CRIMINALS BAG LIONS CLUBS HAVE POLICE

Shops Demolished As Demonstrations Sweep Reich MANY SUICIDES

BERLIN, Nov. 10 (AP)—Nazis Germany today indulged in its greatest wave of anti-Jewish violence since Adolf Hitler came to power in 1933. As a national day of vengeance for the assassination of a German diplomat by a Jew in Paris...

The report indicated that the campaign was conducted with a thoroughness and precision that left little to chance. Only after more than 12 hours of nationwide violence did Praga...

But his appeal coincided with what responsible Jews feared might be a threat to their lives for all Jews to leave the country.

The justifiable and understandable indignation of the German people over the cowardly Jewish murder of a German diplomat in Paris has resulted during the past night in extensive demonstrations.

He referred to the killing of Ernst vom Rath, secretary of the German Embassy, by a 17-year-old Polish Jew who had lived in Germany.

Telephoned reports from many parts of Germany revealed that anti-Jewish violence, beginning today, was nationwide.

Seven of Berlin's 10 synagogues were burned. All Jewish synagogues were reported burned, wrecked or badly damaged.

In numerous cities and communities of the Reich, said Goebbels, appeals, acts of violence were committed against Jewish buildings and businesses.

"The entire population is now, however, strictly requested to desist immediately from all further demonstrations and actions of whatever nature against Jewdom.

The final paragraph of the appeal will be given in the form of a law decree."

Responsible Jews hearing this closing sentence expressed fears that a general order would be issued compelling all Jews to leave the country.

Goebbels' appeal was issued at 4 P. M. (U. A. M., E. S. T., some hours later after the outbreak in Berlin.

The nationwide wave of anti-Jewish violence was shown by the following telephoned reports from many cities to the Associated Press.

MUNICH—All Jews were told they must leave the country within 15 hours. The only Jewish Jewish bank, Aufhäuser, was raided and it windows smashed.

NURNBERG—Private homes of Jews were entered, children thrown out of their beds, furniture was smashed and carried off.

COLOGNE—Crowds broke windows in nearly every Jewish shop. An entrance to a synagogue was forced, its seats overturned, windows smashed, books torn.

ESCAPING FELONS CAUGHT IN BATTLE

LONDON TO STUDY DEMANDS LONDON, Nov. 1 (AP)—Prime Minister Chamberlain told the House of Commons today that Germany's demands for return of the war-torn colonies "could not be considered in isolation" and that they required extended study.

Horan Says There Has Been No Lag in Coyle Case Investigation

The remaining detectives are continuing to run down bits of information. The investigators hope for a "break" now that the Village of Larchmont and Westchester County have joined in offering a reward totaling \$6,000 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the murderer.

"There has been no change in the investigation," Mr. Horan said. "We are not at all discouraged."

Election Victory Spur Republican Campaigns

The Democratic and Republican parties began a 4-year struggle for power to see the aftermath of political upheavals in Tuesday's elections.

With 11 new governorships and eight new Senate seats—at least 78 more House seats—firmly in their grasp, Republicans turned from ballot counting to the awaited question of how to take over the presidency in 1940.

Democrats, characterizing as their failure as inevitable candidates to Roosevelt coalitions minimized Republican claims widespread anti-New Deal sentiment. They were equally determined to use all the vast resources they command to continue national domination beyond the next years.

Only two major races, remain to be decided today. In Iowa, Senator Lester J. Dickinson and Senator Guy M. Gillette are in a neck-and-neck contest. In Minnesota, Governor Earl Warren and Senator Frederick W. La Follette and Raymond E. Willis (R.) are in a close race. In Wisconsin, Governor Philip La Follette and Senator J. P. Kamp are in a close race.

The Major Results Aside from those, the latest tally from the 47 state electors gave this picture of the overture to the campaign which will open in November on Tuesday, nine previous had been won by Democrats, by a Farmer-Laborist and one a Progressive.

These triumphs, more extensive than many Republican leaders had expected, were a surprise to many observers in both the House and Senate next session.

"It is the obvious justice of the statement that the country as a whole is still strongly behind the humane policies of President Roosevelt," he said.

Editor's Note: The following is an eye-witness story of how the armistice was received in the front line trenches on France 20 years ago today.

BOSTON, Nov. 11 (AP)—Most of the world went delirious just 20 years ago today but not some of the men who made the armistice possible. Many of the men then in the front lines in France were too tired to celebrate. The ending of hostilities gave some of them their first opportunity in months for a sleep that was not interrupted by gunfire, raids, gas attacks. Probably typical of the outfit in active combat that day was the Machine Gun Company of the 11th Infantry, 2nd Division, from Pennsylvania.

ELECTION UPSET NOT EXPECTED TO DETER NEW DEAL

President to Push Fundamentals of His Program, Politicians Believe

ROOSEVELT NOT WORRIED

Sees No Sweeping Change in Support For His Policies

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12 (AP)—President Roosevelt's expressed views on the outcome of the congressional election led many politicians to conclude today that he would push the fundamentals of his New Deal program as vigorously as ever in the new Congress.

First the President said he did not expect Democratic criticism of his administration to combine with the support of the Democratic Party to stop heavily in Tuesday's voting for the program.

Second, he said he had expected the Republicans to capture many Democratic seats. He had predicted that there would be 100 new Senate seats and 65 House seats as it turned out they won eight seats in the Senate and at least 81 in the House.

Third, he said he thought the results did not constitute a threat to Roosevelt's government.

This latter expression some politicians said, suggested that Mr. Roosevelt believed there had been no sweeping change in popular support for the policies of his administration.

Contrary view was expressed by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. In a statement, it interpreted its election results as "reassuring" to business.

Penalty Is Decried For Murder Of Diplomat

MORE ARRESTED

BERLIN, Nov. 12 (AP)—Germany's remaining 600,000 Jews were uprooted from German economic life and fined 1,000,000,000 marks—\$400,000,000—today for the murder of Ernst Von Rath, German diplomat in Paris, by a Jewish youth.

How the 1,000,000,000 marks will be raised was not disclosed.

The fine was assessed in a decree issued by Field Marshal Hermann Wilhelm Goering after a conference of ministers. The decree was not published and an official summary of the edict said only:

"Always has a penalty for the murder of Ernst Von Rath in the dastardly murder in Paris upon German Jews in their entire life the form of a money fine of 1,000,000,000 marks."

Goering's decree issued in his capacity of director of Germany's four-year plan, and a decree of Propaganda Minister Paul Joseph Goebbels closed new Nazi barriers around Jews isolating them further from the nation's cultural and economic life.

At the same time, arrests and internments of Jews were reported in Berlin, Hamburg, and Frankfurt.

Field Marshal Hermann Wilhelm Goering, as director of Germany's four-year plan, issued a decree effective Nov. 12 prohibiting Jews from conducting retail business, mail order and commission houses and independent handicraft enterprises.

Goering's decree further barred Jews from heading any industrial or commercial concern by forbidding them to hold shares in such or similar undertakings must have under the national labor law.

At the same time, semi-official reports said that 1,000 Jews had been arrested in Berlin alone.

These sources said it was impossible to estimate how many other Jews had been seized in the rest of Germany since the killing of Von Rath, secretary of the German Embassy in Paris, which incited nationalistic demonstrations and destruction of Jewish stores.

Another decree, issued by Goebbels, ordered Jews excluded from theaters, movie houses, concerts and other public entertainments.

These far-reaching measures toward isolating Jews from German national life were issued after a meeting of Goering, Goebbels, Interior Minister Dr. Wilhelm Frick, Justice Minister Dr. Franz Gürtner, Economics Minister Walter Funk and Finance Minister Lutz Schwerin-Kroetig.

An official announcement said they assembled to "deliberate on solution of the Jewish question which has become urgently necessary."

"Further decisive measures for elimination of Jews from German economic life and for prevention of 'undesirable conditions' in the announcement added, "will be issued within the shortest time by decree and laws."

BRITISH PROTEST GERMAN ATTACKS

England Takes Steps To Protect Subjects, May Make Claims For Damage. LONDON, Nov. 14 (AP)—A strong British protest in Germany against recent Nazi press attacks on British political leaders in connection with the killing of a German diplomat in Paris was disclosed in the House of Commons today by Prime Minister Chamberlain.

Der Angriff, organ of Propaganda Minister Paul Joseph Goebbels, said on Friday, "It is no coincidence" that the 17-year-old Polish Jew who was killed in Paris was killed in the same line as Winston Churchill, Anthony Eden and Alfred Duff Cooper.

Chamberlain spoke in reply to questions on the wave of anti-Jewish violence and anti-Jewish attacks in Germany following the Paris shooting. He said that the British charge d'affaires in Berlin, Sir George Gaither-Pollock, had since the Paris shooting, been making steps to safeguard British subjects and to secure the right to present claims for damage.

Federal Indictments Against Milk And Ice Cream Industries

LABOR OFFICIALS NAMED

Four Chicago City Officers Also Included in U. S. Charges

CHICAGO, Nov. 15 (AP)—More than 30 companies, officials of two labor unions and four Chicago City officials were named today in two federal indictments charging violation of the anti-trust laws in the milk and ice cream industries.

The indictments, returned Nov. 1 after 16 weeks of Grand Jury investigation, and a year's work by the Department of Justice, had been approved today by the attorney general.

They marked another step in one of the most extensive anti-trust prosecutions in American history.

One indictment, charging antitrust violations in the milk industry in the Chicago area, named 31 firms and 11 individuals. The other, charging an ice cream monopoly in the same area, named 23 individuals and two firms.

The four Chicago City officials named in the milk indictment were: Dr. Herman S. Bushman, chief of health control; Clarence Daney's partner, Paul Krueger, chief of health control; and the city's sanitary officer, Dr. W. J. Gorman, chief of the city dairy department of the Board of Health.

Dr. Gorman and former leaders of the pure milk associations, Louis M. Berman, president of the Milk Producers' Association, and John J. Gorman, president of the Associated Milk Producers, Inc., also were named.

The major distributors included in the milk indictment were: The Borden Company, New York; Borden-Walton, Inc., Chicago; and New York Borden Dairy Company, Chicago.

Twenty-one individuals named in connection with the major distributor group included: Dr. H. Paul, Chicago, president, Borden Dairy Company; and four other Chicago Borden executives: Dr. W. C. Conroy, New York, vice president of the Borden company; Dr. A. M. Han, Columbus, Ohio, vice president of the Borden company; Dr. Charles J. Conroy, Chicago, president of the Borden-Walton division of the Borden company; and Dr. W. J. Gorman, Chicago, president of the Borden-Walton division of the Borden company.

The Associated Milk Producers, Inc., large Chicago distributor, leads antitrust suits in the industry. It was indicted, including President Louis Berman, who is chairman of the board of the International Dairy Company.

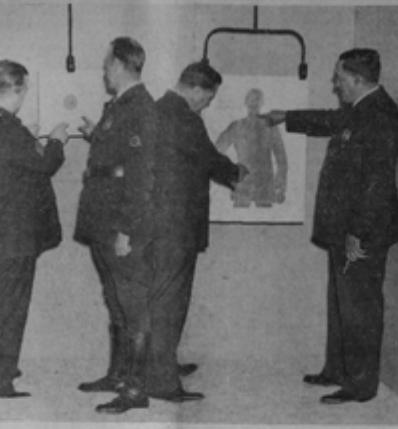

GERMAN JEWS SEEK SECLUSION, FEARING FRESH NAZI OTTBURSTS; U. S. EMBASSY ISSUES PROTEST

Reich Paper Assails 'U. S. Concessions To Jewry'

ICKES ATTACKED

BERLIN, Nov. 16 (AP)— Jews sought seclusion against any fresh outbreaks of German anti-Semitic feeling today while the United States Embassy sent a formal note to the Foreign Office protesting the destruction of American Jews' property during the attack of last week.

No details were given in the note but the United States reserved the right to take further action in behalf of any interests harmed by an act of violence against an ambassador or an ambassador's family.

The editorial was directed specifically against the United States Secretary of the Interior, Harold I. Ickes, and the summons to Ambassador Hugh H. Wilson to return to the United States.

It was published in the National Zeitung of Essen, the newspaper of Fritz Mariani Goering who is second only to Chancellor Hitler in the Nazi regime.

The article apparently was written before President Roosevelt's statement in Washington yesterday that he personally had summoned Wilson to return for consultations on the Jewish situation.

It was a religious holiday the German Protestant churches and other groups made no comment. All government offices and business houses were closed and Jews were keeping out of sight until after the funeral of the embassy secretary, Ernst Von Rath, on Thursday.

His assassination by a Jewish youth resulted in the Jewish attack.

Under the headline "Washington Under Jewish Order," the National Zeitung editorial said of the American ambassador's trip home.

The court then suggested that the matter again be presented at the special term in White Plains, so that the question of the record could be settled and arguments on the merits of the case could be heard.

This argument is expected to take place possibly within two weeks, attorneys said.

Nazis Strive To Stir Up Racial Hatreds In U. S., County Audience Warned

Reich Tactics Aim To Extend Propaganda Here, Educator Says

WHITE PLAINS, Nov. 16—The Nazi propaganda machine will attempt to stir up racial and religious prejudice in the United States as a result of the nationwide protest against the persecution of Jews and Catholics in Germany, Prof. Clyde H. Miller of Columbia University, declared last night as he addressed more than 500 at the first meeting of the White Plains round table of the National Conference of Jews and Christians.

All of the speakers joined in vigorous criticism of the German nation and Adolf Hitler for the present state of anti-Semitism in Germany. The meeting was organized by Mrs. Edward C. Bailey of this city and gave evidence of the interest among Westchester residents in joining to discuss the problems.

Frederick C. McLaughlin, president of the Civic and Business Professionals and former mayor of the city, acted as chairman and introduced the speakers who included Herbert A. Wolff, a member of the Institute for Propaganda Analysis and Dr. Edmund Butler of Fordham University.

Dr. Miller referred to a statement made in the Volksrecht magazine, Adolf Hitler's newspaper, forecasting the state of anti-Semitism in the United States.

"This statement is part of a carefully planned tactic on the part of the Nazi propaganda machine," Dr. Miller said. "One propaganda method of inciting hatred is to predict that such a wave of hatred will sweep over the country."

Sixty-two petitions protesting against the valuation placed on their property in the 1938 assessment roll were submitted to the Village of Mamaroneck Board of Trustees last night, when the board held its annual "grievance day."

Approximately 24 persons made personal appearances before the board during its four-hour session. The majority of requests for reductions in assessments, however, came from banks and trustees for mortgage certificate owners.

The total reduction asked in the 62 petitions will not be tabulated for a few days, according to Harry Epstein, village tax assessor. It included, however, a number of large sums.

Only one large apartment house was considered by the trustees to be assessed at too high a rate.

A similar protest against an increased assessment was made by Herbert McAndrew, representing the John McArthur bungalow on Rummerville Avenue. It was assessed at \$20,000 last year, and was raised to \$24,000 by Mr. Epstein. The petitioner asked that the assessment be returned to last year's figure.

Mr. Epstein gave as his reason for increasing the valuation, the fact that while the property, consisting of about five acres of Rummerville land along Rummerville Avenue, was classified as residential property and was assessed as such, it was, in fact, business property. His contention that it was business property and should be assessed as such was based on the fact that it was used as a boat yard.

Another of the larger reductions sought involved the application of Walker and Forbes, Inc. for reduction of the Mamaroneck Avenue property it occupied with the New York Mackintosh Company.

CONFERENCE SET BY TOWN BOARD TO AIR 1939 BUDGET

Representatives Of All Groups Invited To Attend Two Meetings

FIRST SLATED NOV. 25

Interested Individuals Also To Hear Discussion Of Operating Costs

An effort to acquaint taxpayers of the Town of Mamaroneck with the operating costs and the policies of their government will be made at a series of conferences decided upon by the Town Board last night.

"Interested individuals" and representatives of all organizations in the town are to be invited to attend two meetings, when the Town Board will hear the 1939 budget estimates of the department heads, such as the fire, police, street, park and other units of the government.

The first meeting will be held at 8 P. M. Friday, Nov. 25, at the town offices on the Boston Post Road. This meeting will be devoted to departmental requests which affect the general town at large, such as the welfare department, debt service and the general town government.

To this meeting individuals and representatives of organizations in the Village of Mamaroneck and the Village of Larchmont will be invited. Questions they may ask will be answered and the board will attempt to inform them on every phase of the government in which they might be interested.

The second meeting will be held at 8 P. M. Tuesday, Nov. 29, and will be devoted to the various villages which are included in the unincorporated area's highway and police department, sewerage collection system, street lighting, department and park and other departments will be discussed.

Adjourned meetings will be held in each instance, if it becomes necessary to cover all phases of the subjects to be considered.

The plan was proposed last night by Supervisor Harry C. McCulloch. The two meetings are endorsed and met with instant endorsement from the town board.

The board arranged to that those attending would not be talking at cross-purposes. The first meeting in other words, will concern village affairs, altogether while the second meeting will be devoted to the town as a whole. Supervisor McCulloch said.

Every effort will be made, he said, to urge the taxpayers in all sections of the township to attend the meetings, at which departmental heads will give their reasons for estimating an increase in their coming year's budgets.

HARNETT ARRESTED BY DEWEY IN CHARGE OF GETTING \$67,000

State Commissioner Also Accused Of Extortion

GIVES SELF UP

NEW YORK, Nov. 16 (AP)—Charles A. Harnett, state commissioner of motor vehicles, was arrested in the District Attorney's office today on charges of bribery and extortion.

District Attorney Thomas E. Dewey's office accused Harnett was alleged to have accepted \$67,000 in bribes between October 1936, and January, 1938, from the Parmelee Transportation Company and through three subsidiaries of the National Transportation Company, Inc., the Yellow Taxi Corporation and the Hamilton Taxi Operating Company, Inc.

Dewey said an indictment against Harnett had been ready since late in September but had been automatically held up until after the political campaign in which the District Attorney was unsuccessful as the Republican candidate for governor. It was filed yesterday, he said.

The action against Harnett was said by Dewey to have resulted from a two-day investigation which terminated the taxicab racket in which several traffic laws had been violated.

Harnett, who also is chairman of the State Traffic Commission, appeared voluntarily at Dewey's office after he had been notified of the charges against him.

Former Assemblyman Edward E. Moran, 57, a Brooklyn Democrat, was indicted last June 24 on six counts charging he received bribes and illegal fees from two taxicab companies — the City-Parmelee Transportation Company Inc. and the Terminal System Inc.

It was not explained whether there was any connection between his case and that involving Harnett.

The indictment against Moran contains four felony and two misdemeanor counts. The latter misdemeanors in the case of a public officer do not yet have been brought to trial and is at liberty to leave the state.

67 FILE PROTESTS ON ASSESSMENTS

Apartment House Applies For Largest Reduction On Larchmont Valuations

A total of 67 complaints, six fewer than last year, was filed last night by taxpayers on the new assessment roll for the Village of Larchmont.

The Board of Review met for four hours last night in Municipal Building to hear protests. Twelve of them were personal appearance protests.

The Board of Review will meet again in closed session on Nov. 28 to consider assessment reduction suggestions.

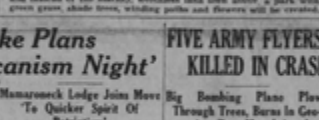

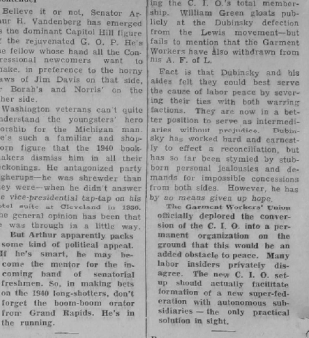
