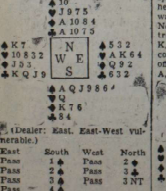

One of the reasons why I am always urging boys and girls not to rush into premature marriage is because when they do they cut themselves out of the flow of life, and it seems a law of nature that something will go wrong with them. It is not that I think it early we are apt to take ill, which brings on disastrous results. For things we do do in our early years, and our teens are tragedies when we do them at middle age.

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### Larchmont Marine Reports Two Cemetery Dedication

Two William E. Walsh, serving on two Almas with the Fifth Amphibious Corps of the Fifth Marine Division, has forwarded to his parents, Mrs. and Miss William V. Walsh of 78 North Chatsworth Avenue, Larchmont, the

memorial address given by the Marine Chaplain at the dedication of the Marine Cemetery on two last month.

On Tuesday, April 23, Mrs. Walsh entered the Marine Corps with her son, following his graduation from Xavier High School in New York. He received a commission as a private and was trained further at New River, N. C., and San Diego, Calif.

The dedication sermon follows: "This is perhaps the grimmest, and surely the holiest task we have faced since D-day. Here before us lie the bodies of comrades and friends. Men who until yesterday or last week laughed with us, joked with us, trained with us. Men who were on the same ships with us, and went over the sides with us as we prepared to hit the beaches of this island. Men who fought with us and feared with us. Somewhere in this plot of ground there may lie the man who could have discovered the cure for cancer. Under one of these Christian crosses, or beneath a Jewish Star of David, there may rest now a man who has a mission to be a great poet, — to find the way, perhaps, for all to live in plenty, with peace and hard labor for their reward, and we gather to consecrate this earth in their memory.

"It is not easy to do so. Some of us have buried our closest friends here. We saw these men killed before very close. Any one of us might have died in their place. Indeed, some of us are alive and breathing at this very moment only because men who lie here beneath the crosses and stars and strength to give their lives for ours. To speak in memory of such men as these is not easy. Of them too can it be said with bitter truth: 'The world will little note nor long remember what we say here. It can never forget what they did here.'

"No, our poor power of speech can add nothing to what these men and the best of our Division who are not here have already done. All that we can hope to do is follow their example. To show the same selfless courage in what they did here. To swear that by the grace of God and the stubborn strength and power of human will, their sons and ours shall never suffer these pains again. These men have done their jobs well. They have paid the ghastly price of freedom. If that freedom be once again lost, as it was after the last war, the unforgettable blame will be ours, not theirs. So it is we the living who here have to be dedicated and consecrated.

"We dedicate ourselves, first, to live together in peace the way they thought and are buried in this way. Here lie the men who loved America because their ancestors generations ago helped in her founding, and other men who loved her with equal passion because they themselves or their own fathers escaped from oppression to her blessed shores. Here lie officers and men, negroes and whites, rich men and poor—together. Here the Protestant, Catholics and Jews — together. Here no man profess another because of his faith or despise him because of his color. Here there are no quotas of how many from each group are admitted or allowed. Among these men there is no discrimination, no prejudice. No hatred. There is the highest and purest democracy. Any man among us the living, who fails to understand that will thereby betray those who lie here. Whichever of us lives here

hand in hate against a brother, or thinks himself superior to those who happen to be in the minority, makes his presence here a mockery of the bloody sacrifice it commemorates, an empty, hollow mockery. To this, then, as our solemn, sacred duty, do we the living now dedicate ourselves—to the fight of Protestants, Catholics and Jews, of white men and negroes alike, to enjoy the democracy for which all of them have here paid the price.

"To one thing more do we consecrate ourselves in memory of those who sleep beneath these crosses and stars. We shall not feebly suppose, as did the last generation of America's fighting men, that victory on the battlefield will automatically guarantee the triumph of democracy at home. This war, with all its frightful heartache and suffering, is but the beginning of our generation's struggle for democracy. When the last battle has been won, there will be those at home, as there were last time, who will want us to turn our backs in selfish isolation on the rest of organized humanity, and thus to sabotage the very peace for which we fight. We promise you who lie here: we will not do that! We promise you, our departed comrades: This too we will not permit. This war has been fought by the common man; its fruits of peace must be enjoyed by the common man. We promise, by all that is sacred and holy, that your sons, the sons of miners and millers, the sons of farmers and workers, will inherit from your death the right to a living that is decent and secure.

"When the final cross has been placed in the last cemetery, once again there will be those to whom profit is more important than peace, who will insist with the voice of sweet reasonableness and equanimity that it is better to trade with the enemies of mankind than, by crushing them, to wear their profits. To you who sleep here silently, we give our promise: We will not listen! We will not forget that some of you were buried with oil that came from American wells, that many of you were killed by shells fashioned from American steel. We promise that when once again men seek profit at your expense, we shall remember how you looked upon this war, how you fought it, lovingly, in the ground. —Thus do we memorialize those who have ceased living with us, now live within us. Thus do we consecrate ourselves the living to carry on the struggle they began. Too much blood has gone into

suffering and sorrow of those who mourn this will come—where? —the birth of a new freedom.

According to notification from Geneva to national headquarters of the American Red Cross dated April 12, motor truck convoys carrying emergency Red Cross food supplies started a daily service from Switzerland to prisoner of war camps in Germany. American Red Cross representative, Francis James said that there are now 296 trucks available in Switzerland for this supply work, contributed by American and Allied Red Cross Societies, by CHALET, and by the French Government. While trucks have been operating on irregular schedules, this is the first time that daily service has been attempted. Each day ten to twelve trucks will leave the Swiss border, bound for distribution centers. Trucks provided by France will be used for prisoners in concentration camps as well as for prisoners of war. 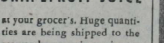

## Crusade Fund Goal Exceeded By Methodists

Methodists of the nation have oversubscribed their \$25,000,000 goal for postwar relief and reconstruction by raising \$28,040,040.749, Bishop J. Ralph Magee, national director of the Crusade for Christ, has announced from the headquarters office in Chicago. Of that amount, the members of the Mamaroneck Methodist Church have subscribed \$2,826.85, over-subscribing their particular goal of \$2,044 by nearly \$800. With the first third of the payment period only partly passed, more than half the amount, or \$1,497,35, has already been paid. It was announced today by the Rev. Asbury C. E. Stromberg, pastor.

Of the national total, compiled from reports made by the church's 563 diocesan superintendents, more than \$11,000,000 has been paid in cash, with the balance in pledges payable during the next 12 months. Solicitation for the national goal was climaxed in many of Methodism's 41,000 churches on March 4 while in other churches Easter was observed as the close of the fund appeal.

This sum, which is to be used in the work of Jesus Christ, will be expended in feeding the hungry, clothing the naked and freeing the minds and spirits of the ignorant, the underprivileged, the driven and the dispossessed in more than 80 countries in all parts of the world. Bishop Magee declared. The \$25,000,000 is one step, and only one goal of the Crusade. Above all the Crusade for Christ will present to millions, suffering and truly lost, Christ—a Redeemer, now present spiritually in His war-torn world.

Approved by the church's General Conference in its quadrennial meeting in Kansas City, Mo., May, 1944, the five-point Crusade program also provides for contin-

## German Prisoners To Get New Diet

NEW YORK, (AP).—A new diet, eliminating most fresh meats, canned fruits and vegetables and butter, has been put into effect for the 13,000 German prisoners of war in the Second Service Command, Army of officials said.

The new menu instituted April 2 in the Command's five base camps, calls for greater emphasis on fatback, sausage, cabbage, carrots and beans. Col. Clinton J. Harold, director of supply for the Second Service Command, said at a press conference the move was made "not on a retaliatory basis but in keeping with our critical food situation."

He said the diet was drawn up at least six weeks before stories of Nazi treatment of Allied prisoners were published here. Fatback, the upper half of a piece of pork is used in soups. The rarer, boneless and other dishes and will appear 26 out of the 30 days included in the monthly rotational menu.

The new menu limits fresh meat in the diet to German POW's to hearts, liver and kidney. Liver appears on five occasions, hearts on three and fish on three. The rarer permits no butter and calls for oleomargarin for one meal a day. Jams and jellies have been eliminated. Recipes direct that corn syrup, if available, be substituted for sugar.

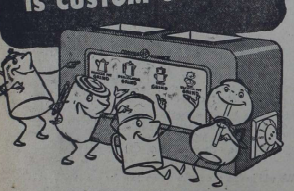

### Expert Help For Your 1945 Gardening

### Planting With Care Gives Continuous Supply Of Commoner Vegetables Without Any Waste

By H. H. DEALE  
Byoy Thompson Institute  
Many Victory Gardeners would like a reasonably continuous supply of some of the commoner vegetables, but this is not possible unless the garden is planted in a way that will supply it. It is not practical to grow a crop of vegetables in one time, and it is often necessary to have a continuous supply of a vegetable for a long period of time.



However, it cannot be too often repeated that a crop need not be wasted, no matter how large, if any surplus above the amount used for the table is suitable for canning or preserving for later use. It is a great objection to very large crops ready at one time, that too frequently, waste occurs, particularly with those vegetables that cannot be processed.

In a small garden, sprouting broccoli and cabbage mature too rapidly in hot weather to make it worthwhile to attempt their production in the summer. It is definitely a Spring and Fall crop, and a sowing of lettuce or of romaine, and one small planting of head lettuce with the picnic with a nature hike and fulfilled two requirements for meals.

**German Armies Eliminated, Says Gen. Clark**  
NEW YORK—Marshal Tito's Yugoslav Army has captured Trieste, Abate, American Fifth Army entered Turin today in a broadcast.

**ROME (AP)—**Gen. Mark Clark, 15th Army Group Commander, today announced the virtual end of the long and bloody campaign in Italy.

Declaring that the German Armies had been virtually eliminated as a military force, he said that 23 enemy divisions have been torn to pieces in the 22-day offensive in the Po Valley and British Eighth Army. More than 120,000 prisoners have been taken.

He said the Germans "can no longer effectively resist our armies, but added that scattered fighting may continue.

Three of Italy's greatest cities, Milan, Venice and Genoa, were Allied hands today as the American Fifth and British Eighth Armies smashed ahead on several fronts in a continue run of the north.

The Fifth seized Milan, where the bodies of the executed Benito Mussolini and El Fucisti comrades lay, while other American troops pushed through the Po Valley to the important port of Genoa.

A Belgrade broadcast today declared that Yugoslav partisan troops had entered the Italian port of Trieste, less than 75 miles from the British Eighth Army's last reported positions along the Piave River.

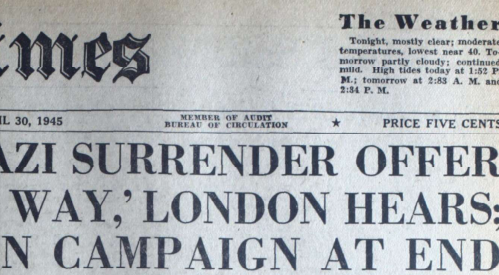

### Munich Falling To 7th Army As Linz Is Periled

PARIS, (AP)—The American Ninth Army established another contact with the Russians three miles west of Wittenburg today, creating a small new untenable German pocket between their diminishing northern and southern redoubts.

A hard battle was in progress in the south for Munich, birthplace of the Nazi party and largest German city yet entered by the Americans.

The new junction was east of Dessau at Apollendorf, 51 miles northwest of Reisa in the Dresden-Lipzig area where the Russians and American First Army first met and cut German lines to the seventh Army and the Germans fled by other routes by the meeting.

Munich was falling today to the Seventh Army and the Germans said Gen. Patton's Third Army and the Russians were approaching the Austrian city of Linz for a linkup that would trap Czechoslovakia and the Germans.

Indications at Supreme Headquarters were that hostilities in Europe would last at the most only a matter of days. High ranking officers were being reassigned and seeking peace while the western Allies drove swiftly into the southern and northern redoubts, advancing almost at once in Germany, Austria and Czech-Slovakia.

The notorious Dachau concentration camp near Munich was captured and 20,000 political and religious prisoners were freed. The Austrian city of Linz, 70 miles east of Salzburg and the headquarters of the Alpine Hitler Youth, was captured.

The British breached the lower Elbe River and advanced with 20 miles east of Hamburg, greatest continental port and second largest German city.

Superforts Hit Honshu, Kyushu GUAM, (AP)—Hitting by day, light in mid bombing was the force of 100 to 150 Superfortresses.

Britain and the United States, whose leaders also assume the support of China, are determined that this Polish arrangement.

The plan which the Latin American strategists have virtually agreed on is that either Chile or Brazil, both of which are executive committee members, should move to add Argentina to a pending proposal to invite the White Russian and ask it as a representative to come here now and join the conference.
