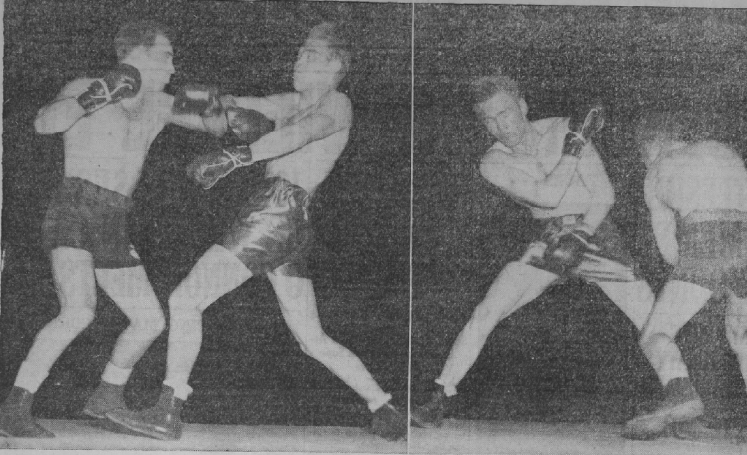

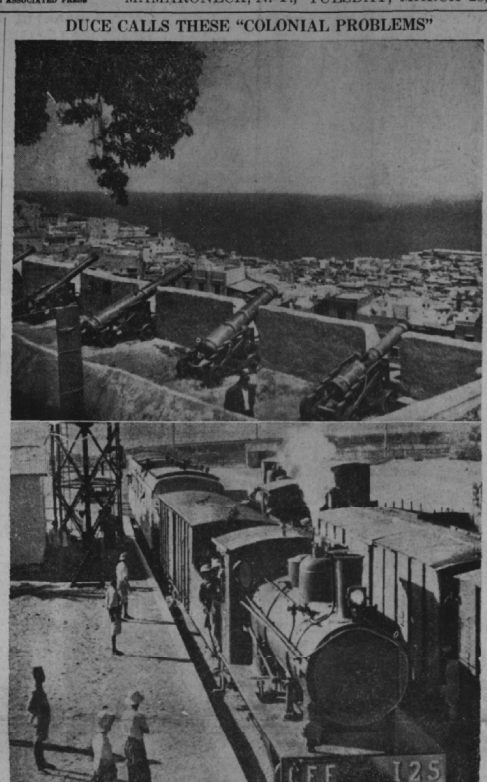

BACK TO COUNTY HOME RULE

One of the most potent arguments used in advocacy of the new Westchester County charter was that its adoption under the prior Fearon amendment to the state constitution would prohibit "sinking" with the county administration by the state legislature.

Before the Fearon state amendment and before the new county charter adopted under that amendment, the state legislature was enabled under law to do about anything to Westchester's government and the governor might desire. Westchester itself would have little to say about special legislation affecting this county.

But the Fearon amendment and the new county charter changed that. For these provided that thereafter the state legislature could pass no special legislation affecting Westchester unless such legislation should later be submitted to the voters of the county for a referendum. If the voters turned down the new bill then it did not become law and was not effective.

At that point Westchester enjoyed greater county home rule than it had possessed at any time since it was created in 1838. And there would have been no complications had affairs remained in that condition.

But last November the state adopted a number of new amendments to its constitution, among them one which provided a large degree of vitalizing the granting status of county home rule. Sections one and two of article nine of the state constitution now read that the state legislature can pass special legislation affecting Westchester—or any other county—upon the request of the supervisors or the county executive, which is much the same as it was before the Fearon amendment and the new county charter.

Further, the Fearon amendment and the county charter formerly provided that any legislation submitted for referendum must pass in not only the county as a whole but also in any municipality having 25 per cent or more of the county population for instance, Yonkers in this county. The new state amendment eliminates that provision.

The Scazdale Town Club, after a thorough study of the elimination of the protective home rule items mentioned, now recommends that they be restored, as affecting counties which set up new administrations under the Fearon amendment. A bill to that end, drafted by Herbert McKennis of that town, has been introduced by State Senator Finly W. Williamson. If passed it will go before the state this Fall for referendum. For like the Fearon amendment, it must be approved by the state at large, although its benefits will apply only to such large counties as have found new charters desirable.

As cursory glance it would seem that the legislature should approve the bill and submit it for referendum. For it would correct a damage which has been done, perhaps unwittingly to Westchester, and Nassau and other large counties functioning to a degree under the Fearon amendment, and under which they thought they were safe for all time as to county home rule.

And, incidentally, the next time this state has a constitutional convention—which cannot be before 1958—it might be well for a more general public understanding of all the amendments on which the voters are called to pass. Certainly Westchester had no advance knowledge that in this amendment, lumped with some two score others in the omnibus No. 1 amendment on the ballot, it was seeing its home rule voted away. In fact, from what has been learned to date of the confusing and contrivance results of the adoption of that No. 1 amendment, it might be better however to mend our state constitution piece by piece and not in lumps as was done in 1958.

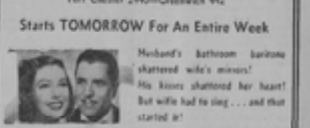
