UTILITIES TO JOIN U. S. IN GIGANTIC DEFENSE PROJECT

Dozen Big Companies Plan To Spend Two Billion In Two Years

BOLSTER ARMS CENTERS: Generating Equipment Planned Capable Of Producing Million Kilowatts

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28 (AP)—A dozen big utility companies, joining hands with the Federal Government in its national defense program, disclosed today they would spend \$2,000,000,000 in the next two years to expand the output of electric power.

This amount, said Floyd L. Carlson of the Consolidated Edison Company of New York, would virtually double present such expenditures.

As the first step, the utilities announced definite plans for increasing generating capacity represented by enough factories to supply generating equipment capable of producing 1,000,000 kilowatts.

The commitments were given as a part of the administrative efforts to strengthen power facilities of the national strategic war material manufacturing centers.

Announcement of the program came from a session of the War Relocation Authority's Defense Power Committee held at the home of Louis Johnson, assistant secretary of war.

Carlson, acting as spokesman for the group of utility executives which met with the power committee, said "substantial" government financing was involved, but would not be in the form of grants.

The government, he said, would do nothing more than lend money or buy securities, in the same manner as a bank.

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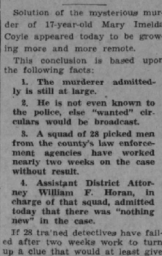

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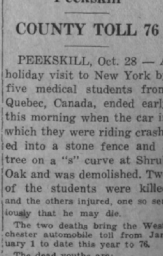

SOCIAL PROGRAM BORN IN COUNTY, DEWEY DECLARES

Republican Hails Westchester As Leader in Progressive Measures

6,000 CHEER CANDIDATE

Leader Cites Proud Record Of Social Welfare And Social Justice

By EDWARD SCHLESINGER Staff Correspondent WHITE PLAINS, Oct. 31.—Westchester County was hailed as the nation's leader in progressive measures of social welfare and social justice by Thomas E. Dewey at a rally here today to announce his nomination as the Republican candidate in the County Center race here Saturday night.

Temporarily his pledge to continue—and even expand—the social security program of the New Deal, Mr. Dewey devoted the first part of his address to show that Republicans in this county set the pace for social legislation a decade ago.

"In Westchester County, many—if not the majority—of the great social reforms have been brought to light," Mr. Dewey declared. "I don't know if you are aware of the great things you have given to the state and nation."

Prudential Trust Co. great public welfare director, Ruth Taylor, recalling that "23 years ago our county was the first to give mothers' allowances for mothers of needy children."

He said this county's aid to handicapped and crippled children, termed it "a real and genuine effort to solve their problem."

"After the legislature was established here, again it was followed by the state," Mr. Dewey said. "Westchester today has led for the State of New York and all the other states of the country."

The nominee also mentioned former State Senator Deane C. Mastick of Pleasantville in sponsoring state-wide old age pensions in 1930.

Idea Born In County "The record shows that here in Westchester began the trail with the first Children's Court."

"No county, no state in the entire country can claim a more proud record of social welfare and social justice."

Mr. Dewey said that in Westchester County, the first Children's Court judge, George W. Snyth, Children's Court judge, were among the more than 6,000 persons who have helped to make this county a leader in social welfare.

Recalling his eight years in "the administration of criminal justice," Mr. Dewey stressed that "social justice for the poor is the root of crime after crime."

"The State must continue to go forward in meeting its social problems," he insisted. "Nothing is more important today than the social welfare and social security of our people. Nine years of depression have brought sharply before us the problems which were creeping on during years of prosperity."

A woman, about 30 years old, bleeding profusely about the head, knocked at the front door of the home of Mrs. and Mrs. Benedict Savage, 23 Hall Street, at 6 A. M. today, and asked to be taken to a physician.

So severely injured that she collapsed at St. Agnes Hospital in White Plains, the young woman at first appeared unable to give an account of what had happened to her.

She was being questioned this afternoon at the hospital by Detective William O'Neill, who was assigned to the case by village police headquarters. Officers attached-said they believed the woman's name was Dolly Lusch of New Rochelle.

The woman was in a daze when she appeared at the Savage home. Mrs. Savage said she volunteered no information, except to tell Mrs. Savage she had "been walking away from the Savage home, Hall Street being a dead end, and opening into Orienta Avenue and running parallel to the Post Road."

The couple took the first ambulance to a Harrison physician, who advised that she be taken to the hospital. Upon arrival there, Mrs. Savage said, the woman collapsed.

At the hospital this afternoon, it was announced that the woman had regained consciousness but had not yet told how she had been injured.

The woman was nearly dazed but appeared to be of moderate means, Mrs. Savage said.

OTTO REITERATES ECONOMY PLEDGE

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SOMERS, Oct. 31.—Former County Judge Walter G. C. Otto, Democrat candidate for county executive, renewed campaign pledges over the weekend to reduce governmental operating costs if elected and to bring relief to "overburdened" Westchester taxpayers.

Judge Otto headed into the final week of his county-wide drive with an assertion before 300 Somers Democrat Club members at the Somers Golf Club on Saturday night that the new county charter provides for appointment of residents to Westchester posts and that he would abide by that ruling.

His stand was taken as an answer to the statement of former Supreme Court Justice William F. Bleakley, Republican nominee, that he intended to name only county residents to positions.

Mr. Otto pointed out that such appointments were mandatory under the charter and that any impression that he might do otherwise was misleading.

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YONKERS TO HEAR LEHMAN TONIGHT

Democratic Candidate To Make Two Appearances Today In Westchester

YONKERS, Oct. 31.—Governor Herbert H. Lehman and the Democratic state ticket will head into Yonkers and Peekskill tonight with Westchester County's rich political strength as the climax of attraction.

Accompanied by practically his entire election campaign and running mates, Governor Lehman will first swing out of New York City for a preliminary stop in Peekskill at 6:30 P. M. and then speed south to a city-wide rally at Saunders Trade School, Yonkers.

Mr. Lehman will then return to New York City for an American Labor Party rally at Madison Square Garden.

The return of Governor Lehman to the traditional gubernatorial trail in Yonkers will be the first political visit he has made to this city since his arrival in Yonkers, where he is spending the summer at a Saunders School meeting in the 1936 campaign.

Although his aides do not expect him to carry the county, as he did against Park Commissioner Robert M. Bly, he is confident that his status as a summer resident of Westchester, with a home in Purchase, will help him to carry it.

Two years ago he lost Westchester to Republican Governor Charles S. Hughes by nearly 6,000 votes.

COUNTY THRONGS HAIL GOVERNOR'S ATTACK ON DEWEY

Lehman Charges G. O. P. Rival Broke Faith With People Who Elected Him MAKES FIGHTING TALKS Democratic Leader Quotes Bleakley On His Opponents Qualifications

By ERWIN H. SAYELSON. YONKERS, Nov. 1.—Governor Herbert H. Lehman charged District Attorney Thomas Dewey with "breaking faith with the people" who elected him, protesting that he was falling to possess the ability to fill the Governor's chair before 4,000 persons here in a speech concluding a triumphant tour of Westchester County.

When you strip this campaign down to bedrock there is just one issue—the people want to elect as chief executive of the state a man who will do his job as a governor," he declared as the audience cheered and stamped in approval.

Dewey asserted clearly in a fighting mood and his speech, headed with criticism of Mr. Dewey's failure to honor an "obligation" to finish out his term as prosecutor.

The speech was the first of several he will make in Westchester, his adopted county. Thursday night he will return to Mount Vernon, for a second address in the arena, and on next Monday night he will be in New Rochelle and Harrison.

His visit to Yonkers was heralded by a parade of 2,000 to 3,000 party supporters and nearly 10,000 spectators lined the route around City Square to watch the demonstration.

Pekelkie Grets Lehman. He arrived in Yonkers under the police escort of a motorcade trip to the Pekelkie Theater from the Park Avenue Hotel.

Thousands lined Pekelkie street. The Governor rode in an open car ahead of a parade of party workers. It was his traditional stop in the north county municipality and the rally brought thousands to the scene.

Count Democrat lighted red flares as the caravan continued south and the Governor thanked for a few minutes with leaders in that village. Then he continued on his way.

Czechs End Frontier Dispute With Poland. PRAGUE, Nov. 1 (AP)—Czechoslovakia's frontier dispute with Poland was ended today by an agreement of notes between Czechoslovak Foreign Minister Frantisek Trosky and Polish Premier, Polish Minister to Prague.

ASSESSMENT ROLL FOR 1939 SHOWS DROP OF \$213,702

Valuation of Taxable Property In Mamaroneck Totals \$36,979,855

The 1938 assessment roll for 1939 taxes in the Village of Mamaroneck, showing a valuation of \$36,979,855 in taxable property, was filed today by Assessor Bryan Epstein.

The total was \$213,702 less than the total of \$37,193,557 which prevailed last year.

The reduction included decreases in business or commercial property assessments throughout the village, Mr. Epstein said.

Owners along Mamaroneck Avenue had complained last year against the valuation of their property for tax purposes.

The assessment roll shows an increase in the special franchise valuation, which was \$1,446,210 this year—an increase of \$106,740.

The total taxable property was decreased from \$35,969,142 last year to \$33,533,702 this year—a reduction of \$2,436,440.

The total of \$1,446,210 in special franchise assessment was divided as follows: Town of Mamaroneck, \$942,940; Fourth District, \$1,476,740; Eighth District, \$6,066,400; Ninth District, \$1,609,270.

CHAMBERLAIN ASKS TO ENFORCE

Chamberlain Also Requests Anglo-Italian Accord

LONDON, Nov. 1 (AP)—Prime Minister Chamberlain asked the House of Commons today to approve early enforcement of the Anglo-Italian accord of April 18 and make a bid for economic peace with Germany.

At the same time he formally announced that Sir John Anderson, 36-year-old "Iron Man of Bengal" and his first private secretary, would be minister for civilian defense, taking charge of both air raid precautions and arrangements for "national voluntary service."

Mr. Chamberlain first called for debate tomorrow on his proposal to deal the Easter pact with Premier Mussolini "as soon as possible."

FRIENDSHIP PACT WITH DUCE URGED BY CHAMBERLAIN

British Prime Minister Says Spanish War Is No Longer Menace

ACT NOW, COMMONS TOLD

Italian Treaty Now Sought As Step Toward Four-Power Agreement

LONDON, Nov. 2 (AP)—Prime Minister Chamberlain today looking day that the Spanish war is "no longer a menace to the peace of Europe" and demanded that Parliament approve the conclusion of his friendship pact with Premier Mussolini.

He based his argument for such action, which would let him continue his search for general European agreement on Mussolini's withdrawal of "half of his infantry force in Spain and a five-fold conditional promise to retire all remaining effective and send no more troops to arms in."

"Most definite assurance" from both Chamberlain and Mussolini in Munich that they wanted no Spanish territory.

Chamberlain was understood to want the Italian treaty made effective as a step to further approach to Adolf Hitler, looking today a four-power understanding that ultimately would lead to a limitation of armaments pact.

Delay in putting this agreement (with Italy) into force, Chamberlain told Commons.

"Objections for the recognition of Italian sovereignty in Ethiopia is to be found if we feel that recognition constitutes an advance toward general agreement."

"If the non-intervention plan (in Spain) is not in operation today, it can not be said that it is the fault of Italy."

Hoover, in a dramatic statement last night, laid the death of Fried, 35, White Plains resident and head of a Bronx real estate firm, to a "Fried" at the hands of a four-man "Fried" syndicate which tried for weeks afterward to collect a \$250,000 ransom.

The chief of the Federal Bureau of Investigation said "certain cases" and said they are under suspicion in two other kidnap cases and three holdups.

The men, Hoover said, shot Fried for \$250,000 in a lower East Side apartment, buried his body in a furnace.

Hoover said the suspects as Demetrius Gula, 30, a pinball operator; William Miller, 27, a WPA playground instructor; John Ryan, 34, a clothes presser; and Joseph S. Scola, 30, a real estate broker.

Hoover said all four have police records and will be turned over to local authorities for prosecution, they were arrested over the weekend.

Victims in the two Brooklyn abductions were Benjamin Farber, 33, a coal dealer, and Norman Miller, 15, son of the head of a deviator concern.

Hoover said the kidnapers seized Farber last April 18 in front of a Brooklyn branch of the National City Bank and released him unharmed shortly after his family paid \$2,500 of a \$25,000 ransom demand.

Young Miller, he said, was kidnaped last July 24 as he left a Brooklyn Theater and was released the next day after his family paid \$15,000. It was the "youth" mystery of his experience that enabled the G-Men to trace the gang.

The body of Arthur Fried was found in a lower Manhattan building, which the men still were being questioned.

The chief case still confronting the G-Men is the disappearance of Peter Levinsky, 16-year-old New Rochelle schoolboy whose headless, mutilated body was found floating in Long Island Sound three months after he vanished last Feb. 20. His way home from school, Hoover said, was cut off by a "big shot" in lower Manhattan. The building was owned by a man who lives in the F. B. 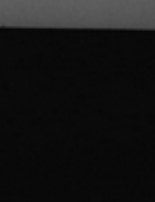

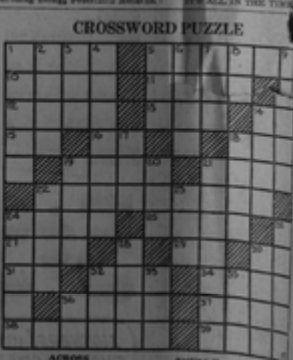

SAVINGS OF \$100,000 TO CHRISTMAS CLUBS TO BOOST TRADE HERE

Big Increase Shown in Funds At Three Banks

OUTLOOK BRIGHT

A flood of Christmas savings money, amounting approximately to \$100,000, will be released the last week in November by the three banks in Mamaroneck and Larchmont—with beneficial effect on local business.

Increase in the total amount gathered together by the Christmas savings clubs indicated not only that incomes were sustained during the last 11 months, but that merchants of Mamaroneck and Larchmont may look forward to one of the best Christmas shopping periods in recent years.

The Mamaroneck branch of the County Trust Company accumulated approximately \$28,000 or \$8,000 more than was gathered by last year's Christmas club at this institution. The number saving also increased from 431 last year to 612 persons this year.

A few accounts "fell off" during the year when the stock market recession struck, according to William F. MacDonald, Jr., manager of the branch. It is thought had not occurred, he said, the savings club total would have been in excess of \$30,000.

The Larchmont Savings Bank of Westchester reported that its total was between \$26,000 and \$27,000, approximately \$2,000 less than last year's total. The number saving also increased from about 625 last year to 714 who will receive checks this year.

The most striking note on the report, according to Secretary Gabriel Wendel, was the fact that the "bulk of the people who started accounts continued their steadily throughout the year. It indicated, he said, that they had sustained incomes throughout most of the year.

The Christmas club accounts, Mr. Wendel said, show that the trend now is "towards continued saving throughout the year." The Trust Company of Larchmont reported that its total this year would be more than \$45,000, as against \$38,500 last year. Last year, the bank reported, 836 persons joined the club, whereas 956 persons were included in the club this year.

In round figures, the total last year was about \$80,000, whereas this year it will be about \$98,500 for all three banks—or nearer \$100,000.

Merchants in this vicinity reported last year that Christmas business was better than the year before—and with approximately \$18,000 additional being added to the flood of "Christmas money" this year as against last year, observers believed that the trading in the common and uncommon goods would be accordingly stimulated.

FRIED RELATIVES TO GIVE KIDNAP DETAILS TO JURY

Ferris Subpoenas Family In Move To Indict Four In Abduction

DEATH PENALTY SOUGHT Negotiations For \$200,000 Ransom To Be Revealed To Jurors

WHITE PLAINS, Nov. 5—Relations of Arthur Fried will tell the Westchester Grand Jury the full details of his kidnaping and the subsequent negotiations for \$200,000 ransom, which, according to federal agents, went on after Fried had been shot to death and cremated by his kidnapers in New York City.

It was learned today that District Attorney Walter Ferris has subpoenaed members of the Fried family in his move to indict four men, held in New York City, for the kidnaping and to invoke the death penalty under a 1933 New York State law.

The four men, a quartet of prisoners, turned over to New York authorities by Federal Bureau of Investigation agents, who effected the solution of the Fried and two other kidnapings, have been indicted in New York City. They are accused of kidnaping to murder true blue having been voted because the New York authorities have no "corpus delicti" in the Fried case.

Detectives are investigating the possibility that the "crime syndicate" is involved in other murders through revelations that one of the men had insured acquaintances for considerable amounts.

The New York Grand Jury yesterday voted three kidnap indictments.

One of the indictments accuses Joseph Saecola, 28, Sing Sing prisoner, and Demetrius Gula, 30, of kidnaping Fried and holding him captive in a basement on the lower East side.

The second indictment accused Charles Smith, John Virgo, 33, and William Jenkins, 27, former WPA playground instructor, of kidnaping Benjamin Parber, of Brooklyn, last April 13.

The third indictment accused the same four men of abducting Norman Miller, 19-year-old college student, last July 24.

New York County indictments were expected under a fledgling agreement reached Thursday by District Attorney Ferris and Assistant District Attorney Jacob Rosenberg of Thomas E. Dewey's staff.

DECISION DELAYED ON TAXI LINE BAN

Court Adjourns Litigation Until Wednesday For Submission Of Briefs

NEW YORK, Nov. 5—Decision was reserved yesterday by Supreme Court Justice Edgar J. Lauer here on a motion by the trustees of the New York, New Haven and Hartford railroad for an injunction to prohibit operation of alleged taxi service between Mamaroneck and other Westchester communities and New York City suburbs.

Named as defendant in the suit are the Royal Cadillac Service, Inc., operator of the Subway Taxi Service, and six individual cab and operators. The railroad company presented evidence that the defendants have not obtained certificates from either the Public Service Commission, for operations in Westchester, or the Transit Commission, for operations in New York City, and data showing that rides had been taken from Mamaroneck, Harrison and other points.

Edward R. Brumley, attorney for the trustees, contended that operations are illegal and in competition with the railroad commuter service. Gustave Simon, New York attorney, who resides in Larchmont, appeared as counsel for the defendants. His declaration claimed any connection with the Royal Company, and asserted they merely employed them.

Mr. Simon represents the Westchester Automobile Commuters Association and said members of this group have used the cars of the individual defendants. His clients pointed out they do not maintain any regular schedule and transport people to New York in answer to calls. Mr. Simon asserted that practice is legal and that no certificate is necessary for such operation. Counsel for the Royal Company asked additional time to give him, Justice Lauer gave all parties until Wednesday noon. He whatever data may be desired.

The operation of the cars is a joint pending determination of the litigation. Mr. Simon said the question of whether or not the cars will transport passengers until a ruling is made is dependent upon whether or not there is a valid service. He said the association is rapidly growing and that it is planning to have a car for members.

TAXPAYER LEAGUE HOPES TO CONDUCT VILLAGE SURVEYS

Larchmont And Mamaroneck To Be Included If Drive Meets Success

GROUP NOW ENLISTS 350 Potential Membership Set At 2,000 Operation Of Group Explained

Village operating costs may be surveyed under sponsorship of the Taxpayers League of Larchmont and Mamaroneck, which is now conducting such a study of the Town of Mamaroneck government officials.

If a membership drive by the league results in the accumulation of sufficient funds, the survey will be broadened to include the villages of Larchmont and Mamaroneck. Walter M. Franklin, member of the league's advisory committee, revealed today.

Mr. Franklin and John L. Hougardy, representative of the Citizens Public Expenditure Survey of the State of New York, in an interview with The Daily Times, revealed not only the aims of the two organizations but their relationship with one another.

Mr. Hougardy, it was explained by Mr. Franklin, has been "loaned" to the Taxpayers League to aid in the membership campaign. The survey, however, is under the supervision of two accountants.

Plan To Broaden Inquiry Mr. Hougardy is being provided at no expense to the league, Mr. Franklin said. The accountants and two clerks assisting them are being paid by the league, he said.

The intention of the league to broaden its inquiry to the two villages was revealed by Mr. Franklin when he was asked what disposition would be made of funds if the survey were successful.

There are two classifications of membership, the "founder member" who contributes \$10 or more a year, and the "contributing member" who is asked for \$2 or more per year.

There are some 300 members in both classifications now affiliated with the league, Mr. Hougardy said. The "potential membership" he said, is about 2,000 persons.

If such a goal is reached—even at the minimum membership of \$2 resulting in the accumulation of approximately \$4,000—the money not used to finance the survey of the town's operating expenses would be used to enter the two villages, Mr. Franklin said.

The Citizens Public Expenditure Survey is a non-profit making organization, Mr. Hougardy explained. It is supported by voluntary contributions he said. The president, Fred L. Dean, with offices at 49 West 48th Street, "draws a small salary," Mr. Hougardy said.

Memberships are being solicited here by a group of about 30 voluntary workers, all members of the league, Mr. Franklin said. They are not compensated for their work, he added. The solicitors use the appeal that "membership in the league is an investment in efficient government, and efficient government keeps taxes down," Mr. Hougardy said.

"If anyone," he added, "has the idea that we are a political organization or have any ulterior political purpose, the solicitors are advised to inform them that our membership and officers include members of both parties. No political organization could possibly be organized as we are."

Attention has been focused chiefly on the governorship fight between Herbert H. Lehman, three time executive, and Thomas E. Dewey, drafted for the state-wide race by Republicans on the strength of his crusade against crime in Manhattan, first as a special prosecutor and, since his election last fall, as district attorney.

Lehman appointed the 36-year-old Dewey to the special prosecutor's office.

The burden of carrying the New Deal into the campaign has fallen chiefly on the shoulders of Senator Robert Wagner, sponsor of the Labor Relations Act, and Rep. James M. Mead, who seeks election to the unexpired term of the late Royal S. Copeland.

They have found vigorous opposition in the Republican candidate, John Lord O'Brien, attorney and Edward Cora, social welfare executive, who have preached against the joblessness of 500,000 New York residents between the ages of 16 and 25 as "the most shocking indictment of our present situation."

Lehman, once described by Mr. Roosevelt as "my swing right arm" opposed the President's Supreme Court Reorganization Bill and made no reference to the New Deal in his campaign talks until a Hyde Park conference with the President a few weeks ago. Since then he has urged election of Democratic congressmen "to strengthen the arm of our great President in his fight for humane legislation."

Dewey in his turn has assailed Lehman as a man who didn't want to run Governor's own ambitious looked toward the Senate until party chieftains persuaded him he was needed in the gubernatorial race and has pounded on charges of Democratic corruption, particularly in Albany and Brooklyn.

Roosevelt's Radio Plea For Continued 'Liberal Government' Brings Democratic National Campaign To Its Peak; Hoover And Hamilton To Fire Final Shots For Republicans

Candidates throughout the nation pressed today toward a thunderous climax to the most intense and vote-rousing off-year election campaign in national history.

The great popular interest, reflected in predictions of an unprecedented ballot total Tuesday, spurred Republican and Democratic leaders in their efforts in scores of apparently close races.

President Roosevelt brought the national campaign of the Democrats to its peak last night by broadcasting an appeal for continued liberal government.

Former President Hoover and National Chairman John Hamilton will speak for the Republicans tonight. Hoover's address to a Spokane, Wash., Republican rally will be broadcast from 9 to 10 P. M. EST., over the Mutual Network. Hamilton will speak over the "red" network of NBC from 10 to 10:30 P. M. EST.

Roosevelt Endorses Lehman Mr. Roosevelt spoke from his Hyde Park home and as a citizen of his native state. He endorsed the Democratic candidate of Governor Herbert H. Lehman and Senator Robert Wagner, both seeking re-election, and Rep. James M. Mead, the party's nominee for the Senate vacancy created by the death of Senator Royal S. Copeland.

Only once did he discuss specific candidates outside of New York State. Then he spoke warm words of praise for the way Governor Frank Murphy of Michigan handled the Michigan automobile strikes in 1937. Murphy is opposed for reelection by Frank D. Fitzgerald, Republican nominee.

Many of the President's remarks were addressed to a national audience.

"We have to have reasonable continuance in liberal government to get permanent results," he said, adding that the voters should remember that need when they cast their ballots Tuesday.

The trend of his speech was taken by many politicians to imply a recognition that his six-year-old administration is the main issue before the country.

Edges Support Of Liberals Throughout he called for strong support of liberal candidates and policies. Not once did he mention the Democratic Party or the Republican Party although he took occasion to assail "Tory Republicanism."

In Washington, the Senate campaign expenditures committee disclosed that its investigators would keep a vigilant watch on the trading in Pennsylvania, New Jersey and North Carolina. Charges and countercharges will be made by both main parties in these states.

Alf M. Landon, 1936 Republican presidential nominee, told an audience at Manhattan, Kansas, last night that adoption of sound fiscal policies by the government would be a step toward substantial economic recovery.

Annals New Deal Speaking at Dayton, Ohio, Dr. Glenn Frank, chairman of the National Progress Program Committee, said the New Deal was leading the nation down a "ragged blind alley" of unpaid bills.

Unless government heeded, this danger, he said, the forgotten man would be not only forgotten, but "betrayed by a government that lends him to hope for all sorts of wonderful benevolence, but cannot provide because it has neglected to foot the bills."

On the Democratic side, Secretary Lyles told a Philadelphia audience that a return of the Republicans to the state would mean handing the future of the state over to Max Baucus, publisher of the Philadelphia Inquirer.

35 Senate Seats At Stake The Democratic National Committee reported it collected \$27,487 between Oct. 28 and Nov. 4 and spent \$39,130. The Republican Senatorial campaign committee reported collections of \$19,500 and expenditures of \$38,788 from Oct. 28 to Nov. 2. The Republican congressional committee reported contributions of \$16,133 for the same period.

There are 35 Senate seats, 23 governorships and the 422 House seats at stake in the election. A total vote of approximately 100,000,000 is in prospect. This would be only \$2,000 under the total cast in 1936 when the Roosevelt-Landon race set a record of 45,646,787. In 1934, the last previous mid-administration election brought out a vote of only 32,804,000.

Supervisors Vote Additional Sum To Spur Hunt For Girls Slayer... \$6,000 NOW PROVIDED... Youkers Republican Opposes Proposal Of Reward 'On Principle'

A reward of \$500 for the apprehension and conviction of the murderer of Mary Imelda Coyle of New Rochelle was voted yesterday by the Board of Supervisors in White Plains.

This sum added to a reward of \$1,000 previously offered by the village of Larchmont, where the girl's body was found on the morning of Oct. 21.

Law enforcement officials hoped that the sum of \$500 now offered would produce a clue which would lead to the murderer, who so far has successfully eluded apprehension.

The central bureau of investigation set up in Larchmont with a staff of 25 law enforcement officers working under supervision of Assistant District Attorney William F. Horns has continued extensive investigation, but without results.

There was little objection to the \$500 reward by the county for clues leading to the conviction of the slayer of the Coyle girl.

Supervisor Armstrong, Youkers Republican, said that while he favored such crimes he did not think 'on principle' rewards should be offered for work which should be done in the normal execution of duties by law enforcement officials.

He decided himself in the negative on the proposition.

The board also appropriated \$150 for road improvements and \$12,700 for fire damage repaired at Playbank.

Here and There Around Nation's Polling Places

By the Associated Press. Reporting the votes of western mountain communities isn't always an easy job. The ballots from Manitou, Colo. will be packed across a high mountain range to Gunnison, the county seat, 66 miles away. A pony express rider will carry returns 90 miles from Bridgeport, Utah, to the county's only telephone point.

Asides from Maine, which voted in September, the only place in the country where no election took place today was Washington, D. C. Its residents don't have the franchise. Three ballot boxes, draped in black, were prominently displayed by organizations which urged Congress to give voting rights to Washington.

The announcement was made while Nazis were taking reprisals against Jews for the shooting of a German Embassy secretary in the roundup of arms began some time before the Paris shooting. Nation Is Expected To Set Off-Year Record

FOES OPTIMISTIC

America's sovereign voters—40,000,000—strongly helped today to determine the New Deal's future course by crossing congressmen and state officials in a momentous 'off-year' election.

The outpouring of citizens gave every indication of setting a voting record surpassed only by 1900's great year. In some regions, however, inclement weather appeared likely to lower the advance estimates.

The opening of the polls—daybreak in some states—put an end to the campaign speechmaking, ordinary government officials and virtually all members of Congress, even leaders in their home bailiwicks, to vote.

President Roosevelt was in Hyde Park where he sealed in an envelope his own forecast of the outcome. For President Garfield the silent man of this year's campaign, said at home in Franklin.

In several states where contests have been especially grueling, tens of thousands of voters in Pennsylvania, hundreds of special ballots were on duty at the polls. Excitement ran high in Michigan and New York because of the hot gubernatorial races. The old age pension issue was a focal point of interest in California.

In contrast to these were the States where Democratic and Republican tickets were in most instances a mere formality.

As Democratic observers hailed the predicted rain as 'Democratic weather' and likely to keep many normally Republican voters away from the polls, Republicans even predicted that rain will fall over much of the area before the close of today's state election.

The weather will not make much difference in the total vote, there are too many good roads nowadays which farmers can use to get to the polls.

Wagner and Mead Triumph in Update Race For Seats in U. S. Senate

ENTIRE SLATE VOTED IN American Labor Party 350,000 Votes For Democrats

NEW YORK, Nov. 9 (AP)—President Roosevelt's native New York—which will be of the greatest strategic importance in the 1940 presidential year—remained Democratic in major contests in yesterday's spectacular state election.

Substantially complete returns showed Gov. Herbert Lehman reelected over his Republican opponent, Thomas E. Dewey, but with a plurality so small that during much of the night nobody could predict the outcome.

With only two of the 60,000 election districts in the state unreported, the Governor now leads by less than 70,000 votes in a total of nearly 4,700,000. The figures were Lehman 2,383,464; Dewey 2,317,200; Senator Robert F. Wagner, each of the labor set bearing his name, appeared safe, as was Rep. James M. Mead for the other New York senatorial seat—meantime vacated by the death of Senator Royal S. Copeland.

Wagner was opposed by John Lord O'Brien, who ably criticized some phases of the Roosevelt administration, and by Edward P. Conry, generally regarded as the labor favorite in the campaign.

The vote with 50 districts unreported gave Wagner 2,423,377 or 60.3 per cent of the vote in 603 districts Mead had 2,347,715 or 59.7 per cent.

Attorney General Bennett polled 2,097,266 to McDermott, 1,653,315; O'Leary (partial), 1,653,315 with 204 districts unreported.

Leahy Governor polled 2,043,753 with 430 districts unreported.

For congressional, Tremaine had 2,343,500 to Rothstein's 1,706,668, with 50 districts unreported.

G. O. P. Elects 5 Assemblymen, 2 Senators First Time In Two Decades

BLEAKLEY LEADS SLATE Yonkers Adopts City Manager Form Of Government By 3,000 Margin

By HUGH W. ROBERTSON, Staff Correspondent WHITE PLAINS, Nov. 9.—Westchester Republicanism yesterday won the most smashing victory it has ever achieved in the history of the county.

Not only did the GOP elect its countywide ticket by the largest majorities ever given any candidates of any party but it captured the solid state legislative representation of five assemblymen and two state senators for the first time in two decades.

While electing its own county officials by record-breaking majorities, the Republican Party gave to the state ticket leads over its Democratic rivals that even the most enthusiastic GOP leaders had failed to predict.

With William F. Bleakley of Yonkers leading the parade with the unprecedented and wholly unexpected majority of 72,952 and with Sheriff George A. Casey leading the parade with the unprecedented and wholly unexpected majority of 62,974.

Outstanding in the case of Republicanism today is the sending to Albany of a solid bloc of legislators, adding one more to the present GOP majority in the Assembly and capturing the County Executive office with a majority ranging from 35,000 to 40,000.

Retired to private life by this election was William F. Bleakley, State Senator James A. Garvey, Yonkers Mayor Malcolm A. Davidson, also of Yonkers, Mr. Garvey's defeat had been anticipated but the loss of Mr. Doran was a bitter blow to county Democratic leaders.

Mr. Garvey lost to William F. Condon, present county register, who is a socialist at the end of the year, by 14,000 while Mr. Doran lost to the young Malcolm Wilson, never before a candidate for office by more than 2,000.

The re-election of the four Republican incumbents in the Assembly—Christopher Lawrence of Bronxville, Theodore Hill, Jr. of Yorktown, James E. Owens of Ossining and James H. Todd of Tarrytown—was practically conceded, as had also the reelection of Westchester's other state senator, Philip W. Williamson of Scarsdale, running in the 26th District, along with the eastern and central part of the government.

Republicans Control State Legislature

NEW YORK, Nov. 9 (AP)—Republicans will control both houses of New York's Legislature for the next two years.

For the first time since 1922, the party already dominating the Legislature extended its leadership to the Senate by sweeping five Democratic and taking over the smaller House majority 21 to 24.

Meanwhile both Republicans and Democrats as a result of yesterday's election increased their representation in the Assembly, mainly at the expense of the American Labor Party which lost all its present assemblymen but gained a new one in Manhattan.
