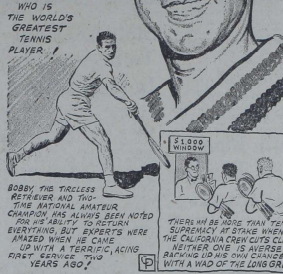

Artificial Arms for Amputees
Artificial arms, incorporating a number of improvements are now available to amputee-veterans by the Veterans' Administration. Veterans who have permanent and spare arms of older variety may now secure one of three newly developed types by making application.

Service Disability
Since the end of the war, it has been the practice of the Veterans Administration to treat or authorize treatment pending determination of the disability's service-connection. After January 1, 1948, treatment for most cases will not be authorized until proof of service-connection has been furnished.

Due Date on Insurance
Veterans who are now reinstating their National Service Life Insurance prior to January 1, 1948 should check their due date to make sure that they know when the policy might again lapse for non-payment. Under present regulations, reinstatement can be accomplished prior to January 1, 1948 without a physical examination by payment of two monthly premiums and a statement of comparative health. It is possible that the grace period may start immediately after the policy is reinstated as premiums are due every day in the month. Here is an illustration of our point:

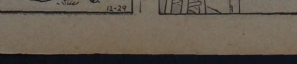

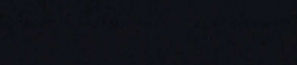

Pact Stabilizing Building Trade Wages Okayed

NEW YORK (AP)—An agreement stabilizing wages in much of the metropolitan building industry until at least April, 1949, and which is punctuated by a stipulate a \$2,500,000,000 construction program here, was announced today by the Building Trades Employers Association and the Building Trades Union.

The AFL Building and Construction Trades Council and the Building Trades Employers Association announced jointly that representatives of 27 of 28 building trades involved had approved the agreement and that the other 11 were expected to "fall in line."

Howard McSpedon, president of the council, said the agreement potentially would affect 250,000 members of 23 local unions embracing the 38 trades in New York City and parts of Nassau, Suffolk, Westchester, Putnam and Rockland counties.

McSpedon and Driscoll said the reason 11 trades were not included was because they have agreements with employers extending beyond Jan. 1, 1948, effective date of the blanket agreement. The latter runs until June 30, 1950.

Driscoll said the pact would be signed after both sides had completed a technical study of it.

Rates, recently arrived at by the council and the association for the 27 trades ranged from \$1.50 per hour for excavating labor to \$8 per hour for hoisting engineers, plasterers, structural iron workers and stone setters.

The two stipulations said the unions had agreed to "share" any increase in living cost up to the amount of rise above that 15 per cent. The unions agreed to absorb a rise up to 15 per cent.
