

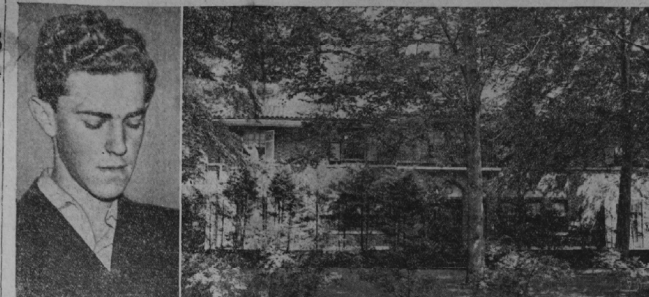

TWO SLATED TO DIE IN SING SING TONIGHT

OSBORN, JUNE 3 (AP)—Two Brooklyn men are scheduled to die in the electric chair at Sing Sing tonight—one for the slaying of an 8-year-old girl, the other for the slaying of the man known as "Doc" Drunkman.

Lawrence Marks, 41, will go to the chair for the killing of Paula Margana. The body of the child, strangled, attacked and forced into a baby carriage, was found in the cellar of her Brooklyn apartment home last July 31. Marks was convicted last Fall. The other condemned man is Fred J. Hall, 34. Hall was convicted of second degree murder but was granted a new trial which resulted in a first degree conviction. Drunkman's battered body was found in the rubble of a garage of the Brooklyn garage of his brother-in-law, Meyer Luckman, on March 3, 1935.

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INSURGENTS FIGHT WAY TO DEFENSES AROUND VALENCIA

Nationalist Forces Push On In Drive To Cut Off Madrid From Sea

AIR ACTIVITY CONTINUES 60 Reported Killed in Raid, Port Bombed; British Dredge Hit

HENDAYE, FRENCH SPANISH FRONTIER, June 8 (UP)—Nationalist forces reached a point 12 miles northwest of the coastal city of Castellon De La Plana in the drive from the Teruel front to cut Madrid off from the sea.

The nationalists announced occupation of Castellon, 120 miles south, putting the zone of Villafraña, eight miles north of Castellon, under artillery fire. Nationalist aviation, artillery and tanks entered the town from the north and west of Castellon, threatening all loyalist communications on the left bank of the Júcar River. Part of the Loyalist troops clinging to the eastern coast region were being cut off.

Nationalist air activity continued. They bombed the Port of Gro de Gandia, 40 miles west of Castellon. A British-owned dredge was hit by a bomb.

LEHMAN'S SENATE AMBITION BOOSTS BLEAKLEY'S STOCK

Griffiths Says He Will Push Yonkers Man For Nomination

SEES GENERAL DEMAND

Former Supreme Court Justice However, Refuses To Make Statement

WHITE PLAINS, June 22—Republican county chairman J. Griffiths, viewing the turbulent state political waters with favor, following the sudden and unexpected announcement by Governor Lehman that he will push for the United States Senate, announced that he will push for the Yonkers gubernatorial nomination of former Supreme Court Justice William B. Bleakley of Yonkers, 1930 state's attorney, and recently designated by the Governor as Westchester for county president.

"There appears to be a general demand that Judge Bleakley get the nomination," Griffiths said. "They are shaping up fine. We have been watching the situation very closely, and everybody I know will be likely to see Judge Bleakley get the nomination."

"Political observers who heard of Mr. Griffiths' statement of the opinion that he had not included in that speech, however, included in the State Chairman, William B. Murray of Ulster, and Kenneth Simpson, chairman of the Westchester County and leader of the largest delegation to the Republican State convention in Saratoga Springs on Oct. 3 and 4. For both Mr. Murray and Mr. Simpson have made definite overtures to District Attorney Thomas E. Dewey of New York County, former racket-buster, as the man they favor for the Republican gubernatorial nomination this year."

In addition, it has been reported in Assemblyman James H. Todd, Yonkers, who is also state vice-judge of the D. O. P. and "backbone man" to Mr. Murray, or the designation of Mr. Dewey instead of the Westchester man, as Todd has herself been suggested for the post of lieutenant governor in the event of a landslide Westchester should receive nomination for governor this year. Mr. Bleakley himself was somewhat indifferently, according to a spokesman in Albany where he is a delegate and vice president of the State Constitutional convention, he limited himself to a brief statement.

"It would not be fair to make any statement on the particular situation at this moment," he said. Griffiths said that he again pushed Mr. Bleakley for the gubernatorial nomination, despite his recent designation for the 1939 post as county president, was viewed as something more for trading purposes. Westchester was by large delegate to the state convention, larger than that of any other county outside New York City excepting York, and is in a strong position to influence the state ticket if it should be a candidate for governor.

Without a candidate, it was pointed out, Westchester might not be able to place any other figure on the state ticket. The main movement, in this connection there were reports that Griffiths might allow consideration of his own name as one of the G. O. P. candidates for the United States Senate.

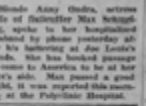

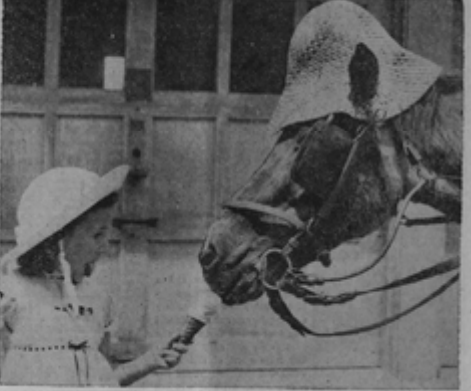

New Link Is Thrown Open At Ceremonies

MANY PRESENT

WHITE PLAINS, June 29—The State of New York, officially represented by Col. Frederick Stuart Greene, commissioner of public works, and Westchester County, through its park commissioners, joined this afternoon with Governor Wilbur L. Cross of Connecticut, his staff and engineers, to open officially a link of the new Merritt Parkway from the Westchester-Connecticut line to Norwalk.

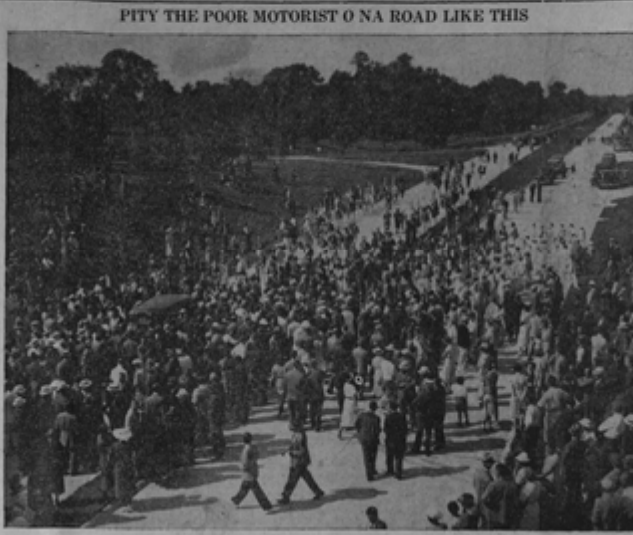
