**LEAKS IN WATER SUPPLY CHECKED**

**Flood Responsible for Loss in System, Treasurer Advises Board**

A BREAK OF SEVERAL OF leaks occurred in the distribution system of the Westchester Water Works due to the flood of last week, Superintendent William K. Stratton reported to the Water Works board last night.

The perpetual leakage extensively has increased by between 15,000 and 20,000 gallons per 24-hour day, he said. Workers are making a systematic search of the entire network of lines to detect the leak or leaks of leaks, 20,000 gallons.

A loss of approximately 40 per cent of the water supply was reported recently for the first half of the year. It was reduced in subsequent months to approximately 27 1/2 per cent, considered by the water works officials as an average loss for a dry year.

The damage done by the recent flood, however, adding more than 15,000 gallons to the daily loss, has brought the percentage up again. The board examining a plan for budgeting the rights-of-way leading from Purchase street into the stage and reservoir recently reauthorized. Subsequently by resolution of the board, it was decided to study the water works in order to suggest improvements to play the impact of the report.

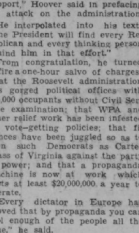

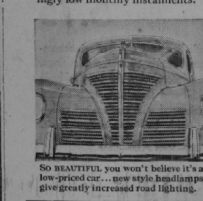

Dinner Fete Tomorrow Night Introduces New Home Plan; Government Heads To Speak

New Savings and Loan 'One Package' Program To Be Explained at Wykoly Country Club—Bliss, Bank Leader, Praises Westchester for Cooperation

Westchester's entrance into a nationwide program to assure sound financing, design and construction in the small home field will be marked tomorrow night with a dinner at Wykoly Country Club, New Rochelle.

The dinner will be sponsored by 10 Westchester savings and loan institutions which recently announced they were ready to loan eight million dollars for home construction here under the Federal Home Building Service Plan.

The plan, sponsored by the Federal Home Loan Bank and created to provide small home builders with services previously available only to those of larger means, is now offered by more than 170 lending agencies in the country.

The dinner tomorrow night will be presided over by Selwyn W. Dixon, president of the New Rochelle Federal Savings and Loan Association and chairman of the Westchester committee of savings and loan executives which put the program into effect here.

President Speakers Speakers will include Gardner W. Taylor, president of the Bronxville Federal Savings and Loan Association; George L. Bliss, president of the Federal Home Loan Bank at New York and a resident of Mount Vernon; Ormond E. Leomin, assistant to the chairman, Federal Home Loan Bank Board, at Washington; James W. Polin, chief of the Federal Home Building Service section, Federal Home Loan Bank Board; Leonard J. Kane, real estate officer, Westchester County Publishers, Inc., and William H. Hall, Bronxville architect.

Reviewing the progress of the plan over the country, Mr. Bliss said today that for the first time small home seekers in New York are provided with designs specially adapted to their communities.

"More than 20 architects now are enlisted under the plan," Mr. Bliss reported. "A total of more than 300 designs have been submitted, each the work of an architect of standing. Westchester County architects not only will add their own contributions but have selected such designs as have come from other parts of the country as are fitted for this county."

Mr. Westchester said that "certain stock plans always have been available to the home seeker but the designs which are to be found in the Home Selector portfolio of the Westchester institutions have been chosen by an architect for Westchester sites."

The approval of the plan by directors of the American Institute of Architects, leading home-financing authorities and editors interested in good construction has won the confidence of communities in which it has been inaugurated.

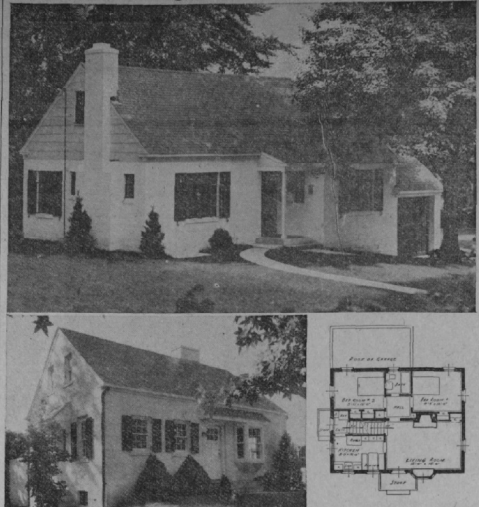
"Last month, 31 homebased associations in New Orleans adopted the plan, committing themselves to strict program of supervision construction. They followed the lead and all the lending institutions in Little Rock, Ark., where it is expected 75 homes will be erected before the end of the fall season."

In a sweeping country "The Boston & Cooperating cottage movement has resulted in the erection of several homes while 20 more are being built under the plan in a new residential community near Wollaston, Mass. Other points where the program is under way are Indianapolis, Denver, Cleveland, St. Paul, Minneapolis, Boston, St. Louis, Louisiana and Oklahoma City. Smaller communities in which it is operating range from Wheelock, Pa., Pennsylvania, to Hannibal, Missouri."

The plan is an outgrowth of the experience of the Home Owners' Loan Corporation, which was forced to recondition nearly half of the million homes it salvaged during the depression to make them sound security.

These operations revealed the full extent of shoddy construction in the United States and officials sought to work out a program which not only would guarantee better small homes for the public but protect the investment of lending institutions which are members of the Federal Home Loan Bank System and allow them safely to advance

Nearly Million Loaned Here To Modernize

Repair, Improvement Loans Insured by FHA Office Amount to \$1,357,133

The White Plains office of the Federal Housing Administration has accounted for \$1,357,133 of the \$19,400,000 loaned to home owners and business men in New York State for repair and modernization work since February, when insurance of these advances was resumed by the government. It was revealed today.

Westchester accounted for \$1,314,347 of the total. Other counties extended credit from the White Plains office were Ulster with \$70,390, Putnam with \$147,592, Dutchess with \$52,164, Orange with \$56,100, Rockland \$20,228 and Sullivan \$14,822.

Improved economic conditions in these sections are due in large part to the unprecedented amount of credit which financial institutions here are now extending for modernization and repair loans.

The significant feature of these loans, Mr. Grace said, is that they represent private capital being put into circulation and that they must be spent at once for labor and construction materials. In addition, they must be spent in the community where the property improvement is to be made as far as possible.

"We may safely say," Mr. Grace declared, "that all of this money is being put to work right among our own people. A borrower under the government insurance program must plan the use of the money for the purpose for which it was borrowed and that without necessary delay."

"It is the almost invariable custom of borrowers to do business with local banks, to employ local labor and to buy material from community dealers, a position which the F. H. A. encourages."

"You can't put all this money to work in a few small communities over a relatively short period without doing a vast amount of good and this is reflected in very much improved conditions in many of the smaller communities in Westchester and neighboring counties."

Home owners have done approximately 90 per cent of the borrowing, according to Mr. Grace. Lenses of properties who are eligible to borrow if they have loans running six months or more beyond the period of the loan, account for most of the balance.

Exterior and interior finishes of homes, which includes painting and central equipment, have accounted for 10 per cent of the loans, additions and structural alterations 19 per cent, plumbing and heating 30 per cent and roofing 17 per cent.

Mr. Grace reported the Central National Bank of New York was particularly active in Westchester loans.

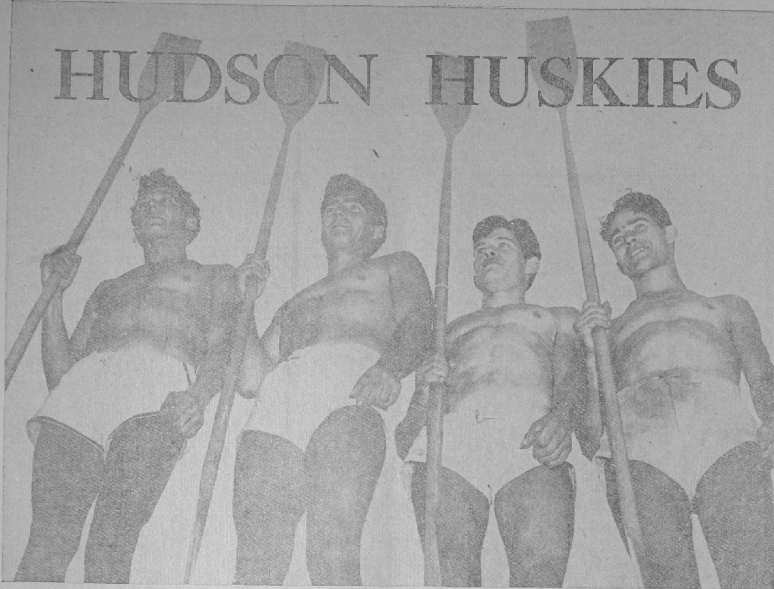

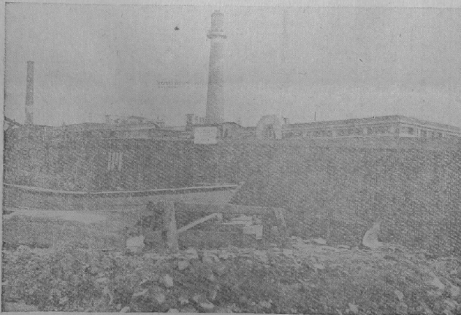
# HUDSON HUSKIES



THE HUDSON RIVER is the difficult training course for the husky paddlers who represent the amazingly successful Yonkers Canoe Club. Winners of the national racing championship for the past two years, the canoeists recently won their sixth consecutive county title in a regatta at Tibbetts Brook Park. Above is Yonkers' four-man, double-blade senior crew which established a new course record by winning the national title at Washington a few weeks ago. BECAUSE THE TIDE and strong running current in the Hudson offer a grueling training ground for the fragile racing canoes, some of which don't weigh more than 60 pounds, Yonkers paddlers have developed their own stroke which has been copied by many leading canoeists. Care of their boats is one of the most important rituals observed by the paddlers. Above you see the national four-man, single-blade championship crew bringing in its boat after a workout in the rain. Left to right are Henry Straub, William Kopko, Albert Emswiler and Joseph Parvitt. Observers watching the boys practicing will note that the stroke sits with his feet under a small deck which gives the crew some protection. A four-man shell virtually rides on the water for the gunwales are not more than two or three inches from the surface.

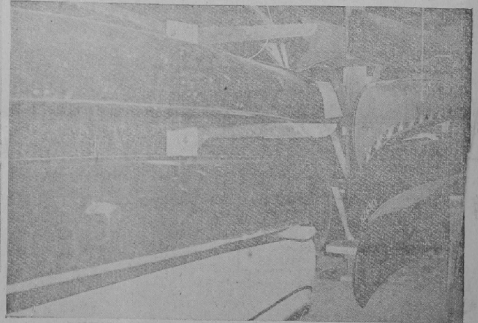


THIS RAVISHACKLE and down-at-heel old shack on the Yonkers waterfront at Saunders Dock houses the national champions. A year ago the paddlers were forced to tear down the clubhouse they occupied on New York Central property. Now they hire a room in this building. In it they keep all their racing equipment and hold their meetings. Last year the club inaugurated a series of Summer classes for Sea Scout and high school paddlers. Yonkers is the only city in the United States offering practical canoeing experience through its schools. Some of the high school youths become adept enough to compete in big-time regattas.



A GREAT DEAL of the success of the Yonkers Canoe Club must be credited to Fleet Captain Harold Bruns (above), who has been one of the outstanding paddlers in the country for the last 10 years. He has been the runcerup to Ernest Riedel, Pennington veteran, in every national championship for the past six years and is a former holder of the international title. He was moored out by Riedel in the recent Tibbetts Brook Park county meet by a scant five feet in the feature 400-meter race. Besides his racing activity, Bruns serves as vice-commander of the Atlantic Division of the American Canoe Association.

The first or front man sets the stroke while the fourth man attends to the steering. The so-called "Yonkers Stroke" is based on the straight-arm method used by blow-judging boxers and tackle-wielding football players. Bunching the arm straight out gives the stroke full power. The canoeists pull and push at the same time with their blades dipping about a foot and a half in the water. Plying through the water in the picture above are, left to right, Edward Balko, Charles Sheffer, John Lysak and Henry Straub.

CONVENTION HALL, ROCHESTER, Sept. 30 (AP)—A party platform endorsing the "vision and leadership" of President Roosevelt was adopted by New York's Democratic State Convention today as it prepared to renominate Governor Lehman for a fourth term.

The platform, reportedly dictated in part by the Governor was presented to the convener shortly after Lehman yielded to the demand of party leaders that he make the gubernatorial race against Manhattan's District Attorney Thomas E. Dewey, the Republican nominee.

"I am made very happy by the willingness of Governor Lehman to accept renomination," the President said. "I will realize the personal sacrifice which this involves but I am certain that the people of your state will continue to approve the forward businesslike and clean government he has maintained."

"We acclaim the courage, vision, and leadership of the President of the United States," the platform read. "He has recognized and alleviated the economic straits of our state. Honest business has been aided and industry encouraged. His administration has restored the confidence of the people and strengthened the pillars of democracy."

The telegram which arrived at the convention adopted a platform reaffirming the "vision and leadership" of the President also lauded United States Senator Robert F. Wagner, slated for renomination, he said, "make our whole state proud of him."

The President also paid tribute to others scheduled for nomination or renomination, including Rep. James M. Buffalo, Jr., of Albany, Rep. Charles P. Morris, R. Troy, and Supreme Court Justice Charles McHugh, the candidate for lieutenant governor.

The President's message arrived shortly after Lehman had yielded.

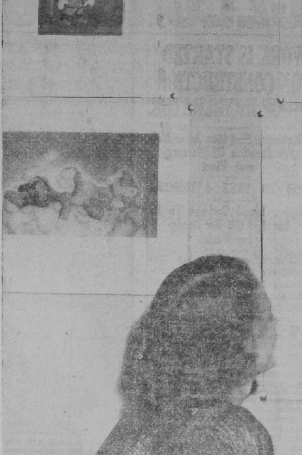

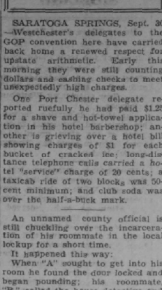
