POST OFFICES GET ORDERS FOR CUT MAIL SERVICE

Deliveries Limited to One A Day; Windows to Close Earlier

WASHINGTON (AP)—Most postmasters over the country get orders today for a cut in mail service, including a limit of one delivery a day to residential areas.

The orders were announced last night by Postmaster General George M. Donaldson. Postmasters were instructed to begin putting them into effect as soon as they are received.

The "immediate" order applies particularly to delivery instructions. A 30-day notice is to be allowed on the curtailment of services that affect business operations, such as receipt of mail at the windows and back platform or post office.

Donaldson explained that cuts in service are necessary because post office costs have been far outrunning postal receipts.

He has been trying to get Congress to vote more money to his department and to let it raise postal rates by a total of about \$699 million a year.

Further, post office windows are to close earlier where possible and other economies are in the works.

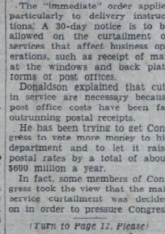
Larchmont and Mamaronck postmasters prepared today to put into operation the order issued by Postmaster General George M. Donaldson to curtail local service in the interest of department economy.

ARE WE IN THE SAME BOAT?

A QUICK reaction to the ruling by the United States Supreme Court in the case of Georgia's county-unit system of voting is that it is regrettable the court refuses to interfere in a procedure which admittedly discriminates in favor of rural districts against urban communities.

Too, it is without doubt that the continuance of the system in Georgia is purposely designed, insofar as possible, to disfranchise the Negro voter, who is found mainly in the large cities.

Population figures show that there is a heavy Negro population in the large cities. There is testimony that only in those areas have Negroes been able to vote in important numbers.

But before we beat down too hard in judgment against Georgia, let us see whether there may be either a mote or a beam in our own eyes.

Here in the State of New York, latest available population figures show New York City 8,161,000, while in the remainder of the State the population is 6,688,000.

But, in representation, New York City has only 24 of our 45 members of Congress; it has only 67 of our 150 Assemblymen and it has only 25 of our 56 State Senators.

There may be argument that problems of government outside New York City are of a type of representation disproportionate to population figures. But, maybe Georgia could argue along the same lines!

So, before we start casting stones in the direction of the South, what about our own glass house?

BRASS MONKEYS

THE 11 convicts of the Communist Party in America, who were leaders of conspiracy after a stormy, lengthy trial in which every type of obstruction was offered by defendants and their counsel, are now out on bail pending determination of their appeals.

Hearing on such appeals is set for June 12. The bail stipulations do not permit the defendants to leave the jurisdiction of the court which tried them. But the Communists now file a formal request to be permitted to travel throughout the nation, from Maine to California.

The purpose of their trips would be to lecture, thereby raising funds to pay their lawyers, court expenses and fines.

What these convicted criminals would lecture about is quite apparent—the benefits of Communism. Thus, they would spread the evil seeds for which they have already been convicted, and magnify the crime for which they had been sentenced.

A lot of nerve, eh? Why, by comparison, they make a brass monkey seem humble!

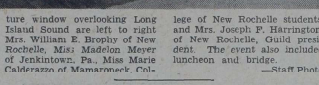

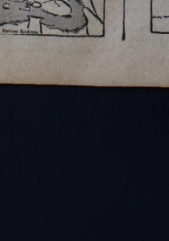
