A total of \$1,002 has been collected in Larchmont to date from the appeals made by letter in the Larchmont Paralytic drive. It was disclosed this morning.

Mr. George Scott, co-chairman, announced that \$116 has been collected at the Larchmont Playhouse, which butters the collection money amounting to \$25.95.

Collections at the theater will close Thursday in Larchmont. PARSHALS SEEM CLOAKED IN SILENCE; WAKE BOMBED; JAP-HELD ISLANDS APPROACHING PEARL HARBOR

Jap-Held Islands Pounded For 25th Straight Day

PEARL HARBOR, (AP)—A highly accurate bombing by two squadrons of Navy bombers, intended to prevent Japan's Wake Island air base from interfering with the current American offensive in mid-Pacific, was reported last night by the Navy but further operations of a mighty task force against the Marshalls were cloaked by official silence.

In two announcements, spaced by only a few hours, the Navy told Air Commanders dropping all bombs on or near the designated targets at Wake Sunday night and at land-based Army and Navy planes operating through the 20th straight day of the largest area of warships ever sent against the Japanese. It had been disclosed officially that Saturday carrier planes of the task force carried a powerful assault on the Marshalls, 700 miles south of Wake, Sunday the naval units, including battleships, were reported to have more than 100 bombs on the air bases and shipping lagoons of those atolls.

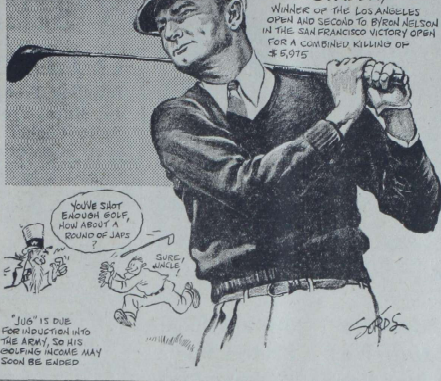

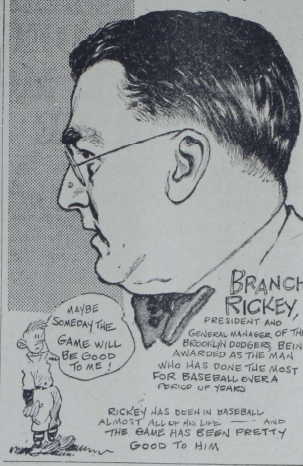

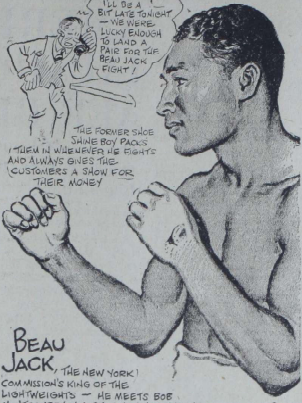

Mayor Goecker Requit Office At End of Term

Trustee Cullen Also Decides Not To Run Again

Mayor Harry E. Goecker will not be a candidate for reelection at the municipal elections to be held the third Tuesday in March. He was elected last night at the Larchmont Village Board meeting at the Municipal building. Mayor Goecker will have served nine years on the village board, the expiration of his term on April 1, 1934.

Trustee Vincent Cullen, the only Democrat on the Village Board, also announced his intention not to accept nomination for a fourth term, after having served six years. In announcing his decision the mayor said, "I'm retiring from office at the end of my term. I'll make a more formal statement later, but I want to say now that I certainly enjoyed working with all of you men. You were most cooperative, and we really had a good time."

"You have seen and are a crack-jack mayor," said Trustee Frank W. Boel, who was charging a cold, "and I might add, I regret at the mayor's decision. Trustee Frank Washburn immediately followed the mayor with the remark that Trustee Boel's statement was unimpeachable. "You have seen and are a crack-jack mayor," said Trustee Vincent Cullen, "and I might add, I'll be said later, with a little smile, that it's surprising to see a Republican keeping so much intelligent time on village matters."

To which Mayor Goecker retorted, "Go and tell your friends about it, maybe you'll scare 'em." After regret was expressed at the announcement by Vincent Cullen that he would not run at the end of his term, trustee Boel made a speech, in a quiet, businesslike manner, addressing himself to the village board, and then returned to his seat. "You've done for them, but they're going to find out. It's a retrospective report for the year 1933, compiled by Henry T. Houghton, supervising chemist, was referred to the board.

The report was signed by Charles McCullough and was owned by the Village Engineering Company, was presented by Village Engineer Arthur Richards, and referred to Trustee Louis for recommendation. The board accepted the report, previously owned by the village, and the committee May 4.

Bond Sales Decline For Third Day

Day's Purchases Drop To \$4,656 With Total Now Only \$248,363

War Bond sales in the Village decreased for the third consecutive day yesterday when of bonds were sold for a total of \$4,656. The Fourth War Loan Drive has to the total \$248,363 toward the quota of \$400,000 with a sale of 1,914 individual pieces.

The War Finance Committee has endeavored during the campaign, to prove that the citizens of this community are patriotic enough to prove their patriotism. (Charles Wadell, chairman, said today, "We want to see more people without a circus of any kind.")

Reports have been made by the War Bonds, he said, that real estate has not been so responsive as the committee expected during the house-to-house canvass. Several having stated that they had not bought bonds and did not expect to.

Several purchasers have not filled out pledge cards brought home by the canvassers. Explaining they did not wish to indicate the denomination of the bonds they intended to buy, Mr. Wadell reported "It is not necessary to say how many or what kind of bonds you wish to buy. It is only necessary to say 'I am going to buy' and what you are going to buy and when."

Of the 67 bonds sold yesterday, the County Trust Company was responsible for 27 at a total of 2,012.30. The Postoffice sold 18 amounting to \$1,200. The Playhouse, 13 totaling \$1,093.25; The Union Savings Bank, 5 for \$145.75; and the Federal Reserve Bank, one at \$175.

While a total of 67 got collected in the Fourth War Loan drive for the week ending Saturday shows an increase below the amount collected the preceding week, the number of purchasers has increased. It was reported this morning by Richard E. McGrath, campaign chairman.

The \$1,500 thermometer at the Free Parking Station opposite the main branch of the Bank of Westchester will be stopped up this afternoon to \$23,000.

Frankfurt, a city of half a million, near the junction of the Main and the Rhine Rivers, already has been damaged severely by three heavy RAF attacks which will over 800 tons of bombs, including 1,800 tons of explosives last Jan. 20th.

German Defense In Dnieper Bend Finally Broken

MOSCOW, (AP)—Russian troops closed in on the iron core of Kriev Rog today from three sides and also advanced in the direction of the Black Sea ports after breaking the long and tenacious German defense in the Dnieper bend at Nikopol.

Hitler at Kriev Rog may have repented his more characteristic mistake in Russia of waiting too long before retreating. He lost 15,000 dead and 2,000 captured as well as enormous stores of booty at Nikopol, a major source of ammunition essential for hardening German lines.

The Germans have large numbers of tanks and heavy armor at Nikopol. They were no sign of withdrawal despite the threat of almost certain encirclement. The only railroad still open to the front center leads to Dolinka, a junction of miles west on the Nikolayev line.

As Malinovsky's Red Star said the ten entrenched Nazi divisions near Chernyav were being exterminated and that the officers and men in the death pocket were looking hope.

Mayor Explains 'Why Recreation' At P.T.A. Meeting

Mayor N. J. Santoro opened his talk yesterday on "Facilities Offered by the Village for Child Recreation" by asking "Why Recreation?" The question was addressed to members of the Mamaroneck Avenue School Parents Teacher Association at the February meeting.

"The answer," said the Mayor, "is a simple one because of juvenile delinquency which knows no class distinction, as many parents come from good homes and do not have it. I do not have it, so do not have recreation program." He continued, "because I have an excellent deck of the lack of such in our home town. Of course there is no substitute for mother love and the mother must first take a hand with her child because when a child does a wrong it hurts the mother and the child suffers more for this than for the wrong it has done."

The Mayor explained the work carried on by the Child Welfare Association which provides a clinic for pre-natal care, dental work and prescribes and give advice on the care of the child. He also spoke of the visiting nurse who, he said, is glad to call on those who need her aid whether or not they are in a position to compensate.

He brought out the fact that Harbor Island had some of the best recreational facilities during the summer, with its tennis, swimming and boating clubs, under the supervision of a professional instructor and his wife.

Mayor Santoro concluded his talk by complimenting the staff in charge of recreation during the summer and hoped that they would continue the program.

"A marked decrease in delinquency was noted during the summer when these programs were in progress," he stated. He showed a colored map of Harbor Island displaying the future plans for the Island, now being carried out by the Post-War Planning Commission.

Mrs. Richard Turner, president of the P. T. A. conducted a business meeting preceding the talk. Members discussed a suggested hobby group for mothers. Mrs. Harold Kuntz, chairman of the War Bond and Stamp sales, reported that there was an increase of \$2247.75 in sales this year over last year.
