# FRANCE TO DEFEND HER INTERESTS

**READY FOR WAR**  
**Nation Will Resist Italian Threat, He Says**

TUNIS, Tunisia, Jan. 3 (AP)—Premier Daladier brought assurances to the Bey of Tunis today that all France's military forces are ready to defend Tunisia, if necessary, against any Italian threat to French domination.

The premier, who arrived at Tunis this morning on a tour of the empire's North African colonies, conferred with the Bey at his 15th-century palace outside Tunis shortly before noon.

He told the ruler that France was determined to keep her preponderance over Tunisia, the key to the Mediterranean, even if it means war with Italy.

The Bey assured Daladier of his loyalty to France.

A month ago Daladier announced that France threw a discomfiting not into an otherwise triumphant reception at Bizerte.

A crowd of 500,000 Tunisians, nationalist, who organized themselves to take the premier to demonstrate. While Daladier was crossing the Bizerte pier, a small boat filled with 500 Tunisians pulled alongside.

Beating drums, they held aloft banners inscribed "Down with France," "Down with Daladier" and "Independence for Tunisia."

On his way to the French residency in Tunis Daladier's staff was broken through police lines along Long Live Daladier.

After some minutes a path was cleared and the premier reached the Residency, where he was welcomed by a group of 500 Tunisians.

During his brief meeting with the Bey he told the Tunisian potentate that France respects Tunisia's allegiance and cooperation.

"I trust tell your highness that all France is ready to contribute to the development of Tunisia's riches and to give her protection which she may need," the premier said.

"France extends this protection to all fields. Your highness may be assured that France never will forget any time her interest in accomplishing that historic mission which her spirit dictates."

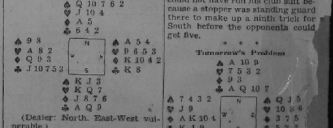

#### Warns Of Threat To Three American Institutions

FASCIST-INCLINED LEADER TO FORM JAPAN'S CABINET

FLAYS DICTATORS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4 (AP)—President Roosevelt told Congress and the world today that peace had not been "assured" at Munich and that "storms from abroad" directly challenged American democracy.

# ROOSEVELT SEVERE BY NAZI PRESS PREACHING 'HATE'

### British Newspapers Hail Courage of His Message

### OFFICIALS MUM

LONDON, Jan. 5 (AP)—The German press scored President Roosevelt's defense address today, charging it preached "hate" with the democracies gave praise and one important British newspaper lamented that the "challenging denunciation of dictators" was not made by its own head of government.

European officials studied the speech as one of the most important declarations coming from Washington since the World War. The democracies hoped it was a prelude to major changes in American foreign policy, giving particular attention to "moderate tax increases" and revision of neutrality legislation.

Both the German Nazi and the Italian Fascist press accused the President of playing domestic politics out of concealing the objectives of George Washington.

Some Soviet Russian newspapers, in brief comments, criticized points on Roosevelt's address and aggression and the United States but omitted passages about the democracy and religion. There was no editorial comment in any of the newspapers.

It was the liberal Manchester Guardian which carried the most detailed analysis of the President's address. The paper's editorial said it was "not surprising" that the British press should have called upon the President to "lead the world in a new era of peace."

"Most English men and women when they listened to President Roosevelt, must have wished that it was the head of their own government who was saying these things," the Guardian said.

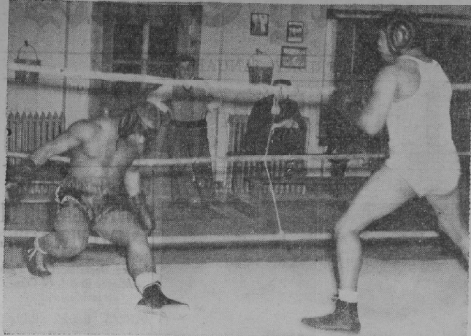

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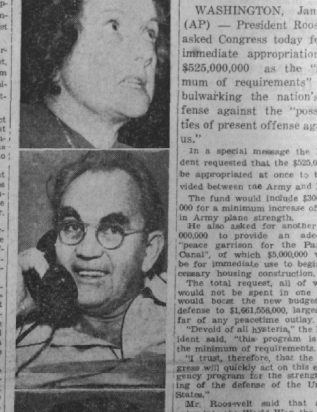
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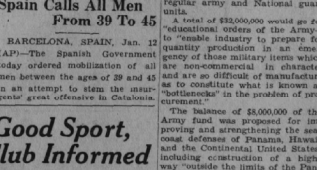
