A WELCOME FOR KIWANIS

Efforts looking to the organization of a Kiwanis Club in Mamaroneck have brought matters to such a point that the Club seems an assured fact.

There are organizations which we may well look upon with suspicion but no city or hamlet in the land need fear the intrusion of any one of these three clubs or of the combined three.

EVERY POSSIBLE PRECAUTION Deputy Commissioner of Public Welfare Strawn has informed the supervisors that despite the declaration of the Valhalla fire district to answer alarms at Grandlands there is really little danger.

In the first place, he points out, the county's hospitals and other institutions at Grandlands and East View have their own fire departments, with equipment, and constant inspection made by agents of insurance carriers.

Nevertheless, the same point raised by the Valhalla fire commissioners is applicable to Dowse departments, namely, the need for some sort of underwriting protection for any injury to firemen or damage to equipment when they answer calls outside their own respective districts in Grandlands.

It would cost the county very little in premiums to extend this coverage. And the volunteer companies have a right to expect that when they are saving county property from destruction by fire they are at least covered against loss to themselves.

And above all it is essential that every possible precaution be taken against inadequate protection to the county's institutions at Grandlands and East View. Nothing could be worse than a fire which would menace the lives of hospital patients and aged indigents and jail prisoners because there was insufficient response to the alarm.

A PATTERN FOR SARATOGA

Bruce Barton may or may not prove to be a good politician. But from long experience as an astute advertiser man he knows the public psychology as well as if not better than any other individual in America.

Those who expect to refrain within three weeks for the Republican state convention at Saratoga Springs should read again what Congressman Barton told the Republicans of Indiana on June 29. And delegates to the New York convention including the large group from Westchester, could do nothing better than to adopt the attitude suggested by Mr. Barton for their deliberations at the Spa.

Frankly, he told the Indiana Republicans, ideas and ideals are not exclusively the possession of their party. And it is futile to condemn everything the New Deal has sought. Success for the G. O. P. at the polls lies, instead, in doing better things which the New Deal has attempted.

"After every Democratic depression in the past they have called us back," said the New York representative. "The Democrats have proved again and again that they can conceive high ideals and exact far-reaching reforms. They have proved, perhaps, that they have more ideas than we have."

"Bryan had more ideas than McKinley. Debs had more ideas than Theodore Roosevelt. Franklin Roosevelt has more ideas than Coolidge had. They have ideas, but they do not seem able to make the ideas work. They can enact reforms, but they cannot give jobs. They can stir up class-consciousness, but they cannot bring the farmer and the worker and the business man together in a united effort which means peace, and that larger national income on which is dependent the prosperity of all."

"We did not repeal the reforms of Cleveland. But we put people back to work."

"We did not repeal the reforms of Wilson. But we put people back to work."

"That is language which the man in the street can understand; that is the tone which will regain the confidence of the workmen; that is the spirit which will revitalize the moribund Republican party in this state."

Let these themes become the pattern at Saratoga and the Republican party may once more become a decisive factor in the government of the largest state of the union.

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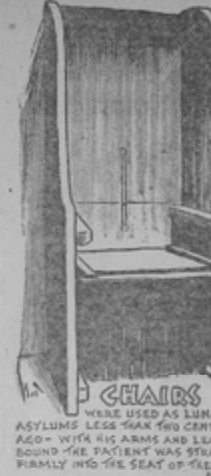

HITLER IN FIGHTING SPEECH PLEDGES AD TO SUBVERT GERMANS

Warns Democrats To Keep Hands Off Crisis

NURNBERG, Sept. 12 (UP)—If the Sudeten Germans in Czechoslovakia cannot defend themselves, "they will receive help from us," Fuehrer Adolf Hitler declared in a forthright words tonight.

Making the speech which the whole world awaited in the knowledge that it might mean peace or war, Hitler warned the democracies that Germany will not allow foreign nations to suppress the 5,000,000 Sudeten in Czechoslovakia.

Hitler declared there is a conspiracy between Democracy and Bolshevism against Germany. "They will receive help from us," he said, "if they do not stand up for their own people."

"Just as the Marxists have joined with Catholics and Capitalists against our country," he declared, "so the so-called democracies are working hand-in-hand with Bolshevism."

"Today we see how the international democracies who pretend to fight for freedom and equality cooperate with the Bolshevists. They are compelled to deal with the democracies because their behavior is essentially outrageous."

"They say they represent the people. However I dare say there are only two governments behind which 99 per cent of the people stand."

"If they call nations where 99 per cent of the people support the government dictators."

"I have no doubts that the democracies are at work again as 10 years ago," he said, "but Germany refused to be robbed."

THE CRISIS IN BRIEF

Europe, armed for war, waited today for a fatal word from Adolf Hitler.

Britain and France, like Germany, were ensnared in a dispute which has grown into a roaring snowball and poses a real question on whether either side could afford to draw back.

War was in the air. Millions talking of nothing else. Every country worked feverishly to protect itself if war comes.

The British Cabinet, having told Hitler that if he invades Czechoslovakia, Britain will fight with France, discussed first arrangements for naval, military and aerial warfare.

Czechoslovakia, determined to fight rather than submit to German encroachment, informed Britain in decisive terms that she will not stand for a political ultimatum.

France prepared every last-minute preparation for possible war. More troops poured back of the Maginot Line facing Germany. Citizens sent their families to the interior and some began withdrawing funds from banks in the frontier districts.

Plans were discussed to move the capital into the interior if Paris is menaced, and to evacuate the population for safety from air raids.

Belgium made plans to blow up roads and railways in the path of a possible invader. Frontier guards were heavily reinforced.

Switzerland loaded mine emplacements along the border with explosives to blow up roads and railways if necessary.

Hitler spoke in a strong speech at an army review on Zeppelinfeld. He told the troops that Germany is determined to defend its racial community against external enemies. Hitler said that the Sudeten Germans of Czechoslovakia in the "racial community" of the Reich.

The Czechs hurried to complete a bomb-proof shelter in the grounds of the United States Legation at Prague. The legation and consulate was swamped with anxious inquiries from Czech-Americans.

The Czech Government, while ordering no actual military movement, was prepared to declare martial law if trouble starts, or possibly in case of disorders in the frontier area.

An intimation came from Bern that Romania may join the pact across her territory. A report on that aspect of the situation was given to the French Cabinet by Foreign Minister Bonnet.

SALES TAX YIELD IN COUNTY SET AT OVER \$4,380,000

Davidson, However, Says Albany Must Act First On Special Legislation

At the same time, County Attorney William A. Davidson, as anticipated, informed the board about the rising costs of water and relief would bring in an amount of seven \$4,380,000 and \$134,000, according to a report made this afternoon by County Board Commissioner William B. Folger to the supervisors.

In his report today, Commissioner Folger outlined the taxes now employed to meet water and relief costs in New York City. They are principally a two per cent sales tax, a three per cent tax on gas, electricity, refrigeration, clubs, telephone and telegraph service; a three per cent tax on sale of foods and drinks over one dollar; a three per cent tax on wines and liquors except beer; a one per cent utility tax; a constant-purchase tax on cigars and a small personal property tax.

The two taxes producing the largest revenues and generally considered for possible imposition in Westchester are the retail sales tax and the cigar tax.

"Although population figures, the experience of New York City and other statistical information is available, furnish some indices of what similar taxes might produce in Westchester County," said Commissioner Folger today. "It will be appreciated that there are so many other variable factors that almost any estimate can be taken as a rough guide only. Consequently the estimates made for possible imposition here are made on the basis of an approximate low and an approximate high."

Of the taxes considered, Mr. Folger estimated that \$1,000,000 and \$4,000,000 from Westchester County would yield \$7,000,000 and \$8,000,000 on the general business and financial income tax, \$300,000 to \$500,000 on the utility tax, \$900 to \$1,200,000 on the cigar tax and \$20,000 to \$30,000 on the personal property tax.

5,000 Enroll As Schools Resume For New Term

STEERING OF 'ABSORBING' Three automobile groups with office in New York City have announced their "unalterable opposition" to the construction by Westchester County of a 10-4 bridge on the cross-county parkway at the new badly congested Postwood crossing of the Bronx River Parkway and the Harlem division railroad tracks.

After reviewing efforts to obtain state fiscal aid for a bridge and telling the two votes of such aid to Governor Lehman, the three associations, Automobile Club of America, Automobile Club of New York and Automobile Merchants' Association of New York Inc., state categorical objections to any new toll highways.

Where, it might be asked, were these three associations when their own Robert Moses built the Henry Hudson bridge at Riverdale, over which Westchester motorists must pass and pay toll if they are to reach the metropolitan quickly and conveniently? It is there any recollection of "unalterable opposition" then?

And was there any loud outcry made by these clubs when the original plan for this bridge would become free after tolls had paid for it was openly violated, the Riverdale tolls to be applied to building easeways for other toll bridges for New York City at Rockaway Beach? Or do the clubs in New York City merely raise assigned wails when tolls are considered outside of New York City?

But the most inconsistent and most intolerable suggestion from these associations follows. It is to the effect that instead of charging tolls on the new bridge, Westchester should apply to the federal PWA for a loan, so that "work could be initiated immediately through obtaining a partial federal grant, with the balance of the needed funds to be absorbed by the county."

That word "absorbed" is merely an euphemism. It means that in the opinion of these club Westchester taxpayers should add to their bonded indebtedness another million of dollars or so, merely that traffic largely from outside this county might ride free over Westchester parkways.

That is a mistake which Westchester does not intend to repeat. This county is now burdened with more than \$60,000,000 for parkway and park construction, largely enjoyed by those from outside. Traffic counts, for example, show 75 per cent of parkway cars registered outside of Westchester. And while they pay tolls at Bear Mountain Bridge, at George Washington Memorial Bridge, at Henry Hudson Bridge, at Jones Beach on Long Island, Westchester alone, in the opinion of these club, must continue to pave and pay to meet such increasing through traffic.

No, Westchester will "absorb" no more bonds for traffic which is strictly a state responsibility, or which is provided for elsewhere by tolls. It took 20 years and the spending of more than sixty millions of dollars—but the lesson was learned when Westchester built Long Island and New York City holding their own parks and parkways with state and federal moneys.

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WESTCHESTER AND WAR

There is a terrifying similarity between events of the past week and those of a July week in 1914. Then as now armed men responded to mobilization orders on the other side of the world while in America there were then as there are now foolish optimists who believed isolation was possible. If isolation were impossible 24 years ago when glaucous airplanes were non-existent, when propaganda by radio had not become a militaristic weapon, when foreign dictators had not already induced in this nation a wide cleavage of public opinion and sympathies, who can be so infantile as to believe this nation can now isolate itself from another war?

Recall that in 1914 the average American believed at first it would be a short, decisive conflict; remember that as the months became years there was still insistent public demand in America for neutrality; and refresh the memory with the recollection that even when the United States found it necessary to enter the conflict it was the general assumption that our assistance would take the form only of money and military supplies.

But the war which sprang from the assassination of an Austrian archduke in Bosnia on June 28, 1914, was not to end until Nov. 11, 1918, not until a total of more than 65 millions on both sides had been mobilized with more than eight and one-half millions dead and more than 21 millions wounded, with another seven and one-half millions prisoners of missing.

Recall that from the United States 4,355,000 men were mobilized, of whom more than two millions went overseas; that of this nation's armed forces 126,000 were killed or died and 234,500 were wounded. Remember that nearly 14,000 in this state alone died in the World War, of which number 457 came from Westchester.

But the World War of 1938-7 is an entirely different war from that of 1914-1918. Civilian populations will suffer from aerial bombardment of deadly bacteria and germs. What has been shown in newspapers and motion pictures of the cruel toll taken of non-combatants in China, in Ethiopia, in Spain, will be repeated in countries where today there is a foolish smugness, an insane assumption that war cannot reach.

What can Westchester do? Little but to pray—and to remember that this is not a composite of marching men on parade, of brilliant uniforms, of blaring bands, of oratory from men who stay behind. There is no glory, there is no beauty, there is no reason in war. It is vicious and it is vile; it is made up of dirt and filth and vermin and blood and the tears of widows and orphans.

Then pray to God, those who have faith, that this tragedy is not to come to Europe, to America, to Westchester!

WHAT'S IN A NAME?

Some there are who maintain that there is little or nothing in names but apparently the members of the Old Town of Mamaroneck Historical Society holds that the choice of names is important even when it means the selection of street names. That is why the organization has petitioned the villages of Mamaroneck and Larchmont and the Town of Mamaroneck to rename highways and parks where feasible, bestowing historic names upon them which will bear some significance.

Streets are usually named without much ceremony, with little sentiment and with even less effort to get away from the time-honored formula for naming streets. Thus it has become a rather inflexible law that if a street is lined with elms it must be called Elm Street. Likewise if oaks predominate on a street, the only name to be thought of is Oak Street. And so it is that almost every hamlet in the land can boast its Walnut, Oak, Elm and Cherry streets. Of course the chief thoroughfare is always named Main street unless the community has a New York complex which causes it to christen the street Broadway.

But streets are among the most enduring things. They outlive men and then often outlive trees. It would seem as though the naming of a thing which is to endure so long a time is too important to be dismissed with a moment's thought or by the selection of the first name which pops into someone's head.

We approve of the idea of bestowing historic names on some of our streets. It would mean a partial escape from a deadly monotony in names and it would be a tribute from the present to the past. Surely our readers must be interested in this subject and The Times will welcome any constructive views along this line.

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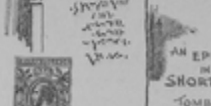
