his client's land suitable for no other use than the apartment building. He claimed the apartment would be advantageous to the village.

The plan for the proposed building was approved by the Board of Trustees, a group and three trustees, Mr. Hooley presented a petition in favor of the project and he said had 200 signatures. Letters in favor were also read, including several from women.

Calling the building code "not a regulation but a nuisance," he asserted it was unreasonable to require fireproof construction of the building. He declared fireproof construction is "economically unsound and asked that the Board waive portions be permitted instead of strict enforcement of the code.

This was opposed by Chief of Police J. Smith, who is in the Fire Department, who read a letter from the Fire Council definitely objecting to any relaxation of the fire prevention regulations of the Building Code in the case of buildings above three stories in height.

Objection to the zoning was voted by Thomas B. Sutton, who said the ultimate result would be reopening of one piece of property after another until the entire town was a vast apartment building, which was the way to the Board.

Mayor Coughlin called upon Chairman John W. Hooley of the Planning Board who in turn called Harold M. Lewis consulting engineer of the Regional Planning Board, who said the Board would water supply can serve a maximum of 10,000 persons, and that an increase in the Village population of 122 per cent appeared likely. He said Larchmont is growing faster than the rest of Westchester County owing to natural advantages. He quoted figures supporting his statement.

Mr. Hooley said the Cherry property was so close to public sources such as the Boston Post Road, the Firehouse, school and garage that it would be objectionable for a private residence. Trustee Launcey Moore said the zoning would be less for apartment dwelling and the attorney replied, "Oh, they have to expect noise." Mr. Hooley said that the land owned by those who wrote favorable letters was about 100 feet "or that," observed Mr. Sutton, "do not think there is any property value for more than \$400."

The Lieutenant Governor was arrested, but he declined to comment on the charges against him.
