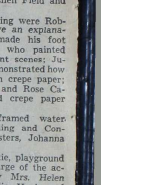

"We have to keep people away at them in the battle of wills that's been going on until they assume a decent attitude of right thinking or until public sentiment against their unfairness rises to such a pitch that we can take action," he declared.

Miss Morgan, who told the board she had been a resident of Larchmont 40 years, bitterly protested the fact that apartments deniers the privilege of bathing at the Larchmont Beach, "she said, "as long as we don't go in, although we've been right on the water, Larchmont is the only village on the Sound which denies its citizens a place to bathe." She added that it was "especially unfair and wrong to deny apartment children the use of the beach."

British experts on military, scientific and international affairs, busy making calculations on the effects of the awesome development, said the bomb would influence all future international relations and produce the "dramatic problem" of how to control it.

"How far it will be possible or wise to diffuse generally over the world the knowledge of how to make these bombs poses a vitally important problem," said Prof. G. I. Taylor, joint president of the League of Nations Union since 1938. "There are enormous difficulties involved in it as a secret of one or two nations."

S. capital as saying the Allies would serve Japan and Soviet Russia a new ultimatum to hasten their withdrawal from the war, with the new weapon unless they surrendered unconditionally. ## Japan Ready To Accept Potsdam Terms If Emperor Is Permitted To Hold Rule

### Text Of Jap Offer To Quit

The text of the Domei 'surrender' broadcast follows: "The Japanese Government today addressed the following communications to the Swiss and Swedish governments respectively for transmission to the United States, Great Britain, China and the Soviet Union: "In obedience to the gracious command of His Majesty the Emperor, who, ever anxious to enhance the cause of world peace, has earnestly sought to bring about an early termination of hostilities with a view to saving mankind from the calamities to be inflicted upon them by further continuation of the war, the Japanese Government asked several weeks ago the Soviet Government, with which neutral relations then prevailed, to render good offices in storing peace vis-a-vis the enemy powers."

"Unfortunately these efforts in the interest of peace proved fruitless. The Japanese Government in conformity with the august wish of His Majesty to restore the general peace and desiring to put an end to the suffering entailed by war as quickly as possible, has decided upon the course of a general surrender of the Japanese Government. "The Japanese Government is ready to accept the terms set forth in the Potsdam Declaration which was issued at Potsdam on July 26, 1945, by the heads of the Governments of the United States, Great Britain and China and later subscribed to the Soviet Government with the understanding that the said declaration does not comprise any demand which prejudices the sovereignty of Japan. 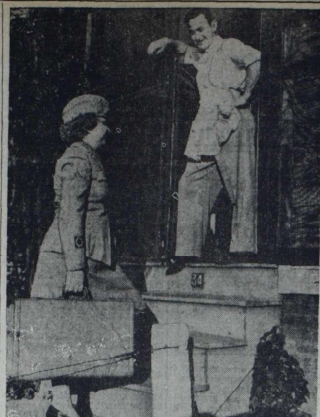

# BIG FOUR POWERS AGREE TO ACCEPT JAPAN'S SURRENDER PLEA PROVIDED ALLIES GOVERN THROUGH EMPEROR

**Terms Specify Hirohito Must Carry Out Directions Laid Down By Allied Military Commander**

**WASHINGTON, (AP)**—The Big Four powers agreed today to accept Japan's surrender offer provided the supreme military commander of the Allied victors govern the beaten Japanese through the authority of the Emperor. Now a reply from Japan must be awaited.

In a reply to Japan through the Swiss Government, Secretary of State Byrnes said the United States would accept the surrender proposal, if the Emperor is made subject to the supreme commanders' orders.

This represented the viewpoint of the United States, the United Kingdom, the Union of the Soviet Socialist Republics and China, Byrnes said in his message delivered through the Swiss embassy here at 10:30 A. M., EWT.

Byrnes laid out the following five conditions in his message to the Japanese.

"Immediately upon the surrender the authority of the Emperor and the Japanese Government to rule the state shall be subject to the supreme commander of the Allied powers who will take such steps as he deems proper to effectuate the surrender terms."

"The Emperor will be required to authorize and secure the signature of the Government of Japan and the Japanese Imperial General Headquarters of the surrender terms necessary to carry out the provisions of the Potsdam declaration and shall issue his commands to all the Japanese military, naval and air authorities and to all the forces under their control wherever located to cease active operations and to surrender their arms and to issue such other orders as the Supreme Commander may require to give effect to the surrender terms."

"Immediately upon the surrender the Japanese government shall transport prisoners of war and civilian internees to places of safety as directed, where they can quickly be placed aboard Allied transports."

"The ultimate form of government of Japan shall be in accordance with the Potsdam declaration established by the treaty expressed will of the Japanese people."

"The armed forces of the Allied powers will remain in Japan until the purposes set forth in the Potsdam declaration are achieved."

"The Allied position was made known after a 24-hour period of conferences among the four capitals on Japan's offer to surrender if she could retain her emperor. As the British Cabinet stood by in London, President Truman held an early morning discussion with Secretary Byrnes. Byrnes then went to the State Department and talked with Chairman Connolly. 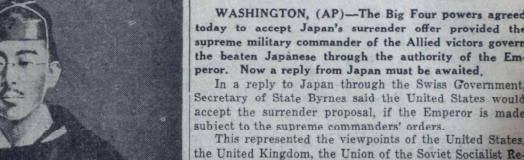

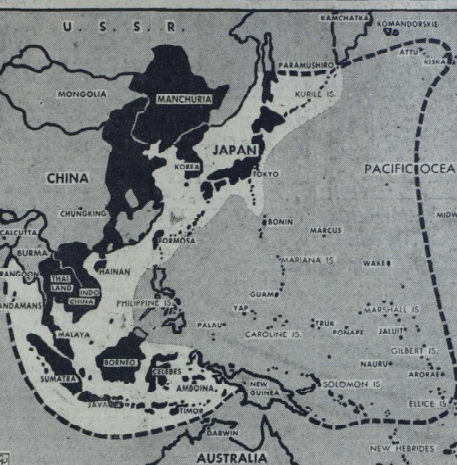
