

Engel Tells Of Einstein's Objectives

Albert Einstein devoted his latter years to proving that "God does not play dice with the world," according to Leonard Engel of 8 Daves Place, Larchmont.

Mr. Engel, a noted medical journalist, discusses the great physicist's goals in an article "What Einstein Was Up To" in the current Harper's Magazine.

Most of Prof. Einstein's work since 1916, Mr. Engel states, was given to a single undertaking—the formulation of a "unified field theory." The theory attempts to bring together under a single law, Mr. Engel says, the phenomena of gravitation and other forms of electromagnetic radiation and matter.

Modern man, he states, even though he is not aware of it, believes deeply in an orderly cosmic universe.

In February, 1954, Mr. Engel was awarded a George Eastman Memorial Award by Long Island University for his "outstanding contribution as a newspaperman and writer."

He was born and raised in New York, and has been Larchmont resident for about five years. He attended New York University and the University of Chicago and worked on newspapers prior to entering World War II.

Since leaving the Army, Mr. Engel has specialized in the writing of articles in the field of science and medicine fields. He is a free lance.

He is married and has a son, Peter, six.

Continued from Page 1 could lead to duplication of expenses of maintenance, policing and other items and could cause confusion and conflict.

The meeting was conducted informally, in this way several objections cited in Governor Hoffman's veto message were quickly cleared up.

The veto message raised four points to be discussed by Mr. Hopkins and Saul C. Corwin, counsel to the PWD, and Deputy Comptroller Joseph J. Kelly cleared up most of the points, except the question of possible competition for tolls between the county authority and the Turnpike authority.

Mr. Hopkins cited expert reports that there would be no competition for tolls between the Turnpike and the county authority, and he would be so as between the Hutchinson River Parkway and the New England Turnpike, but said he is not convinced this would be true as between the other parkways and the main Turnpike.

Mr. Corwin pointed out that the principal aim of the county authority would be reconstruction of the Hutchinson route.

Mr. Galman and Mr. Corwin were also present.

It was pointed out that the financing could be done more economically by using the county's borrowing power. Mr. Hopkins held that it would not be to put this burden on the taxpayers, particularly because there must be bond issues for other projects.

He added that Westchester is the only county where large bond issues would be approved by the voters and expressed doubt that a parkway improvement issue would be approved. In support of this latter point he cited that in Westchester, at the last election of the state of the \$700 million bond issue last month.

William P. Luddy of White Plains, Democratic State Committee member, and John A. Hoyt Jr., Eastchester, Democratic chairman, suggested changes in certain provisions of the bill concerning the financing of the state of the \$700 million bond issue last month.

After the meeting Mr. Luddy, Mr. Hoyt Jr., and Mr. Corwin were acceptable to the county administration and expressed will to accept the bill.

At the meeting, Arnold Frye of Bronxville, county bond salesman, took part in the discussions.

Mendes Off On Race For Faure's Job

PARIS (AP)—France's election campaign got off to a boom start today only a few hours after Premier Edgar Faure's government decided to dissolve the National Assembly.

The Socialist and members of former Premier Pierre Mendes-France lost no time in getting ready to campaign for votes in the nationwide election, expected to be set for Jan. 8. They turned their heaviest propaganda efforts against Mr. Faure and the dissolution.

The cabinet decision to dissolve the Assembly—the first such move in the history of the post-war Fourth Republic—was announced last night. It gives Mr. Faure the early election the Assembly had denied him.

L'Express, chief mouthpiece for Mr. Mendes-France, termed the cabinet action an "outrage against the nation."

It charged the Faure government with "lying to the country on its real economic situation, undermining the authority of the cabinet and abandoning every attempt of French intervention in international affairs and betraying the interests of French youth in leaving the economic policy of the country to the whims of the dictators."

Attorney General David Clarkman said that in 1954 and early this year the two corporations, through Mr. Hooker, issued a prospectus detailing stock offers.

This prospectus, said Mr. Clarkman, contained "false, misleading, deceptive and fraudulent representations." It included the name of Gen. Douglas MacArthur and other prominent figures.

Mr. Clarkman said it also claimed that more than \$300,000 had already been raised in New York City, whereas not more than \$50,000 actually had been obtained.

Opposing the state's motion, Mr. Hooker's attorney, J. Ray Glass, declared that "outside in the title of the prospectus, the client and his National Party Bulletin out of business."

Glass asserted that the prospectus was only a "preliminary draft" of the type of entertainment expected to be provided, and did not require the permission of Gen. MacArthur or other prominent figures mentioned.

Outside court, Mr. Hooker told reporters that the action against him was based on the "misconception" that he intended to set up an anti-Semitic film network. He added:

"I am not anti-Semitic, a racist, nor am I an anti-Faure supporter. To the extent that Judasim is anti-Christian."

Assistant Attorney General Leonard E. Russack asserted in court that there is no relation to the issue here; it's a case of stock fraud.

TE 4 Dialing Range Due To Be Expanded

The direct distance dialing range for all Tennyson 4 individual and two-party customers will be greatly expanded beginning at 12:01 A.M. Sunday, Dec. 18, it was announced today by L. W. Soans, manager for the New York Telephone Company.

"In time for Christmas calling, these customers will be able to dial station-destination calls direct to all telephones in Connecticut, six cities in upstate New York and two in Pennsylvania," the manager pointed out. "In the same way they already dial certain other long distance calls."

The distant places to be added to the telephone company's wide range dialing network include Albany, Amsterdam, Glens Falls, Hudson, Schenectady and Troy in upstate New York, and Philadelphia and Lancaster in Pennsylvania.

About 37,000 individual and two-party-line customers in Westchester and Putnam Counties and Greenwich, Conn., will be able to do this dialing.

"More is yet to come," Mr. Soans pointed out. "Just two months from today, the individual and two-party-line users served from the Larchmont office will

get a sample of nationwide dialing. Starting Feb. 1, 1956, 16 major cities from Massachusetts to California will be added to the direct distance dialing network. This means that these users will be able to dial direct to 18 million telephones almost as easily as calling a neighbor up the street," he said.

A revised 12-page folder listing all dialable points will be mailed to Tennyson 4 individual and two-party customers within a few days.

3. The teachers' job must be presented in such a way so it will attract talented people to the profession.

The conference also came up with this definition of what is looking for in the nation's classrooms:

A good teacher is one who has an active interest in children and youth; has a broad educational background; is professionally qualified and competent; possesses good physical and mental health; has a good moral character; manifests a desire for self-improvement; can work constructively with other professional workers, parents and the community; and is proud of teaching as a profession.

NEW YORK—Surely the most interesting facet of fashion and the one richest with socio-historic significance is this: each time our mode of living changes—which is pretty often in this era of suburban living, super-sonic speeds and home television, to name a few—the change is quickly reflected in fashions, ascribed to these newly popular pursuits.

For instance, when television came in, the hostess robe went out. Too dreary for sitting on floor or hassock when neighbors or friends just dropped in to watch a program.

It was replaced by at-home separates, their lower component either tapered pants or very full floor-length skirts, both geared to decorous sitting on a low level.

Even a year ago, you couldn't find a hostess robe (as opposed to a bath robe) you'd give house-rooms to.

Hostess Gown Back

Now pretty much every home has a television screen, more than one, if there are children. So the need for the separate, awkward full skirt, or the band-disked pants, no longer exists. You can wear a hostess robe-robe again for at-home dress-up. Better still, you can even find one in any store, and I intend to devote a separate column to this popular returner.

Meanwhile, another large factor—TV-v-1—has had its bearings on women's at-home robes as well as on men's robes. We all go more places, often, than ever before in history. Some places we stay with friends or relatives, other places we stay up at hotels or motels—which in many parts of our country, notably the West Coast, have more swimming pools and other amenities or great than all but the newest luxury hotels.

In either case, both husband and wife want with them an at-home robe that doesn't look too bedroom when local friends or hosts, drop in.

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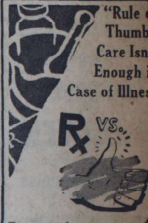

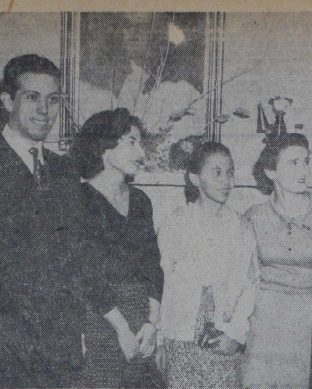

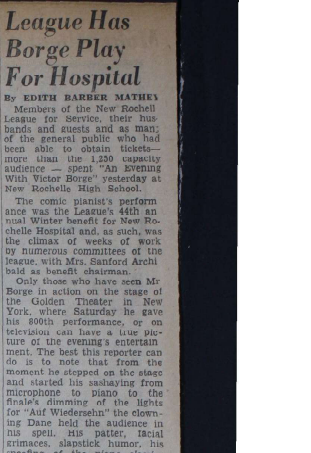

LOYAL INN FIRES BREAK OUT AGAIN Still Smoldering Embers Continue To Flare Up

Flames burst out sporadically yesterday and again this morning at Loyal Inn, Boston Post Road, Larchmont, which was completely wrecked Sunday night in a spectacular four-hour blaze. While the fire was raging early Monday morning coffee and buns were carried to the fire fighters from an emergency unit of the Red Cross called out by Charles Greenall of Larchmont, disaster chairman. Among those assisting were Mrs. George Boelker, chairman of the disaster group of Mrs. Jules Holman whose husband carried coffee in trays to the firemen as they struggled to control the flames.

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Mandeville Speaks Up For Increases Raises For Top County Officials Ride Out Democrats' Buffeting

WHITE PLAINS.— A measure to boost the salaries of three top county officials rode out a wave of stiff debate and sharp political exchange yesterday, then was adopted by a vote of 36-6 by the Board of Supervisors.

The vote fixed salaries for three years, giving Sheriff John E. Hoy and County Clerk Edward L. Warren raises of \$3,190 each and District Attorney Joseph Z. Gagliardi \$300.

Six of the 10 Democratic members opposed the raises. Two of the four who voted for them said they favored the raises for the District Attorney but had to vote for the entire bill because the three salaries were "lumped" together.

Starting Jan. 1, Mr. Gagliardi will get \$17,460 a year and the other two officials \$15,590 each.

Democrat Jumps Gun So intense was the debating that one Democrat started speaking against the matter before it was formally introduced by Supervisor John H. Downing, R., Yorktown, Budget Chairman.

Mr. Downing said that according to State law the salaries of the elected officials could not be changed during their tenure of office. Consequently, he said, this increase would be the only raise in six years for the three—three years past and the next three years. All were released for three-year terms beginning Jan. 1.

Supervisor William F. Byrne, Jr., D., Yonkers' Second Ward was first to speak against the measure. He said it was too

much an increase for anyone in one year.

Supervisor Salvatore Tocco, D., New Rochelle, joined in saying he was against "lumping" the

raises. He said the job of District Attorney deserved the increase but added he was voting against the proposal because it was connected with raises for the other two.

Supervisor Hugh A. Lavery, D., Ossining, also referred to the Board's studies. He said the supervisors are able to pass on salary increases for top officials.

Take Firm Political Stand, Merged Union Advised By Mitchells Reds Stir Up Hate In Asia, Dulles Says Cabinet Aide Urges Clear Labor Voice

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State Dulles today sharply rebuked Soviet leaders for what he termed stirring up an atmosphere of hatred and prejudice against the West on their visit to Asia.

Mr. Dulles told a news conference that the Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev appeared to be aware to conscious use of force by India against the Portuguese colony of Goa.

Such remarks by Soviet leaders, who are now in Burma, show no great desire to lower tensions with the West, he said.

Mr. Dulles added that to this extent the West-Western conference was a success because it has damaged what survives of the friendly East-West relations growing out of last July's Summit meetings.
