

OLD CHURCH PLANS FOR ANNIVERSARY

Union of Colonial Parish With Diocese Will Be Celebrated May 30

SOMERSET, May 20.—The 150th anniversary of the union of the Old Colonial Parish of St. James, with the Diocese of New York will be celebrated on Sunday, May 30 at 11 o'clock. The Rev. William T. Manning, D. D., Bishop of New York, will preach the anniversary sermon and bless the congregation.

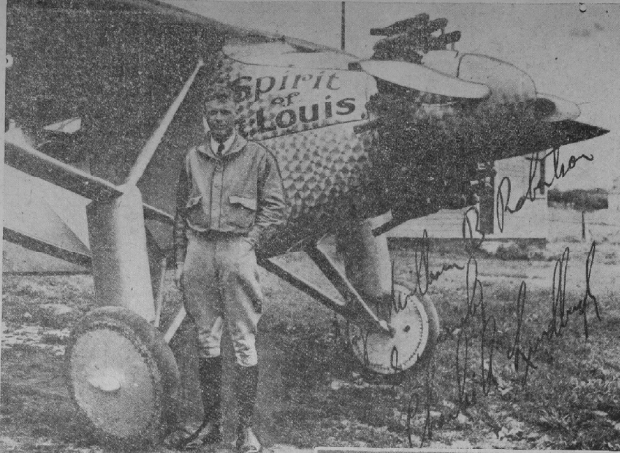
When the Diocese of New York was established in 1784, the old Colonial Church of Saint James had been holding services for worship.

From 1784 to 1787, intermittent ministrations and occasional services were the foundations for the first church building which was opened in 1788.

The first pastor of the church was the Rev. David Perry, who took charge of the parish in 1783.

The present rectory is the Rev. Robert N. Turner, minister, who is Saint Luke's Church here.

How he managed it only Slim knows," says the Major. "But he landed right side up. Now most men would have been pretty badly shaken up. Not Slim—he made a joke of it. When he came to my office he was holding his left arm as though he was holding his left arm."

The Major can remember other incidents, many of them—Lindbergh's second jump and the explanation he wrote, so good an example of English knock-out.

There were the many times that in the course of flying the mail Slim had to make forced landings, break the ice from wings and struts with a broom handle and take off again.

How he came flew his mother down from Chicago (with Major Robertson's permission), she got to sit on the mail sacks. How on his (that) jump, he put the ship down in his pocket when others would have known it was in the first tense moments of descent.

Then came the day when Slim came to fly to Major Robertson's office and announced he would like to fly the Atlantic. All his employer could say was, "Have you been here?"

BALKS AT WIFE'S ANNULMENT SUIT

Husband Seeks To Prove Wife Was Sober When He Married Her

WHITE PLAINS, May 21.—Major Frank Brandstetter, 26, assistant manager of the Johnson & Johnson Co. in West Orange, N. J., will file an opportunity to annul his marriage to his wife, Suzanne Sheets of Montclair, N. J., 18-year-old daughter of a vice president of Sweeney Vacuum Oil Corporation, was not interested or mentally incompetent when she married him at 2 A. M. on Jan. 9 at Poundridge.

Supreme Court Justice Raymond E. Aldrich has reopened the wife's annulment suit, which Brandstetter failed to quash when it was tried here in February. The interdict, said he moved his wife and Brandstetter on Feb. 27 would have become final next week.

Justice Aldrich, after taking testimony from both sides, Brandstetter had not intended to interpose a defense but that it also appeared obvious he had changed his mind. The court observed there must be an acquiescence by the wife to the given condition of the flight of the airplane, following a whitewash conspiracy.

Brandstetter, requesting a new trial, said he believed his wife and he had intended to interpose a defense. He moved his wife and Brandstetter on Feb. 27 would have become final next week.

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N. Y. Hospitals Face Shortage Of Nurses

NEW YORK, May 21 (AP)—New York City's municipal and voluntary hospitals face serious shortage of nurses, in the opinion of Dr. S. S. Goldwater, Commissioner of Hospitals.

Despite the addition of 1,200 nurses during the last three years, there still are vacancies, Dr. Goldwater said, and there will be many more when the graduates, pending the five-day pay law in effect for nurses July 1, are required by law.

The Lindbergh home with its child memories of tragedy and frustration, hope was abandoned. "About four years ago," the Major continued, "the home was turned over to a corporation by the Lindberghs for use as a child health center in memory of their first-born."

Meanwhile their second son, Jon, was born. But in order to free the marriage and joint-children of another tragedy, Lindy and Anne moved to England.

Sir Alexander acquired the bone at Ghiza, Egypt. It was supposed to have come from the spine of a pharaoh who died 5,000 years ago. It was placed in a case in the library of Sir Alexander's home.

Three years ago, it was reported for phossomania—strange chattering of glass, illness and mysterious fire—which caused those at the house to believe it bore a curse.

Grassy Sprain Club Acts To Reorganize

NEW YORK, May 21.—A plan for the reorganization of the Grassy Sprain Golf Club, Inc., of Yonkers, has been submitted in the U. S. District Court here by co-managers by Federal Judge Vincent L. Leibel.

The principal feature of the plan is a provision for a new first mortgage of \$100,000, the proceeds of which was to be used to liquidate tax claims of the City of Yonkers totaling with interest and penalties, \$88,577.92. Holders of \$300,000 in first mortgage bonds are asked to subordinate their interest to the new mortgage, secured by new securities at lower interest, and waive all claims for past due interest.
