BERLIN, Nov. 22 (AP)—The German Government today issued a decree ordering a levy of 20 per cent of Jewish fortunes amounting to \$400,000,000 today to pay the additional tax imposed by the announcement of Ernst Thälmann's voluntary renunciation of his German citizenship by a Jewish Jew.

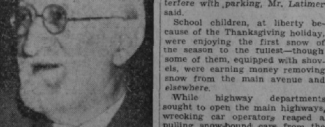

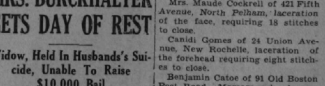

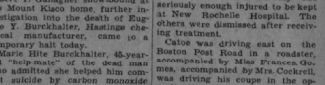

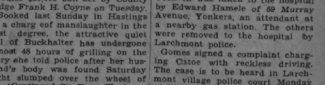

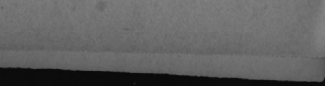

Non-Partisan School Trustees Plan Woman's Club Aid

Representatives N a m e d Mrs. Schweizer Delivers Talk On The Theater

Mamaroneck Women's Club accepted on Wednesday the proposed plan for the nomination of trustees to the Mamaroneck School Board through a committee appointed by representatives of 12 civic organizations.

The club appointed as its representatives on the original committee Mrs. Arthur J. Sanford and Mrs. William Campbell.

The theater is an illusion, not really but a semblance of reality, not life, but the dramatic essence of life, Mrs. Albert Schweizer of Larchmont, who was known as Jean Ford when she was an actress, told the dramatic program following the business meeting.

The theater illusion depends on the acceptance of the audience of the scenes beyond the footlights, to maintain the illusion of reality.

"When we are the phrase 'artistic actor,' she said, 'we do not mean that the actor acts 'natural,' we mean that he acts in the illusion of being natural."

"Amateurs or hobby actors make an obvious effort to act natural, while the real actor has the technique well to hand, but does not appear obvious."

She gave examples of actors who could take any part and seem to fit it, Helen Hayes, playing the role of Queen Victoria, and Katherine Cornell, a mental patient, playing herself, playing perfectly the psychological character of Ira March in "The Green Hat."

"In the early days of the theater," she said, "the profession was considered one of the wisest actors and actresses were inducted from the general public, consequently they were always actors. They acted according to a strict code of their own."

One of the last isolation sorts of actorship of the theater grew up in the explanation of the actors' habits, Coopers and Tress of England and the Dreyfus and Bryans of America.

Although Mrs. Schweizer approves of many of the changes in the theater, she thinks, she said, that there is something to be said for the old theater."

"The old theater," she said, "was always triumphant. The play, written by the dramatist, was a feat of exaltation and renewed determination to follow one's own star."

"Because they were so cut off from other people actors were always thought of as the characters they portrayed on the stage."

"Now, instead of the personal ideas of the dramatist, we are received as ordinary people. In fact, everyone knows what her favorite news papers are, what kind of underwear she wears, what cigarettes she smokes, what night clubs she goes to and who her friends are."

This unfortunately destroys the glamor of actors, she declared, and the audience now accept him as two persons.

She gave as an example of a modern actress who has successfully kept her mystery and glamor, Gladys George, whom she pointed out, has survived many of her contemporaries.

Perhaps the most interesting part of Mrs. Schweizer's program were the scenes which she said to dramatize the various types of drama.

She opened with Alfred Hayes' "The Highwaysman" to portray the costume drama type and contrast of the old-time William Byrd's "Lute Song." The first, she said, was fair and overdone in comparison with the simple, everyday tragedy of the second.

4 SUFFER INJURY IN ACCIDENTS ON SLIPPERY STREETS

Two Seriously Hurt in Weekend Mishaps Following Snow Storm

FRENCH WAR VETS ASK COMPROMISE IN LABOR CRISIS

Ex-Soldiers Appeal To Unions And Daladier To Avert Strike

PARIS, Nov. 28 (AP)—French war veterans appealed to Premier Daladier and the labor unions today to compromise differences and avert a general strike.

The National Confederation of War Veterans, representing 6,000,000 members, called on Daladier to "seek all means of calming the nation's emotions and of opposing the social conflict."

The labor unions were asked to reconsider the danger of general action, which, pointed to the limit, would compromise the security of the nation.

Both Daladier and the labor unions, which are backed by the Socialist and Communist Parties, went doggedly ahead, however, with plans for and against the national strike scheduled for Wednesday.

Called by the General Confederation of Labor for a 24-hour picket, the strike officially would protest against the government financial-aids decree which also had the effect of decreasing pay of the rich at the expense of the poor.

Although Daladier was given three powers to mobilize 521,000 national employees into the army to keep them working, the financial-aids decree which labor leaders to "remain deaf and dumb at your posts" on Wednesday.

BOND ISSUE SET AT \$68,500 BY VILLAGE BOARD

Trustees Vote To Finance Temporary Certificate Of Indebtedness IMPROVEMENTS COVERED

A bond issue for \$68,500 to finance permanently temporary certificates of indebtedness previously issued was authorized by the Mamaroneck Village Board of Trustees last night.

The latter two expenditures were authorized by the board more than a year ago and the West Basin improvement was approved by the voters at the last village election.

The bond covering the Boston Road property acquisition is the subject of a judgment entered by the Supreme Court on the property needed for the widening of the road and the conversion of adjoining property into village park.

All of the property lots owned by the Post Road between the County Sanitation plant and Orienta Avenue—part of which is to be filled by the dredging of the West Basin. The money has already been paid into the court and awaits distribution by the court to the claimants.

The water bonds cover the installation of water mains in the Orienta Point and elsewhere in the village where the water supply is in danger from point of fire hazard. Mains have been installed in the Clinton Avenue, this expenditure was authorized by the board a year ago and is now up for permanent bonding along with the other certificates.

The board disposed of a number of other matters before going into conference with Tax Assessor Harry Epstein on the 1938 tax assessment roll and the grievances recently offered by property owners. The other matters include:

JEWES HERE NEAR HALF WAY MARK IN DRIVE FOR FUNDS

Almost Half Of \$2,000 Goal Collected Following Local Meeting NATIONAL AID MOUNTS

Approximately half of a goal of \$2,000 has already been collected in the vicinity for the relief of German refugees. Dr. S. Shapers, general chairman of the drive here, said today.

The ready response experienced here was manifested throughout the nation, according to the Associated Press which described the drive as "one of the most remarkable responses ever made to appeals for aid."

"American Christians and Jews in a little more than two weeks have showered at least two million dollars on agencies for relief of German refugees," the press association reported.

More than \$800 was collected at a mass meeting held Monday night at the Hebrew Institute on the hands. As left by Dr. Shapers said. He considered the sum "remarkable" since those attending numbered between 100 and 200 persons.

A meeting of the local committee will be held tomorrow night in Dr. Shapers's office. Geographical lines will be marked and a systematic canvass made of this area, which includes Mamaroneck, Larchmont and Harrison. The activities here have been confined to the Jewish neighborhood.

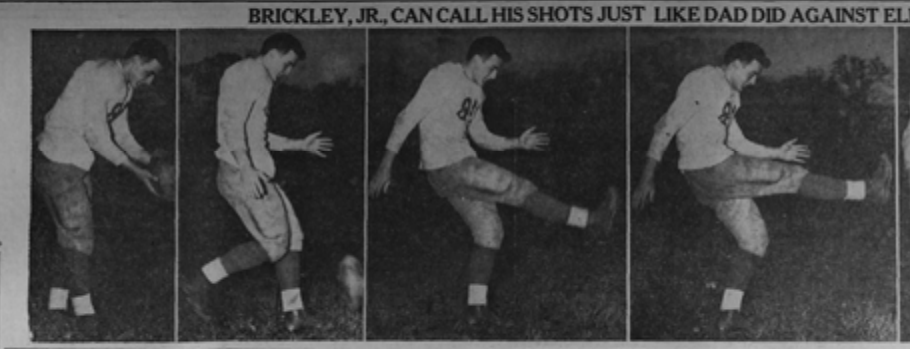

PREMIER SUICIDES FRENCH PARLIEUR IN APPREHENSIVE LABOR DEFEATED

Daladier Expected To Win Sanction For Policies

LABOR DEFEATED

PARIS, Dec. 1 (AP)—Premier Daladier, having broken labor's effort to wreck his government by a general strike, announced today that he intended to call Parliament into session Dec. 8 and demand from it approval of his policies.

In government circles it was believed the Premier would receive sufficient backing to override the opposition of the Communists and Socialists, who backed yesterday's abortive strike as a protest against his economic decree laws.

Daladier, undisputed master of the situation, has continued for the year state of "economic mobilization" for the nation to carry through his program.

For parliamentary support he counted on a majority composed of his own Radical-Socialist Party and groups further to the right.

The Premier also considered punitive measures against labor, Socialist, and Communist leaders of the abortive one-day general strike. He planned a cabinet meeting to discuss punishments.

It was considered probable that evidence of Italian territorial ambitions in France's North Africa possessions had much to do with the Premier's decision to seek a new parliamentary majority.

Shouts of "Tunisia! Tunisia!" by Italian deputies yesterday with Premier Mussolini looking on was taken by French officials to mean that France was facing a new Italian pact campaign for control of the North African Empire.

Foreign office sources reported that France was considering a formal protest against the Italian campaign. Daladier conferred with Foreign Minister Georges Bonnet and high officials met at the Foreign Ministry throughout the morning.

Many observers considered the development a serious setback to Daladier's recent efforts to secure a more friendly relations and it was known that Daladier's close advisers had recommended a withdrawal from a "reaction."

Foreign office circles said Britain was concerned and would support France "indistinctly." It was believed that London and Paris already had been in informal contact on possible measures to limit Italy's growth of her apparatus.

The new French financial program, drafted by Finance Minister Paul Reynaud, paid a heavier tax burden, both in time and money, on the average Frenchman. He must save more to meet government and, although the 40-hour week is kept, in many cases must work longer hours, if necessary, to increase the national income.

Reynaud indicated in a speech today that the government regarded the failure of the general strike as a popular rebuke in favor of the decree laws. His speech, before the American Club of Paris, was broadcast to the United States.

"The people of France declared themselves for work, for order and for social discipline," he said. "Thus they showed that democracy is capable of what some politicians in the world affirm to be impossible—to impose sacrifices that which it is easy in other regimes to impose by force."

BUILDING PERMITS FOR MONTH REACH TOTAL OF \$61,140

The dredging work will be used for park purposes, including eliminating the present village dump. An intention to dig out of garbage is rapidly being eliminated by the Village on Park Street.

The dredging project was approved by village residents at the election and Spring. The village and Federal Government are sharing the cost.

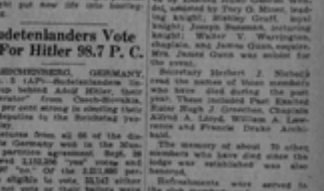
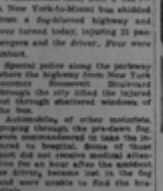
