War Bond Sales Take Big Drop

Only \$59,092 in Bonds And \$4,327 in Stamps Sold During January

BELOW 1943 TOTAL

Whether there's a post-war bond drive slump along or whether bond buyers have been high-pressed into lending their money to Uncle Sam, Gabriel Wende, chairman of the Village of Colmar, did not know yesterday, but the fact is, the January sale of bonds and stamps in the community took a nose dive as a starter for the 1943 financial support of the war effort.

The five issuing agencies reported a total of \$59,092.75 in bonds sold during the month and an additional sum of \$4,327.15 in stamps.

It is difficult to find a fair comparison for the figures which are thereby a drop in the bucket in relation to the 6th War Loan drive last month and are still well below the record for January, 1943, when there was a drive to \$1,000,000.

The nearest January of all comparable, that is that of two years ago, when the drive turned in \$87,825 in bonds and \$3,407.80 in stamps.

It seems from the January figures," Mr. Wende declared, "that there are people who buy regularly and buy generously but the bulk of the people don't do a thing until the heat is turned on."

The report given by the five agencies for January follows with the amount sold in January, 1943, in parentheses:

Ford Analyzes Peril in Rise of Racism

Ideas and ideals count tremendously in life, despite the defeatists, the corrupt and the master-racists, the Rev. Fred Ford, New Rochelle minister and member of the Mayor's Commission on Interracial Relations, told a discussion group of the Larchmont Chapter of the Promotion of Peace Planning Thursday night at the Larchmont Public Library.

The nature of the new world will be determined by the ideas of the present generation, he said, and the words and ideas will act as weapons, he said, raising the question as to "whether we are living in the 20th century of the Christian era or the 19th century of another pagan age."

In a discussion entitled, "Is Democracy Safe With Hitler?" Ford declared the racial problem was the "big question," especially race and a league of nations, and minority groups.

The frank rejection of fellowship, the glorification of brutality and the rampant anti-Semitism are alarming factors in the rise of racism," he said. "The problem is highly charged emotionally, and our only hope for solution is with those who are not defeatist, master-racists, and corrupt."

"Fundamental to all else is the fact that people are people regardless of their superficial differences," he said. "The creed that all men are created equal is the basic ideal and tenet of Christianity, Judaism and democracy."

Our hope for solution which we come for coercion but rather through persuasion, is in establishing meeting places for people to get together and discuss the problem. This can be done much more easily than anyone now here would care to admit."

Dr. Ford spoke of Dr. Clyde Miller's Springfield address, which is in operation in a modified form in the New Rochelle school. He said that the school is under way toward fostering good will among students of different racial backgrounds.

He emphasized the "wrongness" of raising the Negro in the democratic faith and subsequently denying him the same opportunities. The speaker was introduced by Joseph C. McLean, principal of Mamaronck Senior High School, a question period followed his talk.

SOVIETS ATTEMPT TO CROSS RIVER TO BERLIN; ALLIES FIRE BARRAGE BELOW STRASBOURG

Railroad Escape Bridge Shelled From Mile Away

PARIS—American and French troops cleared 30 miles of the left bank of the Rhine below Strasbourg today and laid a heavy artillery barrage on the Neufbrunn railroad escape bridge from less than a mile away.

In the center of the Western front, the American First and Third Armies probed deeper into the thickly wooded Siegfried Line and advanced up to two miles in the center of the western slopes of the Eifel Mountains opposite the late Ardennes push.

Half a dozen German hamlets were taken, more lines of dragon teeth tank barriers were passed; scores of pillboxes—many undefended—were captured.

The active German resistance in the center strengthened the suspicion that the enemy might be falling back to the Rhine from 20 to 50 east of present battle lines in the western sector.

An announcement from Lieut. Gen. Jacob L. Devers, Sixth Army group commander, said that the Allies had taken the victory below Strasbourg in an area manned until recently by 25,000 resolute German troops.

The threat to the Aasian capital was all but dissipated, for the Allies were making a north, pushing the Germans to points about 15 miles away from Strasbourg.

The U. S. Third and 28th Divisions and French First Army troops fought to near Biesheim, a hamlet near Neufbrunn.

Colmar itself was almost surrounded and Allied troops fought scores of pillboxes—many undefended—were captured.

Andelsheim, Widenolzen, Artzenheim and Neufbrunn, between Colmar and the Rhine, were captured. Colmar, capital of Haut-Rhin province, lies 40 miles south of Strasbourg.

Shops Comply As Brown-out Goes In Effect

Compliance of store owners and innkeepers in Larchmont and Mamaronck with the new "brown-out" regulations to conserve utilities was described by the police as "very good" this morning as the first night of observance ended.

The village of Mamaronck, Chief Arthur W. Martensen said that there were three minor violations on Mamaronck Avenue but that they were apparently due to misunderstanding and the owners agreed to comply immediately.

Reds 59 Miles From Berlin, Say Russian Reports

War Fund Drive Chairmen Map Plans To Meet Quota Of \$44,500 In Larchmont

Plans for raising Larchmont's quota of \$44,500 in the 1945 War Fund drive of the American Red Cross were discussed last night at a meeting of district chairmen and vice chairmen at the home of G. Freeman Whitbeck, 34 Woodstock Avenue.

Mr. Tibbette, 1945 executive campaign chairman, pointed out that the budget represented an increase of \$1,200 over the 1944 quota, representing Larchmont's share in mounting demands for Red Cross services in the European and Pacific theaters of war.

Attention Women

ADDRESSED to the women of Westchester is a stirring appeal in the current issue of the Westchester County Medical Society Bulletin, urging a response to the crying need for more nurses, both for the civilian home front and the wounded on our farflung battle lines.

"This is your concern—and ours," says the article in the bulletin, written by spokesmen for the Nursing Council for War Service. "You are to encourage your daughters to study nursing, you to help call to your attention the now desperate need of the armed services whose casualties demanding nursing care recently have risen 270 per cent, whose battle casualties are arriving in the Army hospitals at the rate of 30,000 to 32,000 each month.

"We, the physicians of the Medical Society of the County of Westchester, can provide the medical knowledge and skill to aid the sick, to keep down absenteeism in industry, to man the operating rooms of our civilian hospitals as our absent members are manning the operating rooms of field hospitals, serving battalion aid stations all over the world.

You, the women and mothers of Westchester, will have to provide the nursing care for the armed forces and the civilian sick yourselves if you are nurses, or through your daughters if you are not."

The Westchester County Nursing Council needs help. It needs help in student nurse recruitment for the U. S. Cadet Nurse Corps, in the dissemination of information in the schools in the expansion of the appeal for more and more nurses, those ready through experience and those to be made ready through training. The Council's office is at Room 928, County Office Building, White Plains.

Suggested Solution

TAXPAYERS in Westchester, through representative organizations, have urged that the County make every effort, in turning over to New York State the Pelham-Putnam Parkway right-of-way, to have the State reimburse the County for the \$2,000,000 expended by the County in acquisition of the land. The County is definitely committed to a policy of building no more through-travel arteries at its own expense, so the land now has lain idle for more than a decade.

The State tentatively has agreed to take the land and utilize it as a link in the proposed New England Thruway, to run eventually from New York City to Boston. In return for the County contributing the land, the State agrees to meet construction costs estimated at \$1,000,000 and to reimburse the County for the right-of-way on other through-travel highways bought from private owners if should pay the County for this right-of-way. The State, however, is adamant that it will not reimburse municipalities or counties for right-of-way acquired for such purposes.

The question at this point resolves itself into whether Westchester shall, as permitted in legislation last year, transfer the land to the State without recompense except for State construction, or whether it shall endeavor to get the land and utilize it thereby at least "putting it back on the tax rolls. If, however, this latter alternative is followed, the State would reimburse the County for at least \$2,000,000 in new private owners or forget the thruway altogether. The County is not certain that this which would be taken by Albany.

To solve this money problem, the County has advanced the idea that the State, after construction, charge tolls to meet the cost of construction, and also to reimburse Westchester for acquisition costs. Toll collections could be arranged so that the State in ratio of amounts expended, and when the project had liquidated their tolls could be removed.

This is one suggestion which might prove equitable and satisfactory to both administrations. We suggest that it be submitted at Albany.

H. Bozell To Retire As Trustee

Larchmont Republicans Designate Coombs and Gulliday For Election COMMITTEE MEETS

The Village Republican Committee, at its meeting Monday night, voted unanimously to recommend as candidates for trustee at the Larchmont Spring election, Gulliday to succeed H. Bozell, and Arthur W. Coombs to succeed Trustee Harold V. Bozell.

The action of the Republican Committee is announced by the chairman, Rudolph S. Nelson, who said that Mr. Bozell had requested his intention to retire and requested the committee to find a successor.

In expressing his views to the committee, Mr. Bozell paid tribute to the other members of the Board of Trustees and pointed out that it was an advantage of the Village to have rotation in the personnel of the Board with the aim of bringing fresh viewpoints and also to make it possible for more citizens to have a first-hand view of and responsibility for the problems of the Village, its government and operations.

Mr. Bozell's decision was accepted with regret by the committee. Speaking for the committee, Mr. Nelson stated that the Village was "greatly indebted to Mr. Bozell for his loyal and devoted attention to the duties of trustee and that none had ever given more generously and effectively of his time and energy to the competent management of the Village than Mr. Bozell's record of service with the Village. Mr. Nelson also stated that the first connection was as a member of the Fire Department, which was later transferred to the 12th AAF squadron in the early 20's. On 1,700-Mile Raid

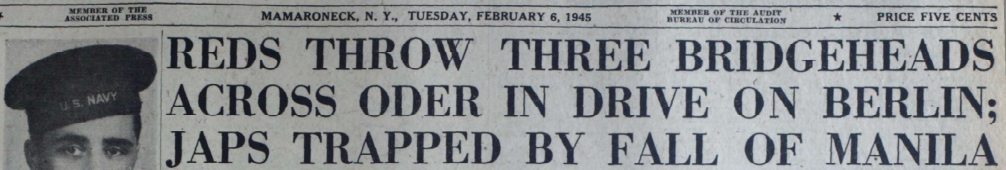

MANILA, (AP)—Liberation of Manila and more than 5,000 prisoners from three years of Japanese subjugation was proclaimed today by Gen. Douglas MacArthur, who immediately took up the new war cry, "On to Tokyo!"

The knockout dash on First Cavalry and 37th Division Yankees smashed across the Pasig River barrier in the city's heart.

Complete destruction of the Japanese defenders "is imminent," MacArthur announced. Caught in a three-way trap, the enemy can go only toward Manila Bay, which is constantly under American bombings.

Several oil dealers were completely out of supplies. Emergency deliveries were being made by suppliers who have a stockpile. The comparatively mild weather conditions have helped in obtaining supplies of fuel.

Three German Cities Targets In Mass Raids

LONDON, (AP)—Some 2,000 American planes staged one of the greatest raids in Germany today, attacking Leipzig, Magdeburg and Chemnitz, the latter being a major industrial center.

The raid was the first since the attack on Berlin in the 25-mile long air train which was launched from the base at Leipzig, 85 miles south and west from Berlin, is a possible haven for the Luftwaffe.

Chemnitz is 40 miles farther south, Magdeburg is 70 miles west and south of Berlin.

Several other towns in central Germany also apparently were hit. A preliminary announcement said the targets were Leipzig, Chemnitz and Magdeburg.

About 800 Mustangs and Thunderbolts flew escort.

The day raids followed a night Masquito attack on Berlin, which delivered action bombs blasted in Saturday's huge Flying Fortress raid.

No Terms Yet Agreed Upon For Transfer By County To State Of Parkway Route

WHITE PLAINS—While Westchester has approved legislation permitting the County to transfer the Parkway to the State of New York in return for State construction, the terms under which such transfer to the State will be made have not yet been agreed upon. Further, the Board of Supervisors will be asked to approve any such terms before any transfer is made.

This was the consensus among leaders of the Board of Supervisors yesterday afternoon after Jefferson Armstrong, Yorkers 11th Ward, had asked for information on the status of the March, 1944, legislation which would permit the County to transfer the Parkway to the State.

LONDON, (AP)—The Berlin Radio declared today Russian troops had captured three bridgeheads over the Oder River east of Berlin, and the Nazi High Command ordered an offensive in the capital, to Soviet troops landing out in new offensives in Silesia.

An afternoon broadcast from Berlin said that General Gregory Zhukov's men had established two more bridgeheads south of Frankfurt in the front assault on Berlin. A crossing 35 miles north-south of Berlin in the area north-south of Frankfurt was announced.

Berlin said one of the latest crossings was at Furstenberg, on the Oder west bank 14 miles south of Frankfurt and 47 miles southeast of Berlin.

Soviet units won a third bridgehead, three miles south of Furstenberg, a Transcon broadcast declared.

It added that a "temporary" crossing had been made between Frankfurt and Kuestrin on a line from 20 to 30 miles from Berlin, but that this bridgehead had been wiped out.

Russian siege guns were battering the Germans across the Oder, said the Berlin radio. Soviet planes were attacking the front east of Berlin, and Moscow dispatches indicated "important new crossings might be announced in that sector."
