REGISTRATION PLACES FOR FALL ELECTION

1,126 Qualify Here, Far Above 1937 And 1934 STATE ALSO UP

Registration for the Fall election reached an unusual high yesterday in the Town of Mamaroneck as well as in all parts of Westchester, a survey revealed today.

In the 15 present districts in the Town of Mamaroneck, 1,126 persons had registered when the registration places closed at 10 P. M. yesterday.

This was far above the 977 registered in the same day in 1937, and for the same day in 1934, the last comparable gubernatorial year.

Heaviest registration was in the Tenth District, where 283 qualified. The Fifth District, with 36, had the lightest registration.

Registration in 36 of the 45 present five districts, the Elements to the Fifteenth started at 8 P. M. today and will continue through 10 P. M. Personal registration was also continuing today.

Word from White Plains noted that Westchester County's first day of registration will hit a new record for a gubernatorial year.

In three cities and several towns and villages from which reports were received last night, the first day registration were about:

Mount Vernon reported 4,532 qualified voters yesterday, an increase over 1937 and 1934 for the same day in 1934, the last comparable gubernatorial year.

Yonkers with 11,600 yesterday, was 1,672 ahead of last year and almost 7,000 ahead of 1934. New Rochelle had 1,372 yesterday, more than for last year and 1,300 ahead of 1934.

The villages of North Tarrytown and Tarrytown reported similar increases.

UPSTATE ALSO HEAVY ALBANY, Oct. 15 (AP)—Polling figures today showed an upstate registration of voters for the election of New York's first non-year governor far ahead of opening day registration in 1934, last comparable gubernatorial year.

In all but one instance, reported cities showed, however, "first day" registration yesterday was well under the corresponding day in 1934, the last comparable gubernatorial year brought out in the "presidential" year.

The single exception was reported in heavily Democratic Albany, where the first day of registration yesterday was well above the corresponding day in 1934, the last comparable gubernatorial year.

Registration in cities and villages of 5,000 or more population outside New York City continues today from 10 A. M. to 10 P. M. Next Friday and Saturday the hours will be from 10 A. M. to 10 P. M. and from 7 A. M. to 10 P. M. respectively.

In New York City the registration, which began last Monday, totaled 1,260,279 of which 389,900 was signed yesterday. Registration in that city ends tonight at 10 P. M.

Mamaroneck First in State To Approve Expenditure Analysis, Speaker Says

CLUB HEARS TALK ON COUNTERFEITS

Secret Service Agent Tells Rotarians How To Detect Bogus Money

Reproduction of bona fide and counterfeit five and ten dollar bills changed to length of about five feet used by W. B. Cawley of the New York office of the United States Secret Service of the Treasury Department at the weekly meeting of the Larchmont Rotary Club Friday at the Larchmont Shore Club to demonstrate methods of detecting counterfeit bills.

Mr. Cawley said this idea is now being used for the first time in an effort to prevent counterfeiting. Counterfeit bills enclosed in cellophane were also exhibited.

Agent Cawley gave members copies of a warning notice from the Treasury Department which advises businessmen to post it near their cash registers and tell their clerks to look at it every time a large bill is presented by a stranger. The government will keep merchants informed about counterfeit bills, he said.

He also warned the Rotarians not to return a bad bill to a passer, try to delay the passer, note a

description of the passer and the numbers of bills involved and the license numbers of cars involved while notifying police and secret service agents. The enlarged reproductions were described in detail by Mr. Cawley, including the details of the counterfeit bills.

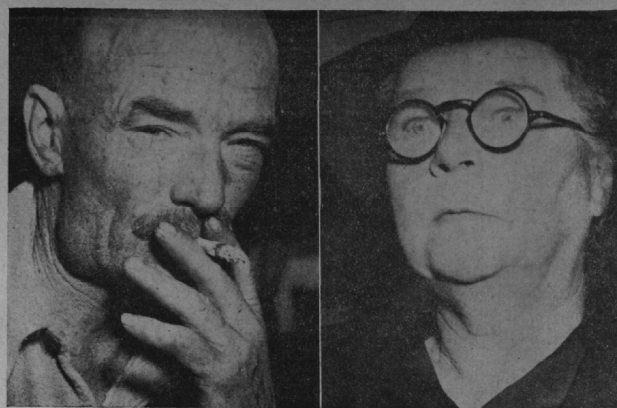

BREAK NEAR, HORAN INDICATES

A "love triangle" involving two men and Mary Inez Coyle, 17-year-old New Rochelle girl whose body was found in Larchmont a week ago today, was revealed to police last night.

One of the men, it was learned exclusively by The Daily Times today, is being sought by police as the man who killed the girl in a raging fit of jealousy and passion.

The second man, captain of a private yacht, called for Florida week before the murder was committed. The Coyle girl was "crazy about" the captain, police learned. She had spurned the New Rochelle man.

This story was told to police last night by Captain Gunter Johnson, master of a private yacht tied in Mamaroneck Harbor off the Beach Point Club. He told and re-told the story to the investigators during questioning that started at 5:30 P. M. yesterday and ended at midnight.

Captain Johnson was ordered to return to police headquarters this morning. Police hoped to have the New Rochelle man in custody, awaiting Captain Johnson's identification.

The story told to the investigators by Captain Johnson was essentially as follows:

The girl had fallen desperately in love with a Captain Easton, the small craft skipper who is now on his way to Florida. He cared nothing for the girl, had even tried to avoid her.

On at least one occasion he "bawled out" friends who had brought the girl to his boat.

On Saturday a week before the murder was committed — Oct. 10 — the girl came to the Village of Mamaroneck from New Rochelle, either borrowed a boat and rowed out herself or was rowed out by a friend, to the yacht skippered by Captain Easton.

This was in the morning and the girl spent several hours with the captain. She left about noon Saturday and was rowed back to mainland by Captain Johnson and another skipper, known only as Ben.

They accompanied the girl to the Mamaroneck railroad station, where she took a train to New Rochelle. She had hidden farewell to the captain who was not short for Florida.

It was after his wife's departure that the New Rochelle man increased his attentions towards the girl. During the week leading up to the murder he attempted to persuade her to "throw over" the captain and begin keeping company with him.

His passionate overtures are believed to have succeeded a week or two before the murder. On the night of the murder the girl was in the company of the captain and another man, known only as Ben.

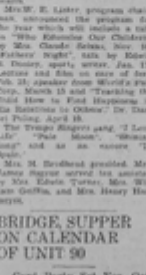

The investigative machinery set up in Larchmont to solve the murder of 17-year-old Virginia Jean Coyle continued to grind today, but with no apparent results.

Street officers kept a watch in the vicinity over the woods, but found no trace of the man. He was described as being about 27 years old, with blonde hair.

He was driving an automobile but the three women failed to note the license number.

The investigation of the Coyle murder, meanwhile apparently had settled down to a routine, persistent checking and re-checking of every clue and angle of the case.

Tomorrow marks the passage of two weeks since the New Rochelle girl's body was found in a vacant lot in the rear of a row of vacant flats in the 1900 block on Palmer Avenue, Larchmont.

Some 20 or 30 sleuths looked to the central bureau for information and police departments throughout the county remaining on the job today.

Many buildings on the island were damaged yesterday by terrific explosions of munitions which were scattered in Wanchow Railway Station. The blasts scattered fragments over the entire settlement, breaking windows and blowing out shutters.

The United States consulate-general suffered slight damage, plaster falling from ceilings due to the concussion. There were no deaths reported. There were no deaths reported.

The Satchern and Honan districts of the city were the worst damaged. Buildings destroyed included the Ministry of Finance, Provincial and Municipal Headquarters, the Municipal Council, and several hotels and the post office.

Damage was believed to run as high as \$100,000.

Flames mounted 100 feet high during the night and today a vast, low-lying cloud of smoke billowed over the city.

Thousands of people fled from the city. The Chinese Government was said to have been immediately notified of the situation.

light tan, printed with a design of blue corn flowers with orange and brown leaves edged in black. Pictures of it were printed in all newspapers that Monday.

It was, it turned out, the real clue of the case. For through publication of the picture of the design, Mrs. Alphonse A. Hinzman then living in Bronxville saw the design and recognized it as being similar to the design in a dress her daughter owned and wore. She checked and could find no trace of her daughter at her New York place of business or her New York City home. Mrs. Hinzman went to White Plains to the office of the District Attorney and there to the morgue. Yes, the murdered girl was her daughter, Dorothy Hinzman Peacock, the wife of a radio repairman and flower salesman. She and her husband had separated in January but the husband still lived in their Mount Vernon apartment.

From the District Attorney's office flashed the news that the girl had been identified and also word for police to find and bring to the office for questioning the woman's husband, Earle P. Peacock. Mount Vernon police under the new Chief Inspector Michael Silverstein, went to the Peacock apartment at 32 Edison Avenue.

Husband Questioned
Peacock, the husband, was soon located and questioned. Police inspecting the apartment, found a pair of his trousers that were soaked with kerosene. On the kitchen floor they found blood stains that had been wiped up but not completely cleared away.

The husband was grilled almost and shortly after a tired district attorney announced that he had confessed that he killed his wife and had covered her body in his automobile tire driven to the lonely spot in Greenburgh and after dumping the body there had returned to New York. Peacock said that the killing had occurred when he and his wife visited their old apartment and she said: "It's the same old dump."

He said he had tried to get her to return to live with him but she said on the home visit him and she struck her with a paper weight on the head. Then as she started to scream, he said he caught hold of her by the throat and strangled her to death on the night of April 21, the first morning on April 22, a Tuesday morning.

It was a trial of headlines. Sydney Peacock was indicted for the first degree murder and his trial set for early in June. Then came an adjournment not to be resumed until on Monday, Sept. 16, at White Plains, before Supreme Court Justice Arthur S. Tompkins. It was a trial of headlines. Sydney Peacock, later to become a Supreme Court justice, defended the youthful husband of 22 years. The defense was legal insanity. The defendant Mr. Peacock told the court and jury, he was "driven to a point of insanity by his wife's conduct with other men and by what took place in the apartment that night of April 21—the young couple's first wedding anniversary."

Court Renders Death Sentence
The court ruled out proposed defense moved to show that the young husband had found his wife unfaithful as the prosecutor, Mr. Coyne, defended the name of the dead girl. The jury heard from the own lips Peacock's own version of his crime and late in the evening hours of Friday, Sept. 27, he was found guilty of second degree murder. He had escaped the death penalty. That night he was sentenced to from 30 years to life in prison and he entered the gates of Sing Sing on Monday, the last day of September.

Earle Peacock, the mild-mannered young husband, became a model prisoner while he was paying for his crime. He took a correspondence school course and completed his high school education. He passed his State's Regents examinations and then applied to the University of Chicago for a correspondence course for a college degree.

Continues College Studies
The prisoner then interested himself in biology and he became a biological assistant at Sing Sing until his transfer to Great Meadow Prison. Today he is continuing his college studies; he is interested in Greek drama and has written a series of memoirs and a melodrama of his own experience.

And while he does all this he is looking ahead to 1943 when, with time off for good behavior, he will become eligible for parole. And he hopes then that the State Parole Board will grant him his freedom and he will have completely expiated his debt to the State of New York for the slaying of his wife during their first wedding anniversary.

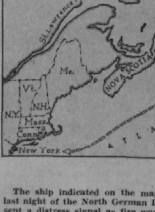
