HITLER APPEAL SPURS NAZIS ON RUSSIAN FRONT

German, However, Fail To Recapture Vital Rail Lines South Of Rzhew

MOSCOW (AP)—Adolf Hitler's own appeal was reported today by the German press as a desperate but unsuccessful fight to recapture railway lines south of Rzhew and southeast of Velikie Luki on the Central Russian front west of Moscow.

So vital is Rzhew to the German vital network of communication lines and rail lines that Hitler telegraphed his commander there emphasizing the threat to the city and warning that "the loss of Rzhew is equal to the loss of half of Berlin."

A British broadcast said the Russians and Germans were already locked in a bitter struggle for the city, with Soviet shock troops battling the Nazis from house to house.

Axi troops trapped behind Shalheral also were counterattacking, but, so far, Russian reports said they had not been able to penetrate to stem the Red Army's drive.

Another 2,000 invaders lashed by the noon communique as killed in overnight fighting. The Red Army said German losses in dead and wounded numbered in the thousands. (The total announced in communique so far, however, total only 15,500.)

PHONE COMPANY FILES PROTEST

Town Assessments Against Instruments And Switchboards Held Illegal

Formal protest against assessing of telephone instruments and switchboards within the Town of Mamaroneck as "real property" was made at a special meeting of the Board last night by a representative of the New York Telephone Company and its attorney referred to Town Counsel John L. Dallas.

Arthur B. Brennan, appearing in behalf of Charles T. Russell, attorney for the telephone company, contended that the instruments and switchboards are "personal property" and should be exempt from taxation under the provisions of the Telephone Act. His brief charged that the telephone company property has been "improperly and illegally assessed."

The Town Board recently voted to add the instruments and switchboards to the Town Tax Roll, pending formal protest from the telephone company. The board's action was held illegal by the Supreme Court in the case of *Telephone Co. v. Board of Assessors*, 247 U.S. 21, 48 S.Ct. 101, 60 L.Ed. 101, 1918.

The Board then adjourned until next Wednesday at 8 o'clock. A meeting will be held for the purpose of receiving the protest from the telephone company. The Board will also receive a report from the Board of Assessors on the matter.

Casgrain, assistant regional representative for the National Housing Agency, explained that the government relief program is only being considered for critical areas—sections where migratory war workers are having difficulty in obtaining living accommodations.

Westchester will not be included until the War Manpower Commission deems it a critical area. County residents are requested to submit further data on the govt. relief plan, however, were advised to communicate with the regional office of the National Housing Agency at 2 Park Avenue, New York City.

Under the government plan, the agency will lease private dwellings for the duration and convert them at government expense into apartments for war workers. Rooms will be taken in areas where zoning and building laws permit multiple dwellings. The structures will be returned to the owners after the war situation clears.

Allied troops quickly moved up and the marauding enemy, however, and occupied the town at dusk Saturday.

Allied Headquarters said the Nazis suffered heavy losses in their unsuccessful counter blow at Takuba, aimed at cutting off the Allied wedge now firmly driven between Bizerte and Tunis.

The British radio claimed the Germans recaptured 24 American tanks in the attack.

On the Libyan flank of the Allied front, British headquarters again reported ported port clashes at Gen. Sir Bernard Montgomery's army.

Army probud Axis defenses at El Eui, where Nazi Field Marshal Erwin Rommel has entrenched in a narrow corridor between allied marches and the sea.

A British communique said Allied heavy bombers again attacked Axis bases in Libya and Tunisia, and also sank a large south-bound tanker off Bizerte.
