THOMAS FIGHTS EXTRADITION ON LUMBER CHARGE

Bail In Indiana Set At \$5,000 Pending Hearing On April 23

George Thomas of 300 Center Avenue, Mamaroneck, charged with first degree grand larceny in connection with the theft of lumber from the Mamaroneck Lumber and Supply Co., 400 Penrose Road, has refused to waive extradition from Indianapolis, where he was arrested Monday.

His refusal means that he will not be brought back to Westchester to face the charges until all legal formalities to force his return have been completed.

He is currently being held in the Indianapolis jail on a \$5,000 bail and the extradition hearing has been set for April 23 in the Indiana city.

Chief Louis Giancola of the Mamaroneck Village police and Joseph Reed, investigator for the County Sheriff's office, returned yesterday from Indianapolis where they had gone in an attempt to bring Thomas back immediately.

On their arrival there, however, they found him unwilling to return. Said for him had been set at \$1,000 but was raised to the larger amount on their request.

Thomas has been sought for more than two months in connection with the lumber case which broke last Nov. 4 when Patrolman Frank Nank and Alvin P. Villaseca of Mamaroneck Village police were suspended from the force on suspicion of being connected with the lumber concern. Both patrolmen subsequently resigned from the force.

Thomas, who was slain shortly after the lumber case, was questioned in one case and disassociated from Mamaroneck after making the same statement in the charge of the westerly direction comprising San Francisco, Los Angeles, Portland, Denver and Kansas City districts.

Finally, a warrant for his arrest was issued early in February and it is on the basis of that warrant that he is being held in Indianapolis.

He was traced to the Indiana city when he sent in a payment to a credit company in New Rochelle for a car which he had purchased in the name of Paul D. Palco. The payment was postmarked Indianapolis and the search for him then centered there.

The jail came when the car crossed the street with its sleeping driver and whirled into a telephone pole, knocking the bulb out of the street-light and demolishing the entire left front section of the car.

MIYAN, Korea (AP) - Allied Communist liaison officers are expected to meet late today or tomorrow in Panmunjom to put finishing touches on plans for a Monday meeting which could pave the way to a truce in Korea.

A time must be set for the session to discuss plans for exchanging sick and wounded prisoners of war. And Gen. Mark Clark's formal acceptance must be delivered to the Communists.

Rear Adm. John C. Daniel, the U. S. truce delegate who will head the Allied delegation Monday, announced selection of four officers as members of the liaison group.

TAX BOOST OKAYED FOR SUPER TRUCKS

ALBANY (AP) - Governor Dewey today signed a bill that increases the State's vehicle-licensing tax on trucks weighing more than 10,000 pounds. Presently, the rates range from 4.6 cents per mile on the load or unloaded weight of vehicles weighing up to 64,000 pounds, which is the legal limit for New York highways.

However, special permits may be obtained from the Public Works Department for heavier loads in certain cases.

The new law extends the tax scale from 2.4 to 3.5 cents a mile for vehicles weighing 61,001 to 66,000 pounds, and provides for higher rates beyond that weight.

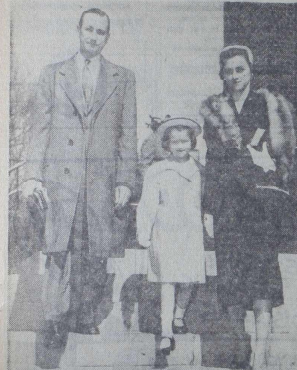

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REDS ACCEPT ALL KEY POINTS FOR SIGNS POW REPARATIONS

Agreement May Be Signed Tomorrow; Exchange Due In 10 Days

MUNSAN (AP) — The Communists unexpectedly agreed this afternoon to all major points of an Allied proposal for exchanging sick and wounded prisoners. An agreement may be signed tomorrow, exchange of sick and wounded prisoners would start within 10 days. The Reds retorted earlier today that they will return no more than 600 prisoners—includes probably not more than 125 Americans.

20 Days for POW Swap

The Communist staff officers delivered replies to questions asked earlier by the chief U. N. delegate. The agreement covers the signing and operation of orders and sets the termination date for the exchange at 20 days after the agreement becomes effective.

Included in the estimated \$1,200,000 plan for alterations, \$130,000 for pipes and radiators and \$125,000 for adding a central heating system for the Belong-Barry combination was \$480,000, \$100,000 for interior alterations, \$130,000 for the former Hokenburgh property with \$200,000 estimated to grade and seed that field.

AFL President Accused With Taking \$11,390 In Labor Funds

NEW YORK (AP) — Joseph P. Ryan, busy boss of east coast longshoremen, was arrested today on a 30-count grand jury indictment accusing him of misusing union funds.

He was charged specifically with theft of \$11,390.

The 62-year-old president of the AFL International Longshoremen's Association was summoned to the office of District Attorney James Hogan.

Before he went inside, Ryan said he wasn't sure what was wanted with him.

Monsieur later, Mr. Hogan's office announced that Ryan had been arrested in connection with an indictment that charges theft of \$11,390 from the funds of the I.L.A.

The indictment occurred between April 14, 1948 and April 16, 1951.

The \$200,000-a-year lifetime head of the union, had been an active member since 1934, when he was 31.

Since then, Ryan has been a member of the AFL International Longshoremen's Association, and the East Coast Longshoremen's Association.

The 30-count indictment includes three counts of larceny in the first degree, and 27 counts of larceny in the second degree.

The indictment was described by the district attorney as a continuation of a long list of misdeeds by Ryan.

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'INTELLIGENCE' HIT BY EX-F.B.I. MAN

Lack of a properly coordinated intelligence service has made communist infiltration of our government, unions and industries possible, Guesher Reinhardt, special employe for seven years of the FBI, told the members of the Masonic Club of Larchmont last night at a dinner meeting in the Seven Pines Restaurant.
