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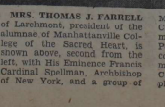
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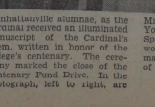

## ISRAELI ATTACK REPULSED, CAIRO EGYPTIANS CLAIM

### Heavy Jewish Casualties Sustained In South Palestine Attack

CAIRO, Egypt, (AP) — Egyptians said today they have repulsed a Jewish land sea air attack against Egyptian positions in Southern Palestine.

"The enemy paid dearly for its aggression, suffering heavy losses," the Ministry of War announced.

The ministry said the action started Tuesday and wound up Wednesday afternoon with Jewish forces in retreat under "repeated and concentrated blows inflicted by our forces."

"A United Nations report from Haifa last night indicated a full-fledged Israeli offensive was underway on our positions," the ministry said. "They were met by our anti-aircraft fire and one raiding plane was shot down near Paldia (designated Egyptian base)."

"Concentrated Jewish land and air forces, supported by armoured cars, artillery and automatic weapons, attacked our positions during the night and early morning hours. Our forces resisted and the battle continued during the night and Wednesday morning. The enemy was forced to retreat under repeated and concentrated blows inflicted by our forces."

## ALL NORTH CHINA IN GRIP OF REDS

### Lull In Fighting Seen 'Calm Before Peace' By Newsman

By HAROLD K. MILKS Associated Press Staff

NANKING — Write off all of central China as a red fringe. The Reds have it.

The lull in the fighting seems permanent. It appears to be the calm before the peace.

Beiping and Tientsin are jammed with well fed, well armed National soldiers. But their withdrawal into two large cities has ended their active participation in the war. They are as useless to Chiang Kai-shek as the thousands he lost in Manchuria.

Today the soldiers in Tientsin, Peiping, Kalgan and Tientsin, Tientsin's port, are waiting with a pretense of defensive activity for a respite of peace.

A North China trip completed yesterday convinces me that the Nationalist will fight to the north of the Yangtze.

On the Communist side, too, there appears reluctance to force the fighting in the north. Red Gen. Liu Xia and other high commanders evidently prefer to await developments from Peiping and Tientsin harbors rather than to fight into the cities. Peiping is filled with Nationalist troops and the other commercial and industrial centers.

Chinese and foreigners alike in North China do not question that the Communists will take over both cities. The only question is when. The majority seem to prefer to wait until the Nationalist are able to save the people such suffering.

## More Snow For Christmas, Maybe Six Inches, Forecast

Weather observers from Washington to Albany today predicted snow for Christmas in this area. A private forecasting service in Boston notified its clients today of snow beginning between midnight and 3 A. M., continuing for 12 to 18 hours and producing from six to nine inches of snow.

In Washington, according to the Associated Press, the forecast said a snow storm sweeping out of the Middle West will hit several eastern states today and tonight. Up to six inches of snow is expected in sections of Kentucky, Ohio, West Virginia and Pennsylvania.

The United States Weather Bureau at Newark Airport issued a forecast predicting snow beginning tonight and continuing tomorrow.

The Albany Weather Bureau joins in the forecast for snow in the New York bureau adds that temperatures may be the lowest 30 so far this season. Not much above the low 30s is forecast for today, and only the upper 20s tomorrow. Figure about five degrees colder tomorrow than today at corresponding hours.

## U. S. SPY PROBE OVER FOR YEAR

Resumption In 1949 Held Dependent On House Committee Vote

WASHINGTON, (AP) — The Congressional spy hearings are over for this year.

Whether they will start again in the new Congress depends on how the House Un-American Activities Committee votes. And it will have at least 40 new members.

The present members are going to pass along some advice to the 1949 committee. But the committee itself isn't going to recommend any returns in its operations.

Rep. Mundt, R. S. D. and N. Y., and Rep. E. C. Rostenkowski, D. Ill., are working on proposals along that line and expect to issue a joint statement.

But the idea of getting the committee to sponsor the suggested changes look on a tie vote. Rep. Donovan, R. Pa., and Hankins, D. Miss. were said to have voted against it.

Mundt said he still intends to give every accused person a hearing before any report is issued about him.

Question witnesses privately so as to prevent unexpected accusations against innocent people in public hearings.

Allow witnesses to submit questions to be asked by the committee to their accusers. The committee itself isn't going to a limited extent.

Withhold all subcommittee reports until the whole committee has passed on them.

The committee now is in the process of filing up some reports. One will be on the spy hearing. Another will deal with Communism in the government.

The third will review the committee's 1947-48 operations and suggest some lines of investigation for 1949.

## ... Council Orders Dutch to Hat War, Release Indonesians

Seven Nations Approve Dictum, 4 Abstain From Voting

PARIS, (AP) — The Security Council today ordered an immediate end to the fighting in Indonesia and prompt release of Indonesian leaders captured by the Dutch.

The council's Christmas Eve vote on these two issues was seven for and none opposed. Four nations abstained.

The council turned down the joint U. S.-Columbian-Syrian demand for withdrawal of Dutch forces from areas seized since the Netherlands attack on the Indonesian Republic started Sunday.

Five nations voted for it and none against, but six abstained. Seven votes are needed for passage in the council.

Issues at stake: the Netherlands be condemned as aggressor.

The council order was based on the American-Columbian-Syrian proposal, as amended.

Delegates made their decisions in a series of ballots on separate paragraphs of the three-power project and two Australian-Syrian amendments.

France, Argentina, Canada, Belgium, the Soviet Union and the Soviet Ukraine abstained on the proposal to issue the cease fire order. France, Belgium, Russia and the Soviet Ukraine abstained on the proposal to order the release of captured Indonesian leaders, though a Russian resolution had proposed the same thing.

All sections of the Soviet resolution condemning Holland for aggression failed to get the seven votes needed for passage.

The cease-fire order was based on proposals originally made by the United States, Syria and Colombia. The order to release President Sukarno, Premier Mohammad Hatta and most of ranking Republican leaders came from an Australian amendment which Syria sponsored.

## More Snow For Christmas, Maybe Six Inches, Forecast

Readings of 20 degrees were general early this morning from Scarsdale to Westchester County Airport and to Croton Park. The temperatures were even across the county in a shift wind which will diminish slowly today, according to the forecast.

A special forecast by the Washington Weather Bureau this morning says:

The snow storm which has extended across the Central and Eastern United States and into the Ohio Valley will continue on eastward during today and tonight. Moderate to heavy snow warnings have been issued for Central and Southern Ohio, Northern Kentucky, West Virginia and the southern portion of Western Pennsylvania. Total depth four to six inches.

Present indications are for snow to five inches for Maryland, Western and Northern Virginia and the southern portion of Eastern Pennsylvania, occurring mainly tonight and tomorrow.

Anyway, the snow would be fine for Santa Claus.

## N. Y. POLICE END DUGGAN INQUIRY

### Death of Scarsdale Resident Still 'Open Case,' Say Authorities

NEW YORK, (AP) — New York City police last night ended an intensive, three-day probe of the death of Laurence Duggan of Scarsdale, but made no immediate comment on their findings.

A short time earlier, however, police said they had found nothing to change their original conclusion that the torpid State Department expert "jumped or fell" to his death.

Duggan, forty-three, plunged 16 floors Monday night from the office of the Institute of International Education, of which he was president.

Deputies said they had concluded their investigation, but that the case was still "open." They would not amplify. A final report was forwarded to Police Commissioner John E. Wallace.

The police probe was ordered after Sumner Waller, former Undersecretary of State, said he was sure Duggan had not taken his own life.

Duggan's name had once been mentioned before the House Un-American Activities Committee, but a committee member said later Duggan had been under no suspicion of espionage activities.

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THAT'S SAYING A MOUTHFUL

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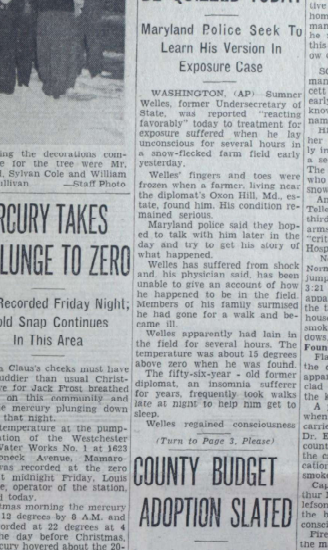

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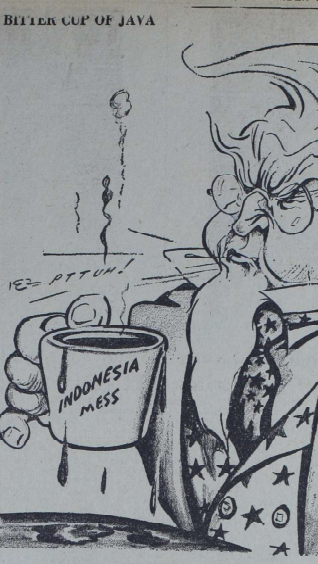

Heavy Opposition Seen Ahead For Labor Bureau Program

By RAY TUCKER

WASHINGTON — Secretary Maurice J. Tobin banks on the strenuous opposition around the White House to aid him in rebuilding the now decrepit Labor Department into one of the most powerful units of the government.

The handsome and energetic politician, who endeavored himself to the President by accepting a "cabinet offer" at a time when it appeared that he might be out of work next Jan. 20, makes no bones about his plan to make his department an all-out, pro-labor headquarters instead of an impartial referee in disputes between the workers and management.

But President Truman recanted that recognition would be an affront to liberals in this country and overseas. It would stir Stalin and other propaganda weapons against us, he has been enough already.

LUXURY TAXES GAIN, LIQUOR PAYMENTS OFF

WASHINGTON, (AP)—November tax collections on furs, jewelry, handbags and cigarette tax in favor had three strong points:

- (1) The need of the Treasury as a possible defense line if Russia should overrun the European continent in a future war.
(2) Spanish manpower.
(3) Spanish strategic position around the Straits of Gibraltar. Even Secretary Marshall and Truman were influenced by these considerations.

MACHINE — Among the agencies which Secretary Tobin wants to bring under his new agency is the U. S. Employment Service Board.

Most of these units are now independent or headed under other agencies such as Federal Reserve and Interior.

It is Tobin's plan to magnify them into his organization, which is now only a shell as a result of a merger by recent Congress. He will have the second most powerful machine at the nation's capital. Agriculture would still rank first, a title which it won in the Nov. 2 election.

PARTISANSHIP — Union leaders will back Secretary Tobin in his demand for more power.

It is probably that President Truman will go along with them because he is eternally grateful to the labor unions for election day. He still figures that when factory workers were re-elected by Congress last year, it was because of their support.

CONCILIATION — Moving the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service and the National Labor Relations Board into such an agency is expected to be a major move.

However, might smother relations between labor and management. It is expected that the Secretary of Agriculture will support a speak up for industry and the farmers, respectively.

It is said that this year alone more than 44 government agencies spent approximately \$1 1/4 billion for health and medical services and \$4 million for veterans.

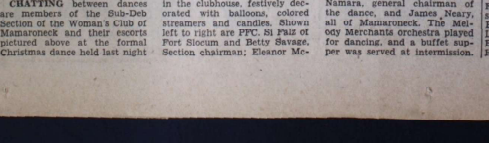

## RUSSIA TO SLASH YUGOSLAV TRADE

MOSCOW, (AP)—Soviet Russia announced today her trade with Yugoslavia will be slashed in 1949 to one-eighth this year's total because of the hostility of Premier Marshal Tito's government.

This was explained in a Russian announcement of a Yugoslav trade pact signed by the Soviet Union's Ministry of Foreign Trade and a visiting Yugoslav delegation Monday.

"In view of the unfriendly policy of the Yugoslav government in relations with the Soviet Union, which have made impossible the maintenance of broad economic cooperation between the USSR and Yugoslavia, the protocol (trade) foresees a reduction in trade turnover to one-eighth as compared with 1948," the announcement said.

It was distributed by Tass, the official Soviet news agency.

The announcement did not state the value of Russian-Yugoslav trade for either 1948 or 1949. Tito was accused by the Russian-led Cominform in June of failing to follow the Communist line. He told his parliament Monday Yugoslavia will sell her goods to the West if the Slav bloc nations fail to honor their trade agreements.

Such Western trade, in fact, already exists. Britain, Italy, Switzerland and Sweden deal with Yugoslavia. The U. S. State Department has expressed interest in developing a sound trade with Yugoslavia, as well as other countries.

## McKellar Wins 27-25 For Senate President

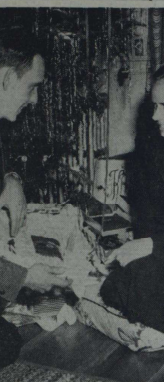
