**1,000 SEND REPLIES TO FISH-GAME GROUP**  
The Southern New York Fish and Game Association now has a complete picture of the outdoor interests of its members as indicated by a tabulation of a query sent to them.  
Over 1,000 members sent replies to the questionnaire. They were asked to state which of the eight activities listed below they were interested in, replying as follows: The average member was interested in 2 1/2 of the eight activities listed. The percentage shown after the items is the percentage expressed for that activity.  
Lake and pond fishing 48 per cent; stream fishing 47 per cent; better legislation 20 per cent; upland game hunting 28 per cent; vermin control 31 per cent; and water fishing 27 per cent; Winter fishing 20 per cent; duck hunting 14 per cent.

**Young Pleasants Released**  
Game Warden Ed. H. Kelly tells us that he released 95 young pleasants for the local waters during July. Also that about 200 trout will be coming in this fall to replace those caught during the past season. Bass and White Perch fishermen also will be available for stocking in our nearby lakes. White perch will be put in Lake Wausatch, Lake Mahopac and Tivoli Reservoir.

**Fly-Casting For Bass**  
Having suggested that some of you try fly-casting for bass along the shores of our local waters, I had a fling at it myself at Rye Lake last Sunday. The satisfaction of hooking and landing one that weighed 1 1/2 pounds. Not a big fish, but then it proved to my mind that fly-casting from shore does bring results.  
At that time I spotted two anglers frantically reeling here and there and gathered later that they were trying to land a bass. I was in my boat at the spot where lake trout gather. The day before was closing day and because a large lake had come to get they had lost the exact spot where the flats were moored. Of course no one wants to lose a bass, some 100 feet of rope and two fish.

**Blackfish in Local Waters**  
The blackfish are now in our local Sound waters but you will have to go out into deep water for them, probably 200 to 300 feet. There are many such spots in the Sound near where they can be fished. Snappers, too, are now hitting in great strides. Later the flounder and trout fish will greatly increase your offerings.

**GAME RESEARCH IS STATE PLAN**  
Conditioning of Fish, Animals Told To Southern Sportsman's Group

The use of research in fish and game conditioning is the object of the State Conservation Department at the present time, said Victor Skiff, secretary from the department, at the meeting of the Southern New York Fish and Game Association at the Court House in White Plains this week.  
Skiff stressed the importance of not merely restocking fish and game as fast as it was taken, but of discovering the circumstances which bring a shortage in the natural development of the species. By discovering how the human element had disturbed nature's balance, the department can condition the species, Skiff said.  
Example: He gave attention to the case showing the inclusion of rearing of a trout pond that had so changed in nature's plan that trout could no longer survive. He pointed out that trout fed on the smaller fishes and if they are fished out too fast, the smaller fish will develop in great numbers. Therefore, if small trout are stocked, they will not be able to sustain with all the other fish. A pond such as this should be sold before being stocked.  
In connection with this statement, Skiff was asked why the department would not stock with large fish reared by the state as it is done in England. He replied that it would be impossible financially for the department to meet the take of rod and gun. As money is limited, that which can only meet needs as far as possible is better. 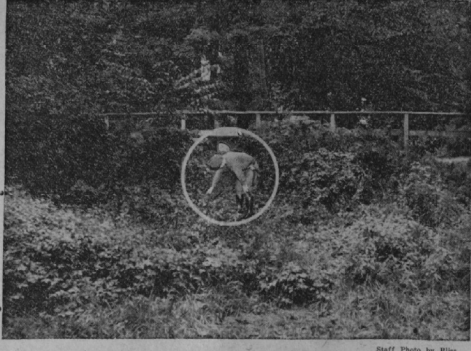

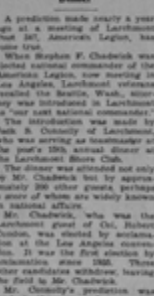

LARCHMONT GROUP TO WAR ON TAXES

League Says Plans To Carry On Fight Against 'All Municipal Expenditures'

By LEONARD J. KANE

Victorious in its campaign to defeat a bond issue for enlarging and remodeling Central School, the Taxpayer League of Larchmont is making plans to press a vigorous fight on all municipal expenditures, it was announced today.

"We're going to keep control of our money," declared a spokesman for the group, "Too many people have lost their homes because they could not pay mounting tax bills."

The league particularly condemned a move for a bond issue for enlarging and remodeling Central School. The issue was recently defeated for the third time, when it carried a provision for a loan of \$125,000 from the Public Works Administration.

"We investigated and found the school all right as it is," says the spokesman. "The money was spent for things that PWA money is much too expensive a double sock, if you know what we mean."

"We don't want any part of it and so we're fighting for other political, nonsectarian and nonracial groups to get out of the taxpayers' interests. It burns us up to know that the tax rate in a neighborhood community is a third less than ours."

The league is unconcerned over the fact that its activities sound like an appendectomy on the budget of the town by the turning down of federal funds, that it may be a precedent for other towns throughout the nation."

The league's unconcerned attitude was expressed by D. T. Williams, a Larchmont resident, who is secretary of the group. Mrs. I. W. Thompson, wife of the president of R. K. O. Theatre, T. R. Allen, M. B. Roosevelt, T. J. Morrison, J. W. Kelly, Mr. Thompson, E. H. Tatum and K. Quinn.

Explaining the background of the movement, the League stated its aim in part:

"There was that two million dollar school bond issue in 1930 which was passed by 121 votes over 23 'noes'—a total voting strength of 144 ballots.

There are a great many more voters around in each civic responsibility so voting came strictly by under the heading of 'Who Cares?' Then came a fearful din from the home of a well-to-do Larchmont resident.

"When Charles switched the switch, to take generally and specifically a new bond issue to be voted in, coming from the expenditure of \$270,000 for the enlargement and remodeling of Central School, it is indignantly regarded by the coffee and cigar that it was practically an outrage and that something should be done."

"Within half an hour the women in the party had been selected and a campaign was on. The phone buzzed that night, all night long and the next morning."

Result: 421 votes for the enlarging and remodeling, 495 votes against. Civic spirit was triumphant.

"Three times the bond issue came up and three times it was carried under, carrying with it the amount of a PWA loan of \$125,000."

LOW-LYING SECTIONS FACE FLOOD THREAT AS RIVERS OVERFLOW

(Continued From Page One) morning in the basement of the Volunteer Firehouse on Mamaroneck Avenue—a basement which was flooded to its top during the July flood.

Village Manager Claude A. Lattimer was surveying the flooded points this morning with a view towards combating the water. Fire Chief Edward Secchi, his assistant chiefs and Acting Police Chief Maurice Thomas were also carefully watching the rising water.

Rain fell on Wednesday and Thursday of last week, skipped Friday and returned Saturday to continue until today with no signs of abatement.

From Saturday afternoon until 8 A. M. today, a total of 477 inches of rain had fallen, Fred M. Abbeness, supervising chemist at the Westchester State Water Works reported. Of this total, 221 inches had fallen between 8 A. M. yesterday and 8 A. M. today. From 8 A. M. today until 11 A. M., three hours later, 11 inches had fallen, bringing to 568 inches the total for the first period of continuous rainfall.

Henry T. Hochstadt, supervising chemist at the Larchmont reservoir, said about 70,000 gallons of water were in the reservoir at the reservoir as it was. The reservoir is about 100 feet below the spillway when the storm began and that level has now risen to 10 inches above the spillway. The maximum height it reached during the storm was 18 inches above the spillway, Mr. Hochstadt said.

Water in Larchmont Gardens lake was rising, but did not spill over the roadway curbs at noon today. The low-lying sections of the Bonnie Brook Country Club were flooded.

Mr. Abbeness and Mr. Hochstadt stressed the fact that the flood water in no way has affected the water distributed through the two systems to local consumers.

All of Westchester was under a blanket of rain-filled clouds this morning.

The few Rochester water works said six inches of rain was registered from Saturday afternoon to mid-morning. The equatorial rainy season began to move westward July tropical rain which caused general flood conditions.

The anticipated 108-hole Westchester golf championship at the Perway starting today and the annual County Bar Association outing at Bonnet Brook tomorrow were called off as courses went soggy.

A spin water stood in back yards and started into basins. Public Works Department staff by ready to get out pumps which were about to be replaced for the winter by new pumps.

The Hyram River went out of bounds in low lying sections of the Benwick District north of Port Chester and again threatened a serious food. The stream and sewers were so full it became necessary to bypass sewage into Long Island Sound all night to avoid it.

Damage to the Bonnet Brook Municipal Building had already been reported. The building is situated on a low-lying section of the town.

Draining rains centering their most destructive force in the New England states where damage already easy rose into hundreds of thousands of dollars, according to the Associated Press.

At Westchester, Rivers neared 1936 flood levels. Half a dozen bridges had been carried away and industrial plants in Gardner, Alton and Southbridge, flooded by rising waters, were abandoned.

A dam and two bridges at Baldwinsville, near Gardner, which had withstood the 1935 flood, were carried away, and the Boston and Maine Railroad reported five washouts, the worst at Westchester, Mass., where an engine and two cars were derailed.

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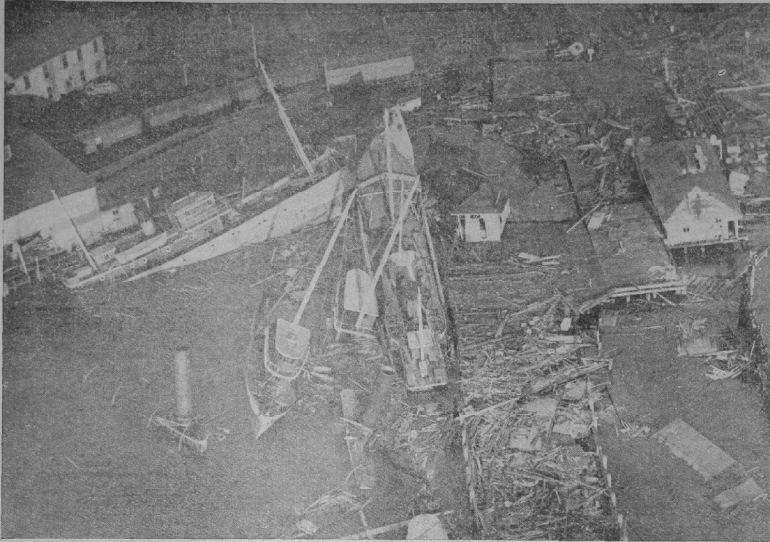
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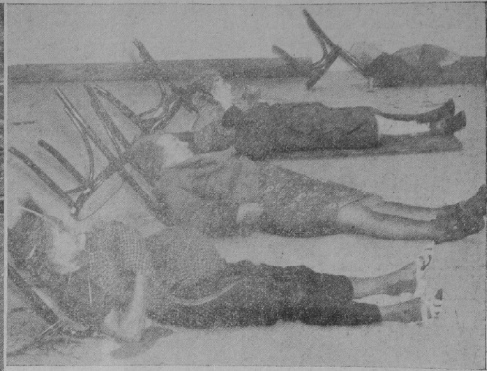

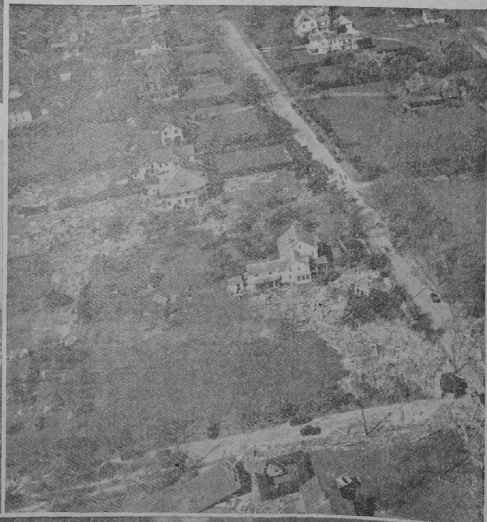

# CZECHS TO BLAME IF WAR DEVELOPS, HITLER DECLARES

## Decision Entirely In Hands Of Prague, Reich Chief Tells Roosevelt

## REPLY COMES DAY LATE

## Chancellor Shares President's Views On Consequences Of European War

BERLIN, Sept. 27 (AP)—Reich-Chancellor Hitler carefully marshaled Germany's whole case today in an unusually long communication replying to President Roosevelt's appeal for European peace.

He ended with these words: "It is now solely in the hands of the Czechoslovak Government and not in the hands of the German Government to decide whether it desires peace or war."

"I have the conviction," Hitler wrote, "that if you visualize the entire development of the Sudeten German problem from its beginning until the present day, you will realize that the German Government actually was in a passive or a sincere will to peaceful negotiations."

He took the President "I completely and in every way share your views concerning the immeasurable consequences of a European war."

Reviewing the history of the Sudeten German affair, Hitler reminded Roosevelt that "Woodrow Wilson himself had proclaimed the principle of self-determination for the nations in the famous Wilson 'Fourteen Points'."

He declared the Sudeten German affair involved in the World War, Hitler said, has accepted the principle as binding on war.

But Germany's fate in accepting this principle was "abominably betrayed," Hitler observed.

He charged that the victors had created a political regime in Europe that reduced the vanquished nations to "pathetic strips of all rights."

Viscount Gort, chief of the Imperial General Staff, and Marshal Sir Cyril Newall, air chief, conferred with Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain today, strengthening the belief that Adolf Hitler was obdurate in his "final demands on Czechoslovakia."

The conference took place after Sir Horace Wilson, close advisor to the prime minister, flew back from Berlin after two meetings with the German chancellor in a desperate effort to stave off war.

The fact that Viscount Gort and Sir Cyril sailed on Chamberlain's immediate flight to Prague today, after Sir Horace's talks with Hitler was taken as an ominous sign.

The prime minister will tell the whole story to Parliament tomorrow, it was believed, and conscription plans were in readiness.

Adolf Hitler told President Roosevelt today it was "solely in the hands of the Czechoslovak government" whether Europe goes to war, while the government radio in Prague declared indignantly that Hitler's demands "aimed at the brutal desire to crush Czechoslovakia as a free state."

The Prague broadcast, made about the same time Czechoslovakia's appeal for peace in Europe was made public in London, declared that the latest demands were not "Czechoslovakia's" but were met "Czechoslovakia" would be so weakened in a military way that the greatest part of her territory, notably Bohemia and Moravia, would be at the mercy of Germany.

Both Germany and the little Central European republic insisted on sticking firmly to positions which declared the danger of a general European conflict, and counseled Europe to rush war preparations at top speed.

London ordered her two depot stations, in the heart of the city, closed for transformation into air raid shelters.

Czechoslovakia's minister to London, Jan Masaryk, made public the British government's reply to Hitler's latest demands, "unconditionally unacceptable" in their present form and promising the "utmost resistance."

In that speech, Hitler demanded that Czechoslovakia cede Sudeetenland to Germany by Oct. 1 and asserted that this was "a demand on which I will not yield."

Hitler already had given an unequivocal warning, however, that "Great Britain and Russia will stand by France," who is bound by treaty to protect Czechoslovakia against attack.

In Geneva, Maxmilian Litvinoff, Soviet Russia's minister of foreign affairs, was reported to have privately demonstrated in the hope that a show of force by Russia, Britain and France would not confirmed the government's attitude and it was to determine whether he was to be further negotiations.

In Paris, news came that the French government said France had entered into friendly negotiations with Poland.

## Former Mayor Urges Abandonment Of Old Ordinance, Adoption Of New One

Abandonment of the plumbing code which has been in effect in the Village of Mamaroneck since 1926 and the adoption of a new code was proposed by former Mayor William E. Lyon at a public hearing held by the Village Board of Trustees last night.

The hearing was on proposed amendments to the original code, providing among other things for a reciprocal licensing agreement between communities. Despite the fact that village planners attended and raised their hands when they approved the proposed amendments, Mr. Lyon objected strenuously to its adoption.

The original code, which was null and void because the law provides that adoption of such codes shall be by "yes and no" vote, Mr. Lyon said, will be discussed that night.

The code was in effect during the meeting for Mr. Lyon's comments, he said, that no such vote was taken.

NEW YORK, Sept. 27 (AP)—Mayor LaGuardia's compromise proposal for settlement of the strike of 15,000 truck drivers was accepted by the strikers at noon today at a meeting in Union Square. The truck owners rejected the proposal yesterday.

The mayor's compromise agreement calls for a two-year contract with a 4-hour week with no reduction in the present weekly base pay of \$44 to \$52. The old contract, which provided for a 47-hour week, expired Sept. 1.

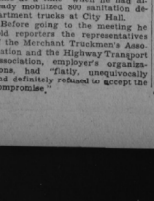
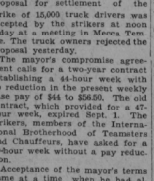
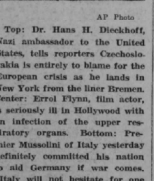
Acceptance of the mayor's terms came at a time when he had already announced no mitigation disbursement trucks at City Hall.
