THE GRAND JURY REPORTS

WHILE information of what transpired behind the closed doors of the October Grand Jury is withheld by law, yet the painstaking efforts of District Attorney George M. Paselli in presenting evidence connected with a large gambling raid in Harrison that month have been apparent.

It was an investigation which should have been thorough and regard for any person. For there had been countless rumors that "protection" had been sought to permit the gambling to continue without police interference.

Now the Grand Jury has made its report without indictments. Presumably any evidence tending to substantiate the rumors was either insufficient or inadequate as to legal requirement for indictment.

But it is pleasing to read the Grand Jury's report which says: "It is the opinion of the Grand Jury that the Police Department of the Town of Harrison and the Sheriff's Office and the District Attorney's Office of Westchester are to be commended for the prompt and efficient action they took when the existence of this gambling establishment came to their attention in raiding the same and bringing an end to the unlawful activities being conducted there."

We concur with that part on the back for the raiders. Westchester is a residential area, a county of homes, a place where people come so they may rear their families in peace and quiet and among law abiding surroundings.

That is something which Westchester will never concede. We trust. For when protection is sought, it is sought, and this leads to bribery, malfeasance in office, and even sometimes to violent crime.

ACIDENT REPORTS REMAIN AVAILABLE

A BILL introduced in the Legislature, which sought to cloak with secrecy all accident reports filed with the State Motor Vehicle Bureau as required by law, now seems dead and buried—and we're mighty glad of it.

We are glad to receive from the sponsor of the measure, State Senator Seymour Halpern of New York, a telegram advising that the measure has been killed "on my motion before the Motor Vehicle Committee, which is chairman."

It is good to have a letter from Clifford J. Fletcher, State Commissioner of Motor Vehicles, advising that the proposal to restrict information about accidents "was discussed with the idea of improving procedure, but, as we studied the results of such action we decided to withdraw our support to this proposed legislation."

This newspaper is particularly pleased that these steps to prevent the erection of barriers to an important source of public information followed an editorial protest in these columns, under the title, "No Iron Curtain On Auto Accidents."

In fairness to Commissioner Fletcher and to Senator Halpern it may be noted that such restrictions are incorporated in what is recommended to states as a Uniform Vehicle Code. The National Safety Council reports that all thirty-five States have adopted laws which provide that all traffic accident reports submitted by drivers shall be for the confidential use of the department receiving them and shall not be made public or used in any trial arising out of the accident.

Frankly, we wonder whether the press and bar associations of those thirty-five states were not asked when this restrictive measure was packed into their statutes during the recent years?

The argument is offered that by keeping drivers' reports guaranteed confidential, the individuals in accidents are protected from ambulance-chasers and are encouraged to give more accurate information because they know it cannot be published or used against them in court. We don't believe this is so at all.

A gigantic job must be done to reduce automobile slaughter—but we won't do it with secrecy. We may have far more success with new and brighter searchlights and loudspeakers, with new zeal on the part of police and prosecutors and courts, with new instruments of education, never suppression for the rising generation.

The withdrawal of the restrictive measure by Senator Halpern and the withdrawal of support by Commissioner Fletcher—this presenting a bill, and then becoming a dangerous law—these steps to making New York State highways safer. We commend both for their readiness to reverse themselves in the public interest.

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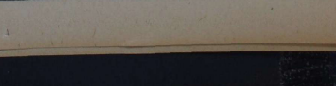

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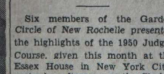

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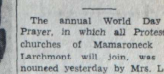

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Social Injustice Amid Beauty Emphasized By Noted Author

A personal background of the experiences which led to the writing of "How Beautiful" was written yesterday by Richard Lewellyn Welsh, known as "How Beautiful" author.

Mr. Lewellyn, introduced by Mrs. George F. Symons, program chairman, spoke on "The Writer's Role in Today's World," emphasizing that his own writing springs from a sense of social injustice in a world full of beauty, and urging that writers use their brains in terms of beauty.

He termed propaganda the "prime evil of our time, a deliberate attempt to fix ideas into the unwary mind, to reveal ways of thinking by the compulsion of a false logic."

The guest speaker described his boyhood experiences in Italy with the Red Cross, his work in hotel management, noting the rugged life amid hotel basements and kitchens, in an international atmosphere where he gained a speaking knowledge of eight languages.

Three lessons learned from the care of kitchen pots and pans will help you, it will not leave the job until you are satisfied.

Following a period as assistant movie director in Venice, Mr. Lewellyn joined the Army, serving five and a half years in Europe. A soldier, he termed himself "the most indolent, stupid and fat-headed in the world" with the soldier living in a "cathedral" entirely regulated by a time-table which makes the adjustment to civilian life "difficult."

After describing his lack of success at job hunting on leaving the Army, Mr. Lewellyn told of his start at writing, and his discovery that writing is "excellent for problems, worries, grudges and frustrations." He stressed the value of a religious faith in a power beyond the explanations of science and noted his personal change which resulted in regarding all men "not for what they had or where they came from but simply for what they were, as individual persons."

After a film job in Germany, the author wrote a play in 1937, called "A Roman Jew," written in three days at the request of an actress, and still running today. He went on to describe his "intuitive knowledge" of lun work which began writing "How Beautiful" in 1942, and the wartime experiences during the Second World War, stressing the devastation of war and his memories of seeing "youth of four nations in uniform, dead and mutilated because of the fault of adults who he said, 'are not responsible again.'"

"The same thing is happening again," he said, "and the politicians and scientists have the next war all set up. But the common people won't stand for it and war won't happen in Europe because the people won't let it."

Mr. Lewellyn's prescription for peace, he pointed out, is to "bless the Army, Navy and Air Force." The aim of Hitler, he said, is laughing today.

After the publication of his "None But the Lonely Heart," Mr. Lewellyn said, the radical changes were effected in delinquency and school laws.

His newest book, "A Few Powers for Shining," a story of two men caught in the machine of war and trying to get back to their wives, points out that human beings are "magnificently loyal," the author said, "and only writers trying to be sensational give the opposite impression."

During the question period for peace, he said, Mr. Lewellyn said that the best advice for a would-be writer is to "write 12 hours a day, 3,000 words in long hand, written to be burned, and neither

starvation, lack of a room nor anything else will keep him from writing if he has the heart to write women hate war," he noted in answer to another question, and there's no difference between Russian women, American women or any other kind of woman. If Stalin starts a war, he said, "the revolution will come from the common people."

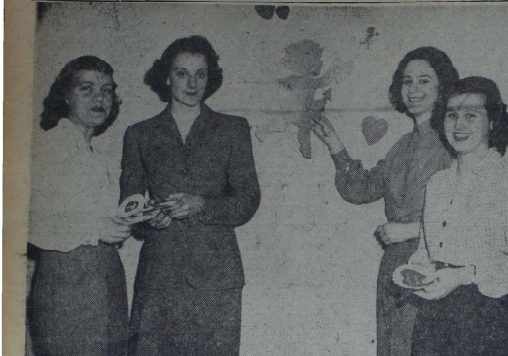
