A fresh wave of vandalism broke out in this area over the weekend with youngsters smashing at passing autos, shooting out street lights, smashing windows and attempting to wreck a barn, according to police reports from the two villages and the unincorporated section of the Town of Mamaroneck.

Eight Army Pushes Toward Tripoli And Showdown

REDS PUSH GAIN

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS in North Africa (AP)—American and British artillery have broken up a German front between northeast of Meljez El Bab, it was announced today, with the French Communists in Tunisia reported destruction of an entire troop train by French guerrillas operating between the coast and interior.

By JAMES M. LANG (Associated Press)—Field Marshal Rommel's carefully prepared El Agheila defense line has collapsed under a single assault by Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery's British Eighth Army, which pushed on to the west today toward Tripoli and a showdown.

The onslaught which once more drove Rommel's desert fox out of his burrow was timed to coincide with smashing aerial assaults on the enemy's Tunisian strongholds in Tunisia, and the west of the rising air might of the Allies.

The brief announcement that the Eighth Army again was on the march came early today in a brief communique from Cairo which said:

Rommel has been driven from his strong positions at El Agheila and has been ordered to retreat. The text of a later communique declared the retreat and the pursuit relentless.

It gave these added details: "The British are continuing their heavy bombardment of the new Japanese air base at Munda on New Georgia Island in the Central Solomon Islands."

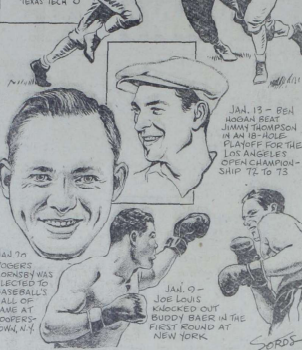

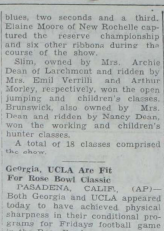

Jurors Entitled To More Gasoline
WASHINGTON (AP)—Jurors who need additional mileage while they are on duty will be eligible for a special gasoline ration, the Office of Price Administration announced today.

Special rations will be issued on the basis of a statement from the presiding judge or other responsible court official that the applicant has been handicapped by duty and that additional mileage is necessary to provide the required transportation.

Other changes in gasoline rationing regulations include: private social workers are made eligible for private mileage if it is needed to enable them to perform special jobs, including investigating the necessity for relief; planning for the placement of military or naval dependents or other persons in homes and institutions; and transporting these persons to institutions.

Changes in administration of the selective service system will be eligible for preferential mileage whether or not the travel is compensated. Preferential mileage is granted only to those receiving compensation for the travel.

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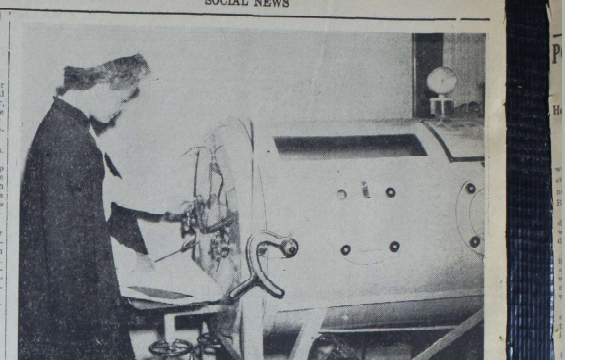

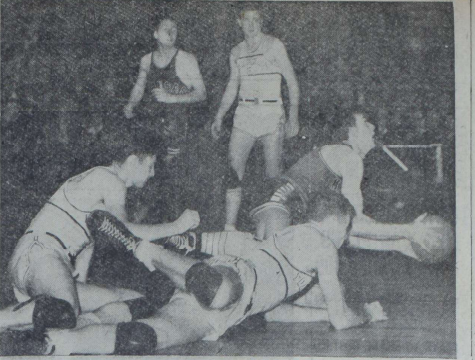

Erika Mann To Speak On Youth Under Sponsorship Of Club

German-Born Author Appears At Larchmont Church On Jan. 8

Erika Mann, daughter of Author Thomas Mann and a writer and news commentator in her own right will be presented Jan. 8 at the Larchmont Avenue Church as the next current events feature of the Larchmont Women's Club. Her talk, which is open to the public at a nominal fee to be "Who Has the Youth of the Future?"

Ever since the voluntary exile of her family from Nazi Germany 10 years ago, Miss Mann has dedicated herself to the cause of the Nazim. She has written and spoken to the end and today is working for freedom and democracy through broadcasts to the enslaved people of Germany and other German-speaking parts of Europe, telling them the truth about their Nazi leaders and their crimes.

Since leaving Germany, Miss Mann has returned there only once in the guise of a peasant to rescue the manuscript of her father's novel "Joseph and His Brothers." She has traveled extensively in Europe and was in Britain in the Summers of 1940, '41 and '42.

As a young girl in Germany during the Weimar Republic, Miss Mann studied for the stage and was a pupil of Max Reinhardt. She made a number of theatrical appearances including taking part in her own satirical revue "Peppermill," in which she was author, director and actor.

In addition Miss Mann has written "School for Barbarians," "The Light Goes Down," "Escape and Life," and "The Other Germany." Her father was in collaboration with her brother, Klaus.

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Motor Corps Members Qualify Only After Special Training

One of the most hard working and least known units of the American Red Cross is the Motor Corps. Few realize that six members of this Corps must go through long months of training and continuous study to qualify for the many services which are required.

They must pass standard and advanced first aid courses, study motor mechanics, map reading, and take instruction in blackout driving. They must pass driving tests given by the State Parkway Police using Red Cross owned motor vehicles with four forward shifts and are also given instruction in driving buses.

The Westchester County Motor Corps is a group of 300 women under the leadership of Commander Helen McLean of Bronxville. There are 10 units in the county each headed by a lieutenant. Mrs. A. Stirling Smith is in charge of the Larchmont unit which serves the Mamaroneck-Larchmont area.

According to Mrs. Smith, the members of her unit average 80 hours work each month. Most members are only required to serve a minimum of 200 hours a year.

The activities of the Larchmont unit are varied. Six members and their lieutenant serve at the White Plains office. They are on duty one day each week, transporting supplies to and from various branches, driving home, and necessary errands.

Two members drive the ambulances at United Hospital every other week and there is always one woman on duty to drive a station wagon to be used as an emergency ambulance.

One night each week two members are assigned to drive the Port Jervis bus, transporting members from the fort to the subway and back. They also have telephone calls and drive equipment in case of an emergency.

Each member is required to report monthly to her lieutenant. In the event of a disaster, the Motor Corps transports patients to and from hospitals and serves all blood banks in the vicinity.

"We are in readiness," says Mrs. Smith, "to serve the community or country at times of disaster of any sort. We are prepared to transport not only the sick or injured, but also doctors, nurses and supplies."

Counter-Attacks On Middle Don Crushed

The spectre of nightmare disaster was etched more sharply for Adolf Hitler in the fading hours of 1942 today as Russia's armies swept 13 more towns into the net of their great Winter offensive in the South and crushed fierce new German counter-attacks on the Middle Don Steppes.

British Military Observers said the Russian drive back through the Kalmyk region in the Northeast Caucasus would probably force the Germans to shorten their line of communications by 200 miles with a retreat to the Kuban River.

Latest advice said the Russian, crushing deep into their defenses, had advanced about 100 miles, capturing the entire German invasion army in the Caucasus.
