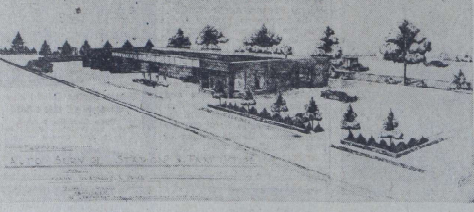

### Ground-Breaking Underway For New Guadagnolo Garage

Ground has been broken for the new Myrtle garage to be constructed on the former Goli Greenhouse property at 5 Fifth Avenue, Larchmont.

The property comprises an acre and a half and runs from Fifth Avenue to the Larchmont access drives of the New England Turnpike. A variance for its construction was granted by the Town of Mamaroneck Zoning Board of Appeals after the area was rezoned in Fall from residential to business C.

Frank Guadagnolo, a 35-year resident of Larchmont, who owned and operated the Myrtle garage at 186 Myrtle Boulevard before the building was destroyed for the Turnpike, is building a new structure which it is said will be one of the most modern garages in the county. Finished with porcelain and stucco, it will conform to the general architecture of new buildings in the area.

The large outdoor parking area to the west of the new structure will be heavily shrubbed across the front portion and partly along one side. The smaller area to the east will also be heavily shrubbed across the front and along the entire side.

**Modern Equipment** Inside the garage will be modern equipment for general car work, body repair and other such service operations. Gasoline pumps will be placed at the edge of the front canopy overhang.

The building will also house at the western end the Larchmont Rapid Taxi Service, also owned by Mr. Guadagnolo.

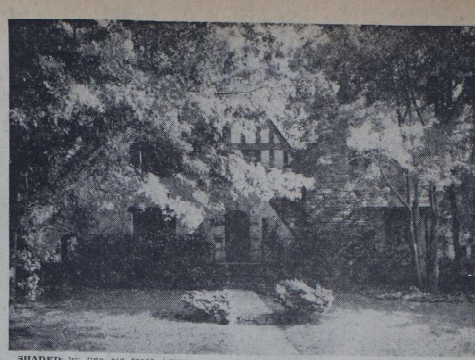

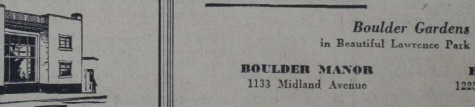

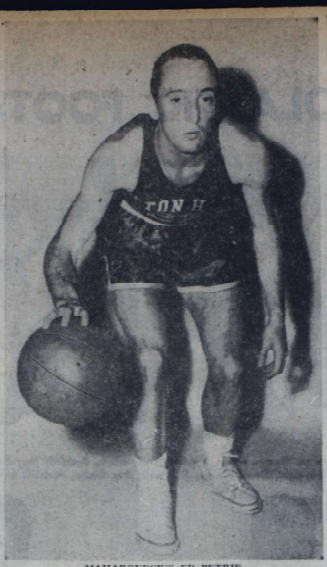

# Mamaroneck's Draddy Repeater On All-County Team

## Iona Prep Star Only Selection From Area

It's All-County time once again. Today Westchester County Publishers Inc. proudly presents its 1955 All-County football team, selected by the 33 best scholastic athletes in Westchester, as determined by countywide ballots of all coaches, officials and sportswriters.

The honor squad, three teams of 11 players each, was designated via a record vote of 121 ballots figuring in the poll. This marks the 17th consecutive year that the Mamaroneck News-Times have conducted the countywide poll to determine the cream of the county's scholastic grid crop.

Here is the 1955 All-County first team, the 11 top vote-getters in the poll:

**Ends**—Jim Peay, Rye, and Frank Burnap, Pelham. **Quarterbacks**—Mario Falco, Harrison, and Tom Sutton, New Rochelle. **Guards**—Bill Draddy, Iona Prep, and Tony Squeo, Edison Tech. **Center**—Jack Pelluci, Pelham. **Backs**—Bill Gundy, Rye. **Fullbacks**—Luis Pirilli, Chester, and Paul Choquet, Pelham.

Rye and Pelham gained slight domination by placing two players each on the first eleven.

**Two Repeat**

It's a repeat performance for two of the stellar gridiron stars of the County first team last year. Gundy, tall, talented Garnet quarterback, was the drawing magnet of the voters, garnering the biggest vote in the poll, a total of 74 votes for the MVP. Voting is based on a 5-3-1 point basis for first, second and third team selection.

Jaezer, Bronxville's powerful, 220-pound fullback, was the second biggest vote-getter, with 57 for 256 points. Port Chester's Luis Pirilli was third with 57 votes for 231 points.

This Gundy and Pelluci became automatic winners of the Most Valuable Player trophies for placing highest as back and lineman, respectively. The MVP trophies are awarded annually by sportsman J. O. Colarusso and Tom Vernon.

Physically, this is one of the biggest first teams ever selected. The backs average 200 pounds per man and more than six feet in height. The line averages a shade under 190 pounds per man and also will over six feet per player. This is also the first time in the poll that the backfield has outdistanced the line.

## Young, MacCurdy 'Cocoaches' Of Year

**HARRISBURG**—What a rare thrill it must be, after 39 years of trying, to have coached that first undefeated team. Len Gray, gruff Howard Leish, Doc MacCurdy had that thrill this year with Roosevelt's varsity football team, which won seven consecutive football games, annexed the mythical SWAC championship and a third consecutive Yankees trophy.

Born in Brooklyn on Dec. 10, 1909, Alexander Young moved to Harrisburg shortly after and became one of the best athletes ever seen at Harrison High School. Starting in his freshman year and continuing through his senior year, 1930, he starred in basketball, football and track. Employed as a halfback fullback, Young captained the Husky grid team in 1929. From there he went to Kent State University in Kent, Ohio, and once again was a standout on the gridiron and diamond through 1933.

He returned to Harrison High three years later as head baseball coach and assistant football coach to George Nelson. In 1945 Young took over the grid reins and held the post ever since.

His club became the talk of the county by going through its first five games undefeated, outscoring the opposition 139 to 29. The Tech team did it twice to take two leads before Harrison fought back to win, 25-13.

"My boys were pulling for an undefeated season," Young reveals now, "but I was secretly hoping Edison would score so my boys would have that on their minds in our big finale against Pelham. Young may have had something at that. Rye scored two quick touchdowns against Harrison to take a 12-0 lead. Had the Huskies gone into the title game protecting an untouchable record, the two TDs could conceivably have completely demoralized the opposition."

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## Campy Edges Snider For National's MVP

**NEW YORK (AP)**—Roy Campanella, thirty-four-year-old Brooklyn Dodger catcher yesterday was named the National League's Most Valuable Player. This is the third time in his eight-year career that Campy has been so honored.

One might think that Campanella, who is slated to manage up to 1957, has no intention of resting on his laurels.

"I think I've got a few good seasons left," he said. "The worst has happened, referring to an injured hand of 1954 which held his batting average to .200 in 111 games. He didn't receive a single vote in 1954, when the Dodgers fell apart and finished a poor second to the Giants.

Campy zoomed back to .318 this year, hit 32 homers and drove in 80 runs as the Dodgers easily on the National League pennant and then beat the Yankees for their first World Series title.

The Brooklyn catcher, receiving eight first place votes from a 24-man committee, polled 225 votes compared to 221 by Snider. The Duke also had eight first place votes.

Ernie Banks, Chicago Cubs' shortstop, was first in six ballots and wound up third with 195. Willie Mays of the New York Giants, didn't receive a first place vote but was fourth with 165, six more than the Phillies' Robin Roberts, who divided the other two first place votes with Pee Wee Reese of Brooklyn.

## Pin Clinic

**ANGLING THE BALL**

Top bowlers have two ways of changing angles on the ball and on slow alleys, and in shooting right-side spars. As each bowler's style is different, the ball will be different.

On a slick-angled alley they hold the right shoulder in-line, straight-on, all the way, so that the ball is thrown more directly at the No. 3 pin or right side of the pocket between the 1-3 pins (according to the angle).

With the slight shoulder pivot the ball swings into an "inside arc" closer to the body, as the right hip clears out of the way. A greater degree of the angle is naturally more to the right. Actually the pivot is a simple movement, but a valuable one. In using it, keep this in mind: Be relaxed throughout. No rushing. In angling to the right, don't over-rotate the hand or wrist. Drive the ball high on the head pin. Let the alley take the ball to the left. Finish the swing smoothly; reach out.

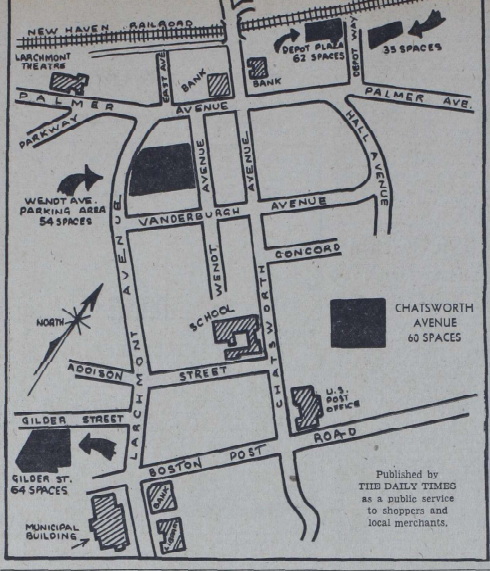

### The Forum 'COMPROMISING OFFER'

One cannot help a certain feeling of dismay after reading of the serious consideration given by the Board of Directors of the Larchmont Community Chest to the \$3,000 offer of the Fund for the Revival of the Watson Controversy. This gift was to be made "unconditionally" in recognition of the "stand" taken by the Chest when charges were made against Goodwin Watson by the American Legion.

It is reported that certain members of the Board had been instructed to meet with an officer of the Fund "to make certain that there were no strings or implications attached to the offer." For us who read the account the strings and implications are all too obvious.

The \$3,000, it is reported, was not to be an ordinary gift, such as yours and mine, but an "award" to be made at the Paine Memorial Hall. One can only imagine the attendant pomp and ceremony, and of course the publicity, planned and unannounced. The revival of the Watson controversy, the opportunity for further attack upon the Legion, and the usual ballyhoo would be ample return to the Fund from its investment. How this would help the Chest which formerly proclaimed the Watson controversy publicly, one fails to discern.

More serious, however, is the aspect which was presumably not intended by the Fund, and most certainly overlooked by the Chest, "the stand" taken by the Chest as a determination of facts to be impartially made, between conflicting assertions of a serious nature, to accept money as an "award" for such a "stand" would certainly be regarded in professional circles as extremely unethical. We certainly would not tolerate it in the case of a judge or an administrative official.

One is left to wonder why the "award" was suspended quite possibly the Paine Memorial would not permit use of its premises for such a purpose. Perhaps, spurred by public criticism of its offer, "awards" the directors of the Fund now realize that anything so nearly approaching bribery is best for neither the Fund or the recipients. One can only wish that the reason for the suspension had more clearly been an immediate and righteous indignation rejection by the Chest of such a compromising offer.

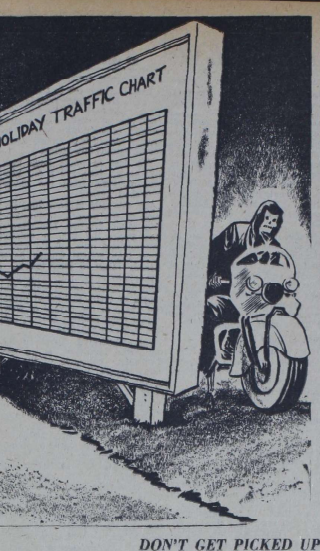
