ANGLERS HELPED BY SUPERVISORS

Board Unanimously Passes Bill To Appoint Study Group On Watershed Ban

Westchester anglers gained the support of the Board of Supervisors in their fight against the "emergency" ban on fishing and boating in the reservoirs of the New York City water supply area.

Acting under a resolution introduced by Bedford Supervisor Edward P. Barrett, and passed unanimously, Chairman Ralph McClelland has appointed a committee of nine watershed town supervisors to study the entire situation.

In his resolution, Mr. Barrett expressed his doubt as to whether an emergency actually exists and as to whether the law under which

business were revoked was complied with. "I want to give the supervisor credit for having the best intentions," he said, "but personally I don't think this emergency exists."

"For years it has been the desire of the authorities of the New York City to grab their rights and take away all they could get hold of from the citizens living near the watershed property."

The governor, he maintained, has been "kidded" into believing there is an emergency.
