## British May Occupy Suez; Feet Waits Striking Order

LONDON (AP)—An authoritative British source said today Britain is ready to use force if necessary, including the reoccupation of the Suez Canal zone, to keep the canal open to world shipping.

The informant is an official of Prime Minister Sir Anthony Eden's government. But he declined to be identified by his name or position.

He said Britain has not asked the United States to join in any military measures which the country may take as a result of Egypt's nationalization of the Suez Canal.

## President Confident He's Fit To Carry On

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower said today he is expressed concern as to whether he would live through another term, Mr. Eisenhower replied with a smile that he was flattered by their concern.

Then he said the Republican Party and the country apparently believe they still need him. He added that the decision will be up to the American people.

Mr. Eisenhower was noticeably thinner than when he held his last news conference on June 6. But he replied to a barrage of questions during a 20-minute session in a sure voice and seemed to be in a confident mood.

### Believe He's Needed

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### Checkup Shows He's Able To Enter Campaign

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower got a new physical examination today. The White House physician reported him in "fine shape."

The physician, Maj. Gen. Howard M. Snyder, told newsmen that so far as the forthcoming Presidential campaign is concerned Mr. Eisenhower "will be able to do just as much as he would have without this attack."

Gen. Snyder was alluding to the emergency surgery Mr. Eisenhower underwent June 9 for relief of partial blockage of the small intestine.

The illness was an acute attack of ileitis or inflammation of a portion of the intestine.

Gen. Snyder chatted with reporters informally in the White House lobby before the hour of Mr. Eisenhower's first news conference since the June 9 operation.

### Peiping Gets Protest; No New Advances

RANGOON, Burma (AP)—Burma today pressed Communist China to withdraw Red troops which military sources say have occupied an 11,000-square-mile area of Burmese territory.

There were no reports of new advances. Clashes with Burmese forces and some casualties were said to have occurred when the Chinese units moved up to 60 miles at various points into Burma's northern territory.

A government spokesman said Burma was "seriously concerned" about the move along the northeast border and had brought the situation to the attention of the Peiping government.

There was no serious cause for concern, he said. "Negotiations are now in progress with a view to the withdrawal of these Chinese troops to the Chinese side of the border," a Foreign Office statement said.

## He Declines To State Any Preference

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower said today Vice President Nixon is perfectly acceptable to him but he is not going to forecast Republican convention action on some possible Vice Presidential candidate.

Mr. Eisenhower declined at a news conference to state any preference for a Vice Presidential nominee.

Mr. Eisenhower said he himself has not been recommended as a candidate for the job, but he has already said so to the Administration team.

In previous exchanges on the subject Mr. Eisenhower has said he would be "delighted" to have Mr. Nixon on any ticket with him. He has praised Mr. Nixon's contribution to the Administration.

### There's No Doubt

David D. Eisenhower said there can be no doubt about his satisfaction with Mr. Nixon as a running mate.

He declined specifically to say whether Governor Christian A. Herter of Massachusetts would be as acceptable for second place on the ticket.

Herter D. Stassen was proposed for Mr. Herter by substituted for Mr. Nixon.

Mr. Harriman pledged to fight Kefauver's withdrawal, but he said he would not do so if Kefauver's withdrawal created a strong chance that Mr. Stevenson will be nominated on the first ballot.

Several other supporters of the former Illinois Governor said such a victory was "close to a certainty."

Both Mr. Stevenson and Mr. Kefauver said in response to questions that they had been do-between them. Mr. Kefauver said he is not a candidate for the Vice Presidential nomination but he did not close the door to a possible deal.

Mr. Stevenson said "there are a number of qualified men" acceptable to him if he wins the top spot—and I include among those Senator Kefauver." He added that "there have not been any negotiations by me with Mr. Kefauver or any other one associated with me."

In any event, the day's developments appeared to have washed out any lingering traces of the bitterness with which Mr. Kefauver and Mr. Stevenson had each other in the heated Florida and California primary campaigns.

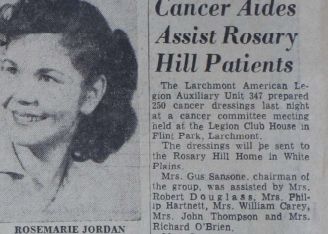

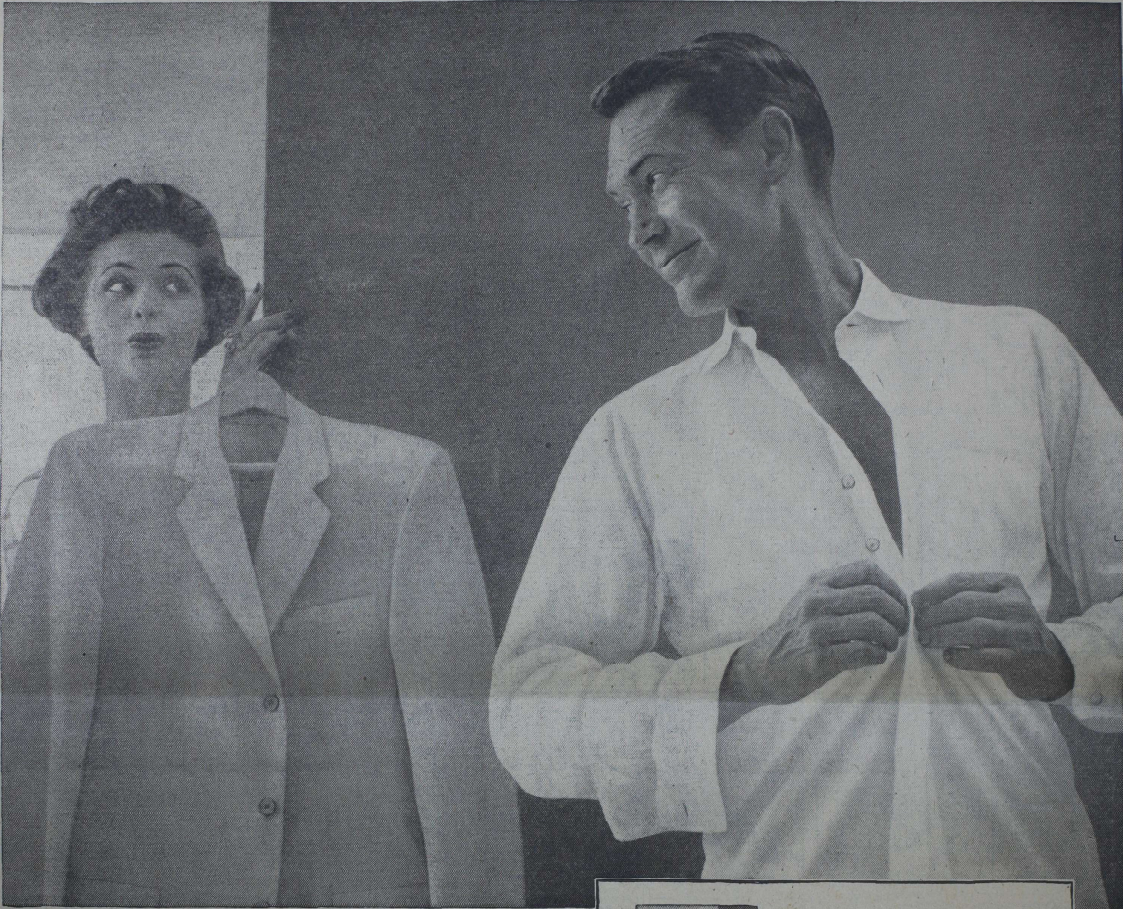

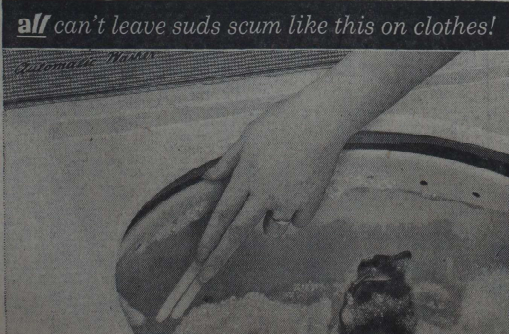

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The Best He Could With What He Had

DURING that 20-year period in which the Democratic Party appeared to have a strangle hold upon the White House there was one Republican Presidential Convention when it was obvious the GOP was merely going through the motions, perhaps only out of habit. It was the nominee of the convention had no chance from start to finish.

Speaking at the Democratic convention which followed shortly after the GOP had named its man, Will Rogers asked for tolerance and understanding.

"Don't be too hard on them, Republicans," he told the Democratic convention. "They done the best they could with what they had."

We think much the same can be pointed out to fellow delegates of the Democratic convention in Chicago last night the green pastures of glorious victory which he believes to lie ahead. Governor Clement, indeed, did the best he could with what he had.

But at that it wasn't much. "The President's record and his party's record are one and the same," he told a cheering audience. "He cannot pry them apart."

Yet for weeks the Democrats have been claiming there were big rifts between the President and Republicans in Congress, and that only by Democratic help was his legislative program effected.

The keynote spoke of "privilege and pillage" and of "a sordid record of broken promises and unredemed pledges." He talked of "a double-faced campaign" and of "the smile and smug technique" while "the top man peers down the green fairways of indifference."

Gouchou, that doesn't seem to us likely to convince many Americans that Dwight Eisenhower is a cheat and a fraud. The keynote referred to hard-working Secretary of State John Foster Dulles as "unquestionably the greatest unguided missile in the history of American diplomacy."

And that is supposed to be funny? There was a great deal more, of course, to the address by Governor Clement. We admit it was long and his devotion to Democracy with a capital "D" was evident before he did it all with what was at hand. It was not his fault that the material was so scant and the ammunition rather low.

Oh, well, perhaps we expect too much of a keynote. After all, he is only the Temporary Convention Chairman. Should we, in fairness, expect more than a temporary trip from his eloquence?

Time To Let The Young Folks Run Things?

MRS. Eleanor Roosevelt, who has always exerted strong influence upon the youth of our land, told Harry S. Truman at the Chicago convention that it's time for the oldsters to start to withdraw and to let the younger elements of the Democratic Party take over the controls.

Mrs. Roosevelt believes that young people have a lot more sense than most of us give them credit for. Just a few years back, you may recall, she asked that our laws be changed to permit eighteen-year-olds to vote. She was joined in this recommendation by no less personsage in the Republican camp than Dwight Eisenhower. But to date only Georgia has lowered the voting bars from twenty-one to eighteen.

In this new advice Mrs. Roosevelt went more nearly get what she asks. Certainly the steering wheel of the Democratic Party, and more especially of the 1956 convention, is under hands so veined with age they appear upon occasion to be palsied.

Mr. Truman is in his seventy-third year. Mrs. Roosevelt will be seventy-two in October. Averell Harriman is almost sixty-four; Speaker Sam Rayburn of Texas, permanent chairman, is seventy-four; Sam Rosenman, Mr. Truman's chief adviser, is approaching sixty-one; James A. Farley is sixty-eight.

Maybe Mrs. Roosevelt has something. Maybe it would be best for the party and the nation for these oldsters, reluctant as they may be to give up control, to step aside for sharper minds and brierier hands.

Yes, indeed, it may well be time to let the younger crowd take over—the John Kennedys, the Lyndon Johnsons, the Hubert Humphreys, the Stuart Symingtons, the Bob Meyners, the Bob Wagner.

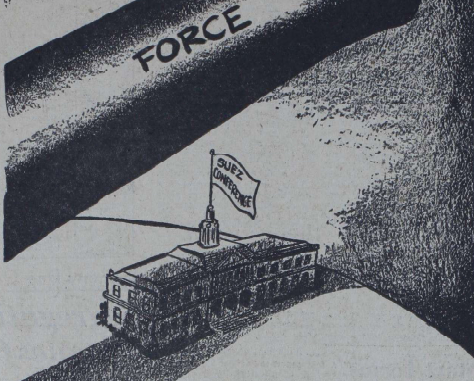
Youth will be served, they say. But when? Only when the Grim Reaper has forced a decision which most of the older party leaders are themselves unwilling to make.
