# Combing The Town

### Budget Brochure

A brochure, "The New Budget," one of the series of "Know Your Schools" pamphlets published by the Larchmont-Mamaroneck Parent-Teacher Club and the Mamaroneck Teachers' Association was distributed to Mamaroneck school children today to be taken home to their parents.

The pamphlet, in folder form, contains explanatory material on salaries and salary schedules, methods of allocating budgetary funds, and data about the school year.

Also provided is information relative to registration and voting on the proposed budget.

### Equipment Spotted

Tapes, burials, brush hooks and similar equipment were spotted at brush fire danger points in lots and fields scattered about the town of Mamaroneck by the Mamaroneck Rye Conservation Club with headquarters at 1120 Cove Road, the home of the club's president Charles W. Yank.

The equipment has been distributed for use in controlling brush fires, which, if allowed to grow unchecked, destroy cover for birds and nesting birds, and animals, and denude the soil, leaving it unprotected against erosion, wind and soil.

In urging local residents to be careful with fire this spring, the Rye Conservation Club suggested dumping brush in grassy or wooded areas rather than in open lots. In this way the material cover can be augmented, rather than endangered.

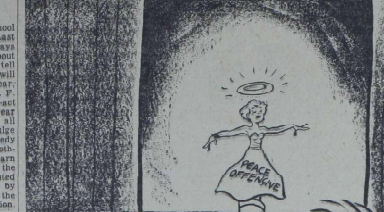

centralized school district, and Trustee Robert White, the projected enrollment of the schools in 1957-58 and the financial aspect of centralization.

Mr. Duncan brought the board's discussion to a close by summing up the report and listing its disadvantages and advantages from the Mamaroneck board's point of view.

He pointed out that a centralized system would be larger by 25 per cent with a lower assessed valuation behind each child than now exists in the Mamaroneck district.

The number of pupils in each of the Mamaroneck Schools, Mr. Duncan went on, would remain about the same with the exception of the Mamaroneck Senior High School and the Mamaroneck Avenue School.

Under centralization, the possibility of using the Mamaroneck Avenue School to correct overcrowded conditions in Central Chatsworth and the Junior High School would be ruled out.

Advantages
1. There would be 13 fewer teachers in a centralized district than would be needed under the present system.

peculiar location in relation to the rest of the district. There are not enough people in the Mamaroneck District near the Mamaroneck Avenue School to fill it up," he said.

Some use of the capacity might be effected by redistricting, but even redistricting could not solve the problem of overcrowding at Central School arising from apartment developments within the immediate vicinity of its Boston Post Road site.

Alternative solutions, he went on, are to transport the first and sixth grade classes of Central School to Mamaroneck Avenue School daily by bus or to build a new neighborhood school.

Opponents pointed out that predators are dangerous and that no matter how careful members of the Joint Advisory Committee tried to formulate their findings are apt to be misleading.

Supervisor Owen A. Mandelkern, who presided at the meeting, proposed that Mamaroneck form its own reconstruction bill as of \$1,000,000 and there be a 50 per cent increase in the tax rate of 50 cents per \$100 of assessed value.

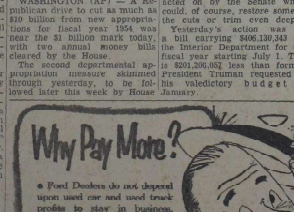
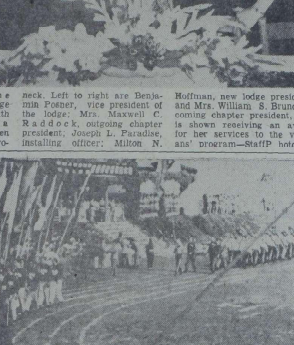

Bellevue High School students were at odds on the subject Leonard Cottrill, a spokesman, who recently moved here from what he believed was a better school, cited the wider range of experience and opportunity available in a large school with a better chance to find friends and carry out his interests. He added, however, that teacher-pupil relationships are not to be expected in a small school.

James Finley, a senior, delivered a plea for the two districts to remain as they are, pointing out that in Bellevue every boy in the senior class is active either in intra-mural or varsity sports and that most of them are also members of such groups as the dramatic club, glee club, student government or band. His opening remarks drew a laugh from the audience when he claimed that "we as students probably have a better understanding of what goes on in this school system than the parents, the board of education and even the teachers."

Board non-committal The board's stand was non-committal. Trustees George Garfunkel, claimed in answer to a question from the floor, adding that the board had already with the Mamaroneck School Board to express no formal opinion on the consolidation before the joint session is held.

Mr. Garfunkel was the board's spokesman to evaluate some of the intangibles involved in the proposed merger, with strict injunction to present a non-partisan view. His presentation evoked, however, with so eloquent a defense of the status quo that the audience laughed later when Mr. Garfunkel objected to what he called an "expression of opinion on the part of Trustee Carl Messerman."

Malcolm D. Brown prefaced his remarks to the board with thanks to Trustee Garfunkel for his "defense of the school district of moderate size." Trustee David Schwartz, a partisan of consolidation, pointed out that Trustee Garfunkel's remarks "could hardly have expressed an opinion when the board had already agreed on a non-partisan presentation."

Advantages Mr. Brown expressed a fear that in a large consolidated high school there would be no scholarship requirement for athletic participation. He said that the 17-year-olds competing with 17-year-olds and 17-year-olds "who are still in school" would be "flunking in every subject."

He also pointed out that Rye Neck needs only \$300 for a trustee office, while in a Mamaroneck school there would be a scholastic program. He also pointed out that Rye Neck elements of the student body and pointed out that all projections by the board as to the future of a consolidated high school must depend finally on the still non-existent board of education for the new district.

Mr. Schwartz quoted a remark made by William Fisher at Tuesday night's hearing by the Mamaroneck School Board when Mr. Fisher said, in effect, that the present division of school districts is antiquated, dating back to a property boundary set down in the 17th Century, claiming that it is time to restructure the cultural, social and economic unity of Mamaroneck and Rye Neck.

Teacher Salaries Robert Zimmerman, social studies teacher, said he agrees with Mr. Garfunkel on the advantages of a small school, and that he is proud of the close teacher-student relationship at Bellevue. He pointed, however, to the difference of about \$47,000 in the Board's salary items for 1953 and 1957-58 and asked how the Board proposes to hire 15 more teachers with this sum to offset the effect of an anticipated 40 per cent increase in enrollment, referring to favorable references to the extra-curricular program at Bellevue, Mr. Zimmerman.
