Polls Close At 9

Voting in the Mamaroneck Union Free School District No. 1 election of two trustees to the Board of Education was being carried on today in the Music Room at the Senior High School on Palmer Avenue. The polls close at 9 A. M. A rush is expected during the last two hours.

Voting by machine will determine which of three candidates will be elected to the Board for three-year terms. The candidates are Mrs. Lawrence J. Beardsley of Larchmont, Joseph O. Moynahan of the unincorporated town area, and Samuel Baker, of the village of Mamaroneck.

Voting in Rye Neck started at 2 P. M. today and the polls also will close at 9 P. M. Everett, St. Smith and George H. Coffin are unopposed for reelection to the Rye Neck Board of Education.

TAXPAYERS ADOPT A SCHOOL BUDGET AT DISORDERLY ANNUAL MEETING

MAN DIES AS CAR PLUNGES 300 FEET OFF CROTON CLIFF

Rescuers, Working By Floodlight Extricate Body After All-Night Work

FLAMES DESTROY AUTO

Acetylene Torches Employed To Cut Victim's Body From Wreckage

Working by floodlights through the night in the chilly waters of the Croton River, rescuers succeeded today in retrieving the body of a man from beneath an automobile which last night crashed through the guard rail at the top of Croton Dam and plunged 300 feet down a rocky cliff to a ledge, where it burst into flames.

When the motorist's car was cut out of the wreckage by acetylene torches and raised by ropes to the top of the dam, it was tentatively identified as that of Max J. Auch, 33, of 272 1/2 St. Street, Astoria 1.

Three witnesses of the crash said that the Auch machine turned over on its side at the top of the dam, suddenly swerved to the left then veered to the right and rolled down the cliff, landing with a jolt of a car of flame on a ledge in the chasm.

When the motorist's car was cut out of the wreckage by acetylene torches and raised by ropes to the top of the dam, it was tentatively identified as that of Max J. Auch, 33, of 272 1/2 St. Street, Astoria 1.

CONFUSION MAKES STARRY MEETING AS 1,000 ROAR OPINIONS

RYE NECK SCHOOL BUDGET ADOPTED IN QUIET SESSION

No Opposition Voiced As Only 20 Taxpayers Attend Annual Meeting

Only 20 interested taxpayers turned out to adopt the Union Free School District No. 1, Town of Rye, budget last night at P. E. Redden High School auditorium. It was one of the quietest annual meetings on record.

There was no opposition to the budget, and hardly any questions. At the same time the taxpayers voted for levying of \$187,340 by tax.

Lawrence Quinn was elected chairman of the hearing. George Coffin, Rye Neck Board of Education vice-president, presided at the outset in the absence of President Everett Smith, who was out of town on business.

After the hearing, which lasted barely more than 30 minutes, the assembly voted to adjourn until today when the 190 persons who registered for the school election may vote between 2 P. M. and 9 P. M. This will be another quiet procedure since President Smith and Mr. Coffin are unopposed for reelection. In controversial sections the registration has reached the 1,000 mark.

Benjamin Price nominated Mr. Quinn for the chairmanship, and was seconded by Gary G. Oakley, Board Clerk. Fred Greifath read the minutes of last year's budget meeting, and they were adopted. R. P. Brewer, district treasurer, read of the financial report of a \$800 expenditure on adult education, and also clarified questions on teacher pension items.

Malcolm Brown offered a resolution that the order of business be decided upon at the outset of each budget hearing "to get away from the usual stereotyped formula. His motion was lost when nobody seconded it.

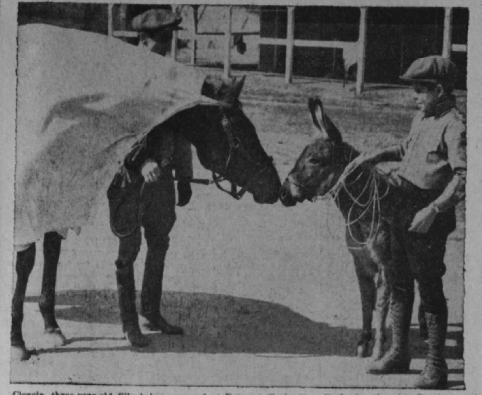

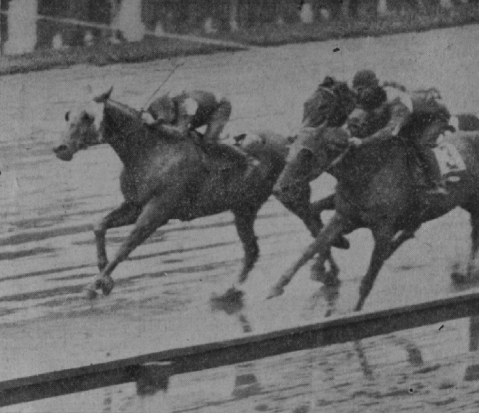

SCHOOL BUDGET WINS APPROVAL OF PTA GROUPS

Council Votes Full Cooperation To Local Board Of Education

MAPS CAMPAIGN PLANS

Association Seeks To Attract Crowd To Meeting Set For Tuesday

Approval of the Mamaroneck Board of Education's tentative budget for the coming year was voted in a resolution adopted last night by the Larchmont and Mamaroneck Parent-Teachers Association at a meeting in the Senior High School.

The Council representing the PTA group in all of the schools in the district, took the action after a discussion of the budget and a "question-and-answer" session, in which William B. Hamilton, president, and the Board of Education, presided.

The Council voted to "go on record" in support of the budget and to support the Board of Education in its campaign, and to urge the Board of Education to prepare and to thank Mr. Hamilton for coming to the meeting.

Members of the organization agreed to meet a campaign, Mr. Hamilton said, and to urge the Board of Education to "get as many people as possible" to attend the annual election to be held by the Board of Education at 8 P. M. next Tuesday in the Mamaroneck Senior High School, Palmer Avenue, and residents of the school district to go to the meeting.

The PTA meeting last night and the plans to get a crowd to the meeting Tuesday night, were prompted by the "economy program" proposed by the Larchmont and Mamaroneck League of Larchmont and Mamaroneck which would mean the dismissal of 47 teachers and larger classroom attendance in all of the schools.

Questions put by Mr. Hamilton last night revolved largely around the wisdom of the cut in salaries and what would result from the League's proposal.

The parents also asked many questions in regard to the procedure followed at the annual meeting.

The PTA Council's action is one of several taken by Larchmont and Mamaroneck groups on the heels of the League's proposal, and other economic cuts that are reflected in the budget of approximately \$142,000.

The Larchmont League of Women Voters and the Mamaroneck Parent-Teachers Association have adopted resolutions in support of the League's proposals.

A public gathering sponsored by the Larchmont Gardens Association also adopted a resolution, terminating the proposal "ill-considered" after hearing Mr. Hamilton give a detailed accounting of the budget.

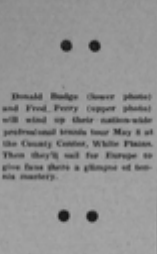
