\$845 Goin' Begging
The Union Savings Bank of Mamaroneck is looking for the holders of \$845.00 worth of school savings stamps purchased prior to 1937 when the savings stamp machines were in operation, so that the stamps may be redeemed for their cash value. The system was installed in 1922 when children were encouraged to buy stamps of 25, 10 or 1 cent denominations by depositing the money in stamp machines placed at the Central, Chautauque, Avenue, Murray Avenue, Mamaroneck Avenue and Harry Avenue Schools. The stamps were purchased by means supplied by the bank and when the folds were filled, the stamps were deposited by the child in a regular account. When the system was abolished, an attempt was made to have all stamps presented for redemption but the amount still outstanding has never been called for.

According to a statement issued by the bank today, the money must be turned over to the State if an account is inactive for more than 20 years and the institution is therefore making an effort to locate the "forgotten owners" of the stamp saving money.

GERMANS RUSH SPECIAL INTO ODessa WITH ORIFERS

NO HOLY PORT AT ANY COST

Germany Battle From Favorable Positions

MOSCOW, (AP)—The Germans have rushed special units into Odessa to defend Odessa at "any cost" and are battling on the close approaches to that Black Sea port from favorable positions behind the many layers of the city's defenses and escape lines of communications.

While the Germans struck out in strong counterattacks from the beleaguered base, Russian Storm-division and bombers pounded at the city's defenses and escape lines of communications.

For the fourth straight day, the Moscow communication made no mention of the progress of Marshal Ivan Stepanov's 10th Army protecting the stronghold, Red Star dispatches reported today.

The Russian Army supreme command announcement broadcast by Berlin said:

"The German Crimea steamy divisions attacked north of Kerch and were repulsed by German and Russian troops. These were special events on the Black Sea front and central Caucasus. In a fresh counter-attack made by German and Russian troops, the German offensive was repulsed. The Russian Air Force captured more than half of the area within the city. Special fighting has been reported since Monday.

Attempts to lift the siege yesterday were repulsed with heavy losses, the communication announced, but that fierce fighting is continuing.

Zhukov's troops were reported to have captured a large amount of equipment and supplies, including the fortified town of Skala itself.

Yank Bombers Blast Airfield In Balkans
ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, NAPLES (AP)—Yank bombers of the U. S. 15th Air Force again attacked a Balkan target yesterday, hammering this time at a German airfield in the coastal capital of Zagreb, as ground action on the Italian front continued at a virtual standstill.

Zagreb was vigorously defended by enemy aircraft, many of which were shot down and 23 of our heavy bombers were lost.

In all operations yesterday, 28 enemy aircraft were reported destroyed and the damage to the airfield was reported to be heavy.

New Pacific Blood Due, King Says

Navy Commander Avers Enemy's Navy Can Never Make Up Losses

600 SHIPS BLASTED

WASHINGTON, (AP)—"Japan's war fleet is already damaged so that she can never hope to make up losses and heavy new blows at it may be expected in the next few months," Admiral Ernest J. King, Navy commander in chief, declared today.

"We are seeking opportunities to strike whenever we can get within range of their warships or bases," he said, "and I think you will find within the next few months to come, that we shall achieve our purpose."

"We have reduced Japan's merchant fleet to less than two-thirds of what it was when we were attacked. We have sunk and damaged her warships and we have seriously damaged her fleet of warships that she has never been able to make up. To date, we have sunk, probably more than 600 Japanese merchant ships and destroyed more than 600 Japanese warships."

"She cannot stand such a rate of loss for any length of time and we are going to keep it up," he said.

Disillusion of the Japanese Empire, he said, is the greatest cause of the Federal Reserve Bank's policy of making the minimum requirement for victory in the Pacific.

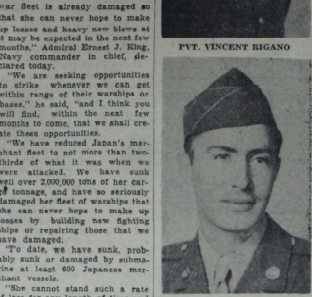

Deadly Fighters Take Over Aerial Offensive

WAVES OF BOMBERS HITTING GERMAN STATIONS TRACED THE REMAINING FIGHTERS PROGRESS INTO NORTHWEST, NORTH AND CENTRAL GERMANY.

LONDON, (AP)—Strong formations of deadly Allied fighters fanned out over Germany today, the Berlin radio said, taking over the pre-invasion offensive from heavy bomber fleets which had closed out a week of shattering air and Hitler's air arm and transport.

Waves of bombers hitting German stations traced the remaining fighters' progress into Northwest, North and Central Germany. Formations probably were made up of American Mustangs and Thunderbolts, often employed in spectacular attacks on American Lightnings and British Mustangs and Typhoons.

These swift fighters, although carrying a relatively minor sting of incendiary bombs, were used to harass and disrupt the enemy's air traffic, destroy a full score of the American planes was shot.

First reports from German sources indicated that the Allies had been refusing to Allied coalition to come up and fight.

There were no signs of a major offensive, however, apparently the second day American Flying Fortress and Liberator have returned to Germany, and the Allies are expected to take the offensive again in the next few days.
