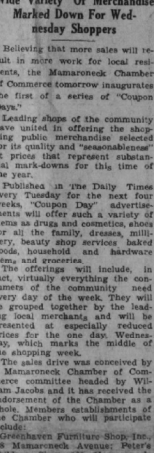

Budapest Postpones Mobilization of Army At Request of Foreign Powers

PRAGUE WAITS DECISION

Czechs Assure Fuehrer Of Loyal Attitude Toward Germany

BERLIN, Oct. 14 (AP)—Adolf Hitler received former Premier Koluman Daranyi of Hungary at the Munich Putschhaus today in a conference the purpose of which was described as an interchange of views on Hungarian racial groups in Czechoslovakia.

The Hungarian statesman was accompanied by Admiral Miklos Horthy, Hungarian National leader, and Otto von Erdmannsdorff, German minister to Budapest.

The group arrived in Munich after a quick flight from the Hungarian capital.

(Advisers from Budapest said the Hungarian delegation went to Berlin on Hitler's invitation.)

MOBILIZATION POSTPONED
BUDAPEST, Oct. 14 (AP)—Diplomatic circles reported today that Hungary had postponed scheduled mobilization of her army at the request of "Great foreign powers," especially Germany, "in the interest of European peace."

PRESIDENT MAKES NATIONAL SURVEY OF DEFENSE NEED

Roosevelt Unable To Estimate Budget Until Study Has Been Completed

NEW DATA TECHNICAL

Mass Production Of War Equipment One Of Biggest Problems

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14 (AP)—President Roosevelt said today that he was making an entirely new study of the nation's national defense needs and that until it was completed he could not estimate next year's budget.

The President told a press conference he could not comment on the new budget because new technical developments in national defense necessitate a complete re-study of defensive requirements.

He said the reason for the re-study of these needs began to take shape about a year ago because of information coming in from the War Relocation Authority.

Asked about yesterday's statement by Bernard M. Baruch, chairman of the World War Industries Board, that America was not prepared for war because of lack of sufficient first class equipment, the President said he had not read the statement. He added, however, that a good many people were checking the situation in connection with the defense picture in the last three or four years.

One of the things being studied, he said, was that of mass production of equipment, including airplanes, power and other items.

BREAK NEAR, HORAN INDICATES

A "love triangle" involving two men and Mary Isabella Coyle 17-year-old New Rochelle girl whose body was found in Larchmont a week ago today, was revealed to police last night.

One of the men, it was learned exclusively by The Daily Times today, is being sought by police as the man who killed the girl in a raging fit of jealousy and passion.

The second man, captain of a private yacht, called for Florida week before the murder was committed. The Coyle girl was "crazy about" the captain, police learned. She had spurned the New Rochelle man.

This story was told to police last night by Captain Gustav Johnson, master of a private yacht tied in Mamaroneck Harbor off the Beach Plaza Club. He told and re-told the story to the investigators during questioning that started at 5:30 P. M. yesterday and ended at midnight.

Captain Johnson was ordered to return to police headquarters this morning. Police hoped to have the New Rochelle man in custody, awaiting Captain Johnson's identification.

The story told to the investigators by Captain Johnson was essentially as follows: The girl had fallen desperately in love with a Captain Easton, the small craft skipper who is now on his way to Florida. He cared nothing for the girl, had even tried to avoid her.

On at least one occasion he "bawled out" friends who had brought the girl to his boat. On Saturday a week before the murder was committed —Oct. 10—the girl came to the Village of Mamaroneck from New Rochelle, either borrowed a boat and rowed out herself or was towed out by a friend, to the yacht skippered by Captain Easton.

This was in the morning and the girl spent several hours with the captain. She left about noon Saturday and was rowed back to mainland by Captain Johnson and another skipper, known only as Ben.

They accompanied the girl to the Mamaroneck railroad station, where she took a train to New Rochelle. She had hidden away from the captain who was just shortly for Florida.

It was after his wife's departure that the New Rochelle man increased his attentions towards the girl. During the week leading up to the murder he attempted to persuade her to "throw over" the captain and begin keeping company with him.

His passionate overtures she had refused to entertain and she had left to Florida in the train, leaving behind her a note, signed "Cheryl," in which she stated that she was to be married to a man named "Richard." Captain Johnson has an excellent memory and stated that he would deliver the letter to Larchmont police headquarters. They agreed to go immediately, but as they entered, (Continued on Page Three)

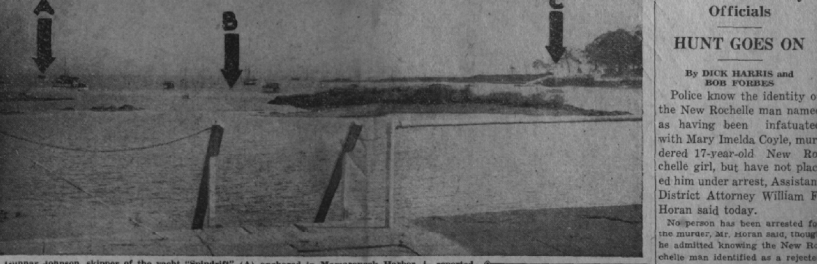

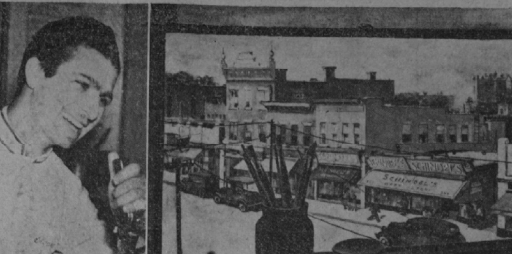
