

ITALY ORDERS JEWS TO LEAVE; HITLER CLOSES RELIGIOUS SCHOOLS

All Settlers Since 1919 Get 6 Months To Leave... CITIZENS ALSO... ROME, Sept. 1 (AP)—All Jews who have settled in Italy since Jan. 1, 1919, today were ordered to leave the country within six months by a Cabinet decree.

The decree applied even to Jews who have become Italian citizens, because citizenship conferred since that date has been revoked... The edict was made applicable to Italy proper, Libya and the Aegean Isles. No mention was made of Italian East Africa.

The settlement of Jews in Italy from now on was prohibited... The decree defined as Jewish all persons born of both parents of the Hebrew race regardless of religion... Today's decree provided that if those affected did not leave Italy voluntarily within six months they will be expelled "followed by the application of penalties fixed by law."

The granting of pensions to veterans in the South Tyrol—where the German-speaking population has been estimated at 250,000—was one of numerous steps taken to win over that district since Reichsbanner Hitler's annexation of Austria March 15... The veterans affected actually fought against Italy in the Austro-Slovenian phase of the World War.

Another cabinet measure gave the government full power to make any use it desires of industrial or commercial establishments in the event of full or partial mobilization... Italian East Africa—Ethiopia, Somalia, Eritrea—may never be the haven for most of Italy's expelled Jews.

Jewish refugees from other European countries have found the doors of other lands closed... The decree was issued after a cabinet meeting at which Premier Benito Mussolini presided... It did not show the number of Jews who would be affected by the decree but observers estimated it would be more than 200,000.

Milan police recently reported 20,000 Jews had settled since Germany's absorption of Austria last March 15... A large number of other Austrian refugees have settled in Trieste and other northern Italian cities... At the same time the Fascist regime moved to give greater loyalty to the Germanic population of the South Tyrol, ceded to Italy by Austria after the great war.

War veterans who served in the Austrian Army were accorded the same pensions as Italian World War veterans. This measure was approved by the Cabinet with Premier Mussolini presiding... The cabinet also approved measures to stimulate childbearing by limiting the numbers of women working and making promotion of men in the Civil Service dependent on their marital status.

40 PERCENT LOSS IN SUPPLY FOUND AT WATERWORKS

Thrasher Opens Investigation To Discover Reasons For Shortage... CHECKING ALL METERS... Auditors Find Mysterious Loss In Water Leaving Pumping Station

William E. Thrasher, superintendent of Westchester Joint Waterworks No. 1, which serves Mamaroneck Village, Town, and Harrison today had under way an investigation to determine the reason for a water loss amounting to almost 40 per cent of the supply.

The reported loss, as found by the Waterworks auditor, E. J. Edges and Dean of New York City, in their semi-annual report, shows a difference of 39.92 percent from the total water leaving the pumping station to consumers, as found in bills to consumers.

The investigation came at the order of the Waterworks auditor, who heard the report on Tuesday night... The board of directors, headed by Mr. Thrasher, Mayor William Johnson, and Dr. G. M. Hines, and Benjamin Taylor, Harrison auditor.

The board asked for a preliminary report within a week, while a formal and complete determination will be given the board in two weeks... The director said today that leaving the reasons that caused the water system "right," thus resulting in a loss of 40 per cent of the total water leaving the pumping station has become a mystery.

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835 MORE REGISTER, SETTING RECORD FOR VOTE ON NEW SCHOOL

STILL ON STAND... Larchmont And Town Area Hold Big Lead... 2,271 QUALIFY

The largest registration for an election in Union Free School District No. 1 was rolled up yesterday for the special vote on Sept. 10 to determine whether Central School will have a \$270,000 addition... A total of 2,271 registrants, of which 835 were recorded yesterday in an overwhelming display.

Eight other deaths were caused by the same heavy rains sweeping the Quebec area, six persons of a single family drowned when their cabin at Portneuf, 40 miles west of Quebec, was swept away by a flood of Portneuf River, and two Montrealers died in a washout of a road.

Three physicians who took charge of Quebec emergency train, collapsed of the apartment house, at 412 A. M. For several weeks, the factory town six miles east of Quebec, had been suffering from incessant rains, although only five cases had been reported.

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Japanese Occupy Strategic Villages

On the Hankow front, about 300 miles to the south, the Chinese maintained they overcame Japanese motorcycle and cavalry forces and repulsed 13 days and nights at Loka west of Jichang, Chinese reports said the Japanese lost many men.

FERRIS CONFERS WITH DEWEY ON POLICY RACKET

District Attorney Seeks Data on County Link To Hines Trial

GRAND JURY MAY ACT Sister Of Dixie Davis Tells Of Taking Money To Tammany Leader

WHITE PLAINS, Sept. 6.—District Attorney Walter A. Ferris today was in consultation with District Attorney Thomas E. Dewey and members of his staff in New York City; it was learned to determine whether there is cause for investigation by the Westchester Grand Jury of any operation of the policy game in the county incidental to the conspiracy trial of James J. Hines.

It was at that report here that Mr. Ferris had called to New York City to take the stand in the Hines trial, and testify as to any knowledge which might have come to him of operations of the "policy" game in Westchester. But it was Mr. Ferris' office here that was specifically asked by the chief assistant District Attorney Robert T. Gallagher.

Instead, it was learned from other sources, Mr. Ferris wishes to consult with Mr. Dewey regarding testimony, as yet unrecorded in the Hines trial, that at a period of one year ago or thereabouts, he and his associates had their headquarters in a Mount Vernon garage. It is not held that any slips were used in Mount Vernon by the gang but that the garage was used for bookkeeping purposes.

Mr. Ferris is said to be particularly interested in testimony given by George Weinberg, the participant, to the effect that while the policy slip headquarters was in Mount Vernon they operated without interference by the police. It was testified, when there was a shake-up in the police force, Schultz (Cousin) was away.

An automobile in front of the motorcycle was the indirect cause of the accident. Donohue said the driver started to make a turn into a driveway, apparently changing his mind and jerked back into the road. Donohue said the "operator" said he was faced with a choice of crashing into the rear of the automobile or "splitting" the machine. He chose the latter course, he said, and he and Miss Bruner were thrown to the pavement.

They were taken to New Rochelle Hospital by a passing motorist. The driver of the automobile was taken into custody later by Eastchester police, Donohue said.

A charge of reckless driving was brought by Donohue against the motorist, whom he identified as Robert C. Hamner, 70 Penn Boulevard, Scarsdale.

Accidents Few Considering Heavy Flow Traffic In This Section

32 DEATHS IN STATE Autos Take 278 Lives In U. S.; 44 Down; 18 Kill Themselves

(By The Associated Press)

The nation's Labor weekend dawned with this year's climb to 396, a survey showed today, as compared with 291 for the 1937 weekend.

Jammed highways and bathing resorts accounted for most of the fatalities, with 33 deaths, road, led the grim parade.

The figures also included 18 homicides, 11 homicides and 45 miscellaneous fatalities, California and Ohio, with 23 deaths each, led the grim parade.

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Three Crashes Here Three automobile accidents, each with injuries to persons, involved, occurred over Labor Day weekend in this county, a check with police of three communities revealed today.

One accident was reported by Weaver Street police, one by the Village of Larchmont Department and one by the Village of Mamaroneck police.

The three police departments agreed that the number was unusually low, in view of the tremendous amount of traffic driving in the county during the three days of festivities.

All of the accidents occurred on the Boston Post Road, the thoroughfare which accounted for the greatest amount of traffic here.

One of the accidents reported in this community occurred at 3:45 P. M. today when two members of a Brooklyn family returning home after a holiday weekend in Boston, Mass., were severely injured as their car, which was on Boston Post Road near Dillon Road, Town of Mamaroneck, crashed into a telephone pole and a billboard.

Victor Mariani, 47, of 380 Manor Street, driver of the automobile, was reported by Weaver Street police to have fallen asleep at the wheel. He was proceeding west on the Post Road when he crashed off the pole.

The automobile first struck the pole and then careened into the billboard, which collapsed on top of the automobile. The sign, however, did not go through the top of the car.

Top of Summer statistics claimed three lives over the weekend. There was no automobile death, setting a record for five years. One drowning, was reported.

Dependent because his wife had left him and their five-month-old son, Simon Frank, 27, gas station attendant at Hawthorne committed suicide yesterday by inhaling carbon monoxide fumes.

According to state police, Frank went into the garage of his home near the Bronx River Parkway Extension, turned on the motor and lay down on a blanket near the exhaust pipe of the machine. He was found at 11:45 A. M. yesterday by a friend.

Praha Waits Reaction To Sudeten Concessions

PARIS PREPARES

Adolf Hitler delivered his long-awaited annual proclamation to the Nazi Party Congress at Nurnberg today, but failed to make any reference to the Czechoslovak crisis on which Europe had expected an important declaration.

The German chancellor dealt at length with domestic affairs and accomplishments of the Nazi Party, touching only briefly on foreign policy.

While the Nazis met in Nurnberg, the Czechoslovak Government in Prague awaited reaction from the German government and the Czechs to its sweeping concessions.

These concessions were not announced by a official press conference of the British.

The Chamber of Deputies subcommittee on army affairs was called to meet tomorrow in an urgent session to be devoted to the question of production of war material.

The Spanish civil war and the Chinese-Japanese conflict continued at full force and China emergency measures to insure domestic peace after Monday's rebellion by a small group of national socialist.

Japanese troops reported an overwhelming victory over the Chinese 98th Division, one of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's outstanding units, in a 48-hour battle of the southwest border of Hunan and Anhwei Provinces.

An appropriation of \$15,000 to finance the committee's work was reported by the supervisors.

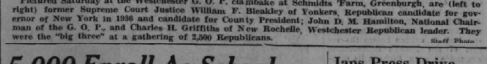

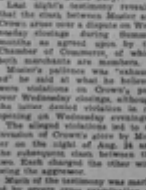

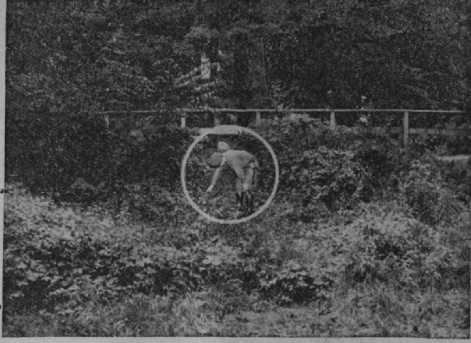

Steam Brings 22-inch Rise in Supply At Water-works
JULY FLOODS RECALLED
Rainy Summer Makes Usual Purchase Of 150,000,000 Gallons Unnecessary

It has rained so much this year that the Waterworks Dept. Water Works District No. 1 has not found it necessary to buy the usual summer supply of approximately 150,000,000 gallons of water from the New York system.

But filled cisterns which have drenched the city since rain began today, bringing a precipitation measured at 2.36 inches up until 9 A. M. today at the water works, retained the heavy rainwater the day after today.

A spell of rain continued then with a violent shower beginning July 22 which caused Mr. Alderman to overflow the tanks the following day, causing thousands of dollars worth of damage.

That and other rainfalls during the sunny dry August months, escaping with the present weather, will make the purchase of water unnecessary, according to Fred M. Alderman, executive assistant. The ordinary dry spells had ended, he said.

The water works operate an average of 15,000 per year on water to supplement the supply capacity in the reservoir, paying \$1000 per 1,000,000 gallons. Two years ago the average did not rise from the system then bought approximately \$100,000 of replacement water.

There were no signs this morning that the present rain was near coming. Mr. Alderman said that a heavy fall rain was expected, 45 inches on Sunday and 1.5 inches yesterday up until midnight.

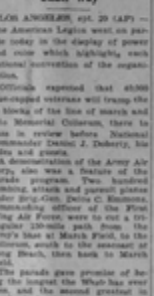

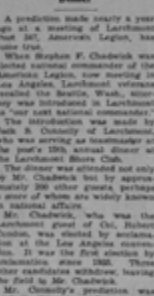

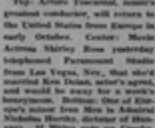

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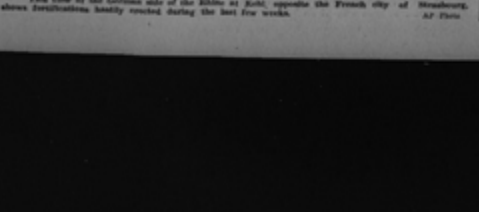

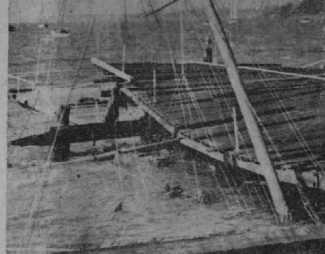

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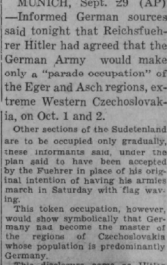
