Let New Homes Pay For New Schools

CROSS THE HUDSON there comes a new, bold proposal from the Tappan School District. It is a recommendation to permit struggling municipalities and school districts to meet increasing costs of public education. And it looks good to us.

Here, briefly, is the idea: The builder of each new home would be assessed \$500 to meet school costs. These \$500 assessments would be placed in escrow to pay for new school additions to old schools as the need arose. Thus, new homes—either apartment units or houses—would pay for the new schools which their own building necessitated.

We repeat, it sounds like a good idea to us. Of course, it is new. So far as we know it has not been tried out anywhere else in the state. And, naturally, there will be objections from developers and contractors and perhaps even building unions. None of these, we think, are good reasons raised, because the higher the cost of a new home the fewer new homes there will be.

With that attitude all straight-thinking persons must naturally agree. But that is not all there is to the picture in any means. There is to be considered the interest of the family already residing in the municipality or school district. Do schools may be satisfactory for them. But newcomers fit their children push up the requirements. Why should the newcomers, then, pay for this added financial obligation laid upon the community?

It will be immediately said that these newcomers do, indeed, pay their way, since they will pay taxes upon their new homes in the same proportion as oldtimers have been paying taxes upon their older homes.

Quite true. But there is usually a considerable lag in time between the creation of a new home and the collection of taxes thereon in sufficient volume to meet the increased school costs caused by the entrance of the new family into the community. This \$500 would, to a degree at least, bridge that gap in time.

Further, this is a fairly simple method of raising badly needed funds. It places the burden upon the developer who is required to meet other requirements laid down, such as paved streets, sewer connections, lighting and the like. And the developer would, we assume, pass on the \$500 as part of the cost of the living unit.

There will be objections, we are prepared to admit. And it is even true that some of these objections are at first glance a very sound basis for a different problem confronting every municipality in the state may have legal obstacles. Nevertheless, on a broad view the plan seems to us to have considerable merit.

We certainly think there is enough common sense in it to justify discussion by our city and town and village authorities.

Why, we ask again, should not new homes be required to pay for the new schools which the new homes themselves ask necessary?

WE THINK HOLIDAY parties are fine. We thrill to the old songs about decking the halls with holly and yearning for a white Christmas and wishing ample rest to all ye merry gentlemen. We are excitedly aroused to nostalgic sentiments by references on New Year's Eve to the obligations that our acquaintance should not be forgot. We might even go so far as to join in on a barbershop rendition of "Sweet Adeline," sometimes quaintly characterized as The Bottle Man of the Republic.

But, we trust our readers will not take it amiss if we offer a kindly suggestion. We hope they will not consider us over-blanketed-at-the-party if we ask on behalf of their smiles and friends that let us all be careful and exercise judgment even in their fun and frivolity.

Specifically, what we are getting at, in rather soundabout fashion, is a warning to all against holiday abandon which may mar the season and perhaps mutilate themselves.

We can repeat all the old warnings. We can remind that gin and gasoline don't mix, that whiskey and wheels are a bad combination, that the life you save may be your own, and so on. Sometimes, however, we feel that these slogans have become so hackneyed they no longer have weight. So, instead of being exact as to what may happen to the inebriated we merely remind that grown folks should not act childish.

It is silly, if it is adolescent, it is even infantile, to take chances after drinking at a holiday party. And this is probably especially true with regard to the traditional "office party" which has in so many cases become synonymous with intoxication.

Let's have fun at our parties, whether at the office or at home. Let's mix and mingle with our friends and our friends' friends. Let's enjoy Christmas to the utmost. Let's ring at the old and sing in the new.

But while we are doing this, let's remember, too, that there is a tomorrow, a day after Christmas, a day after New Year's, a day when we go back to normal, routine living and work. Particularly, let us all be careful driving after the parties. That is what the sweet chariot swings low.

Please, we ask again, don't be offended and think we are spoil-sports.

It's just that we like our readers and want all of you with us through 1956 and for many more years.

Foes Itching To Fight Stevenson

WASHINGTON — Although President Eisenhower's illness has panicked Republicans who counted the 1956 election as a White House walk-in with him at the top of the ticket, his possible retirement from the race has precipitated personal and factional and ideological rivalries that may damage the Democratic cause even against a substitute and less popular GOP nominee. It has given itching feet and hands to redoubtable opponents of Adlai E. Stevenson, who had long been expected to be renominated on the first ballot at a harmonious convention. Instead, he has been subjected to harsh criticism for his "moderation" proclamation by three ambitious Democrats—Governor Averell Harriman of New York, Governor G. Mennen Williams of Michigan and Senator Estes Kefauver of Tennessee.

Although Mr. Harriman and Mr. Williams refuse to announce their candidacies openly, politicians close to both men believe that they would not wear if Mr. Stevenson failed to make the grade. Mr. Kefauver has already complained that the Democratic leaders in several states, notably California, are stacking the cards in Mr. Stevenson's favor.

WILLIAMS' OUTLOOK — The uncertainty about Mr. Eisenhower's plans has upset Governor Williams' carefully arranged Presidential timetable. Only a few days ago, he had planned to step aside next year permitting Mr. Stevenson to wage, as the Michigan man thought, a hopeless battle against Mr. Eisenhower. Do Stores Mind Exchanges?

Question: Please settle an argument for us. A says that after Christmas the stores expect people to return the presents they don't like or can't use and accept them as a matter of course. She says she has no compunction at all about doing this. B says gifts should not be returned or exchanged except for size or damage, that stores don't like their charge. Who is right?

Answer: No store likes to take back merchandise once sold. Small stores often suffer severely, since their stock is limited, and it is harder for them to dispose of seasonal goods a second time. Some of the larger stores have accepted exchange of gifts as a necessary evil, and do try to make up consequent losses. Prices are highly competitive; losses are usually taken in other ways of merchandising. Conscientious people keep their gifts, accept them as presents that have been selected for them, and return them only for the reason that they are lower. Perhaps all prices would be lower if we all shopped more carefully with the intent to keep what we buy.

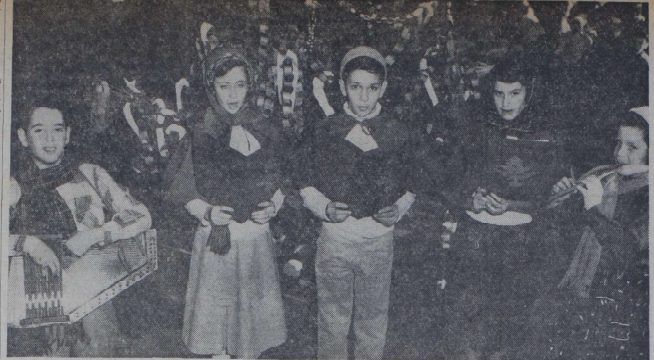

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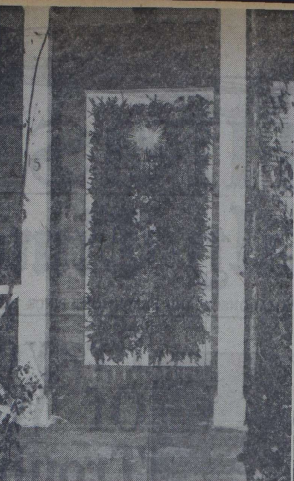

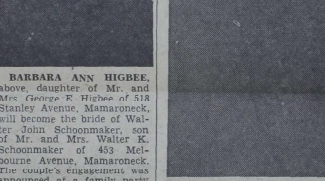
Helen Keller, Miss Cornell Sit For Former County Artist

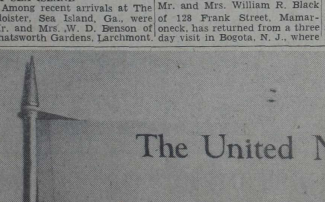
