The observation that "March sure was a rainy month" is borne out by precipitation figures kept by Henry T. Hochstetler, supervising chemist at the Larchmont reservoir.

A total of 7.28 inches of rain fell during the month just ended, and this record was surpassed, in fact, as Mr. Hochstetler was told only by March, 1916, when 7.70 inches fell, according to New York City weather bureau records.

The most for March is 7.13, thirteen days of the month brought rain to this vicinity, he added, and the heaviest rainfall was on March 21, when 2.09 inches came down.

Reservoirs are filled, the outlook "good" for ample water supplies for coming months, Mr. Hochstetler said.

Tax Lien Studied

Town Attorney John L. DeWitt last night was in the office of the Board to study a request by the Village of Mamaroneck in relation to a tax lien on J. DeLoe Place, the commercial building owned by the Colonial Rubber Company. Mr. DeWitt will report to the Board before it acts.

The Village asked approval by the Town of an affidavit made by Ethel Hirschman of 310 Riverside Drive, New York City, that she had had and therefore surrendered all her rights to a tax lien on the property in the sum of \$11,000 on May 23, 1934.

Consolidation Munn Brothers Co. advised that though a lien in that amount would require a security bond before the village could accept it, the Town, the property has already been disposed of through a lease-purchase transaction to which the Town Board is assented.

A Lot of Steel

Approximately 1000 tons of steel are contained in oldrolley tracks in this vicinity, Town Engineer A. J. Fode reported to the Town Board last night.

Mr. Fode was directed by the Board to investigate the possibility of salvaging the steel for the town's use. The question to be asked is whether the value of the steel offsets the cost of tearing up streets and repairing them.

Mr. Fode reported 1200 linear feet, single track on Palmer Avenue; 2300 feet of double track on Palmer Avenue; 1800 feet single track on Mamaroneck Avenue; 5000 feet double track on Mamaroneck Avenue; and 4500 feet of single track on Mamaroneck Avenue that is in County road.

Mr. Fode's survey did not include the tracks on Chatsworth road from Boston Post Road to Palmer Avenue, which Village Engineer Arthur Richards said today he could not estimate as to steel content.

A Works Projects Administration project may ultimately be worked up for the salvaging plant, the Board indicated last night.

JAPANESE BOMBERS ATTACKED PORT OF AKBAY

TELETYPE BUDGET INCREASES TAX RATE 82 CENTS

Drop in Valuation, And Defense Fund Blamed

DEBT DECLINES

A tentative budget setting a tax rate of \$17.62 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation, an increase of 82 cents, for the Village of Mamaroneck in 1942 has been filed by Treasurer-Clerk Frederick H. Bull, Jr., and will be submitted to the Board of Trustees tomorrow night.

Date for the annual public hearing will be set at the Board's organization meeting Monday.

The increase, marking the first time since 1934 that the rate in the Village has gone above 17, was attributed by Acting Village Manager Guy Yeoman, to a decrease in the assessed valuation of \$211,150. "The universal increase in price of all material and supplies," the addition of a civilian defense fund.

The tentative estimates were prepared by Mr. Yeoman and by Village Manager William H. Johnson, though the latter has been confined in a hospital recently and was unable today to comment on the budget.

An item of \$10,495 for civilian defense is in the budget for the coming year, as against nothing in the past year. Other funds were increased or changed as follows: general, \$71,154 to \$86,641; police, \$24,150 to \$23,750; fire, \$20,250 to \$20,050; utility, \$9,320 to \$9,180; light and power, \$21,070 to \$20,410; water fund, \$20,510 to \$20,210; changed, Health Center, \$5,372 to \$5,877; Park, \$11,124 to \$15,880; library, \$6,015 to \$43,225; library, \$19,520 to \$19,500, unchanged.

Municipal indebtedness dropped from \$410,730 to \$398,841, a reduction of \$11,767, which ordinarily would have a beneficial effect on the tax rate. Mr. Yeoman, in a prepared statement accompanying the budget, however, called attention to the inclusion of an increase of \$8,500 for a tax anticipation note payment.

The summary, in addition to those items listed above, also gave totals as \$20,262, as against \$21,711 last year. The gross budget, he reported, \$79,191, as against \$74,149 last year.

The tentative estimate anticipates a decrease of \$14,032 in the income and credits, for \$124,717 this year as against a total of \$138,749 last year.

With credits deducted, the estimated net for 1942 is \$82,142. (Continued on Page Eight)

RAF AGAIN RAIDS PARIS FOUNDRIES; 15 PLANES LOST

Hopes To Mobilize India's Forces Brighten Invasion Looms

Japanese sea-borne troops thronging closer to India were reported today to have landed at the chief West Burma port of Akyab, only 100 miles from the Burma-India Frontier, as prospects for mobilizing India's 390,000 men on the side of the United Nations look a sudden brightening turn.

A Chinese spokesman in Chungking said the Japanese landed at Akyab under the protective cover of a force of cruisers and destroyers.

The port is only 200 miles across the upper Bay of Bengal from Calcutta.

Meantime, dispatches from Australia indicated that Japan's invasion forces in the Southwest Pacific have been steadily attempting overland drive in New Guinea, were preparing to launch a surprise assault on New Britain, and were being constantly attacked at Lae and Salamaua by the United States.

Lae and Salamaua lie on the northeast coast of New Guinea, less than 900 miles above Port Moresby.

The Sun's correspondent at United Nations Headquarters said eight Japanese divisions—between 120,000 and 200,000 troops—were massed in Java and Sumatra, and were being alerted for Japan's next major offensive.

It was reported that the army is to include large numbers of parachute troops.

A newspaper also reported that the Japanese were receiving "concrete" aerial reinforcements, threatening to challenge the United States and Australia forces in the battle for the approaches to Australia.

A British broadcast said American and Australian flyers had destroyed or crippled 96 Japanese planes with a loss of only 12 of their own since March 10.

Wary of the air ill-fated fighter defenses, Japanese planes made their first night attack on Darwin, Australia's north coast port, last night, after suffering heavy losses in previous daylight raids in the Philippine Islands. A War Department bulletin reported sharp attacks on Bataan Peninsula in the wake of yesterday's big-scale assault, in which Japanese troops captured some American Philippine positions but failed to reach the main defense lines.

The War Department said enemy artillery and gunners attacked Litoia, Gen. Jonathan M. Wainwright's Bataan positions, and Japanese planes continued their round-the-clock assaults on Fortresses in Manila Bay. However, the Japanese were forced to fly at such high altitudes that their bombing was ineffective.

On the British Burma front, the Indian headquarters reported no substantial change in the situation, indicating that the Japanese had advanced only marginally in their two-pronged drive from the Burma oil fields. A day and night in India, British's special envoy Sir Stafford Cripps revived hopes for a settlement of the all important question of the administration group for the Indo-Pakistan region. NEW YORK (AP)—Phillip Wenz, 67, of 163 North Avenue, fell to his death, according to West 2nd Street station police, from a fourth floor fire escape into a rear courtyard about 10 A. M. today.

He was dead when an ambulance attendant from St. Vincent's Hospital arrived.

Detectives said Wenz, an old age pensioner, had lived in the neighborhood for 30 years and confided recently to acquaintances that he was not feeling well. He occupied a second floor apartment in the building and the title of his body as it struck the courtyard attracted neighbors who called police. Detectives said they found a letter in his effects addressed to a nephew, Daniel Wenz, of 629 Hillside Avenue, Mamaroneck.

DEFENSE WORK HANDICAPPED BY LACK OF FUNDS

Town Council To Carry On Despite Tangle Over Financial Assistance

BULLETIN

A bill extending the life of defense councils was signed on Tuesday by Governor Lehman. Supervisor Bert C. McCulloch was informed today, that the measure was still a "temporary thing" and "in no way solved the problem we face," Supervisor McCulloch commented.

Despite the fact that legislation creating local defense councils expired Tuesday night and the Legislature failed to adopt a measure extending the life of such organizations, civilian protection activities will continue "legal or not," the Town of Mamaroneck Board decided last night.

The Legislature has now gone into its Easter vacation—but without adopting a bill which would have extended defense councils for 30 days. This bill has been proposed to give the legislators time to work out an act to govern civilian protection for the duration of the war.

"I suppose you gentlemen are aware that I am here tonight representing a body which no longer has any legal standing," Henry T. Monda, chairman of the Defense Council of the Unincorporated Section of the Town, said in opening the discussion at last night's council meeting.

"The council has no more legal authority than a group of men standing around on a street corner," Councilman Munda stressed. "I think, however, that if we have to operate illegally, we'll do it."

Mr. Monda went on to explain in two lifelines and were brought here March 31.

Motor Tanker Sunk Off Atlantic Coast

GLoucester, N. J., (AP)—Dartmouth College today reported from an enemy submarine that 15 RAF bombers were missing from far ranging raids that reached into West and Northwest Germany as well as into the Paris region.

The British Air Ministry said the heaviest blows were rained on the Meuse valley of Poland eight miles west of Paris, which had been rolling out 20 tanks ready for the German war machine.

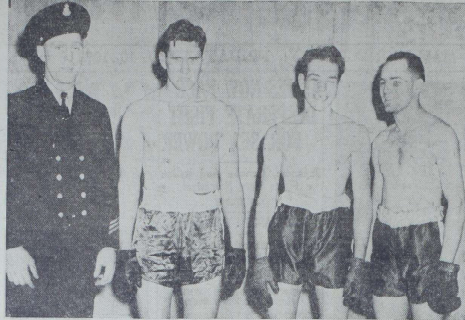
Recreation Route Dispensers As Won Registers 532; DeCocco Wins 220

FOR OUR OWN GOOD

As might have been expected, complaints have arisen regarding the inconveniences and annoyances caused by blackout tests in Westchester.

Business men, particularly in the amusement and theatrical fields, have complained that their revenues are affected, not only on the night of the blackout test but on preceding nights when persons were unwilling to leave their homes for fear the blackout might find them away, some have complained because they must turn out their lights when leaving home, on the chance the blackout might come before they return; parents have complained because they have been out when the test came and could not return to their children at home.

These are, of course, annoyances, and it is quite likely they will become worse. But there should be a broader understanding of the principles involved. The defense workers are not holding these tests for their own amusement, they are, instead, endeavoring insofar as possible, to simulate conditions which will exist when the actual enemy raiders come, in order that each of us may be prepared to protect ourselves and our families and our homes. That is the sworn obligation of the defense leaders and they will be remiss should they fail to take such precautions.

Then, let all try to understand this design and let cooperation instead of complaint be the distinctive reaction. It's for our own welfare that these tests are being held; in time to come we will be grateful that we have had the opportunity for the schooling.

Pearl Harbor didn't have that opportunity!

DEFENSE COST HEARING

The Village of Mamaroneck is proposing that the sum of \$10,495 be set up for a civilian defense fund in the 1942-43 budget. The Daily Times has already questioned if that amount is not out of proportion to the amounts being appropriated in other communities. It is when we compare it with the appropriations of the Town of Mamaroneck and the Village of Larchmont. What other places are doing we do not know and, perhaps, we are out of order raising the question.

This \$10,495 does seem like a lot of money, however, and we have heard a great many express the opinion that it is excessive. Public opinion has been freely expressed on the matter and this has probably prompted the Village Board of Trustees to take a wise course of action. They are to hold a public hearing of their own on the matter, prior to the regular budget hearing. The defense workers and all who are interested are invited to meet with the Board for an intelligent discussion of the subject. The meeting will be held on April 15 in Bellows High School.

Trustee Howard S. Meighan suggested this hearing and expressed the opinion that further thought should be given to this appropriation. He called attention to the fact that the Board has no actual past experience to guide it in estimating costs of defense and he stated that he believed the Board should consult public opinion on what has already been spent and on what it is proposed to spend.

All that Trustee Meighan has to say is directly to the point. We want to be well taken care of in case of air-raids whether it costs \$10,000 or \$20,000 but we want to make sure that our dollars are being spent where they will do the most good and that no more of them than are necessary shall be spent. Taxpayers should come out to the Board hearing as well as in the budget hearing which will come later.

ROOM FOR THE TWO-WHEELER

It has always been wise for the careful rider to be on the alert for bicyclists, particularly children riding to and from school. But now that need for courtesy and carefulness by the motorist on behalf of the two-wheeler becomes more acute, since there are so many more of the cyclists.

Let it be noted, too, that many of these operators of the self-propelled means of transportation are just youngsters. They are not yet certain of the rules of the road nor of their own skill. They are likely to wobble around a bit, sometimes on their own side of the road and sometimes not.

"Am I A Citizen?" Will you please give me some information regarding citizenship. I was born in Kingston, Ontario, Canada, but my father was born in New York State and I have lived here most of my life. Am I a citizen? If not, what should I do to become one?

If your father retained his American citizenship, and if you have resided in the United States since infancy, you may claim to be an American citizen at birth. You can establish your citizenship in many ways, but you must be at least 18 years of age and your own birth certificate.

Legal Name My father has a citizen paper since 1890 and I have been out-lying under his paper for the last 40 years. It appears that when I went to school my name was spelled wrong with a mistake of two letters. I always kept the new name instead of my father's. Even my children were baptized under the new name. I gave my children what it makes any difference or what I should do.

J. R. It was your father, not his, who gave you the name. You can establish yourself as his citizen by naturalization. It might be wise to consult an attorney about having your name legally changed. There would be an official record identifying you with both names.

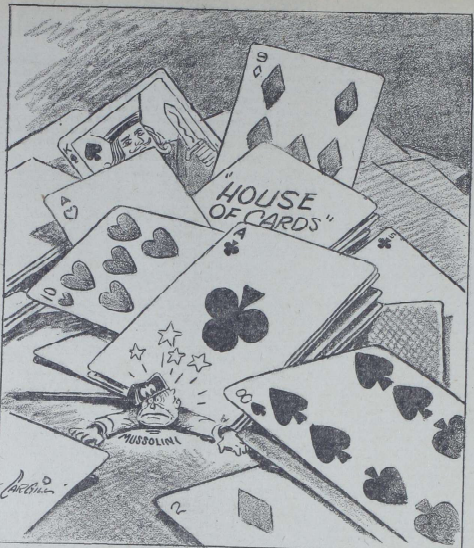

NEWS BEHIND THE NEWS

WASHINGTON—This 4 percent war profits limitation legislation cropped out of the Senate into the administration some days back, and since then the House has been passing it around like an incendiary bomb, looking for a passably suitable place to throw it. That this administration wants anyone to make more than 4 percent, but everyone knows the initially proposed method was not just profitable. The administration wants to get it excess profits in another more effective way, through taxes.

The proposed 4 percent limitation, for one thing would fall before taxes were paid by manufacturers and hence would leave manufacturers considerably less than 4 percent. For another thing it would apply on each contract, so a manufacturer handling swiftly-produced articles could make 4 percent profit three or four times in a year while a manufacturer working on a more slowly produced article would receive only one 4 percent profit for the year. The idea came out of the sky on Saturday afternoon in the House about 5:30 P. M. when no one was looking. Most of the members had gone home for the day.

The proposition was offered by Rep. Francis Case, Republican, of South Dakota.

Under the rule, the Thomas Amendment would have limited the final form of the bill to some workable arithmetical limitation and by the administration practice of escape to be taken by all from an embarking political profession. But this still left the final outcome of the matter in conflict with the House and Senate. 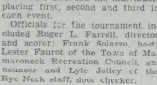

PRODUCTION ISN'T ENOUGH

British Labor Minister Ernest Bevin announced last weekend that British manufacture of airplanes has already reached parity with that of Germany and added that American airplane production will within six weeks be equal to that of Germany, Italy and Japan combined.

That is wonderful news. Particularly when this modern warfare has shown that without control of the air no military offensive may be conducted. At Pearl Harbor, at Rangoon, at Hong Kong, at Singapore, just as it was at Dunkirk and for a time over London and in front of Moscow, it was the enemy with superior air power who held the balance of power. Within months and perhaps even within weeks, as it is now indicated in the areas around Australia, that condition of superior enemy air power may change.

But this production of airplanes in England and in the United States isn't itself enough. Those airplanes must be transported to the battle line. And that means shipping. When they get there those airplanes must be in ready sufficient numbers to take and hold command of the air. That means training by hundreds of thousands. So, what the united nations need most are not only airplanes at the end of the assembly line but ships and seamen, fighting pilots and ground forces. After these combat units have achieved their goals the armies can advance with smaller casualties. And it is that protection which America wants for its men before the spearhead of the second A. E. F. moves forward.

SOUND FAMILIES—STRONG NATION

Declaring their own open warfare against ill health, against sickly babyhood and childhood, against neglect of adolescent youth, against breaking up of families under exceptional conditions, the New York Catholic Charities, with more than 200 cooperating agencies of welfare serving New York City and seven adjacent counties appeal for the next 10 days for your help.

Within this benighted area Catholic Charities operate 15 general and 12 special hospitals, 35 health institutions, such as convalescent homes and out-patient departments, 65 agencies for family, 67 child welfare institutions, and 31 agencies for the athletic, cultural, social and spiritual programs needed by youth.

Now, more than ever, problems confront this organization of proven value to the metropolitan area, including Westchester. War tensions have reached into almost every family; there are vacant places at almost every table; rising living costs threaten increasing numbers on marginal subsistence levels. And all of this vitally affects the backbone of the country—the family.

And the family, let it be noted, must be sound if the nation remains so; a country is only as strong as are its families. When families break up on a large scale, when parental control is removed, when a mother's tender care is missing, the very structure of the state itself is threatened. And that is why this year more than ever, Catholic Charities is needed and that is why your help must come.

It is today's children who will make tomorrow's history, so, as we plan for the peace that is to come, let us first be sure that we will have strong, healthy, intelligent, conscientiously trained citizens of the next generation to enforce that peace and to prevent a repetition of what the world faces today.

The orphaned, the abandoned, the handicapped, the homeless—these are the little ones who must be cared for; and in addition there are the elderly, the maimed and the sick, who must be sheltered even when war's demands are most rigorous. And, to a degree, we are helping fight the war when we make our citizenry strong.

"It is this nation that is physically tough," said Surgeon General Parran recently, "we can leave our planes unbuilt and our battleships on paper. We shall not be able to use them."

Let us at home, then, help those in the front line by caring for the families left behind; let us assure them repose of spirit in the knowledge their loved ones are under solicitous watch; let us keep America sound by perpetuating strong families.

To do that, help when you are called upon by giving liberally, generously and gladly. If it is, in actuality, an investment in the America for which men cross the ocean are today laying down their very lives. Can we, then, conscientiously, hold back our dollars?

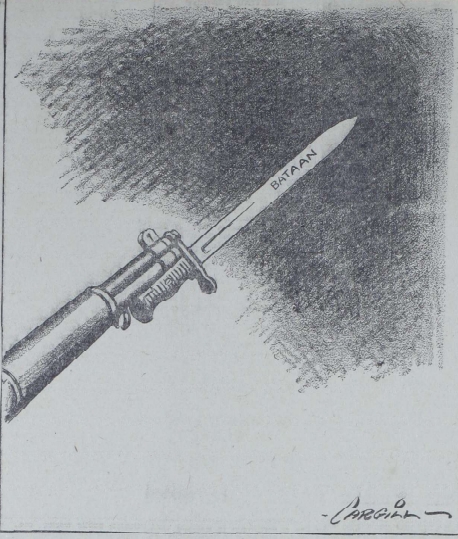

NEWS BEHIND THE NEWS

By PAUL MALLON

WASHINGTON. A certain amount of gloom within the Nazi military is now visible to the eye.

Gen. Rommel's drive in Libya, which was expected to be a decisive stroke of the next war machine, was still sticking at its old-time pace. His operations were not well concealed and lagged behind former Hitler tempo.

Now he has only about six weeks left before sweltering desert heat begins to take its toll on the British and the forces of the Near East.

The Russian war have picked up some German prisoners with more than five or six weeks' training. It is harder to send men with no more experience into battle even to fill out depleted units, as is apparently being done.

Centralia, the German general staff would not be using them anywhere if manpower was not a pressing problem.

These are the best trained German troops—specialized shock troops, paratroopers, mountain troops, the tower of the German army in Berlin, and the most feared.

They cannot be replaced. They were especially selected for their superior talents and physical stamina.

How far the Germans have been pitched is attested by the fact that they are filling up their lines on the South Russian front with Balkan soldiers.

Several of their mechanized units have been reorganized into infantry and become equipment, which the government would fix production lines, rather than raw materials.

Rye Neck School Board Proposes 87-Cent Boost In Tax Rate For 1942

An increase of 87 cents in the tax rate of Union Free School District No. 1, Town of Rye, bounding off from \$3.84 to \$4.71 per \$100 of assessed valuation, was proposed today by the Rye Neck Board of Education.

The tentative estimates, as announced by James Jackson, president of the board, set a net loss of \$19,150, an increase of \$17,438 over the net of \$17,672 for 1941-42. The budget will be given a public hearing at 8 P. M., May 5, at the P. E. Bellows High School.

Main reason for the increase, Mr. Jackson explained, is a drop of about \$4,000 in anticipated credits plus rising costs in the several funds being included in the new year.

France Now Verges On Open Break With U. S.

CRISIS NEARING

BULLETIN WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States has held up shipments of non-military supplies to French North Africa, pending clarification of the situation in Vichy.

Relations Between Pro-Nazi France and the United States verged on an open break today, and France's new role in the war assumed grave importance on the basis of German reports that the French Army would be reorganized.

Advice reaching London, quoted well-informed Berlin circles as saying that Gen. Henri Dentz, former French commander in Syria, would shortly receive one of the highest posts in the French Army and would reorganize the army and the general staff in line with the "new policy of France."

Other major developments in the European War theater included: Russian Front—Soviet dispatches said that German troops had been sent through German front-line defenses pending German Army High Command's decision to order the withdrawal of White Russia, and were now bordering Vitebsk in the second line.

British news said that the Moscow news said that the Luftwaffe had shot down 22,000 planes and several times that many wounded troops. It said that the Germans had lost 400 planes in the first six days of April against 80 Soviet planes.

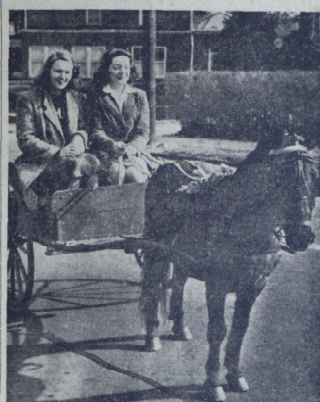
