get last June if the superintendent had recommended it." The infant was too young then," Trustee George Garfunkel commented. "It hasn't grown that much," was Trustee Allen's reply. Trustee Burchell recalled that the board "scrapped" to keep the budget down last spring but Dr. Hicks repeated that at that time the fees for the adult education program had not been levied and that the fees as well as the state aid credit would be found without disturbing the budget. Trustee Harold Barlow declared that "if the money could be found without disturbing the budget" he would be in favor of it but Mr. Burchell reminded the board that an advance would have to be made in anticipation of state aid which would not be forthcoming until next year. The statute which limits the amount of money a school dis-

trict can spend was mentioned by Trustee Fritz who added that if the board must make a choice of expenditures, the first obligation "must be to the children." "I agree," replied Trustee Garfunkel, "but you don't have to make a choice." Trustee Barlow added that the program is designed to be self-supporting. Trustee Burchell said again that he is not in favor of raising a director until the state makes it mandatory and Trustee Garfunkel suggested that the matter be left until the Spring budget hearings when the taxpayers can make their opinions known. The board approved seven recommendations made by Dr. Hicks for the adult program including the hiring of six teachers at a salary of \$8 per session of 120 minutes. Registration was set at \$2 per course for residents except driver-education which is \$3. Non-residents will pay \$3 per course and \$5 for driver-education. A lab fee of \$3 will be charged in connection with the ceramics course. Registration for the second semester will be conducted the second week in January and first semester students will be given first preference. Acting on the advice of Attorney Henry T. Hornidge, the board agreed to allow the two children of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Levy formerly of Pittsburgh, Pa., to attend Rye Neck school although they are temporarily residing in the Mamaroneck District. They will move into their new home at 313 South Barry Avenue as soon as Mr. and Mrs. M. J. Conner, the present occupants, move to a new house now under construction on Shore A.C.E. Drive. The request was made by the Morris Stern Agency and Mr. Stern reported that the family expects to take occupancy March 15.

The board referred to the prospective building program recommended by Dr. Herbert Lane and President Burchell stated that although actual construction will be necessarily delayed because of the present world situation, plans should continue and available building sites investigated. Trustee Allen said that he and Dr. Hicks had surveyed two possible sites and it was agreed that options should be obtained. Trustee Allen also reported that during a recent visit to the Barry Avenue School, he had found the building in an excellent state of "maintenance and cleanliness." A question as to the use of the Daniel Warren gymnasium for basketball ground which Bellow is in use was left to the superintendent with the suggestion that be changed to cover custodial fees and lights each night. Strike Hammers War Effort
 A federal judge last night ordered the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen to end the day-old strike. The government, which seized the nation's carriers last August after a strike threat stemming from a wage hour dispute, said the stoppage was "serious" by interfering with the war effort.

The walkout, which the union termed unauthorized, virtually halted freight movement. It caused some passenger train cancellations and disrupted other industries. Continuation of the stoppage threatened a major delay in the Christmas mails in Chicago, which is a major transfer point for continental mails.

The steel industry was hit almost immediately. Some blast furnaces were banked. There

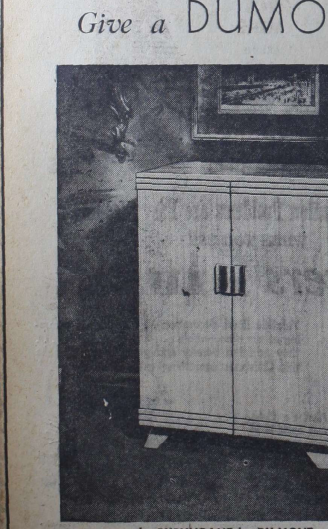

 voy was believed to be carrying supplies for the Reds, massed around Hamburg and Hungnam. In the far northwest, another threat appeared in the growing strength of Red jet fighter planes streaking into action from Manchuria. A security blackout settled over the general picture in the critical Hamburg-Hungnam area of Northeast Korea. But a U. S. 10th Corps spokesman there estimated that 10 Chinese divisions

were putting pressure on the slender beachhead from three directions. A P. correspondent Stau Swinton reported two light ground attacks on the perimeter, which embraces Hamburg and its Hungnam port on the Sea of Japan coast. Both attacks were repulsed. Chinese in company strength were captured American outposts in the first probing attack. The perimeter is manned by elements of three American and two South Korean divisions plus British and Puerto Rico units. They are armed by modern, or more skilled troops drawn to the beachhead from all Northeast Korea. Chinese menacing the perimeter were hammered by carrier-based marine and naval fighters. Also protecting the beachhead were the long-range guns of American warships. Sharp Fight Expected. Field officers expected a sharp fight within the next future. Correspondent Swinton reported down from the north on foot. The heaviest force was moving through the Suichong Valley north of Hamburg. West of the Hamburg-Koto road, Chinese elements moved toward the beachhead.

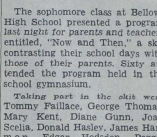

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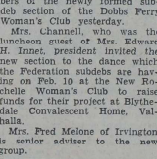

signs on business property. The temporary signs for 720 square feet to replace a sign 50 by 200 feet.

Reached to the next meeting of the board, tentatively scheduled for Jan. 1, was the application of Ralph P. Polini for permission to erect a five-story business building on a vacant lot just west of the new Patricia Gardens Apartments on Palmer Avenue. The land is located in a Class B multiple dwelling district adjacent to a business district.

Frank M. Gagliardi, attorney for Polini, presented six exhibits, including a sketch of the proposed structure, and maps and photographs of the property, and argued that a similar hardship was created for his client because of the shape and location of the property.

Composed of approximately 700 square feet of land, it is located on the north side of Palmer Avenue between the Patricia Gardens and the A and P building. The plot is in the shape of an irregular triangle with a 75-foot rear lot line and a 153-foot side parallel to Palmer Avenue with the apex of the triangle pointing west toward the business section of Larchmont.

Only a business building can be built on the property, Mr. Gagliardi argued, since it is so small multiple dwelling and residential zoning setback requirements would not allow a two-family house to be built.

Testifying as an appraisal expert and backing up Mr. Gagliardi's statements was Albert W. White Plains, who declared that the best use available for the land was the erection of a taxpayer building.

According to plans submitted by Mr. Gagliardi, the building would be on a line with a six-foot high retaining wall in front of Patricia Gardens with the rear corner of the store cut diagonally to overcome any abrupt change in the building line on the lot.

Speaking in favor of the application were Stephen C. Carlin, one of the builders of Patricia Gardens, who maintained stores could add to the appearance of the property and would be similar to the design of the garden apartments. If a 20-foot setback were enforced, he pointed out, the store would be too small to be practical and the building line would tend to drop back on the apartment building line because of the bend in Palmer Avenue.

Mr. Sutton supported the application as a taxpayer, claiming that it would cost the village too much money to fight the application. The case appealed, James Macdonald of a Virginia Place also spoke in favor of the variance.

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The House Appropriations Committee today urged Congress to grant the entire \$16,483,000 asked by President Truman to speed up national defense.

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U. N. COMMITTEE SEEKS WAR'S END

NEW YORK, (AP)—A three-member United Nations cease-fire committee today began a search for ways to persuade the Chinese Communists and battered Nationalist forces to end their bloody war in Korea.

Outspoken Russian opposition to the committee was expected to be a major factor in its efforts, but the committee went ahead nevertheless.

India's Sir Benerup N. Rau and Canada's Lester B. Pearson held their first meeting—personally today. Their next move appeared to be to seek from Dr. Chin representative Wu Shih-chang that his government consider acceptable cease-fire terms.

The U. N. reportedly has said it will stop fighting if the Reds do the same. Though Mr. Wu has made no public statement, Russian Jacob A. Malik has said the Chinese will withdraw from Korea if foreign (United Nations) troops pull out.

The General Assembly, with only the Soviet bloc in opposition, established the committee yesterday and told it to seek terms with the committee.

The resolution named Mr. Entenman to head the group and immediately appointed Sir Benerup and Mr. Pearson.

Liaison Officers named by the U. S., which with Britain supported the proposal, named N. delegate Ernest A. Gross and Lt. Gen. Willis Critchfield to serve as American liaison officers with the committee.

CHINESE HORDES SEIZE HANGHUNG

Defenders Withdraw Into Tight Ring Around Beachhead

TOKYO (AP)—Allied beachhead forces abandoned Hamhung today to the Chinese Reds pounding against them in swarms of "sea waves" attacks.

The defenders withdrew from the wrecked industrial city into a tight ring around Hamhung port on the Sea of Japan six miles to the southeast.

Demolition charges blasted the heart of Hamhung before the pullout.

Terro-stricken North Korean refugees swarmed by tens of thousands across frozen fields and down roads toward the allied beachhead.

The Chinese swarmed into the beleaguered city from the north and east, forcing the defenders to withdraw as they were thrown east.

The city lay open to Chinese gunners who watched from outlying ridges as demolition cascaded towering clouds of black smoke into the sky.

The Chinese swarmed into the Hamhung suburbs.

They pressed allied defenders into their shrinking beachhead with attacks that overran forward positions by sheer weight of manpower masses.

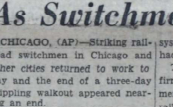

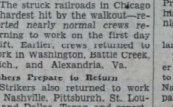

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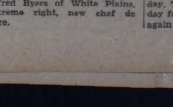

The Indian diplomat will report back to the committee, probably Monday, on the result of his talks with Wu, and the group will then try to reconcile the opposing views with the aim of finding the basis for a truce.

CHICAGO (AP)—Striking railroad switchmen in Chicago and other cities returned to work today and the end of a three-day crippling walkout appeared near at hand.

However, there was some question whether the strike issues themselves had been settled. Some persons who were in on talks at Washington said no actual agreement had been reached on issues. They said union leaders were told the strikers would have to return to work before further negotiations.

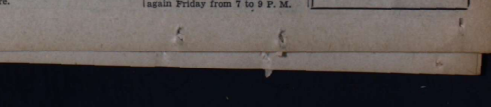
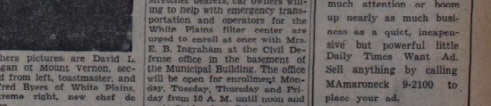
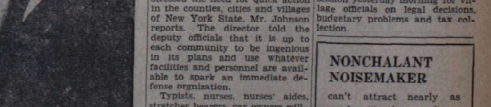
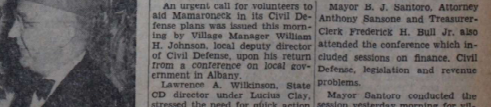
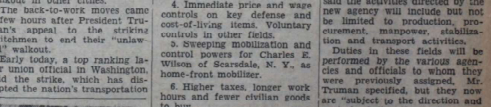
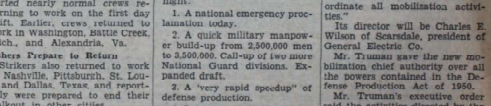
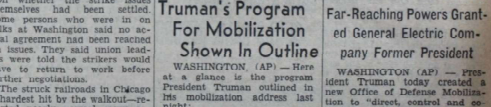
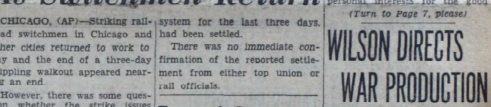
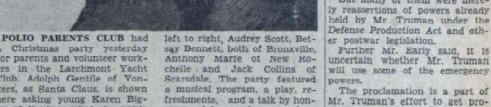
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Stepinac checks Belows despite Petrie's 36-Point Effort

EX-COPS, FIREMEN PROTEST PHONE RULE

MOUNT VERNON—Members of the Retired Police and Firemen's Association of Westchester last night protested the new policy of the New York Telephone Co. under which information operators no longer give a telephone listing from a street address alone, but require the full name and address of the subscriber.

The action was announced by Nathan Yasudoff, secretary, who said that the group plans an appeal to the Public Service Commission on its contention that the new system works a hardship on people with poor vision and those who are elderly.

In announcing the change last week, company officials described it as an experiment in Westchester undertaken because a survey showed that less than 5 per cent of inquiries would be affected although supplying the service costs thousands of dollars annually. The utility also contended that such service goes far beyond the original purpose of the information service to supply new or changed numbers and to help in cases of emergency.

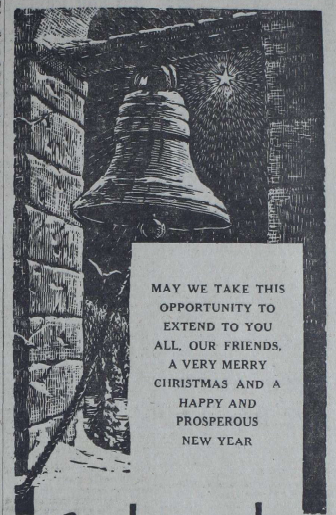
