Jackson To Run For 5th Term

Trustee To Enter Race To Succeed Himself On Village Board

TWO OTHERS RETIRE

Trustee James Jackson will be a candidate to succeed himself on the Manhattan Village Board, it was learned today.

Mr. Jackson is expected to present his name to the Village Republican Committee for recommendation to the G.O.P. caucus as a candidate for reelection next month.

The Republican caucus must select two other candidates to fill terms which expire this Spring. Both Trustees Howard S. Meighan and Trustee Edwin R. Dooly have announced that they will retire from the Board at the expiration of their present terms. No candidates have as yet been advanced for the vacant posts.

Mr. Jackson has served on the Village Board since April 6, 1937. He was appointed to fill the remaining year of the unexpired term left vacant by the elevation of Thomas F. Johnson from trustee to mayor. He has remained on the Board ever since, successfully completing his second year.

Bombs Rout 300 Nazis From Lofly Abbey Post

NAPLES, (AP)—Waves of Flying Fortress dropped bombs on the centuries-old Benedictine monastery at Mt. Cassino today to help clear the road to Rome, routing almost 300 Germans from the lofty observation post where they had directed murderous fire against American doughboys. As the smoke of the aerial bombardment died down, Allied big guns started shelling the abbey grounds.

The bombing hitting the Benedictines Abbey founded in 529 A.D., rained down in support of American infantry attacking the hill against machine-gun and artillery fire, and offered a warning to monastic life refugees to vacate the abbey.

The dozens bombs sent great gusts of gray and black smoke spiraling above the Benedictine Monastery, blotting it from sight. One Eighth Air Force plane hit the abbey again, and others crashed upon the German positions nearby on the top of the hill. German heavy machine guns were silenced by the bombing.

Start Racing In New York On April 8

NEW YORK—Plans for the 1944 racing season have been formally assigned by the New York State Racing Commission. It was announced by the commission recently. The New York program will start on Saturday, April 8, and will run for 181 days, concluding on Nov. 4.

These dates do not include an application which is pending for the United States Racing Association, nor do they include a possible Victory meeting, planned at the end of the regular season and with state charities benefiting. Last year the Victory meeting returned about \$50,000 to New York charities.

As has been the case for many years, the opening meet of the season will be at Jamaica, where 25 days of racing will be held. Activities will then be transferred to Belmont Park, which will open on May 8. Belmont's Spring program will comprise 24 days, and Aqueduct will follow, opening on June 5 and running through July 1. The Empire City dates after July 3, through July 29 and the Saratoga schedule is July 31 through Sept. 2.

Dates in Fall Meets

The Fall program will commence on Sept. 1 at Aqueduct. After 12 days there the spot will move to Belmont, where it will be conducted from Sept. 13 to Oct.

4 Nazi Divisions Driven Back In Counter Blows

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, NAPLES, (AP)—Allied forces are holding their lines intact on the battered Anzio beach-head after smashing back attacks by four full German divisions—40,000 to 60,000 men—in the strongest Nazi counter blows yet delivered, Allied Headquarters announced today.

The Fifth Army on the main front to the east, reinforced by New Zealand and Indian troops, lighted a ring on Cassino in the northeast, northwest and south, cutting two highways west of Monte Cassino and reaching the railway station south of the town after shoving 50,000 steel into the driving strength.

The powerful Nazi assault before Rome knocked a hole in the Allied lines of the front in the town of Anzio, but Fifth Army tanks and infantry struck back in several places, forcing the counterattacks.

Biggest Nazi Raid In Year Hits London

LONDON (AP)—German heavy and medium bombers, striking in double the strength of any recent raid, hit London in three waves last night and left a trail of smoldering ruins and shattered windows in their wake.

The last official estimate was that about 150 of the night raiders slanted at the capital area. Although all of them penetrated the umbrella of terrific anti-aircraft fire thrown over the city, the damage was the most widespread of any attack of the past year and 1943.

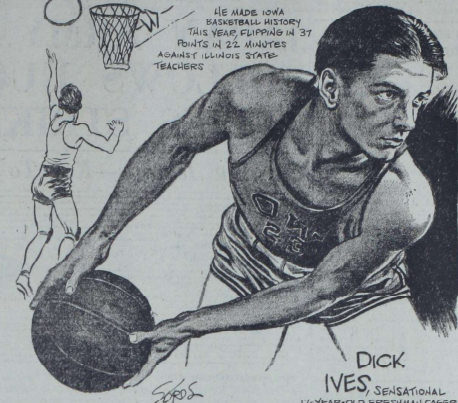

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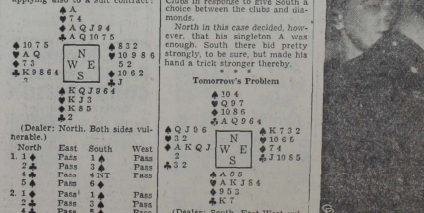

"If the taxes in a community do not make possible a program which would cost seventy dollars per year, the State would not have the difference. However, that program was never reached and during the last year we could not get it level up to \$60 per pupil.

"The present program calls for an average of \$15 per pupil and it is clear that New York can do it more than any other State, that each child has an education level at least that much."

Dr. Mort believes that learning reading, writing and arithmetic, the fundamentals of education, can be taught in many different ways. "The child must learn from environment and communication," he stated. "He learns when he studies home, science and history, and all these studies he is learning patterns of behavior. He is learning respect for the other person's property."

Dr. Mort concluded his talk by saying that the schools of the State are doing a good job. "In the modern school," he continued, "we do not have that feeling of hurry because you are not studying for a test, you are studying for the good teacher knows that."
