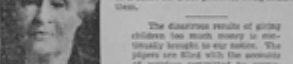

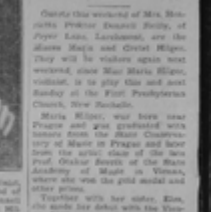

The blast hurled Mr. Gilman across the room and blew out 99 windows in the plant. The explosion was caused by a small quantity of a highly explosive material which was being used in the manufacture of a new product.

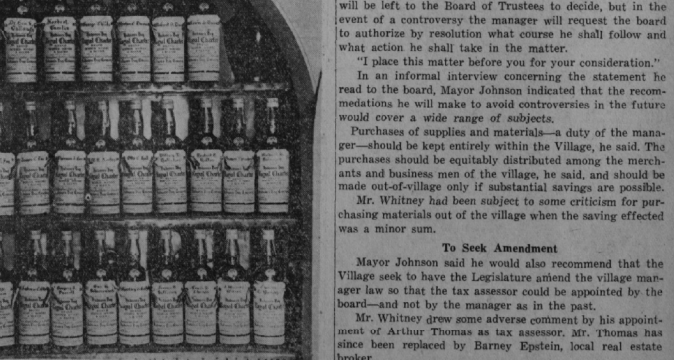

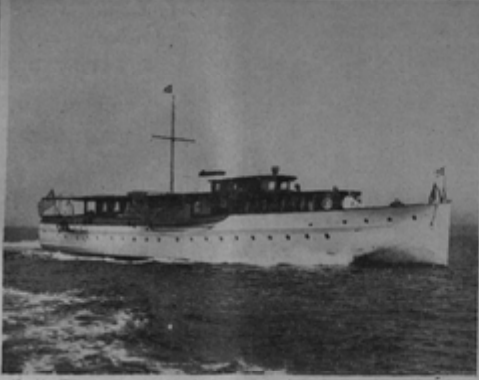

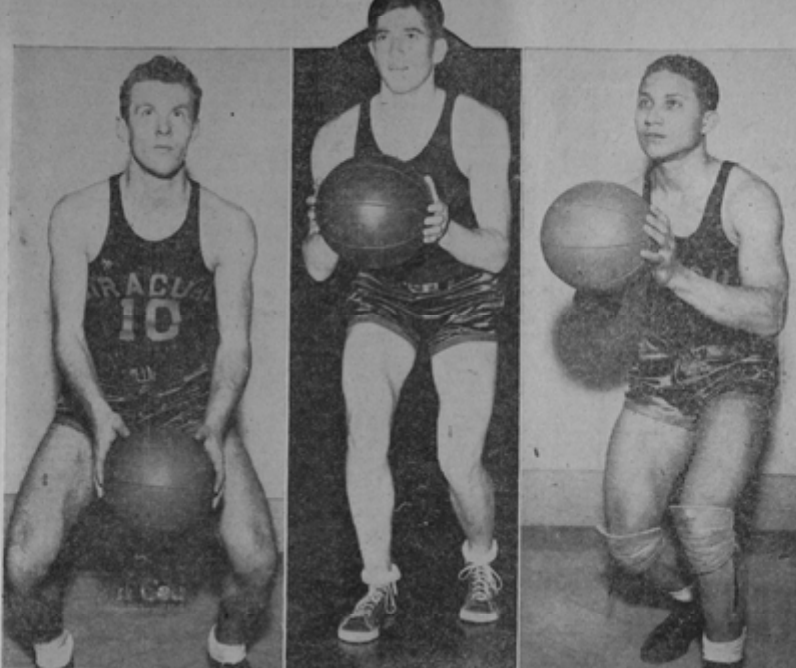

STATEMENT AIMS VIEWS
C. O. P. Chief Sees Better Municipal Administration For Mamaroneck

Mayor William H. Johnson's re-commendation that the Village of Mamaroneck Board of Trustees re-appoint Raymond J. Whitney as village manager has the approval and support of Edward J. Kuhn, leader of the Republican organiza-tion in the Village, Mr. Kuhn an-nounced today.

Mayor Johnson revealed yester-day he had recommended to the board that Mr. Whitney, who left the position on April 4 after almost seven years of service, be re-appoint-ed to office. It was thought likely the board would act on Mayor Johnson's recommendation at the meet-ing next Monday night.

Mr. Kuhn, as leader of the organiza-tion which supported and elected Mr. Johnson two years ago, issued the following statement:

Whitney again as village manager please be advised that I have been in constant touch with Mayor Johnson regarding this matter and that the decision arrived at was not one of snap-judgment."

"I can assure you that his decision has my approval and support. I will want to state that no ac-tion was not due to any efforts or pressure from any other group—but solely to the deliberate and clear thinking of Mayor Johnson. During my more than 20 years of village affairs, Mayor Johnson, in my opinion, has been one of the most conscientious, sincere and honest public officials that has ever served our Village and I be-lieve that it is the duty of every citizen to give him the support, en-dorsement and approval of his pay-ment and citizens' wishes. Consider-ation regardless of personal prefer-ence or grievances. This I believe has been done by our Mayor when he made his announcement to the Village Board and to our community."

"I believe that the change that was made last Spring had no ill effects on our community—instead it has and will tend to make for a better administration of local vil-lage affairs."

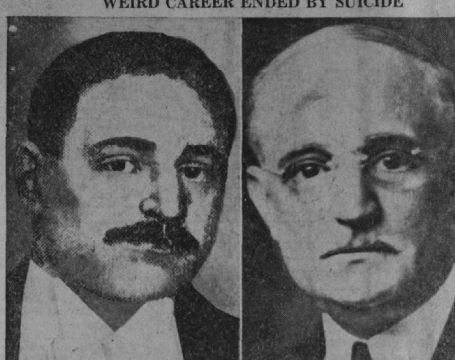

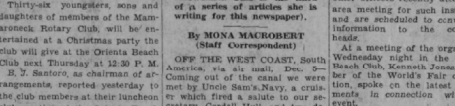

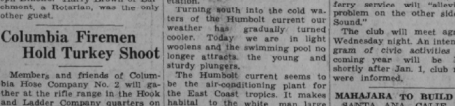
