County Weighs Town-Village State Aid Plan

WHITE PLAINS—Division of town and village state aid under the Moore Plan was discussed when the Board of Supervisors met with the County Legislature last week. At a result of the meeting presided over by James D. Hopkins of North Castle, chairman, the committee decided to continue its study of Moore Plan state aid and report at a later date.

Supervisors present yesterday pointed out that no town representative participated in formulation of that part of the Moore Plan which treats villages in Westchester differently from towns of the county. Discussion also brought out the fact that traditionally Westchester towns, because of special expense burdens they assume which towns in other counties do not bear, have

received larger shares of state aid than the others.

Since 1916 towns have guaranteed to the State, County, School Districts and Special Districts, the entire amount of their tax levies, but assumed as the entire tax levy is never collected in one year, the towns have to borrow to finance the difference between their guarantee and the taxes taken in.

The conference brought out the possibility of cost of welfare administration being thrown back on the towns. Under the present setup, the County unit plan of welfare administration, welfare is no longer controlled by the towns. But the law provides the Board of Supervisors must renew the system every two years. That makes the return of welfare administrative costs to the town possible.

Social Security Positions Open To Job Seekers

The attention of local residents was called today by Allan Sack, manager of the New Rochelle Social Security Office, to a special examination which has been announced by the Executive Secretary of the Social Security Administration, Board of Civil Service Examiners. The positions, aimed at securing trained personnel for the settlement of claims for O. A. S. payments, are (1) Adjudication Reviewer (Trained) CAP-6, \$3021.00 to \$3735.60 per annum, and (2) Adjudication Reviewer, CAP-7, \$3397.20 to \$4149.60 per annum.

Positions will be in the area of offices of the Bureau of Old-Age and Survivors Insurance in the following cities: New York, N. Y., Chicago, Ill., Kansas City, Mo., Philadelphia, Penn., Birmingham, Alabama and San Francisco, Calif.

Qualifications for applicants are of two kinds: experience and education. Experience to qualify for the position is as follows: "Candidates must have had three years of experience for Grade CAP-6, and four years of experience for Grade CAP-7. Adjudication Reviewer, in a business or industrial enterprise, Government agency, or administrative ruling requiring a determination of law and fact in the more complex claims arising under the law, contract, government order, or regulation making the force and effect of law against a government or private agency for benefits, annuities, or payments."

Such work must have involved "the interpretation and application of laws, regulations, decisions, policies, or administrative rulings requiring a determination of law and fact resulting in the allowance or disallowance of such claims." The Civil Service official declared.

A legal education or membership in a bar of a State can be submitted for the experience requirement.

Surrogate's Court Fees Total \$65,355

WHITE PLAINS—Fees collected by Surrogate's Court in 1947 totaled \$65,355, an increase of \$13,000 over the previous year and almost \$20,000 more than in 1945, according to the annual report of Surrogate Charles H. Griffiths submitted Wednesday to the Board of Supervisors.

The report was compiled by E. L. Finger, clerk of the court, to present a summary of its activities during the year. The magnitude of the work is illustrated by the statistics showing that the accounting department conducted proceedings involving estates totaling \$73,606,189, while the gross amount of assets in estates coming before the estate tax department was \$99,728,609.

The court assessed taxes totaling \$1,822,047 on the latter estates. The money, however, is not paid to the state. Under the law Surrogate Griffiths must determine and fix the amount of state tax on any estate coming before his court.

Surrogate Griffiths wrote 1264 memorandum decisions, and 254 written decisions on contested matters during the year. In which he also held 168 hearings on 128 contested matters. He held 293 conferences with attorneys, granting 189 adjournments and denied one such application.

The court also listed and issued 24,993 certificates, handling of 1,967 proceedings, according to 9,385 instruments, and approval of 724 bonds.

The probate department examined and filed 1,339 petitions, drew 1,342 decrees concerning 1,313 wills admitted to probate, and four rejected; and issued 1,338 letters testamentary. The administration department examined and filed 903 petitions, and issued 741 decrees and 741 letters of administration.

Nursing Home Ruling Is Awaited

WHITE PLAINS—Decision was reserved last week by Supreme Court Justice Lee Parsons Davis on an application by Mrs. Gertrude E. Ernst of 1324 North Avenue, New Rochelle, to vacate the zoning Board of Appeals of that city to grant a variance which would permit use of the property for a convalescent home.

Walter E. Ernst, her husband, accused that the board's action was arbitrary and unauthoritative. He contended that the nature of the neighborhood has changed, and that efforts to sell the place as a residence, continued over a period of three years, were unavailing until Dr. Louis Amato sought to purchase it for a private sanatorium.

Assistant Corporation Counsel John A. Bodmer defended the action of the board. He said that if the variance was allowed owners of other similar residential properties could demand similar changes, and that would destroy the neighborhood.

Protestants Plan Huge Aid Program

NEW YORK (AP)—A \$81-700,000 aid program for churches and needy of foreign countries is planned for 1948 by American Protestant churches.

The Church World Service, announcing the program yesterday, termed it greater than anything the American churches have ever attempted. It is \$20,000,000 larger than the program completed in 1947.

HARTFORD—New England and the South have received more than their share of praise in American history books according to Trinity College scholars who yesterday announced a new course on "The Influence of the Middle Atlantic States on U. S. History."

Professors at the 125-year-old New England college believe that American way of life had important origins in New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Delaware, which have been comparatively neglected by chroniclers.

Professor D. G. Britton Thompson, who will teach the new course for advanced students, pointed out that the Middle Atlantic States led the nation in assimilating a mixed population of American, European and Indian, developing business and industry, and supplying wealth for national expansion as well as producing a large population that has been the nation's most powerful group politically. These contributions of the Middle Atlantic States to American civilization, were basic in making the United States the strongest nation on earth, Professor Thompson believes.

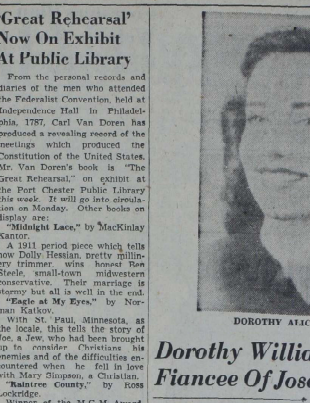

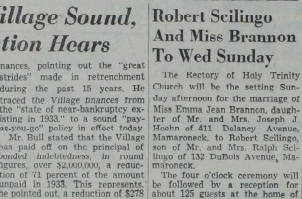

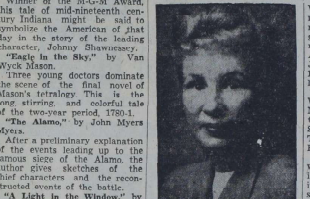
