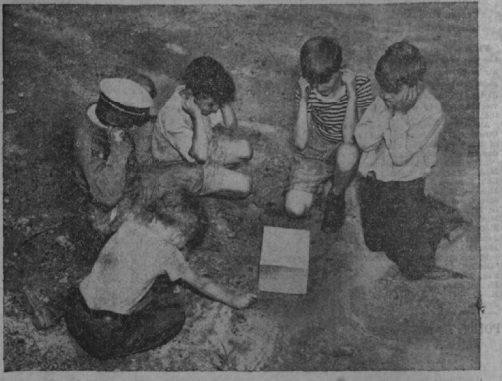

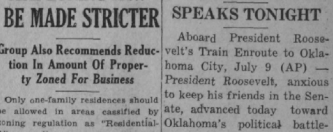

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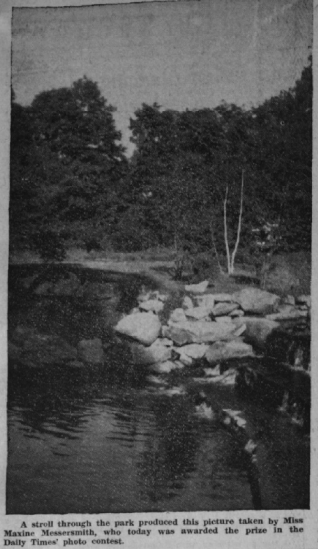

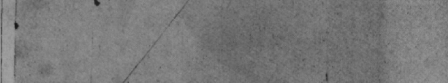

The message, picked up and relayed by the United States Army Signal Corps station at Seattle, Wash., said the plane was flying at an altitude of 6,200 feet.

The American aviator and his four companions had remained at Yakutsk for two hours 35 minutes after completing their 2,177-mile hop from Oymyakon, Siberia. Hughes planned to make yakutsk his last stop in Soviet Russian territory. He plotted a course of 2,560 miles to Fairbanks across the northeastern tip of Siberia and the Bering Sea.

Hughes landed at 6:08 P. M. (4:08 A. M. EDT) tonight, completing the 2,177-mile flight in 19 hours and 55 minutes.

JAPAN ABANDONS PLANS TO STAGE 1940 OLYMPICS

Tokio Halts Arrangements Because Of Duration Of Chinese War

FINANCES ALSO LACKING

London, Finland And New York Mentioned As Possible Sites

TOKIO, July 14 (AP)—The Japanese government suddenly abandoned plans today to stage here the 1940 Olympics, because of the probable duration of the Chinese War, and the cost of financing the games.

The announcement of the cancellation by Public Welfare Minister Maruta Kichio Kido through the semi Japanese News Agency surprised the entire nation, military leaders, Japanese organizing committee members and declared the 12th Olympiad would be conducted "whether or not the government supports it."

Various athletic organizations and newspapers in several countries have notified for a boycott of the games if held in Japan, but secondary reasons and military leaders' opposition to a growth of internationalism among the youth were cited to explain the suspension.

Despite several previous indications that Japan did not wholly support the 1940 games, the government had prepared to contribute 4,000,000 yen (about \$1,250,000) toward the cost and a 4,000,000 stadium near Tokyo.

(London and Helsinki, Finland, had been mentioned as possible sites for the coming Olympiad, if Japan found it impossible to host it.)

The cancellation was taken to indicate Japan is convinced the year-old conflict in China cannot continue until 1940. Japan lacks money and materials for the necessary sports structures.

Some smaller buildings were under construction. Foreign technicians had been working for months completing plans. Many athletes had started training although the games were forbidden to enter the country.

Count Michinau Boyevich, member of the International Olympic Committee, said Japan might bid for the 1948 games.

"I hope Japan can bid then," he said. "Apparently it is impossible to bid even for the 1948 games. The cancellation was inevitable under present conditions."

NEW YORK PROPOSED PHILADELPHIA

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. (AP)—New York and Philadelphia were proposed today to take the Olympic games laid down by John H. Kelly, former Olympic boxing champion and chairman of the Philadelphia Democratic Committee, proposed that the New York World's Fair be continued to 1940 to include the games and that Philadelphia be chosen for all remaining events.

Super-Ship Finishes 91-Hour, 17 Minute Flight

14,690 MILES

FLOYD BENNETT FIELD, NEW YORK, July 14 (UP)—Howard Hughes, first man ever to circle the world within the space of four days, landed here at 2:37 P. M. EDT today in a super-airplane stained with the dust of three continents.

Like a thoroughbred that is fastest on the run down the stretch for home, Hughes and his four companions roared in from Minneapolis on a 40-mile race in wind, hitting times the highest speed of the entire flight of 14,690 miles.

When the wheels of the big plane lunched on the concrete landing field, Hughes had cut in half the best previous round-the-world record—18 hours, 49 1/2 minutes, made by the late Wiley Post in 1931.

He had crossed three continents and two oceans since leaving this city at 7:30 P. M. EDT last Sunday. His unofficial round-the-world time was 91 hours and 17 minutes.

Insull had arrived in Paris only last Monday to visit his family and was staying in a downtown Paris hotel.

The aged Chicago business man's journey to France had been first interrupted by the grounding of an ocean liner in the St. Lawrence river. It is believed that Insull was returning to Quebec and sailed on another boat the following day.

Officials at Mamaroneck Hospital, which police used for emergency purposes, refused to give details of the fatal accident but disclosed Insull had been picked up on the street.

It apparently had been struck by a hit-and-run driver who drove away.

The former utility magnate's widow also refused to give details of the accident as well as anything about the insurance policy which had been brought back from a refuge in Turkey.

Insull was taken to the hospital at 1:30 P. M.

Hospital authorities said he was dead upon arrival.

Insull's Paris visit came four years after another most important visit in his dramatic flight across Europe to escape extradition to the United States to face charges of embezzling funds of the utility empire he pyramided in the heart of America.

In March 1935 he was acquitted of the charges as he was four months earlier of fraud charges which came to trial after he had been brought back from a refuge in Turkey.

REFINERY BLAZE SPREADS HAVOC

Spectacular Blast Causes New Peril After Fire Kills 3, Injures 75

WELLSVILLE, N. Y., July 18 (AP)—A spectacular explosion early today spread new havoc in the \$100,000 Sinclair Oil Company Refinery, after three men were killed and 75 injured in a chaos of fire and explosions last night, but firemen finally appeared to be bringing the fire under control.

A storage tank containing 2,500 barrels of naphtha exploded about five days back with a deafening roar and a cloud-sweeping flash of fire. No one was reported injured, but a similar tank, exploding last night, shot shrapnel clear across the nearby Genesee River, and killed three spectators on the opposite bank.

Chief Hollis Johnson of the company's fire department said business, including business as well as stock and equipment, would amount to about \$300,000. Emergency calls for all fire-fighting chemicals were broadcast through Western New York and Pennsylvania after the new explosion today. Soon afterward, a 20,000-barrel tank of highly inflammable naphtha caught fire, and three lives in their hands and approached close enough to snuff out the fire with chemicals.

JAP FLYERS RAID CHINA AIRDROME

Bombing Planes Land At Field; Crew Sets Grounded Craft Afire

SIAMANG, July 18 (AP)—Japanese naval flyers today carried out what a Japanese naval communiqué described as "the most daring attack in the history of military aviation." "I am not going home without the plane, but I won't fly it," the Californian explained. He said he would take it back by steamer.

He had lunch at the United States Legion, where managers from many countries of the world gathered in with congratulations on his flight. One of them was a radio broadcast to America.

FACING DEWEY'S CHARGE, SENATOR KILLS HIMSELF

Berg, Bronx Democrat, Takes Own Life Rather Than Face Indictment

WIFE PLEADS WITH HIM

Veteran Acquiesced of Receiving Money For Procuring Liquor Licenses

NEW YORK, July 20 (AP)—State Senator Julius S. Berg, Bronx Democrat, shot and killed himself today a short time before District Attorney Thomas E. Dewey's office, announced he had been indicted on charges of receiving money for his aid in procuring liquor licenses in the Bronx.

The Bronx County Democratic Committee yesterday had refused to rededicate Berg as a political candidate, naming in his stead Assemblyman Chas. J. Glavin.

The indictment, severely returned against Berg, contained 17 counts. None related to the investigation Dewey is conducting into charges that certain legislators were recipients of sums of money paid by large taxable corporations for influence legislation. Assemblyman Edward S. Moran, Jr., already has been indicted in that investigation. Dewey did not disclose the name of money Berg was accused of receiving.

Berg killed himself, Detective Captain Conrad Rothberg said, by sending a .32 caliber bullet into his right temple in his cellar at 1630 Broadway after a 12-hour argument with his wife, who had urged him "to tell everything."

He ate breakfast before he shot himself, and apparently his wife heard he was safe from self-harm, for she had been in the room for a moment and was still outside when the shot was fired.

Berg lay slumped across his desk when the rain in Captain Rothberg said she stumbled out of the room, starting to the office telephone operator. "I thought you told me that he didn't have a revolver."

"I looked through his desk yesterday and couldn't find one," the operator was quoted by Rothberg as saying.

A one-legged war veteran, was chairman of the Bronx Democratic Committee of the Senate. He handled much of the legislation sponsored in the Assembly by Assemblyman Edward S. Moran, Jr., who was indicted three weeks ago charged with extortion and accepting illegal fees as a legislator.

Last night Berg went to his office and telephoned his wife Rose, at their Belle Harbor Summer home. She arrived at 11 A.M. and a few hours later they both left the building. That was the last they were seen together until they returned not long afterward.

An elevator operator was impressed by the conversation that he wrote out a report for the superintendent of the building and later was turned over to the police.

"What you should do is tell everything," Mrs. Berg replied. "I can't, I can't," her husband replied.

The elevator operator said he then heard Berg say that what he could reveal might come close to implicating one of the highest officials of the state.

Aboard the plane with Hepburn were Bernard E. (Bill "Eze") Smith, New York stock market operator of Bedford, N. Y., who made his fortune during the depression; J. P. Becker, Toronto mining magnate who is one of Ontario's richest and most handsome men; and the pilot, James Towner, of Toronto. The plane, an amphibian type that would accommodate 10 passengers but on this flight to survey the Canadian wheat crop was loaded for only the four occupants. It is owned by Becker. The party left Toronto a week ago Sunday on an 800-mile trip through the northwestern Canadian wheat plains.

Last night at White Horse lifted the plane over the falls at the falls at White Horse in the Yukon territory. Hepburn is a well-known Alaskan capitalist, a trip normally requiring no more than a short hop across the straits which separate the western Canadian wheat plains.

The weather was unfavorable. The sailing was low and heavy mist storm swept through the beautiful mountain passes that separate this coastal city from the tundra. The sea was white.

Towner was an experienced Arctic flier and aviators did not seem to be unduly apprehensive over the weather conditions which are reported to sit down and wait until the weather clears and a vessel's officers said that Towner must have landed at one of the three or four available emergency airports along the route. The best of these was at Sitka. The plane had a landing gear located at Carleton or Atlin in Yukon territory.

All of these points were without communication at night except for a chance contact by short wave radio.

The course of the flight was over a desolate almost uninhabited country and a forced landing would be dangerous.

The Grumman amphibian has a cruising speed of 130 miles an hour and a top speed of 160. Becker bought it several weeks ago and this was its first long trip.
