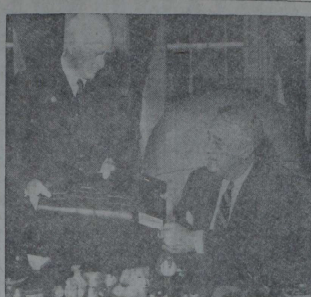

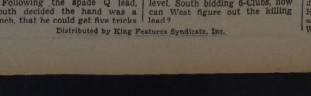

The most significant mound show was given the largest crowd, 27,700 at Crosley Field in Cincinnati, where Lefty Johnson of the Indians pitched a 11-inning game for the Reds.

At St. Louis, Lefty Al Hollingsworth pitched a small turnout of 10,000 fans at Wrigley Field, Chicago, restricted to 10,000 fans, but he pitched a 3-0 triumph over the Chicago White Sox on four hits. The Browns, who bled eight hits, but were held to one run by bespectacled Bill Dickey of the Sox, who threw the clinching victory with another shutout.
